Rotan School To Lose Tax Values, Taxes Make Go Up Make Budget

The Rotan School Board, after kicking around the construction of a new track field for approximately a year, recently decided to table any action on the construction. Last Monday night, the funds that would have been expended on a track field, were listed in a new category--that of surplus budget funds. The \$135,000 originally earmarked for the track field and some \$20,000 that was set aside for the purchase of a new school bus that was not ordered appeared as surplus funds.

Board members are in the process of studying the 1986-87 budget. They will be holding a budget workshop meeting on Thursday, August 28th at 7:30

From preliminary indications. Rotan total appraisal value will decrease from approximately \$70,871,000 for last year to \$68,690,000 this year. In order to enerate the same tax dollars, the rate of .85 cents per \$100.00 valuation will have to increase to .91 cents.

During last Monday night's meeting Pat Hamric presented the results of the TEAMS test taken by Rotan first grade students.

Students scored 89% in mathematics, above Region 14 schools and state schools; but fell below region and state schools in scoring 74% in writing and 70% in

reading. Superintendent Alton Fields asked for and received approval from board members to use his discression in using the 6 allowed early dismissal days during the 1986-87 school year.

Board members approved the selection of four career ladder teachers. The four new teachers, coupled with nine holdover teachers give Rotan a total of thirteen teachers receiving the \$1,500 annual bonus.

Board members reviewed the local board policy concerning the driving and parking of automobiles on school property and asked Superintendent Fields to instruct building principals to adhere strictly to the board policy.

Gandy's Dairies was awarded the milk bid for the 1986-87 year on a motion by Donnie Gruben and second by Joe Morrow that passed unanimously.

Commissioners Anticipating Hike In Taxes To Meet Budget

without increases. Since

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court, in anticipation that some 35 million in taxable value will be lost from the tax rolls for the current year, are proposing adopting a budget

some 35 million is lost in taxable value representing approximately \$180,000 in spendable tax dollars, it appears that the taxable rate to county residents will have to increase from .37 cents per \$100.00 valuation last year to .42 cents or .43 cents per \$100 valuation this year. The increase from .37 cents to .42 or .43 cents will generate the same spendable dollars

for Fisher County. The total county valuation is being projected to fall from \$289,859,000.00 to \$254,629,000.00 representing the \$35,229,784.00 loss in valuation.

County Commissioners reviewed the possibility of using Action Telecommunications as a long distance telephone carrier. A presentation was made to the commissioners by Cindy Evans. She indicated that the county could save 20% on long distance calls. Commissioners requested further information and are expected to reach a decision in September.

In discussing the new budget, Judge Marshal Bennett and the Commissioners are not going to plug any pay increases into the new budget. They are asking department heads to curtail the purchasing of new equipment in their effort to keep the budget at the same level as last year.

Judge Bennett indicated that he felt the real financial crunch would be felt by county officials next year. He suggested that commissioners look at some type of consolidation of work and equipment in the future from a strictly economic standpoint.

Commissioners discussed the county trapper salary and a requested \$200.00 a month increase in fees for the next contract year. They didn't take any action.

Commissioners are expected to name the members of the Fisher County Economic Development Board at a meeting later this

Commissioner Jay Hendon made a motion that passed unanimously not to hire any new employees in the Fisher County Agent's Office.





IRS AUDITS & YOU

There are some steps you can take to make an audit of your tax return less likely and, in the event that you are audited, steps that you can take to make that experience

To avoid being audited, your best defense is a good offense. File an accurate, complete return, and keep good records and supporting documentation for income items and deductions that you claim. Keep your records long enough to meet the statute of limitations for the tax return related to them. The federal statute is three years from the later of the date of the return is due or is actually filed. The statute is six years if over 25 percent of gross income is omitted from the return, and there is no time limit on fraudulent returns or where no return

ing fields!! BOLL WEEVILS

Boll weevils are present in many fields in the 5 county area. Infestations will reach damaging levels in these fields during mid-August as large numbers of adult weevils emerge, begin feeding and egg deposi-

Damaging weevil infestations are already present in some fields but there is less than 10% square damage in a large number of fields. Fields where there is some weevil damage should be inspected at least weekly and preferably twice weekly. Boll weevils prefer squares 1/3 grown (1/4 inch indiameter) or larger for egg deposition. Once 25% of the 1/3

weevil damage, control measures are needed. It is very difficult to bring boll weevils under control when over 50% square damage is present before control measures are started, try to keep the square damage below 15%.

The boll weevil infestations in the area now are heavy and are comparable to the heavy infestations of the early 1907's. Control measures will have to be applied to prevent excessive damage in many fields.

Before starting a boll weevil control program, evaluate the square and boll set. The bolls must be protected from boll weevils until they are one inch in diameter or 12 days old. In fields where there are very few bolls, more insecticidal applications will be needed to mature the

Insecticides applied for boll weevil control will also destroy beneficial insects and spiders. So treated fields should be inspected closely for bollworms. A population of 5,000 or more bollworms per acre can cause excessive damage. Should a damaging population of bollworms

change will be needed. Information on insecticides for control of cotton pests is presented in B-1209 1986 Management of Cotton Insects in the High Plains, Rolling Plains, and Trans-Pecos Area. publication is available at your County Extension Office.


