County Runoff Election Saturday

Fisher County voters will be returning to the polls this Saturday to cast ballots in a total of 6 runoff races, five are state offices and one county race.

The local race involves Fisher County Commissioner Jimmy Wright in a runoff with challenger Bob Terry for the position of Commissioner Precinct No. 4.

Fisher County voting locations will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m., on Saturday, June 7th.

The statewide races include: John Sharp and P.S. Ervin for Railroad Commissioner. Shirley Butts and Oscar Mauzy for Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1;

Jim Brady and Robert Campbell for Justice of the Supreme Court.

Place 2; Raul Gonzalez and Jay Gibson for Justice of the Supreme

Court, Place 4, (unexpired term); and Rusty Duncan and George

Martinez, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1.

Bullock Roundup Nets 9.1 Million In Back Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that a roundup of delinquent and inactive taxpayers in April netted more than \$9.1 million in back taxes for the state.

Last month Bullock refused to hand out new sales tax permits to some 150,000 businesses that owed taxes or failed to file reports last year. Of the taxpayers who lost their permits in April, Bullock has reopened the accounts of 18,787 taxpayers who

have settled their debts. "We let folks know that if they wanted to do business in Texas, they had to hold a new permit. And we weren't issuing permits to tax delinquents until they paid what was due. I guess they knew we were serious. We have \$9.1 million in the bank to prove it," Bullock said.

Besides the delinquent taxpayers who paid up, another 300,000 taxpayers with

clean records received new permits. The remaining taxpayers who failed to file returns or reported no sales during 1985 are considered to be out-of-business.

"Sometimes businesses fail, but the owners forget to tell us so we can take them off the books. Besides the money we picked up from back taxes, we're saving the state another \$250,000 each year in paperwork, processing and postage on those 134,000 dead accounts,"

Bullock said. "I've got to declare this project a success."

Bullock reminded consumers to be on the look out for the new red, white and blue permit and "be aware of who you're doing business with." Businesses not displaying the new permits are operating illegally, he said. The money collected in back taxes has been placed in the General Revenue Fund.

ed, but oxidation continues and the hay may become extremely hot.

There is a serious danger that a barn fire will occur when the temperature goes above 160 degrees F. Fire pockets may occur in the hay when temperatures reach 175 to 185 degrees F.

Producers can best check the temperature of forage by probing with a steel rod and inserting a thermometer attached to a wire. Use a dairy or similar type thermometer that will record a temperature of at least 200 degrees F.

If hay reaches a temperature of 140 degrees F., it should be checked daily. At 160 degrees F., hay should be checked hourly, and at 180 degrees, it should be removed from the barn.

Since removing hot hay from a barn may hasten spontaneous combustion, producers may need to have a good

water supply handy to fight a fire with.

To prevent a large economic loss of forage and facilities, producers should strive to bale hay at the optimum moisture content of 13 to 15

percent moisture. A hay preservative must certainly be considered at moisture levels of 18 percent or higher if weather conditions prevent drying to be optimum level.

Fisher County Reaches 60% Savings Bond Goal

During the first quarter of calendar year 1986, Texas sales of U.S. Savings Bonds amounted to \$94,802, 245, an increase of over \$13 million over 1985 for 16.4%, T.J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced today. These sales represent 25.6% of the state's 1986 assigned dollar goal of \$370 million. March 1986 sales of Series EE Bonds were \$33,634,254 an increase of 15.1% over March 1985.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$37,386 during March 1986 in Fisher County, James L. Springer, Volunteer County Chairman, said. Total sales in the County during the

period January-March, 1986 were \$74,000.00, which represents 60.7% of the County's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, March sales of U.S. Savings Bonds totaled \$600 million, 40% above March a year ago and the highest sales for any March since 1979. Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds for the first half of the Fiscal 1986 increased 40% over the same period a year ago. Savings Bonds held by the American public reached an all-time high-over \$81 billion for the first time ever-to \$81.42 billion.

Much of the sales growth can be attributed to the new market-based rate which was effective November 1, 1982.

Nuclear Dump Site

I'll bet our neighbors to the north (Deaf Smith County-Hereford, Texas) are tickled to death that they are in the running for the nation's first high level nuclear waste dump. I say that "tongue in cheek", because the announcement has caused my blood pressure to rise, I can just imagine what it has done for our Panhandle friends.

United States Energy Secretary John Herrington has nominated Deaf Smith County along with Yucca Mountain, Nevada and Hanford, Washington as potential sites, and President Ronald Reagan has accepted the sites. Two sites were removed from consideration-Richton Dome, Mississippi and Davis Canyon, Utah. I suspect their Congressman and U.S. Senators cut deals to get them off the dreaded list.

If the possibility of getting a nuclear dump site, some 4 hours from our front door in Fisher County doesn't scare you, how about the amount of federal funds that will be needed to further study the sites. According to U.S. Government reports it will take about \$970 million more dollars to perform additional studies on Hanford, Washington; (by the way I'll lay heavy odds this site is never selected-too many environmentalists in the Great Northwest, they're not about to sit still for a nuclear waste dump among all the Washington state pines, near Washington State apples and so close to California); additional studies at Deaf Smith County will cost \$850 million and additional studies at Yucca Mountain, Nevada will be \$780 million.

I don't know much about Hereford, Texas or Deaf Smith County except on a clear slightly breezy summer night you can smell the Hereford stockyards in Canyon, Texas-but that doesn't matter. We're talking nuclear waste here. I remember a firm in Deaf Smith County by the name of Arrowhead Mills that manufactures a variety of health and nutrition grains (I assume they're still in business) and if they are-don't buy any stock in the company, they'll probably be out of business if Deaf Smith County is selected as the nuclear dump site. What health food nut would want grain grown over a nuclear dump site.

I'm concerned with the water table. We're bound to get runoff from the Panhandle and even though the nuclear dump site is supposed to be safe-I suspect Russia thought Chernobyl was safe also-I don't want to take the risk.

I vote for Nevada. The United States will save \$190 million by finally selecting Nevada-so why not eliminate Texas and Washington state right now and save the bucks. Nevada has few permanent residents (eliminate Carson City, Las Vegas and Reno) and the greatest attraction of the state is gambling coupled with the "oldest profession in the world."

Nevada deserves the dump site in my opinion.

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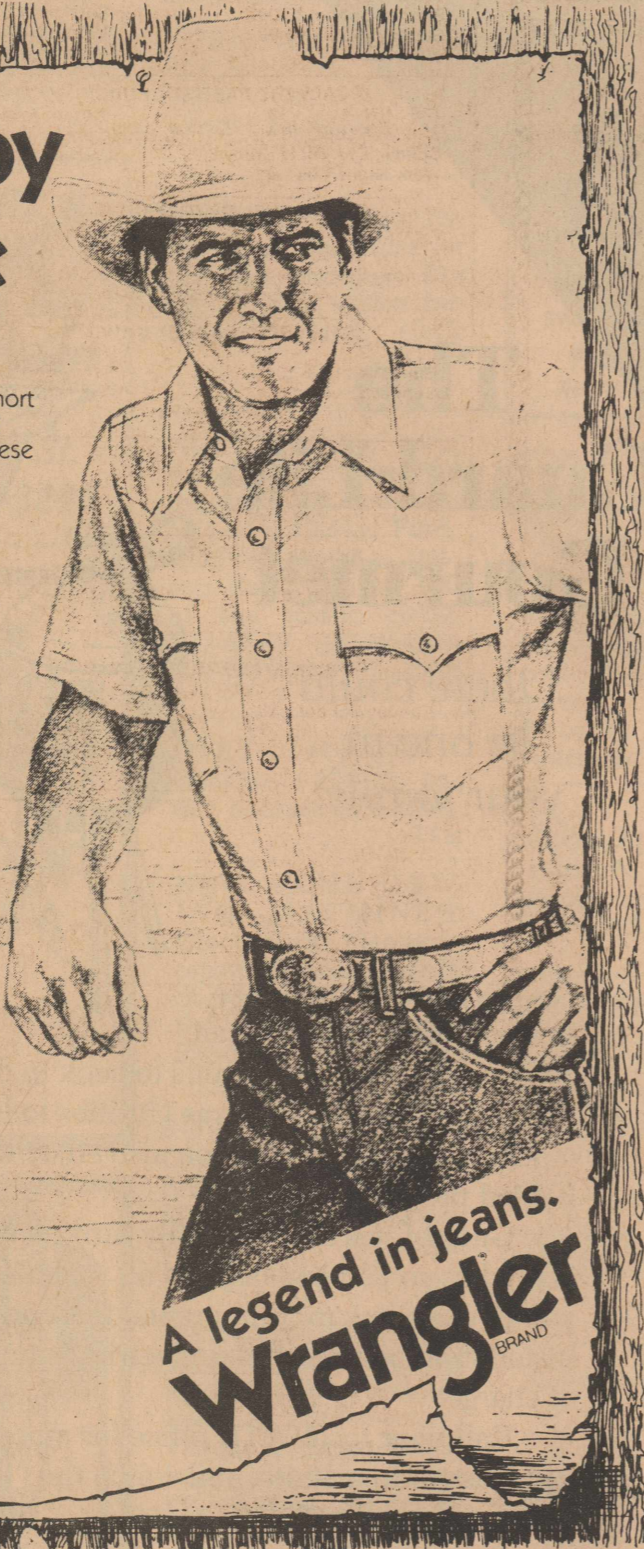
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State Capital Highlights

IRS NOTICES

(Know What You're Paying)

The Internal Revenue Service sends out numerous tax deficiency notices which are incorrect. Don't pay additional amounts on your income tax return unless you are satisfied that you owe it.

IRS offices are staffed with ordinary people that make ordinary mistakes. Add to that a computer that can make ordinary computer mistakes and you have the ingredients for improperly mailed notices. Because these notices come from a Federal agency, the average person gives them more credibility than they may deserve.

The Internal Revenue Service is attempting to match certain documents to your social security number and your tax return. If you receive interest, dividends, rents, royalties, or any number of other types of income, you will probably be issued a "1099" information slip identifying the earnings. If the IRS can't readily locate that information on your tax return, they may send you a deficiency notice even though that income may be included somewhere in your tax return.

Don't assume that you owe additional taxes to the IRS just because they send you a statement. Because of the possibilities of both mechanical and human error, it's worth checking to make sure you owe the amount requested.

If you have paid someone to prepare your tax return, give them a copy of "all" correspondence you receive from the Internal Revenue Service, even those which do not request additional taxes. Your tax return preparer needs a full track record of all aspects of your tax return if he's to do an adequate job of representing you. Most IRS notices require a response within a specified number of days; therefore, all correspondence should be given to your accountant as soon as possible.

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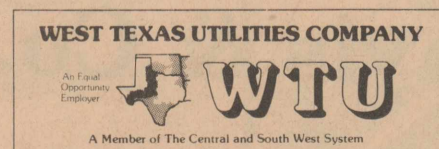

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Rotan's Tom Hargrove Takes Part In Aggie Muster

Texas A&M graduates in the Philippines held a Texas Aggie Muster in Malinta Tunnel on Corregidor Island Philippines on April 20, 1986, 44 years after a historic Aggie Muster at the same location. The ceremony also commemorated the

150th anniversary of Texas independence. Twenty Aggies answered a "Roll Call for the Deceased" for 20 Aggies who died defending Corregidor in 1942. At the 1986 Muster was Dr. Thomas R. Hargrove, of the International Rice Research

Institute, Los Banos, Philippines. Hargrove, a 1966 A&M graduate and a 1962 graduate of Rotan High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Hargrove of Rotan.

Aggies, worldwide, meet yearly for Muster on Texas Independence Day, April 21 when, in 1836, Gen. Sam Houston and his Texas Volunteers defeated the Mexican Army at San Jacinto and established the Republic of Texas.

In 1942, 25 Texas Aggies, mostly lieutenants and captains, mustered in the vast Malinta Tunnel at the invitation of Gen. George F. Moore, 1908 graduate of A&M and commander of the Philippine coastal artillery. As Japanese artillery pounded "The Rock", the Aggies held

a traditional Roll Call, with living Aggies answering for each dead comrade-at the mouth of Gen. Moore's lateral of the tunnel. The list was substantial; that Muster was in the aftermath of Bataan's fall and 15 days before Corregidor had to surrender. Within 2 weeks, all surviving Aggies were dead or prisoners of war. Twenty Aggies (19 were officers) died in Corregidor's defense. Only 3 of the Aggies who attended the 1942 Muster are alive today.

The 1986 ROLL CALL was at the same spot as in 1942. Living Aggies answered "here" for the 20 who died on Corregidor. "In the dark, musty recesses.. many said they felt the presence of those heroic

men who fought on Corregidor," said James W. Carter of Waco, Muster Chairman.

Aggies sailed to Corregidor aboard the "Mount Samat", former presidential ship of the Philippine Navy. Ceremonies were preceded by a tour of Corregidor and a Texas barbecue. The Lybian crisis put Clark Air Force Base cargo planes on alert..and prevented Aggie pilots from flying Lone Star beer to the Philippines for the Muster.

Victory was celebrated at a 1946 Aggie Muster on Corregidor, attended by 150 Aggies. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, in a special message to the "Sons of Texas A&M on Corregidor", wrote "in this hallowed soil lie the mortal remains of many men who here died that liberty might live. Among the bravest..are twenty officers, sons of Texas A&M, unable themselves to answer this year's annual Muster. It is for us..to do so for them..to answer in loud and clear

voice..Dead on battleswept Corregidor where their eternal spirit will never die but will march on forever..."

A 1943 Muster on

Guadacanal was attended by 27 Aggies and a 1945 Muster on Guam, by about 50.

In World War II, 20,000 Texas Aggies

served in the U.S. armed services. Texas A&M, not West Point or Annapolis...was America's largest source of officers.

A lot of information as well as misinformation is going around regarding the nutritive value of beef and its fat and cholesterol content. There is much confusion, for instance, about the effects of saturated fat and cholesterol on human health and on which meats contain these products.

The really high cholesterol foods are chicken livers, eggs, beef liver and shrimp. When comparing a large egg with a rib steak, shrimp with ground beef, roast chicken (light meat, skinned) with canned tuna, crab meat with ground beef, and extra lean ground beef with roast chicken (dark meat with skin), the first food listed is higher in cholesterol but the second item has more saturated fats.

Forage producers and purchasers need to be cautious of the moisture content of hay at time of baling and storing.

Barn fires due to unfavorable hay drying conditions caused by weather and high humidity are a real problem in the spring. The problem has been more prevalent the past two years because of increased harvesting of wheat hay.

Producers should keep a careful watch on hay stored in buildings the first four to six weeks. When the temperature of hay reaches 150 to 175 degrees F., bacteria and mold's in the hay are killed, but oxidation continues and the hay may become extremely hot.

There is a serious danger that a barn fire will occur when the temperature goes above 160 degrees F. Fire pockets may occur in the hay when temperatures reach 175 to 185 degrees F.

Producers can best check the temperature of forage by probing with a steel rod and inserting a thermometer attached to a wire. Use a dairy or similar type thermometer that will record a temperature of at least 200 degrees F.

If hay reaches a temperature of 140 degrees F., it should be checked daily. At 160 degrees F., hay should be checked hourly, and at 180 degrees, it should be removed from the barn.

Since removing hot hay from a barn may hasten spontaneous combustion, producers may need to have a good

water supply handy to fight a fire with.

To prevent a large economic loss of forage and facilities, producers should strive to bale hay at the optimum moisture content of 13 to 15

percent moisture. A hay preservative must certainly be considered at moisture levels of 18 percent or higher if weather conditions prevent drying to be optimum level.

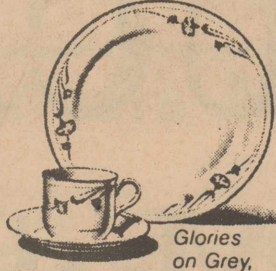

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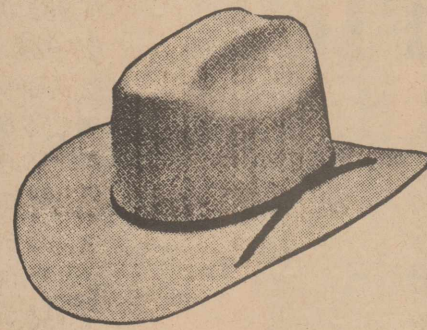

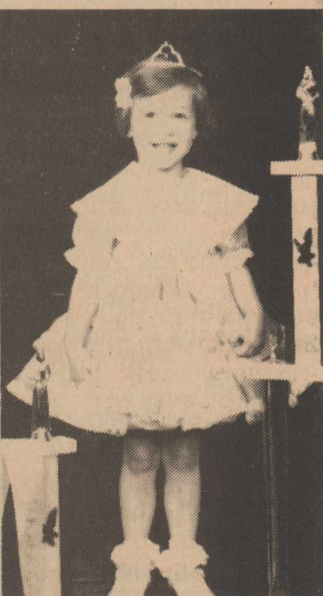
Parents should accompany children under ten who do not have a library card already. There is no charge.

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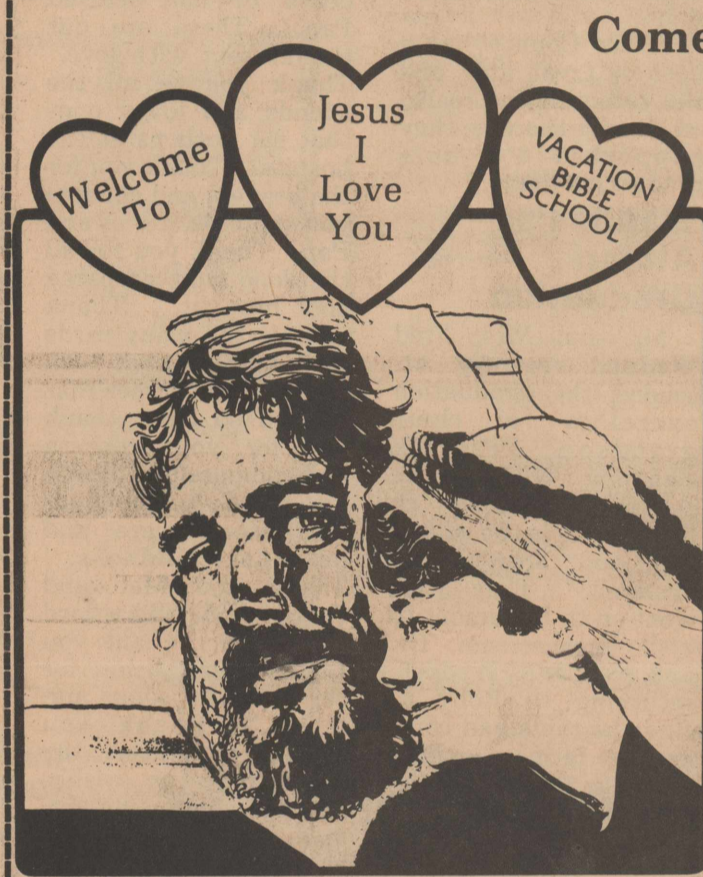


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
