Glen Holt Is Named State Head Of TRGA

The Texas retail Grocers Association (TRGA), a statewide trade association, named Glen Holt of Rotan, President for the year 1987-88 on June 9, 1987. Holt has been a member of TRGA since 1951. He has served on the board for three years and as an officer for four years. Over the past several years he has served on numerous committees. Holt was Chairman of TRGA's 60th Annual Convention in San Antonio, June 6-10, 1987, where history was made with the largest exhibition. In addition to serving

as President of TRGA, Holt is presently serving as President of the Abilene Retail Grocers Association. Holt owns and operates Thriftway Super Markets in Rotan, Snyder and Tahoka, Texas. The Texas retail Grocers Association has over 2,500 retail and associate members. The retail members own and operate approximately 8,000 food outlets in Texas, and employ more than 160,000 people. The sizes of these outlets run from supermarkets to convenience stores to mom and pop stores.

Rotan Hires Nelms As New Football Coach

The members of the Rotan School Board interviewed a total of three candidates for the position of Head Football Coach last Monday night and voted to extend a contract to Weldon Nelms, current coach at Lubbock Estacado High School. One board member commented "I personally would like to have hired all three of the men, they were very strong candidates". Nelms has achieved level two on the career ladder, is described as an excellent classroom teacher and comes to Rotan with a total of seven years of teaching experience.

"I like to throw the football, I'll be looking at a lot of film, evaluating the personnel in a effort to be ready for the first season scrimmage on August 21st," said Nelms.

The new coach is originally from Plains, Texas. He attended New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell where he was a wide receiver on the football team for two years then transferred to Western New Mexico University at Silver City, New Mexico where he was a two year all conference free safety. He graduated in May of 1980.

Following graduation he was a graduate assistant coach on the

Western New Mexico University staff.

His wife Casey, Originally from Seminole, Texas is the mother of two children-Randi Beth, who will be 6 in August and Sara, who just turned 4 in June.

Nelms began his high school coaching career at Springlake Earth. He was an assistant coach, defensive coordinator, junior varsity basketball and head track coach for two years. When the head coach left, Nelms was made head coach and stayed in that position for 2 1/2 years.

He left Springlake Earth to accept a position on the Lubbock Estacado team as offensive and defensive line coach and assistant track coach.

Success has followed Coach Nelms. His teams at Springlake Earth won three district track titles, they were

district football champs in 1980. At Lubbock Estacado they were district football and quarter final champions, regional champs in track and state champs in track in 1986.

In the summer of 1985, Nelms was an assistant coach for the North All-Star team in the annual Texas High School Coaches association annual contest. Nelms taught physical education, health and world history at Estacado.

The local assistants will be staying under Coach Nelms. "I feel very confident they (the coaches) will do an excellent job", he commented.

It will take some adjusting, but basically I will be running from the "I" formation with a lot of wing sets, flanker sets and doing a lot of sweeps and fullback traps", said Nelms.

Fisher County Sheriff Mickey Counts, in a telephone interview last Tuesday morning, indicated that a total of three area ladies have called his office in the past two weeks reporting stolen purses.

"It is apparent that someone is working hard

to take purses from unlocked automobiles", said Counts.

"I want to work just as hard at informing area ladies to discontinue the practice of leaving purses in unlocked automobiles", said Counts.

Buy Cemetery Marker

In regular meeting last Thursday Roby Lions Club voted unanimously to sponsor and underwrite the project of securing an Official Historical Marker for Roby Cemetery.

Fisher County Historical Commission is doing research with application for the Marker with Texas Historical Commission, Austin. These Official Markers are granted only after much research and documentation of facts. Considerable time is necessary to secure the Markers, and Roby Lions Club hopes to have the Marker here for dedication within a year. Application is being made for the larger size Marker, 27 x 42. (same size as Courthouse Marker).

This was the principal cemetery for Fisher County for the early years after the County was organized, and many of the earliest graves are located here. The grounds have been well cared for through the years by interested citizens, but a few years ago a Perpetual Fund was started with interest from the fund to maintain the Cemetery. This has proved very popular and it is largely responsible for the splendid condition at

present. The Lions Club voted to accept contributions to help raise the \$650 Marker cost. Any member will accept a contribution. If the fund should fall short

the Lions Club plans to supplement.

Any surplus money after the cost of the Marker will be placed in the Perpetual Cemetery Fund.

Hospital Board Gets Look At Budget Draft

Fisher County Hospital Administrator Gary Mc Gee introduced the first draft of the 1988 projected budget to hospital board members last Monday night. In that first draft, Mc Gee has built in an across the board 5% salary increase to all hospital employees and \$75,000 for an additional physician in 1988.

The preliminary budget is based on a tax rate of .27 cents per \$100 valuation which is up from .24651 in 1986. In 1986 the rate was hiked substantially over 1985's rate of .175 and the rate in 1983 and 1984 of .17 cents per \$100 valuation.

Mc Gee's figures, all projected, call for taxable real estate values of \$69,871,178 for 1987 as compared with \$71,746,887 in 1986. Taxable personal property is expected to be

up slightly in 1987 over 1986. In 1986 personal property values were \$4,280,183 and in 1987 they are projected to be \$4,289,801. Automobile values are down slightly. In 1986 values were \$7,884,366 and for 1987 they are projected to be \$7,804,577. The big loss is expected in mineral valuations for 1987. They are expected to be approximately \$146,061,540 as compared with \$162,467,430 for 1986.

The overall bottom line is that 1986 total values were \$246,378,866.00 and 1987 values are projected to be \$228,027,096.00.

The tax dollars generated from the 1986 values of \$246,378,000.00 amounted to \$607,349.00. The projected tax revenue to be generated from the 1987

values of \$228,027,096.00 is \$615,673.00.

Mc Gee told board members that his 1988 budget calls for total required funds of \$1,697,137.00. He expects the hospital operations cost to be \$1,279,304.00; he anticipates the clinic operating cost to be \$242,200.00; he pegged debt service obligation to be \$140,633.00 and has set \$35,000.00 aside in the budget for acquisition and replacement of equipment. Those figures add up to the \$1,697,137.00 projected funds needed to keep the hospital operating. Mc Gee informed that his projected 1988 budget of \$1,697,137.00 was approximately \$200,000 less than the 1987 budget of \$1,895,761.00.

In order to secure

those funds, Mc Gee has projected .30% occupancy or 3,285 patient days at an average of \$350.00 a day or \$1,149,750.00 in income. He plans to take in \$615,673.00 in ad valorem taxes and \$45,000.00 from the clinic.

The entire budget is based on a projection of taking in \$1.14 million dollars from hospital operations at the 30% occupancy rate.

The hospital has been on a constant occupancy rate decline since 1983. In 1983 the occupancy rate was 60% dipped to 56% in 1984; dropped to 36% in 1985; slide to 31% in 1986 and it is projected to fall even lower to between 25% and 30% in 1987.

The board and administration has said repeatedly that the key to providing good quality health care at the

The study developed to a preaching point, which now includes four Bible studies and a children's club. The team is trying to locate a suitable place to hold evangelistic meetings and eventually worship services. As ac-

ting field director, Babcock is also developing a seminar program for continuing education of French pastors.

Babcock's wife, Sally, is a 1976 graduate of Asbury College where she received a B.A. Degree in history and

secondary education. She taught kindergarten for a year prior to teaching seventh and eighth grade English for public school in Boyle County, Kentucky.

The public is cordially invited to attend these special activities.

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board hired a new physician for the Fisher County Clinic last Monday night to replace Dr. P. O'Neill, who has voluntarily decided to drop back to part-time status at the Fisher County Clinic.

The board hired Dr. C. B. Wallace, MD, who is to assume duties in the Fisher County Clinic on August 1st. He is cur-

rently practicing in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

Dr. Wallace, according to Administrator Gary Mc Gee, 'is a board certified surgeon, will have a family practice and will be delivering babies at the Fisher County Doctor's Clinic'.

Dr. Wallace is a native Texan, 53 years old, and according to Mc Gee, will be very visible and involved in the community.

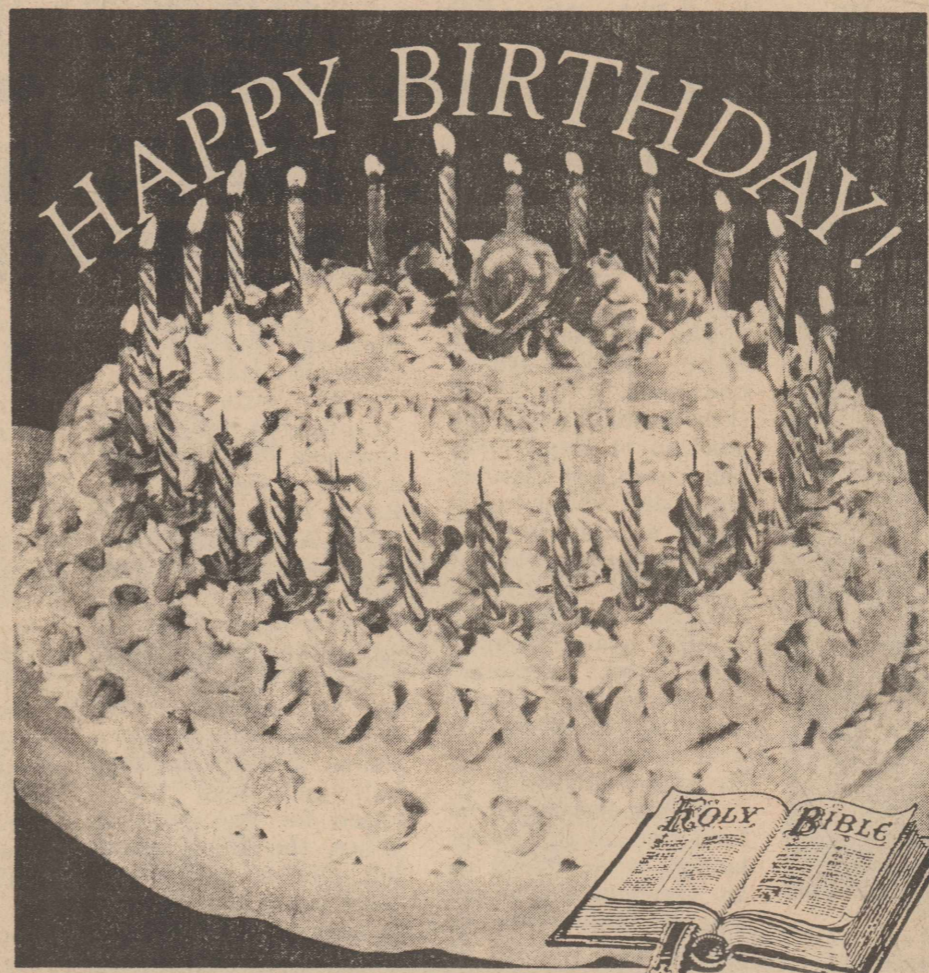

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Texas Folklife Festival Is Set For San Antonio Start

Tired of reruns and rented videos? Soggy from all those hours at the pool? Haunted by that dreaded end-of-vacation complaint, "I'm bored"? Maybe a

change is in order, something different to lift the summer doldrums - something like the annual Texas Folklife Festival. Scheduled for Aug. 6

to 9, the Texas Folklife Festival is a celebration of the state's rich heritage sponsored by the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San An-

tonio. Featuring the music, food, dances, and crafts of the many ethnic groups who settled and developed Texas, the Festival blends education and entertain-

ment in an event the whole family can enjoy. Children, parents and grandparents alike discover more about Texas history and culture as nearly 6,000

participants from throughout the state share their special skills, talents and traditions with approximately 100,000 visitors. Age has no limits at the Festival as young and old explore together the many things to do, see, hear, taste, touch, and try.

In addition to folk games the Festival presents a variety of crafts and pioneer skills

such as basketmaking, spinning and weaving, lye-soap making, log construction, breadbaking, whittling and more, all of which visitors can try for themselves. Other activities include joining the soldiers at the fort, practicing handwriting in the one-room schoolhouse and learning about the lives of Indian Texans at the tipi.

An extension of the Institute's statewide role as a research, education and communication center concerned with the history and culture of Texas, the Festival is in downtown San Antonio. Festival hours are 5 to 11 p.m. Thursday Aug. 6; noon to 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday, Aug. 7 and 8; and noon to 10 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 9. 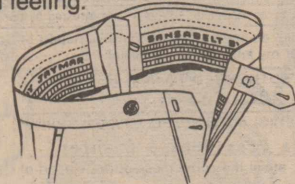

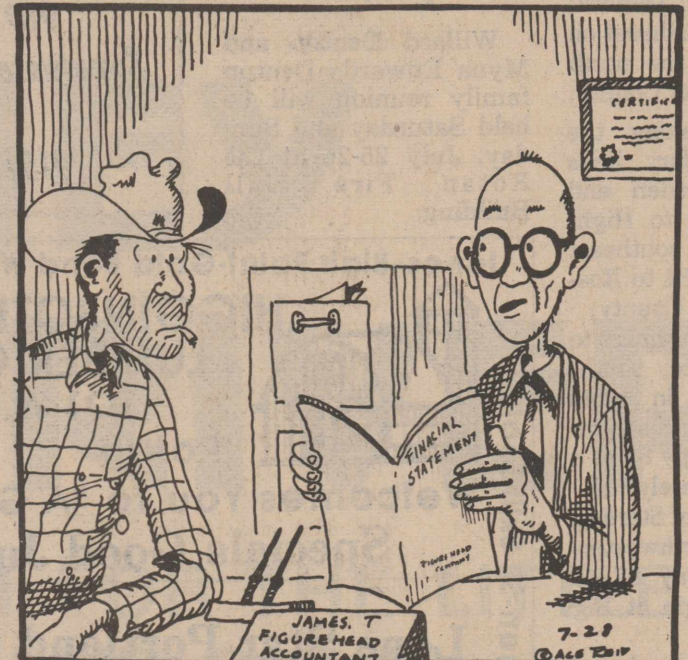

Legal Notice

1. Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized hereinbelow.

2. The Colorado River Municipal Water District has a valid Texas weather modification license. The initial license was issued on December 18, 1974, and was renewed in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1986.

3. The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect water resources. The period of the permit is March 1 through November 30 during the years 1988, 1989, 1990, and 1991.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas, 79721-0869.

5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described as being the area between an outer boundary which is defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.

6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa;

thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence, west-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: A licensed meteorologist will select cumuliiform clouds for cloud-seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and pilot reports to direct an aircraft equipped to dispense the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, into the updraft air at cloud base.

8. Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather and Climate Section of the Commission.

9. A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas, 78711. The petition must contain (1) the signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice. More information on calling a hearing can be obtained through the Legal Division of the Commission.

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On The Hiring Of Illegal Aliens To Work On The Farm.....

The changes affecting employers concern the INS investigations and enforcement of sanctions. Initially, sanctions were to be enforced on June 1. This was officially moved back to July 1 and could be delayed until September 1 if a congressional compromise is reached.

This has not been done at this time, so the official date of the start of sanctions is July 1. The INS previously announced that any violations found on the part of the employer would be cited, but no fines would be levied for a one year period after the start of the sanctions.

Fines could be imposed if subsequent violations were found during that one year period. The INS now has stated that the first visit will be to provide information and consultation about the employee's responsibilities under the law. After the initial visit, a citation would be issued if the employer was still out of compliance. Fines would be made only on the third visit rather than the second visit as was previous policy.

Under previous SAW rules, illegal farm workers were ineligible to apply for legal status in this country if they had arrived after May 1 this year. That date has been changed to June 26. The workers still must prove that they worked in the perishable-agriculture industry at least 90 man-days during the year ending May 1, 1986.

For those workers who are eligible for legalization under the SAW program, but are not

presently in this country, they have to present all documentation to an authorized center within their country. Thus a "catch 22" situation, they had to have documents from employers, etc., showing eligibility but they could not come back to this

country to gather the documents. The new rules allow SAW applicants to complete the application form, pay their fee and give "reasonable statements" about their work that qualifies them as a SAW employee. They will be issued an

employment authorization card which allows them to come into this country legally. The worker must promise to provide the needed documents within 90 days. If this is not done, the illegal alien is subject to removal from this country.

WHICH SPOUSE OWES THE TAX?

Which spouse is liable for the income tax on a jointly-filed tax return? Who is liable for additional tax assessed on a prior-year return? What if you are divorced? Are you liable for your spouse's income tax if you filed a separate tax return?

A husband and wife are both liable for the income on a jointly-filed tax return. That means that IRS may collect taxes, interest, and penalties on that tax return from either spouse. The IRS can collect the money from whichever spouse it is easiest to collect.

There is a provision in the tax law known as "innocent spouse" relief. A person filing a joint return may avoid liability for the omission of income caused by his or her spouse. The innocent spouse must establish that he or she was unaware of the unreported income. An innocent spouse may also be relieved of tax liabilities on a joint return if it can be shown that the tax return was signed under duress.

Sizeable inequities can come about because of divorce if prior tax returns were filed jointly. Once a property settlement has been agreed to neither spouse would be pleased to pay a sizeable IRS claim on an ex's tax return. This contingent liability should be provided for in the divorce or separation agreement.

If you and your spouse file separate tax returns, you can change your mind and file a joint tax return for any of the previous three years. If, however, you file a joint return, you are not permitted to elect separate filing status once the due date for that year's tax return (April 15th) has passed. A divorced taxpayer may not elect to go back and file a separate return if he or she filed a joint return with an ex-spouse. One spouse may, however, claim a refund based on an amended tax return with respect to a jointly-filed return even though the amendment is signed by only one of the two original filers.

County Hospital Board May Restructure Debt

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board listened to a presentation last Monday night by a Roby firm proposing to re-roof the Fisher County Hospital at a cost of approximately \$40,000.00. The board did not take any action on the proposal.

Following the presentation by Sunbelt Specialized Services of Roby, the board went into executive session, closed to the public, with Pete Hohan, director of nursing and Barbara Hohan, Quality Assurance Coordinator, to discuss a new quality assurance program. The session lasted 45 minutes.

The board approved unanimously a new program to sell delinquent tax property to the highest bidder if the property fails to sell at Sheriff's sales. Board members ap-

proved a new organization (chain of command) chart as presented by Administrator Gary McGee and voted to purchase a mowing tractor and shredder from Farm Tractor and Services, Inc.

Board members are scheduled to meet with James Campbell of Southwestern Company concerning the restructuring of bonds on August 13th at 2:00 p.m., at the Fisher County Hospital.

In final action, Administrator Gary McGee informed the board that, Rotan Insurance Agency had informed him that the possibility of getting directors and officers liability insurance written appeared good. Additional information on the insurance would be available in August. The meeting adjourned at 9:45 p.m.

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Social Security Manager Asks Residents To Check Earnings

People in the Big Country area who receive Social Security checks and who also work should take time to check their earnings, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in

Abilene, said recently. Those who earlier estimated that in 1987 earnings would not exceed the annual limit should check to make sure they have not earned more than they an-

icipated. The 1987 annual limit is \$8,160 for people 65 through 69 and \$6,000 for people under 65 all of 1987. If a person's annual earnings exceed the limit, \$1 in benefits is

withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the limit. A person will have to repay any benefits that were incorrectly paid. If a person finds earnings are more or less than expected, he or she

should notify Social Security right away so that benefits can be adjusted and an overpayment avoided.

If a person's earnings are less than expected, benefits may be restarted if they have

been stopped.

Board members will look further at possibly adjusting the local private room rates at their August board meeting.

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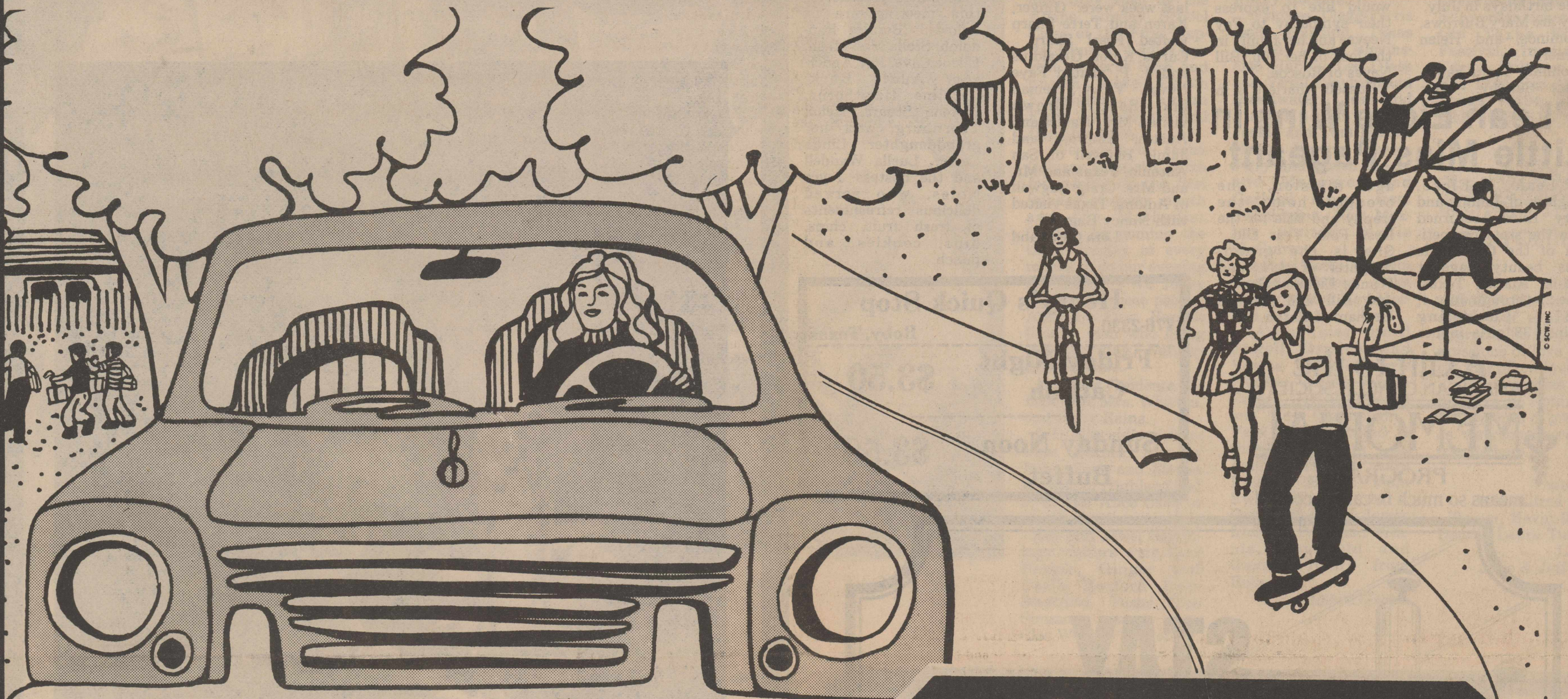



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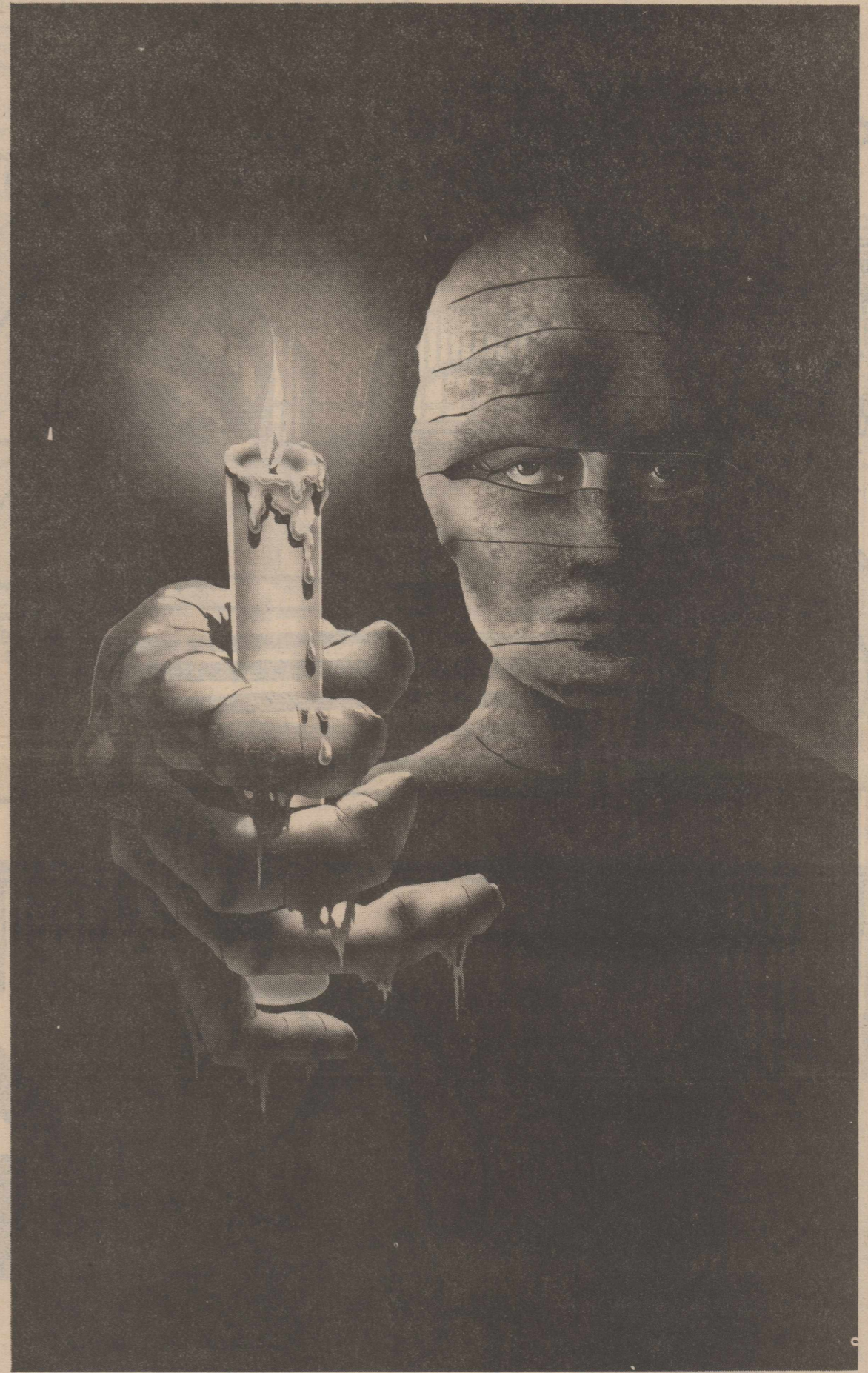


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News From South Fisher County
