

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FEDERAL TAX RETURNS (Can I Change Mine?)

The period of time (statute of limitations) for changing a federal income tax return is normally three years from the "returns" filing deadline. This means that the taxpayer and the government both have the opportunity to make changes, large or small, in the past three years' tax returns.

There are a large number of taxpayers who prepare their own tax return or have them prepared by someone other than a full time tax counselor. If you are one of these "self-preparers" I recommend that you have your tax returns reviewed at least every third year by a professional preparer.

A review will cost far less than the preparation. If amendments are necessary, the fee would be somewhat in line with the benefits to be had.

Contrary to popular belief, these amendments do not automatically trigger an audit of your returns. Some IRS districts require examination if the tax refund is substantial, say \$5,000 or more. If you are amending the third oldest year immediately before it is ready to "close under the statute", you should attach an explanation of why you waited so long to amend it. It is logical for the IRS to assume that the person requesting adjustment immediately before the "closing" may be trying to slip by with a questionable adjustment. Unless you have a bad conscience about a prior tax return, you should feel comfortable about amending for a refund of your money

The three year review by a professional preparer is adequate for many tax returns. If, however, you have a major financial decision to be made, don't leave it to chance. Seek the help of a qualified practitioner to determine the tax effects before the business transaction is completed. Good tax planning cannot be done after the fact.



Farmers who want to bid to enter their highly erodible cropland into USDA's 10 year Conservation Reserve Program may do so during the program's fourth signup period from Feb. 9 through 27, Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng announced.

Lyng also announced a one-time, one-year "bonus" for the 1987 crop, to be paid in the form of an increased annual rental payment. The bonus payment will be equal to \$2.00 times the farm program pay-ment yield for corn, times the number of acres of corn base designated for enroll-ment in the CRP. This "bonus" will be payable in the form of generic commodity certificates when a 1987 Conservation Reserve Program contract is accepted. In subsequent years, the annual rental payment will be only that amount specified in the CRP contract.

"Since a paid land diversion is in effect under the 1987 Feed Grain Program to restrain further buildup of corn stocks, this rental payment is being offered to encourage highly erodible, excess corn acreage into longterm conservation use,

Lyng said. "This offer is limited to new CRP contracts effective beginning with the 1987 crop year. It is not retroactive for corn

base acreage under CRP contracts already sign-ed", Lyng said. "This additional rental payment will be made at the time new 1987 CRP contracts are accepted. It will be charged against placed in the CRP. the CRP maximum payment limitation and not against other program payments".

"Producers who have already enrolled in other 1987 production adjustment programs and rerized to waive this limit ceived advance payif there will be no adverments in cash and generic certificates may cancel their contracts and enter into the CRP," he said. "There will be no penalty, but payments already received must be refunded in cash.

During the signup period, producers will be given the option to enter into a CRP contract beginning with either the 1987 or 1988 crop vear.

The CRP is one of the new conservation initiatives contained in the Food Security Act of 1985 designed to reduce soil erosion. Under the CRP, owners and operators of highly erodible cropland agree to crease production on the highly erodible land for a 10-year period and to devote this land to conservation uses.

County Agent Report

By Richard Spencer

A well-managed fertility program is one of several essentials for profitable cotton production.

While the nutrient requirement for cotton is much less than some other crops, adequate amounts of nutrients at the right time or growth stage are essential in developing healthy, productive plants.

A well-managed fertilizer program must take into account yield goal and soil type. The producer must identify yield limiting factors such as compaction zones, salinity spots and With poor drainage: this information plus soil test results, the producer can determine more accurately the fertilizer rate that will provide the most profitable vield. Why fertilize for 1 bale of cotton when the upper yield potential for a specific field may be only 3/4 bale per acre?

"Efficient use of plant nutrients also can be achieved by applica-tion timing." "For tion timing.' nitrogen, efficiency tends to improve as the period between application and uptake by the crop is shortened. Preventing nitrogen loss becomes even more important in lighter textured soils subject to leaching or in poorly drained fields where denitrification can occur.'

In many situations, it may not be practical to delay all nitrogen application just ahead of maximum plant uptake. The cotton plant's high demand for nutrients occurs during the square to boll-formation period. While nutrients are equally as important during the early stages of plant growth due to the relatively small plant size, total use if less than during later growth and developoment periods. "While low levels of

nitrogen will limit total production and quality of most field crops, cotton also can be hampered by excess nitrogen.

The negative effect of excess nitrogen can be minimized somewhat if the plant has a good fruit load. Otherwise, excess nitrogen will lead to rank growth and, delayed maturity, which will make plants more attractive to insects. and will cause greater difficulty with defoliapreparation." tion and regrowth dur-

cotton crop has adequate nutrients, producers should begin with a soil test. A soil test enables a producer to make realistic decisions regarding the nutrient status of a particular field or farm.

Just as good quality water is essential for human health, the same holds true for livestock. If livestock do not drink an adequate

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amount of safe water daily, food intake will be reduced, production will be lowered, and producers will experience an

economic loss. Water is absolutely essential for livestock. It constitutes 60 to 70 percent of their bodies and must be in their diet for life, growth, reproduction and well-being. So animals should have all the water they will

drink. Stress may occur in an animal deprived of the chance to drink sufficient water, and actual dehydration can occur.

When only substandard quality water is available to livestock, health problems may develop as a result of poor acceptance and lower intake or drinking mineral or organic contaminants. Producers

Livestock generally consume many different kinds and qualities of water with few adverse effects. Overall, no major livestock health problems associated with water quality have been reported although there are reports of individual, isolated circumstances of water contamination. No one has it thicker than the prison system, except embattled Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower. Prison directors have to keep the inmate popu-

lation down with one hand while they help lawmakers search for \$83 million for emergency prison construction.

All Hightower has to do is fight for his political life: the Republicans have Clements' blessing behind their legislation to change firebrand Democrat Hightower's office from an elected to an appointed one.

Hightower called it a "cheap" political shot," and said if Clements wants a fight, "he's got one." Clements insisted the act wasn't political or personal.

Remember Mattox?

Privately, even some Democratic officials grin while Hightower squirms, since the bill is given little chance to pass in a Democratcontrolled Legislature. House Agriculture chairman Dudley Har-

rison said he doesn't think the Texas agriculture community supports the change.

Indeed, others say that when Hightower was elected to this post after a failed attempt for the Railroad Commission, some regarded him as a political opportunist who knew little about farming. But since then, Hightower has proven to be a tireless promoter of Texas products and seeker of new markets.

Hightower, a populist, is often also

Sciences of America, Inc. sells nutritional products for treating a myriad of diseases from AIDS to dandruff.

Mattox also filed suit to block a State Board of Insurance action from taking effect, calling a 17.7 percent rate hike for workers compensation insurance "unconscionable.'

Bullock Warning

Comptroller Bob Bullock warned lawmakers that Texas could lose as much as \$100 million in the next four years under a new federal court order affec-

He said Mattox will appeal the district court ruling which limits reserve accounts in company surpluses for the purpose of franchise tax calculations.

For the present, Bullock is dropping the state's revenue estimates by more than \$100 million.
