## Burl Nash Construction Gets Bid On Building Roby Addition

The Burl Nash Construction Company of Abilene, Texas, did not submit the lowest bid on the construction of the new Roby School cafeteria, but their bid is the one the board members accepted.

Their bid was \$147,568.00 which was one of the lowest but not the lowest according to Superintendent Jimmie Laurie. The bid by Burl Nash Construction Company was accepted at a special meeting of the board last Monday night.

Wadleigh Construction Company of Snyder was hired as the management firm for the construction project.

Burl Nash Construction Company expects to have the project finished in 140 days at a cost of \$147,568.00. Roby School Board members were of the opinion that the project could cost as much as \$175,000 to \$180,000. "We still have to purchase tables and chairs for the cafeteria after construction is completed. The major cooking equipment, coolers

and walk-in refrigerator cost is included in the bid price."

The building will look similar to the Roby Band Hall, it will have

slotted windows, said Laurie.

There were a total of ten bidders on the construction project.

### Judy Mauldin Will Not Seek Roby Board Term

Roby residents will be electing at least one new trustee to the Roby Independent School Board when they go to the polls on Saturday, April 4th.

Judy Mauldin, current board member, informed Superintendent

Jimmie Laurie recently that she would not refile for an additional term on the board.

Board member Steve Terry has re-filed.

Election day is Saturday, April 4th, deadline for filing is Wednesday, March 4th.

Other board members are Andy Moore, June Wright with terms on the board expiring in 1989; Jeff McClure, Ronald Henry and Calvin Elkins with terms expiring in 1988.

### Six County Gins Record 1,100 Bales For Period

A total of 1100 bales of cotton were ginned last week by the six Fisher County gins.

Last week's ginning brought the season total up to 14,092 bales. The leader in production last week was the Terry Gin with 571 bales. The Farmers Gin at Rotan had 274 bales for the week and the Rotan Gin had 200 bales. The only other weekly production was

turned in by the Farmers Union Gin with 55 bales.

Season leader is the Rotan Gin with a total bales count of 5,351; Terry Gin is second with 3,108; Hobbs Gins is in third place in total production for the season with 1,852; Farmers Gin has 1,816; Farmer Union Coop Gin in Roby has 1,020 and Longworth Gin has 945.

### Joe Morrow Plans To Seek Another Rotan Board Term

Rotan School Board member Joe Morrow indicated last Monday that he has decided to seek another term as a member of the Rotan School Board. He intends to officially re-file next week.

The other spot to be voted upon this year is occupied at present by Larry Landes. He is undecided concerning his intention to seek another term.

Other board members are: Leo Long, Pete Fowler, Roger Blackwelder, Donna Kennedy, Donald Gruben.

The election is scheduled for Saturday, April 4th. Deadline for filing for a spot on the

board is Wednesday, March 4th.

During the training, students received instruction in drill and ceremonies, weapons, map reading, tactics, military courtesy, military justice, first aid, and Army history and traditions.

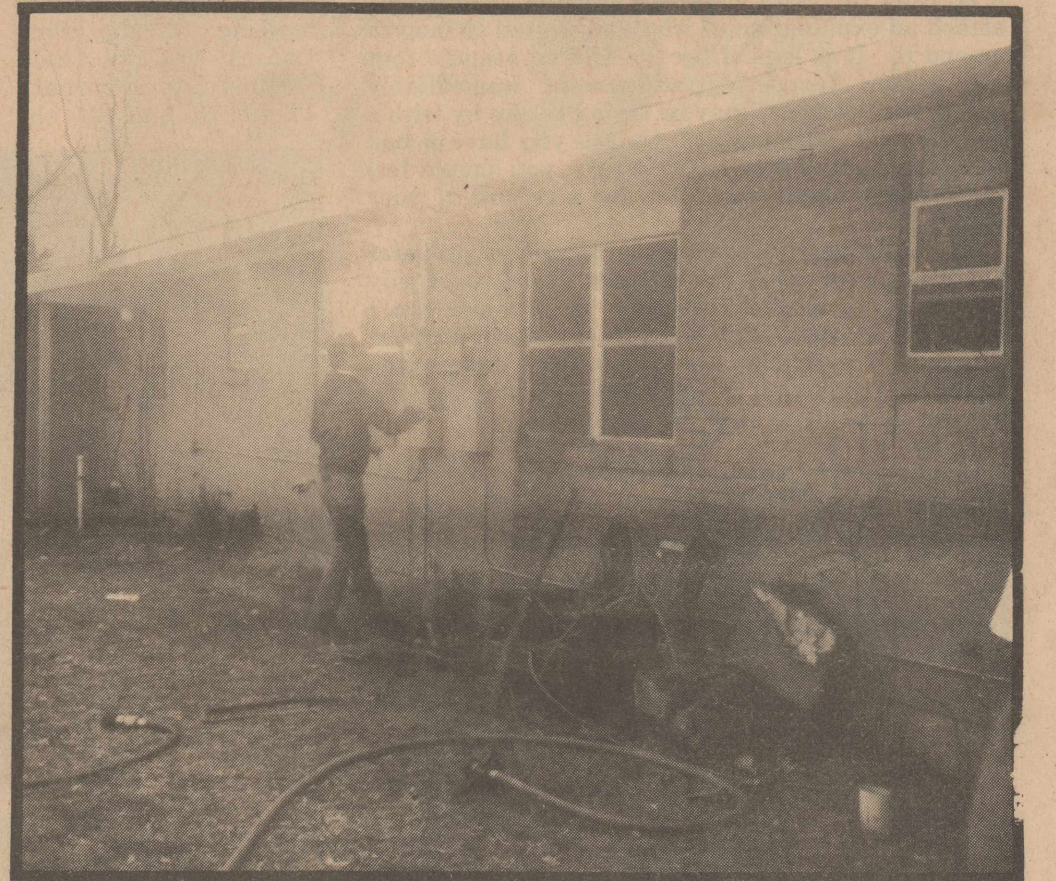

## Roby High Business Teacher Dora Reyes Up For Award

Dora Reyes, business teacher at Roby High School, has been nominated for participation in the Texas Ex-

cellence Awards Program, sponsored by the University of Texas at Austin, was developed

to recognize teachers who play a critical role in preparing their students for higher education. The award

was also developed in an attempt to stimulate the contributions teachers make by recognizing the

achievements of outstanding individuals.

Dora was nominated for her excellence in teaching business at Roby High School. She has taught for sixteen years (eleven years at Roby). During those

sixteen years she has taken students to the Regional contest in U.I.L. every year. During the eleven years at Roby, Dora has taken students to the state meet in Austin every year since 1980. Her students have won 1st place in State U.I.L. contest 2 times in Shorthand and 1 time in Editorial Writing. Her students consistently do an excellent job in all contests.

Teachers nominated for the awards will receive a certificate of appreciation from the University of Texas at Austin in recognition of their contributions to educational excellence. In addition, they will be considered in a selection process which will result

in between five and twenty teachers being invited to the UT campus during the spring for a special conference and awards ceremony. Those teachers will receive a substantial cash award, a commemorative sculpture, and an exclusive enrichment opportunity tailored to the recipient. VIP tours and hands-on

demonstration of some of the University's most noted facilities will give the participants a distinctly UT experience.

The Texas Excellence Awards for Outstanding High School Teachers are administered by the UT Ex-Students' Association in cooperation with the College of Education.

## ASCS Conservation Reserve Signup

Farmers who want to bid to enter their highly erodible cropland into USDA's 10 year Conservation Reserve Program may do so during the program's fourth signup period from Feb. 9 through 27, Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng announced.

Lyng also announced a one-time, one-year "bonus" for the 1987 crop, to be paid in the form of an increased annual rental payment. The bonus payment will be equal to \$2.00 times the farm program payment yield for corn, times the number of acres of corn base designated for enrollment in the CRP. This "bonus" will be payable in the form of generic commodity certificates when a 1987 Conservation Reserve Program contract is accepted. In subsequent years, the annual rental payment will be only that amount specified in the CRP contract.

"Since a paid land diversion is in effect under the 1987 Feed Grain Program to restrain further buildup of corn stocks, this rental payment is being offered to encourage highly erodible, excess corn acreage into long-term conservation use," Lyng said.

"This offer is limited to new CRP contracts effective beginning with the 1987 crop year. It is not retroactive for corn

base acreage under CRP contracts already signed", Lyng said. "This additional rental payment will be made at the time new 1987 CRP contracts are accepted. It will be charged against the CRP maximum payment limitation and not against other program payments".

"Producers who have already enrolled in other 1987 production adjustment programs and received advance payments in cash and generic certificates may cancel their contracts and enter into the CRP," he said. "There will be no penalty, but payments already received must be refunded in cash."

During the signup period, producers will be given the option to enter into a CRP contract beginning with either the 1987 or 1988 crop year.

The CRP is one of the new conservation initiatives contained in the Food Security Act of 1985 designed to reduce soil erosion. Under the CRP, owners and operators of highly erodible cropland agree to cease production on the highly erodible land for a 10-year period and to devote this land to conservation uses.

Under provisions of a recent amendment to the legislation authorizing the CRP, alfalfa and other multiyear grasses and legumes in rotation

during the years 1981-1985, as approved by the Secretary, will be considered to be "agricultural commodities" for the purpose of determining eligibility of land to be placed in the CRP.

Not more than 25 percent of the total cropland in a county may be placed in the CRP. The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to waive this limit if there will be no adver-

se effect on the local economy. The 13 county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees that were authorized to accept acreage into the CRP in excess of the limitation as a result of contracts entered into during the third CRP signup may not take offers for any additional land to be placed in the CRP. Other county ASC committees expect-

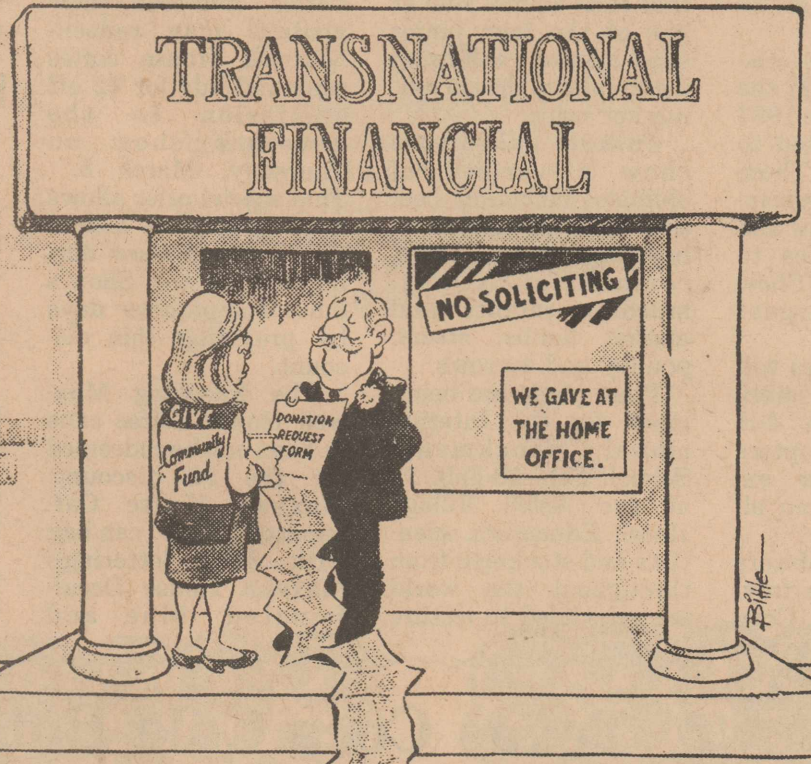

Have you noticed that our world seems to revolve around music? Everyone enjoys listening to one form of music or another. There is just something about it that helps to take away some of the cares of this world.

There is one form of music that I sincerely believe takes that No. 1 spot in the realm of great music. ### Final Rites Are Held For Ruth Ellis, 69, Of Roby

Ruth Ellis, 69, of Roby, died at 9:30 p.m. Sunday, January 25th at Fisher County Hospital in Rotan. Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 28 at the First United Methodist Church in Roby. Officiating was the pastor, Rev. James Hawthorne, Rev. Warren Schoenecker of Abilene, and Rev. Loren Gardner of Coahoma. Burial was in the Roby Cemetery under the direction of Weathersbee Funeral Home. Mrs. Ellis was born Sept. 15, 1917 at Roby. The daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jesse McWhirter, she graduated from Roby High School in 1933 and Texas Tech in 1937. She married Henry J. Ellis, August 21, 1937 at Lub-

bock. They made their home in San Antonio before moving to Abilene in 1966 and to Roby in 1975. She was a member of the First United Methodist Church and the Eastern Star. She had served as a Pink Lady, and had a 700 bar for service to the Fisher County Hospital. She is preceded in death by her parents and a sister, Laverne Permenter. She is survived by her husband, Henry Ellis of Roby; a son, Jimmy Ellis of Houston; a sister, Nell Jenkins of Arlington, Va.; a brother, Jim Ned McWhirter of Ft. Worth; a brother-in-law, E.W. Permenter of Starkville, Mississippi and two grandchildren.

## State Capital Highlights

The honeymoon is over early for Gov. Bill Clements and the Legislature, and Speaker Gib Lewis observed the activity among lawmakers is as thick now as it usually is at the end of previous sessions.

No one has it thicker than the prison system, except embattled Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower.

Prison directors have to keep the inmate population down with one hand while they help lawmakers search for \$83 million for emergency prison construction.

All Hightower has to do is fight for his political life: the Republicans have Clements' blessing behind their legislation to change firebrand Democrat Hightower's office from an elected to an appointed one.

Hightower called it a "cheap" political shot, and said if Clements wants a fight, "he's got one." Clements insisted the act wasn't political or personal.

#### Remember Mattox?

Privately, even some Democratic officials grin while Hightower squirms, since the bill is given little chance to pass in a Democrat-controlled Legislature.

House Agriculture chairman Dudley Harrison said he doesn't think the Texas agriculture community supports the change.

Indeed, others say that when Hightower was elected to this post after a failed attempt for the Railroad Commission, some regarded him as a political opportunist who knew little about farming. But since then, Hightower has proven to be a tireless promoter of Texas products and seeker of new markets.

Hightower, a populist, is often also viewed even by party cronies as a media

showboat. What no one can figure out is if the Republicans are really serious or just keeping Hightower pinned down.

If they're serious, they might well remember how such acts can come back to haunt with a sympathy backlash at the ballot box. Five years ago, the GOP redistricted Jim Mattox right out of his congressional seat. He fought back and now he's beginning his second term as Attorney General.

#### Prison Bail-Out

One proposal to come up with the new prison money is to shift \$83 million from the state contributions into the Teachers Retirement System, but one teachers' group doesn't like it.

Officials say the shift wouldn't hurt teacher retirement, but the Texas Federation of Teachers disagrees.

#### Mattox Sues

Attorney Gen. Jim Mattox and Texas have joined with New York and California in a lawsuit against a company alleged to have an illegal pyramid sales scheme.

The company, United Sciences of America, Inc. sells nutritional products for treating a myriad of diseases from AIDS to dandruff.

Mattox also filed suit to block a State Board of Insurance action from taking effect, calling a 17.7 percent rate hike for workers compensation insurance "unconscionable."

#### Bullock Warning

Comptroller Bob Bullock warned lawmakers that Texas could lose as much as \$100 million in the next four years under a new federal court order affecting franchise tax collections.

He said Mattox will appeal the district court ruling which limits reserve accounts in company surpluses for the purpose of franchise tax calculations.

For the present, Bullock is dropping the state's revenue estimates by more than \$100 million.

#### Legislation Filed

Rockwall Sen. Ted Lyon and Fort Worth Rep. Mike Millsap cofiled legislation to ban abortions beyond the point a fetus could live outside the mother's body, even with life support systems.

McAllen Rep. Juan Hinojosa's new bill will change the Open Meetings Act to tape record closed-door meetings so a judge can determine later if the session violated any laws.

\*New Texas

Secretary of State Jack Rains of Houston was sworn in by Texas Supreme Court Justice Raul Gonzalez.

\*The original Goddess of Liberty will return to a special pedestal in the Capitol north foyer.

\*A Clements' special panel unveiled 35 proposals to stimulate economic growth in Texas, including freeing

about \$250 million in state trust funds for venture capitalists.

\*State and federal officials closed three Texas banks in one day last week, making four total this year. All three banks, located in the Woodlands, Houston and La Pryor, reopened the next day with new owners.

\*Governor Clements plans to attend the in-

auguration of a newly elected Mexican governor next month, part of his program to improve relations with the Mexican states along the border.

\*Former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt, now on the presidential campaign trail, swung through Austin last week to address legislators and meet with Texas Democrats.
