### Roby Two-A-Day Workouts Scheduled To Start Aug. 10

Roby Head Football Coach Kent Jackson is taking on a big task this season, he'll be responsible for directing a football program with the help of two assistant coaches-down one from last year.

When Jackson was made Head Football Coach, Mickey McCarty was made Principal of the high school. McCarty will be the boys basketball coach, but will not have any football coaching duties this year.

Jackson will be assited by Larry Williamson and Ricky Williamson will be in charge of the offensive backs and on defense the linebackers and ends; Williams will be in charge of the offensive receivers and defensive secondary.

Jackson will be coaching the offensive and defensive line.

The new Roby Coach issued shoes and socks to all players last Wednesday. He is in hopes that 30 to 35 players will report.

Two-a-day workouts for the Roby Lions begin at 7:00 a.m. Monday, August 10th with the evening workout to probably begin at 6:00

p.m. ''The two-a-day

workouts will last at least a week and we'll be adjusting the second week of workouts according to the progress being made" said Jackson.

Roby begins preseason play on August 20th against Water Valley in a scrimmage on the road. The Lions are home on August 27th against Robert Lee. The opening game is Friday, September 4th against Abilene Christian in Abilene. The first home contest is September 11th against Miles. The Lions are open on September 18th and play O'Donnell on the road on September 25th.

Homecoming is October 2nd against Meadow with district play beginning on October 9th against Roscoe. The only non-district game is against the Sweetwater J.V. on October 15. The final three games are against Aspermont on October 23; Home with Rotan on October 30th and away against Munday on

November 6th.

"We were real pleased with the way the players adjusted to the new program in the spring and we are hoping the enthusiasm carries over to two-a-day workouts" said Jackson.

Mr. Webster defines a butterfly as "any of humerous slender-bodied diurnal insects with large (usually) brightly colored wings.

But that leaves one cold, and doesn't really tell one much about a

Don't blame Webster. Who can describe the feeling of seeing, sometimes holding, a butterfly? It is a "thing of beauty and a joy forever."

Aside from its beauty, that must be experienced and not defined, the butterfly carries on its wings a deeper message, captured by Richard Bach in his book, Illusions: "What the caterpillar calls the end of the world, the Master calls a butterfly.' The butterfly speaks to us of a

world that often experiences its greatest growth through change, and of the fact that even while we crawl through life today, there shall be wings tomorrow.





CANCELLATION OF DEBT

Generally, a taxpayer is taxable on debts that are forgiven. The forgiveness of indebtedness is treated the same as though you had earned the money and paid off the debt.

However, if the cancellation of debt is the result of a discharge in bankruptcy under Title 11 of the U.S. Code or if it occurs when the taxpayer is insolvent or if the debt is a qualified business indebtedness, the taxpayer is not requireed to pay income tax on it. The purpose of this section is to ease the burden on the bankrupt taxpayer.

These special rules for bankruptcy and insolvency are intended to strike a balance between the bankruptcy law which was intended to free a debtor saddled with unmanageable debt and the tax policy which states that cancelled debts are to be treated as income. There are special rules for reducing the basis (tax cost) of certain property and for offsetting certain business losses.

After April 9, 1986, income from the discharge of debts owed by certain qualifying farmers to unrelated lenders may be excluded from the farmer's income if a reduction in the basis of depreciable property is made.

There is a special income exclusion which applies to students. If the loan is under a governmental agency student loan program which discharges debt based on employment in certain geographical areas, the cancellation of debt will not be treated as in-

In a recent tax court ruling, the discharge of indebtedness of limited partners generated income to the partners equal to the full amount of indebtedness. The partnership contended that the income should be limited to the fair market value of the collateral securing the loan. If you are being relieved of debt, you should review your tax consequences before year end.




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

### **ASCS To Open Fifth Signup Period**

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will open a fifth signup period July 20 through 31 for the Conservation Reserve Program. The voluntary program is designed to help farmers prevent or control critical soil erosion and help adjust the production of surplus agricultural com-

County ASCS official, Billy Don Atkinson, said the CRP takes highly erodible land out of farming for 10 years and places it into trees or other permanent vegetative cover.

To enroll in the program, applicants must submit bids stating the per acre rental payment they would accept to convert their highly

#### **SSI** Recipients May Now Be **Employed**

Disabled and blind supplemental security income (SSI) recipients can now try to work without fear of losing all their benefits, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

Temporary provisions designed to encourage disabled or blind recipients to attempt to work are now permanent parts of the Social Security law. The provisions provide for special cash benefits and continued Medicaid coverage to SSI recipients who work despite severe impairments.

"SSI cash payments may continue to disabled recipients while they attempt to work," Hammons aid. The amount of the payment depends on the recipient's earnings--as earnings increase, the SSI payment decreases or stops. If the recipient finds his or her work attempt is unsuccessful, payments

can be started againoften without filing a
new SSI application.
Also, blind and
disabled recipients can
keep their Medicaid eligibility even when their earnings make their income high enough to stop cash payments. To keep Medicaid eligibility, a person must continue to be blind or disabled, meet all other non-earnings SSI eligibility requirements, depend on Medicaid coverage to continue working, and be unable to purchase similar medical care.

'To ensure that benefits are not going to recipients who have recovered medically, Social Security plans to review the disability status of all recipients who get benefits under the new provisions"
Hammons added.
However, Social Security will no longer con-

sider how much a reci-pient earns in deciding if he or she is still disabled for SSI purposes.
(Under the Social Security disability program, earnings are still considered in deciding whether disability con-

tinues.) More information about all the SSI work incentive provisions is available at the Abilene Social Security Office. The Office is located at 142 S. Pioneer and the telephone number is

erodible cropland to conserving uses, and also provide a cropping history for 1981 through Mr. Atkinson said the program allows up to \$50,000 per year, based on the bids per acre and the number of acres under the 10-year contract. Rental payments are made annually to producers with approved contracts, and cost-share payments are made after the approved conservation practice is completed

To date, approximately 12,000 acres of Fisher County farmland have been accepted in the CRP, according to Mr. Atkinson. Fisher County farmers will receive approximately \$375,000 during 1987 in annual

rental payments for the highly erodible land under the 10-year contracts to date!

'Harvesting, grazing, each farmer to receive or other commercial use of forage on CRP acres is prohibited,' Mr. Atkinson said. Maintenance measures, such as weed control, are required. He said farmers who decide to return CRP acres to crop production before the end of the 10-year period must repay the government, with interest, all CRP annual rental and cost-share payments.

> The national program is saving about 209 million tons of soil annually on 8.2 million acres of land enrolled during 1986.

#### **Cabinet Post?**

With more than three years left in his term, Hobby has not made his last mark on the Capitol

Those given to speculation can easily see Hobby in a U.S. cabinet position--perhaps as Secretary of Energy--but Hobby said he wants to keep politics out of the goals he has for Texas in his remaining term.

In his own words, he can be more effective now that the perception of his running for higher office has been removed.

#### GOP Pooh Pooh

Other camps offered more cynical reasons why Hobby is pulling back his troops.

Texas Some Republicans pooh pooh Hobby's stance, saying his latest program for new taxes would sink any election bid.

Indeed, tax bill author Rep. Dan Morales, D-San Antonio, predicted 50 legislators will not run for re-election because of the specter of political defeat or personal financial hardship.

Another view holds that Hobby did not want to endure the sniping of announced opponent Attorney General Jim Mattox, who has already mud-balled him several times this year.

Amid the massive praise of Hobby's service, his most vocal detractor was Texas GOP executive director John Weaver, who thinks Hobby has now

lost a lot of leverage

around the Capitol.

Fifteen years ago, Hobby's leverage came from family wealth and a bevy of powerful friends.

If knowledge is power, then note what Comptroller Bullock said last week: "Bill Hobby knows more about state government than any person alive.'

Insiders will agree, but some will say under their breath," except for maybe Bob Bullock." Hobby wouldn't mind that.

And as the reigning conservative Democrat of state government, Hobby can play a big role in anointing successors and in delivering the Texas vote to an '88 presidential candidate.

#### End of an Era

So, barring massive upheaval of the Senate membership, Hobby is not likely to pass as your average lame duck.

What is passing, however, is the end of era, for Hobby is the strongest of conservative Democrats at the state level. He will likely be replaced in nomination by an unabashed, unapologetic
