Disciplined Bible Study Course To Be Held At First United Methodist Church In Rotan

A program of disciplined Bible study for laymen, emphasizing knowing what the Bible says as a basis for what it means, will begin October 2 at the First United Methodist Church, 209 N. McKinley, Rotan. The

course, a survey of the Old Testament, will last for ten weeks. This study is one of ten semesters of Bible study prepared by Trinity Bible Studies, and is non-denominational in scope. Not intended as mere devotional or occa-

sional material, these Bible studies call for disciplined commitment. The student is expected to attend weekly classes, complete daily assignments, and prepare for examinations; however, the approach is neither heavy nor scholastic. There will be unique visual aids used in the teaching.

The Fisher County Young Farmers will hold a trap shoot Sunday, Sept. 14th starting at 1 p.m.

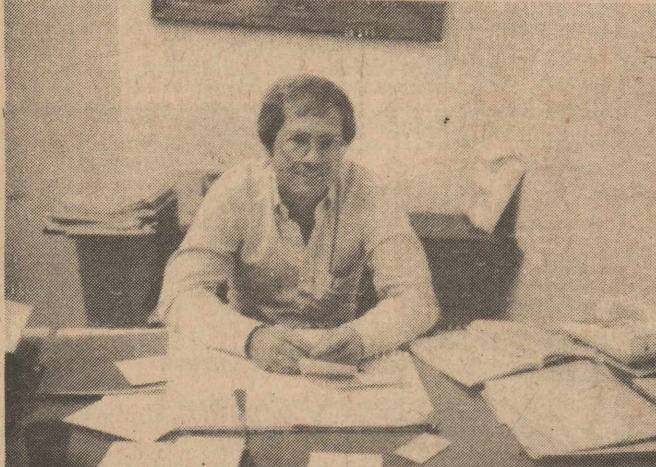
The shoot will be at the Dono Terry Farm on F.M. 419.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Legislature last week continued its stalemate over House and Senate plans to revitalize a shrinking state budget, and lawmakers expected to carry on in a second 30-day special session throughout September.

Gov. Mark White, on a collision course with the House with his plan to raise the state sales tax, told House Speaker Gib Lewis that unless House members softened, they could expect him to keep them in Austin another month.

Meanwhile, the House showed the first signs of cracking under immense pressure to raise taxes. Bill Hollowell, D-Grand Saline, and Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, agreed to carry a bill raising the sales tax by seven-eighths cents.

Last week, senators passed and sent to the House their bill to cut only \$418 million, and with it went an ultimatum from Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby. Hobby predicted the Senate, in the end, would reject all cuts unless a tax bill was enacted.

SIGNS OF CRACKING

The House at first quickly rejected the Senate cuts, sending the issue to a conference committee where lawmakers saw little hope of a compromise before adjournment Sept. 4.

But by the end of the week, Hollowell, a multi-term Democrat who might easily win an in-house contest for "Most Conservative State Representative," agreed to carry a tax hike. He was joined by Speaker Pro Tem Berlanga, and pro-tax legislators took hope.

The crucial House leadership, Speaker Gib Lewis and Ways and Means Chairman Stan Schlueter, still vowed to stop a tax bill.

Quietly, the House agreed to adjust some cuts, particularly those made to higher education. The Senate also wants to leave funds intact for court-ordered reforms in prison and mental health facilities.

"SIMPLE SLAM DUNK"

The House followed suit to permit branch and interstate banking for the first time in Texas, a quick action that sponsor Rep. Bruce Gibson, D-Godley, called a "simple slam dunk." The bill went to the governor's desk for signing.

The moving force behind the bill was the closing of 15 Texas banks this year. Proponents want out-of-state banks to infuse Texas with new cash; opponents fear they could drain more cash from Texas.

The House version removed the Senate's restriction to limit it to nine metropolitan counties. Also, the House added a new bank holiday, Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday.

The bill allows out-of-state banks to buy existing banks in Texas, but not create new ones. No non-Texas savings and loan can buy a Texas bank. Every bank in Texas will be required to have a majority of Texans on its board of directors.

Two controversial provisions: no out-of-state bank can accumulate more than 25 percent of all Texas bank deposits under its

control, opposed by some as too lenient; and the door is open to banks in all other states.

The branch banking bill is expected to be on the November 1986 ballot for voter approval.

PARIMUTUEL, LOTTERY ADVANCE

The Legislature last week stood poised to pass legalized betting at horse and dog tracks and setting up a state lottery similar to those in 22 other states.

Those issues will also face voter approval, but not until a 1987 election.

The House tentatively passed the parimutuel betting bill, already approved in the Senate. And the Senate gave tentative passage to the lottery bill.

OTHER ACTION

The Senate also approved additional benefits to boost early retirement by state employees, while the House advanced the Senate bill to retract a three percent pay raise for state employees starting next month.

The House also noddled ahead a bill eliminating a 5-cent-per-gallon tax credit for gasoline not made in Texas. The move would add \$13.4 million to the

state's general revenues but not harm the gasoline industry here.

"HELL FREEZES OVER"

When Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle recently blasted former GOP Gov. Bill Clements for not selling all his shares in a drilling company doing business in Libya, many understood he was trying to help the Democrat, Gov. Mark White.

Then a few days later, a look at the list of stockholders for Schlumberger, Inc., revealed the name of former Secretary of State John Fainter, one of Gov. Mark White's top operatives and closest friends.

Slagle, who should never be accused of faint-heartedness, refused to back off his statement that Clements must sell those shares and stop giving aid and comfort to an unfriendly nation.

In fact, he told one audience he would apologize to Clements when "hell freezes over". Fainter, in private business now, kept the issue low-key, saying he bought the stock as an investment and might sell it in the near future.

Executive Committee Meets At Courthouse

The Executive Committee of the Fisher County Program Building Committee met Tuesday in the Courthouse Annex. Mrs. Lowell Thornburg, chairman, presided. Minutes were read by Mrs. Fred Kemp.

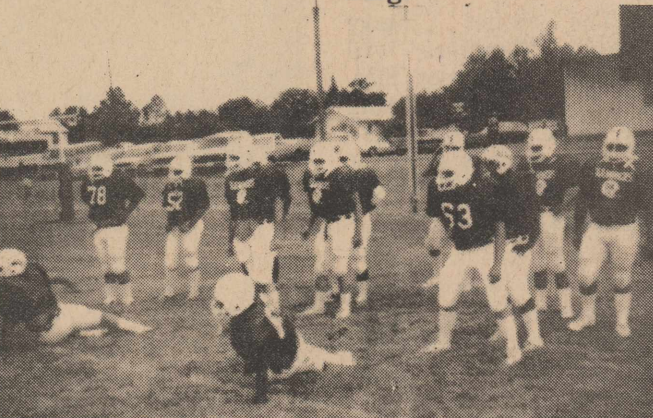
The date set for the Annual meeting of the County Program Building Committee

LOANS TO FAMILY

Loans to family members, especially from parents to children are often too casually arranged. What are the consequences of charging less than the going rate of interest on a loan to a family member? What tax treatment are you entitled to in the event the loan goes bad?

Interest-free loans and loans at less than the going rate of interest are generally treated by the IRS as though they required the going rate of interest. Such loans will create interest income to the lender and a corresponding interest deduction for the borrower. The interest deemed received by the lender is then considered to have been gifted back to the borrower.

The rate of interest "imputed" by the IRS is determined by the length of the loan and the current rate of interest on certain obligations of the United States.

There will be no imputed interest if the loan is under \$10,000 or if the borrower has annual net investment income of \$1,000 or less and the total loans do not exceed \$100,000. For practical purposes, the borrower can only use the funds to acquire non-income producing assets (a car, boat or home, for example.)

If the debt becomes uncollectable, the lender will get one or two possible tax treatments. If it's a non-business loan, the lender will get a short-term capital loss under the current tax laws. (The upcoming tax legislation may do away with capital gain and capital loss provisions entirely.) The lender will be entitled to the preferred ordinary loss if the loan is in connection with the lender's trade or business.

If you are providing financial assistance to some family member, whether it's a direct loan, an assignment of equity in property, or a line of credit at a bank, give proper concern to both the legal and tax aspects of your transaction.

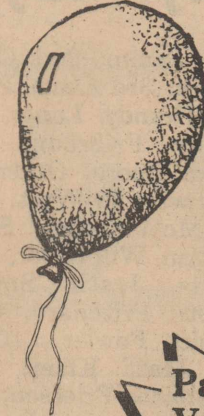

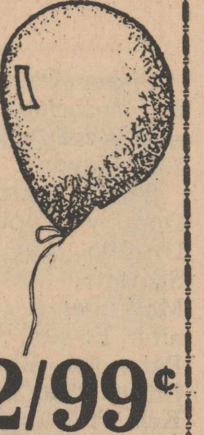

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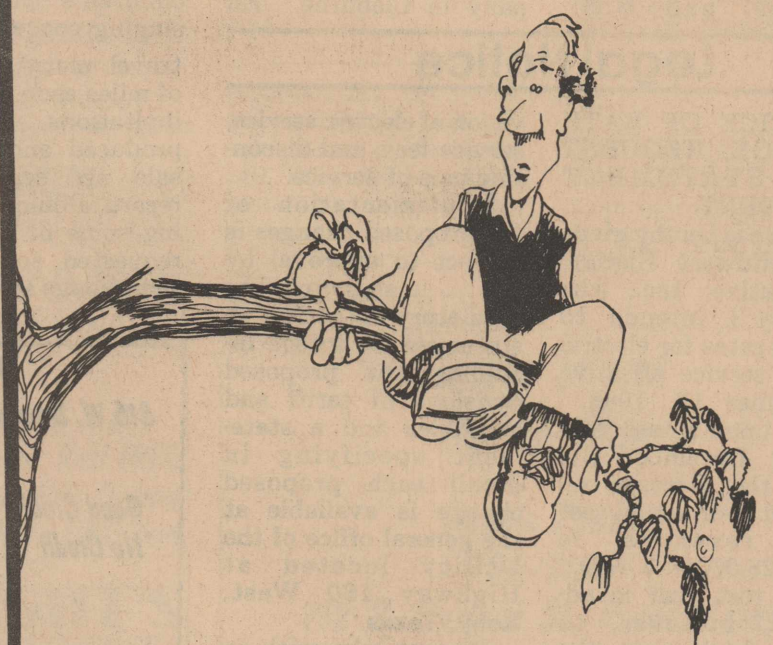

and installing a fifth defensive back.

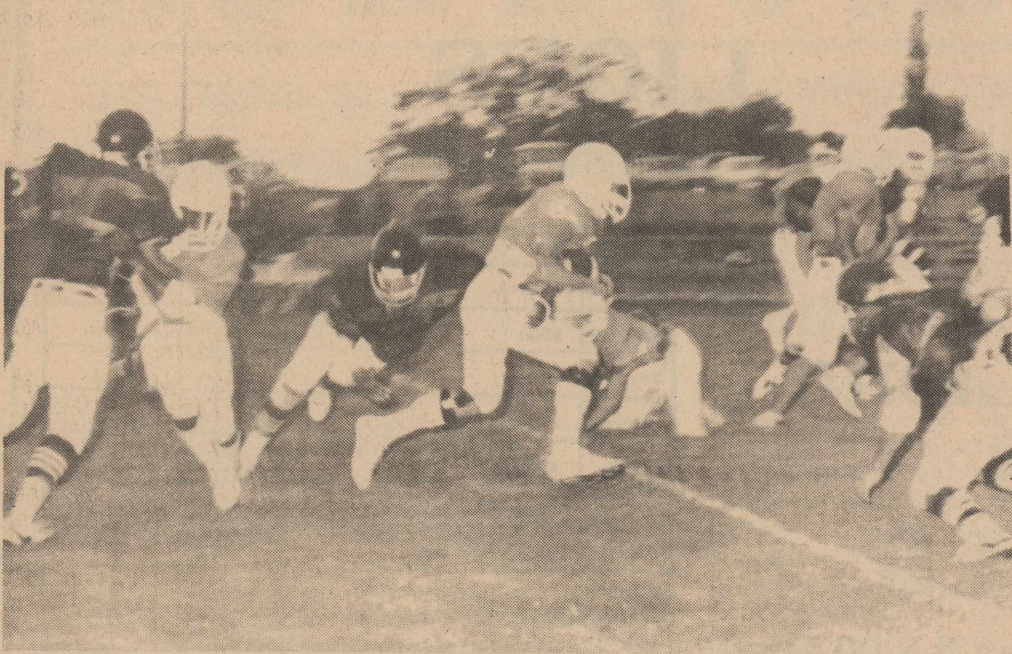
Robert Lee runs a one back offense. Their run and shoot offense gives the quarterback the run option, run sweep and pass and it is a worry to

fullback (No. 22) and may have the fastest wide receiver we see all year", commented the coach.

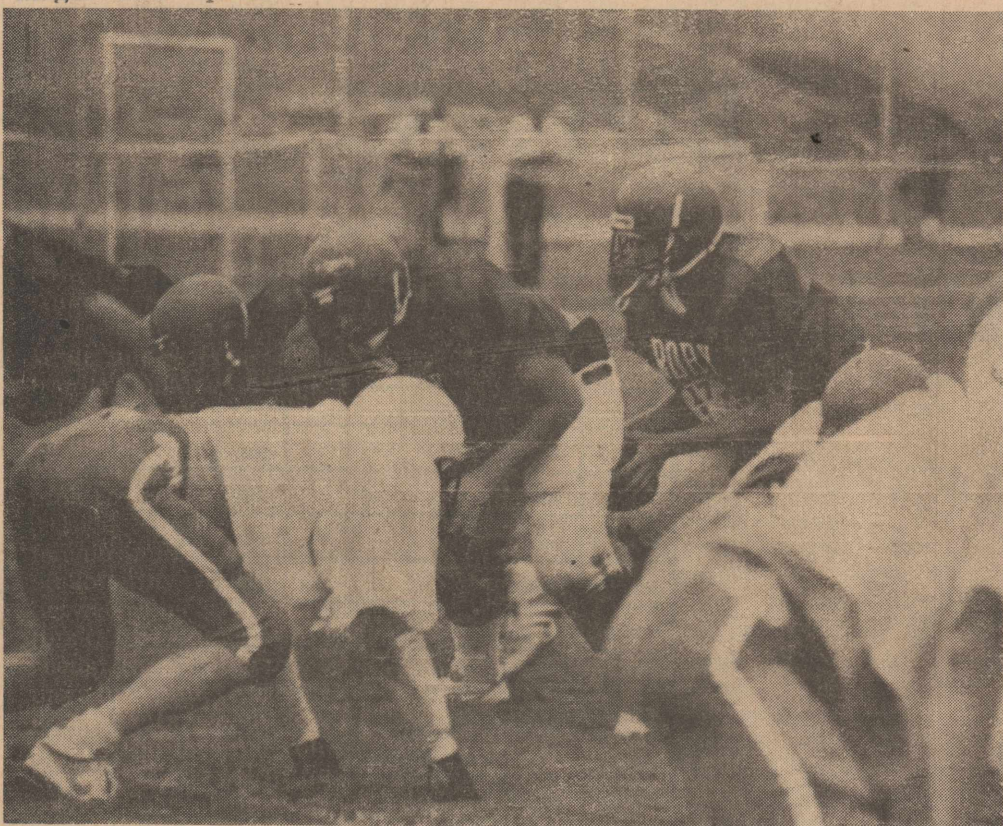
Against Robert Lee, in the final scrimmage,

County Bug Scoop

August 28th Bollworm moth numbers reached an all-time summer high. Bollworm egg numbers remained low during the first part of the week. After checking the moth trap today, I expect egg numbers to increase over the weekend.

Young cotton fields that have quite a few squares, blooms and making new growth are most attractive to the bollworm moths as they look for a place to lay their eggs. The older fields with few squares will be less likely to get into worm problems! SCOUT! PLEASE KEEP YOUR FIELDS CHECKED FOR EGGS AND WORMS THIS WEEK!!! The economic threshold to use is 8 to 10 small worms per 100 terminals.

Boll weevil traps are catching weevils, so we know they're on the move! Some fields continue to show increased weevil damage.

Spraying for weevils should be when 20-25% of the 1/2 grown or larger squares are damaged. It is very hard to bring weevils back under control when the damage level is above 50%. Once control measures are started for weevils, the square damage level should be held below 15% if possible. An interval of 3 to 5 days (not 6 or 7) between insecticidal applications will be needed. If a field is being sprayed for weevils and worms get started in that field, an insecticide change will be needed.

SORGHUM MIDGE
Some of you will want to be checking your blooming sorghum for midge. Here are some helpful hints from Tom Fuchs, Extension Entomologist in San Angelo:

Description: The adult midge is a small fragile looking orange colored fly about 1/12 of an inch long. Larvae or maggots are tiny and pink to orange in color.
Life Cycle: Adult female midges deposit 50-250 tiny white eggs between the glumes or husks of developing seeds. Eggs hatch in 2-3 days into pink to orange or maggots which consumes the internal contents of developing seeds. Larval development requires 9-11 days.

Larvae pupate beneath the glume. Shortly before the adult emerges, the pupa works its way toward the tip of the spikelet until three quarters of the pupa protrudes from the tip. The pupal period is completed in 3 days and a generation can be completed in 14-16 days. Adults live only 1-2 days.

Damage: Sorghum midge can damage grain sorghum only when it is blooming. A single floret or seed is susceptible only 1 day, a head normally blooms and is susceptible for about 7-9 days. A field which is uniform is usually susceptible for 2-3 weeks. Susceptible grains are only those with yellow blooms or anthers.

Midge larvae cause damage by feeding on the ovary of the seed which prevents normal development of the seeds and results in "blasted" heads. Severe damage can result in 90-100% yield loss.

Scouting Tips: To determine if midge are present, begin scouting when 10% of the heads are in bloom. Remember that a sorghum head blooms from the tip downward and on the first day or two of bloom only a few florets or seeds are blooming. Sample bet-

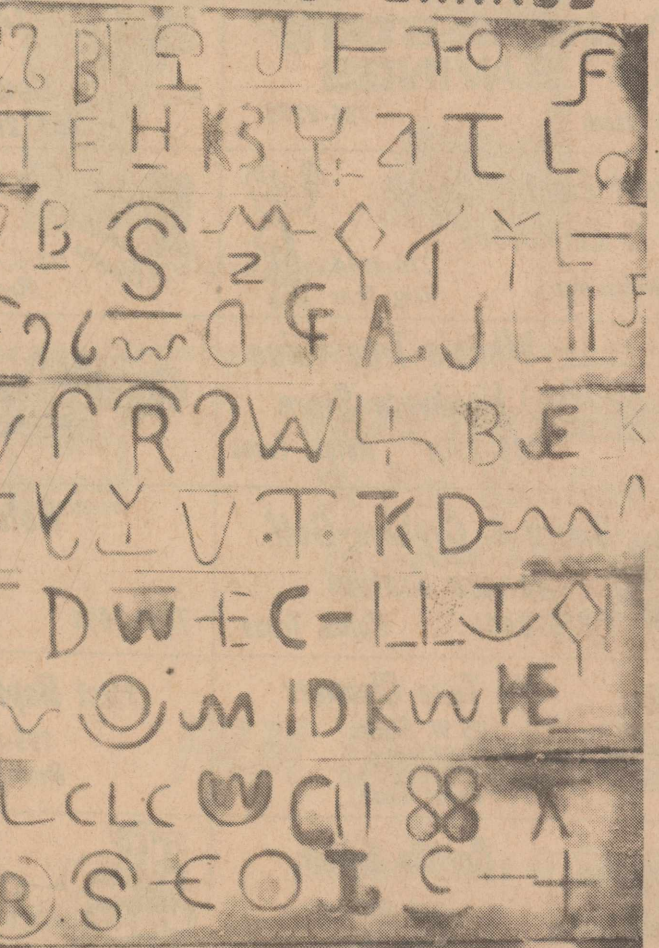
ween mid-morning and noon. Each day a new midge population is present, so sample daily, if possible. Sample either by carefully observing heads for midge adults or by slipping a clear plastic bag over a sorghum head, shaking the head and looking for adult midges at the top of the bag. Sample a minimum of 50-100 heads per field per day.

Control: The most cost effective control for midge is uniform planting of hybrids of uniform maturity in a community. Johnson grass control is also helpful because this is usually the first spring host for sorghum midge.

Several sorghum midge resistant hybrids are commercially available although not yet widely planted in West Texas.

Chemical control may be justified when more than 1-2 adult midge per head can be found on susceptible hybrids or 5-10 on resistance hybrids. As many as 3-4 applications at 3-4 day intervals may be necessary to protect a field from economic losses. Day 5-12 of bloom in a uniform field contributes about 75-80% of potential grain production and are key days for midge control.

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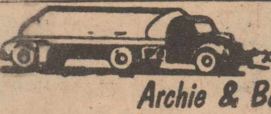
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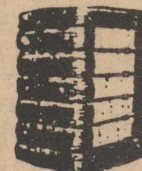
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
