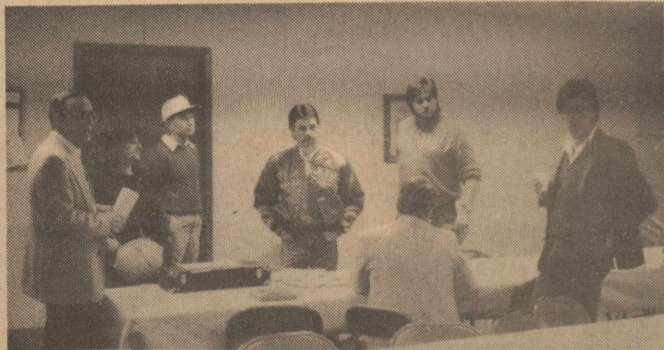

Merit List students included Jo Ann Terry of Roby and Susan Ann Foster of Rotan.

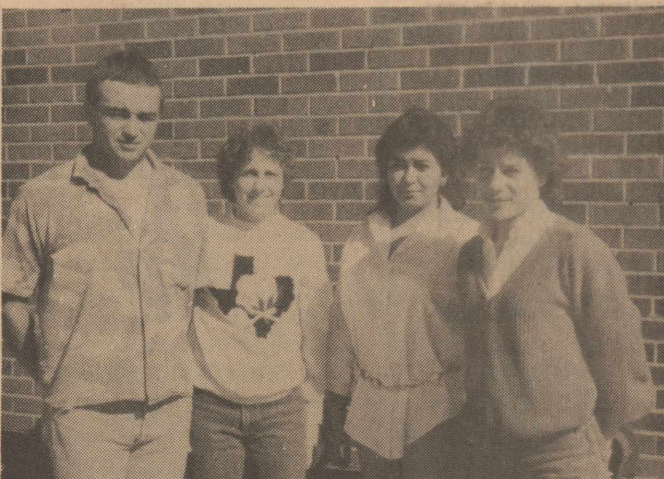
The President's List is composed of students who make no grade lower than A while

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Linda Moore-Lanning Authors Book, The Myth: The Truth About Texas Women

Do the culture, traditions, and ethnic background of Texas women set them apart from other women in the United States.

Linda Moore-Lanning thinks so. She has written a book about Texas women entitled "Breaking The Myth: The Truth About Texas Women."

Moore-Lanning travelled some 14,000 miles and interviewed hundreds of Texas women before deciding they indeed were different.

The author grew up in Roby, a small West Texas community near Abilene. She could write the book, she pointed out, only because she is a Texan and feels that the people of Texas would not be able to accept such a book written by a non-Texan.

"Breaking The Myth" (Eakin Press, \$14.95) pulls the wraps off the myths and puts

the spotlight on Texas taboos that grandmother would never have discussed. By being guaranteed anonymity, Texas women discussed their upbringing, religions, friends and lovers, their careers, including prostitution, and their lifestyles-including lesbians.

The author doesn't shock, and provides understanding, not judgment. She explores all ethnic groups equally and sheds new light on old differences. "I see this as a book for all women", the author said. "It will help them understand and appreciate themselves."

Moore-Lanning got the idea to write this book while she was a part-time teacher at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Washington. It happened at a reception for new faculty members. One of the professors explained:

"Ah! A Texas woman. I've read so much about Texas and Texas men. When are we going to hear from Texas women?"

This questions kept nibbling at her for eight or nine months. When she learned she was going to be in Texas to judge a speaking contest at a state convention of Business and Professional Women, she put together a questionnaire which she hoped would help her gather some information about these women.

She decided to stay in Texas that summer and with her two daughters, she travelled over the state interviewing pro-

minent women in various fields. She encountered the many cultures and ethnic groups in Texas and decided that that helped explain why Texas women are different.

Moore-Lanning points out that women-rather than men-pass on to their children language, religion, etc. She said, "It was the Texas women who reared those macho rednecks in Texas, you know."

"I didn't focus so much on how men sacrificed and died, but how women sacrificed and survived," she added.

The author received her BA degree from Sam Houston State University and her Masters degree from East Texas State University. She lived in Texas for 22 years and then started travelling around the country with her husband, Lt. Col. Lee Lanning, public affairs officer at Fort Lewis, Washington. She pointed out that they have been stationed all over the U.S. so she has been able to compare the different life styles and cultures.

Mary Evelyn Blagg-Huey, president emerita of Texas Woman's University, in her foreword, describes the book as "well and imaginatively written."

"It will be read by aficionados of things Texas for it sets out important data relating to the state's history, culture and social milieu...and by feminists and non-feminists alike, for it sets out with objectivity

the lives and dreams of Texas women who have many notions about their proper social roles."

"It will be read as a text book-and certainly should be-for it fills a long-enduring void and supplies a need both old and contemporary as it seeks out the image and the experience that belong in the knowledge of one truly educated about Texas and about women."

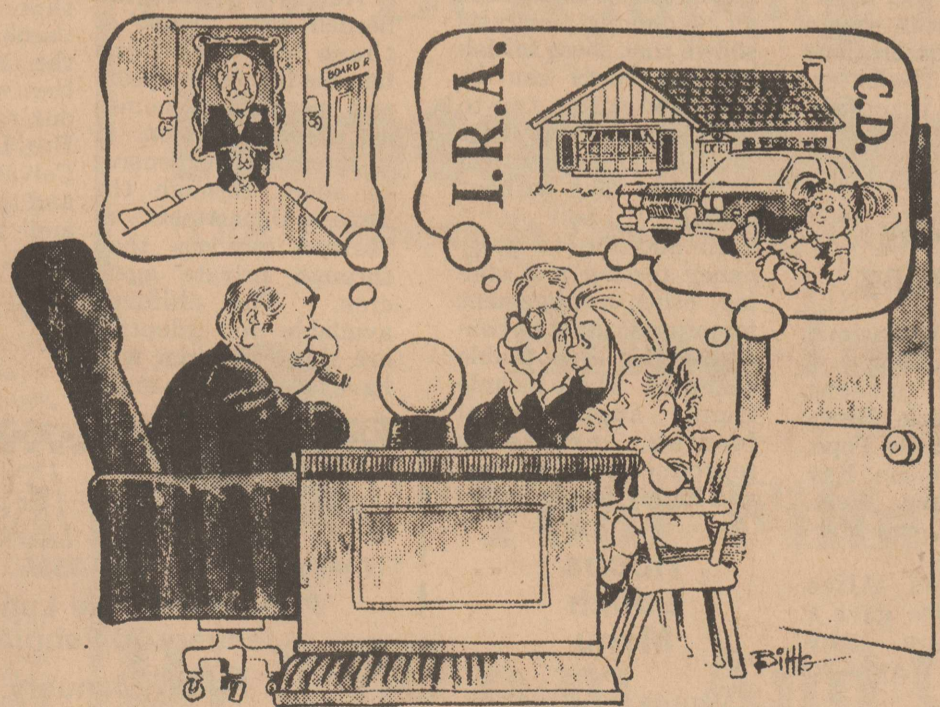

County Agent Report

According to Tom Tipples of Professional Cattle consultants, Inc., cow cash prices are expected to increase in the spring. Tight supplies should enable cow prices to rise to the \$40 mark in the next 60 days and hit a ceiling price in the spring. Cow prices reasonably increase on less supplies this time of year, but price increases will be more pronounced this year. Herd liquidation to take advantage of lower capital gains taxes has also depleted the cow market. Indications are that producers will withhold heifers for rebuilding which will further cast the number of cows available for slaughter. A decrease in cow slaughter also will support the fed cattle market by reducing the amount of tonage on the market.

Pregnancy testing and culling of open and skipper cows (those calving every two years) is one of the quickest ways to improve the reproductive performance of the beef herd.

This has been shown by field demonstrations conducted by the Extension Service in numer-

ous counties.

One such demonstration in Central Texas involved cow herds that were pregnancy tested for at least two consecutive years. In the first herd, no culling was done after pregnancy testing, while in the other herd all skipper and most open cows were removed. A few open heifers were kept in the latter herd to maintain cow numbers. Pregnancy rates before culling were 83.6 percent and 83 percent, respectively. The nutrition and health status and level of bull fertility were essentially unchanged during the two-year study.

In the second herd, pregnancy rates after culling went up to 95.3 percent in the second year, while pregnancy rates in the herd without culling remained near 84.5 percent.

This clearly shows the importance of pregnancy testing and culling open and skipper cows. Obviously, replacements can be costly, but an economic analysis shows that these initially high costs can be recovered within two to three years and that total dollar income will be higher than without culling.

In addition to pregnancy testing and culling, other management factors also must be considered for a profitable beef herd. These include timely supplemental feeding; necessary reproductive vaccines and highly fertile bulls.

Hundreds Of Texas Children Are Needing Foster Homes

Hundreds of Texas children need homes, some temporary, some forever. The Texas Department of Human Services is searching for individuals and families who can provide homes for these children.

Who are these children? Where do they come from? These are children who have been severely abused and neglected and have had to be removed from their biological parents for their own protection. They are children who have been traumatized by very poor parenting practices and most show the effects of chaos, cruelty or disinterest and neglect. They range in age from birth to seventeen. They come from all ethnic groups. They usually have special needs resulting from their damaging background, from physical handicaps to learning difficulties to emotional and social adjustment problems. Many have been sexually exploited, which creates a whole spectrum of special problems for children, and their caretakers.

What kinds of homes are needed for these children? There is a critical need for individuals and families who will be willing to be licensed as foster homes. These homes receive these children in an emergency situation when they have been removed by a court order from their parents. These homes work toward healing broken hearts and often broken bodies of very traumatized children while Children's Protective Services workers work toward developing a permanent plan for these children to grow up safely. Foster parents are there for children at a time of critical need and have an opportunity to really love and nurture them through a frightening and confusing time. Foster parents are reimbursed for this care at the rate of \$8 a day from birth to age 9 and \$9 a day for ages 10 through 17. All medical expenses are paid.

Adoptive homes are needed also. Some of these children will become free for adoption and permanent homes are needed for them. It is much less expensive to adopt through the Texas Department of Human Services than through private agencies. The children available for adoption are these children who have been through much

tragedy and have special needs. They are older children, usually school age, sometimes even up to teenagers, before they become free for adoption. There is a real need for adoptive homes for older children, minority children, and children with special needs. Incidentally, many foster parents also adopt, so the program is not mutually exclusive. A growing number of individuals are licensed as foster parents who are also interested in adoption. This makes it possible for the agency to place a child who is likely to become free for adoption into a "Legal Risk" foster home when they initially come into protective care, in order to reduce the number of homes that the child must adjust to. This can be an extremely helpful program for a child, and there is a need for many, many more families and individuals who would be willing to participate in it.

Single persons, families, working mothers, grandparents will all be considered as possible resources for children needing a safe, nurturing home. Training will be provided to meet the needs of abused and neglected children. The need for homes for these children, some temporary, some forever, is critical.

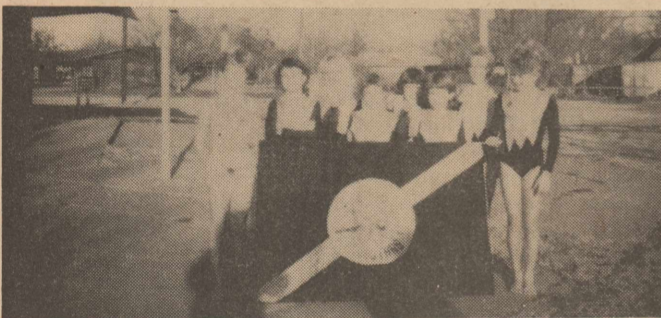

State Capital Highlights

The day after Bill Clements was inaugurated he drew a line on no new taxes and threatened to keep the Legislature in special session indefinitely until a reduced budget was forged.

That very same day, Speaker Gib Lewis realigned the power-structure of the Texas House to increase the odds of an emerging tax bill.

The two-party Texas Legislature is on a collision course.

Clements' first hardball pitch was a fastball screaming down the middle of the plate. He will not back off his campaign tax stance, even if the Comptroller has predicted a \$1 billion deficit this fiscal year, and a \$4.8 billion short fall during the 1988-89 biennium.

Other state officials are set on a tax hike, but the new governor liked what he saw when he reviewed his budget force's list of about \$4 billion in possible cuts. That budget group is made up of the new "in" Republicans.

Democratic Power House

Speaker Lewis' response was to alter his grip, shift his stance and wait for the next pitch. He realigned his committee strength by dethroning three GOP chairmen and reducing the Republicans on the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee from seven to three.

He has said a tax bill may be necessary, and now, if Lewis wants a tax bill from the House, he'll easily get it out of

committee.

The three Republicans who lost chairmanships are Tom Craddick of Midland, Buzz Robnett of Lubbock and Fred Agnich of Dallas, all one-time Lewis team members.

No Partisanship

Lewis says partisanship played no role in his reassignments. In the past, Lewis has never engaged much in party politics. He appreciates team loyalty more.

But if Lewis has made the House a bit more partisan, can he really be blamed? After all, it was only last year that:

--The GOP lined up a well-financed opponent against him;

--Some GOP members were privately speculating that Craddick would make a fine Republican speaker;

--Many Republican members deserted his team on the tax hike vote in the bloody special sessions.

All New Look

The House has a whole new look, and Lewis put Republicans in control of the powerful calendars committees. Clements' budget man Toomey is off Appropriations, but chairs the Judiciary panel.

Some other winners of promotions include Dudley Harrison of Sanderson, chairman of Agriculture and Livestock; Mark Stiles of Beaumont, County Affairs; Terral Smith of Austin, Natural Resources; and Alan Hightower of Huntsville, Corrections.

Prison Bailout

At week's end, Clements predicted the Legislature will give him the authority to transfer some \$82 million to the state prison system to avert daily fines by a federal judge.

The state has until April 1 to meet court-ordered reforms or it will suffer several

million in daily contempt of court fines, but Clements said the Legislature may be able to address the matter within a ten day period.

Overdue Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said 3,100 Texans owe the state a total of \$37 million and he will turn the list over to Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox for collection.

Most of the sum is from overdue sales tax accounts.

Other Highlights

Testimony began in a courtroom showdown to overturn the state's system for funding school districts. Over 100 school districts have joined the lawsuit which pits poor areas against rich for a fair share of tax dollars.

The overcrowded prison system released more than 250 inmates last week so new inmates could be legally incarcerated.

On his last day, former Gov. Mark White urged lawmakers to cough up emergency funding to build new prisons.

ASCS Sales Slips Needed

To avoid late payments, Billy Don Atkinson, County Executive Director, of the Fisher County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said wool and lamb producers should turn in their 1986 sales receipts and file a payment application by January 31, 1987.

Farmers who have a record of their wool and mohair sales are eligible for incentive payments only if the sales are reported to the ASCS office. Mr. Atkinson said the quantity sold does not affect the eligibility. However, sales slips should contain the month of shearing, month of sale, number of head shorn, pounds of wool (grease basis) or mohair sold, and net proceeds. Shorn wool and mohair payments will be made only for bonafide sales

documented on invoices prepared by the purchaser. "Sales slips for lambs must show the liveweight and state that the lambs were unshorn."

According to Mr. Atkinson, shorn wool and mohair payments are based on a percentage of each producer's returns from sales. The percentage is the amount required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool and mohair in 1986 up to the support prices of \$1.78 a pound for wool and \$4.93 per pound for mohair.

The ASCS official said pulled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the price support level for shorn wool through payments on unshorn lambs.

As of Jan. 13, 1987, local producers had filed for their 1986 wool payments.

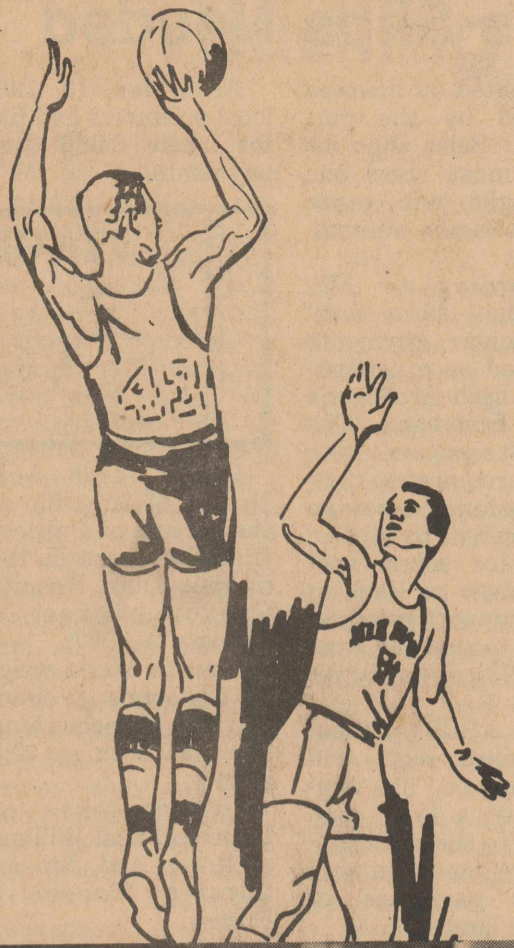

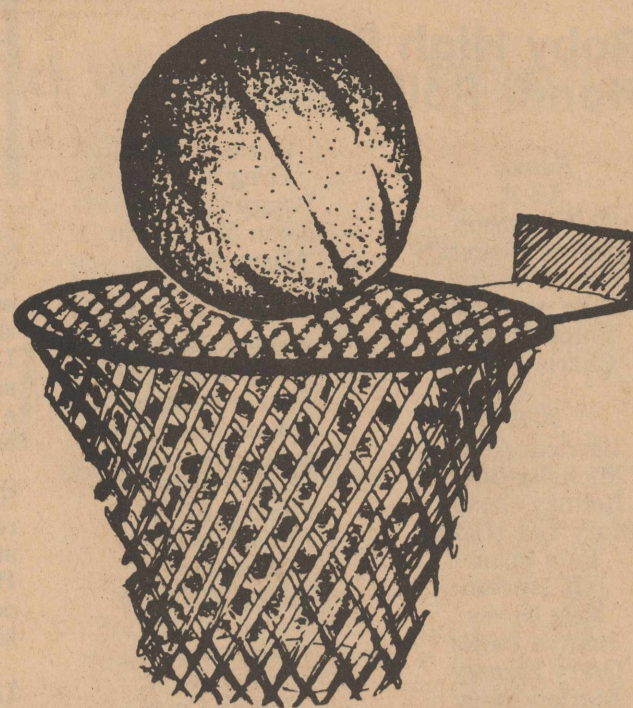

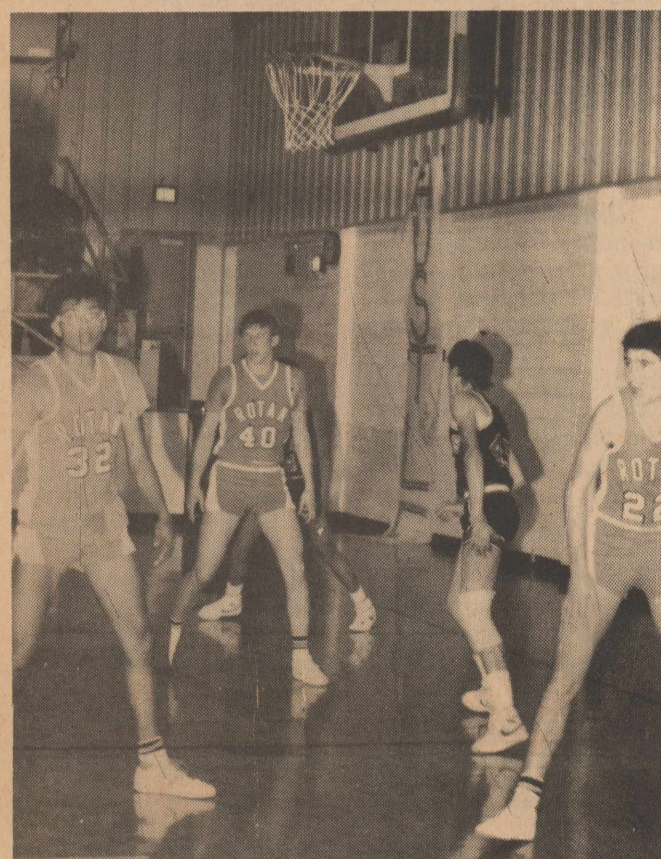
