## Bailey Favors Cattle Brand Inspections

Representative Scott Bailey of Cisco, introduced a House Resolution today requesting that a legislative study be made concerning the possibility of adequate legislation concerning the branding of cattle and the registration of cattle brands. Bailey said that the recent action by the United State Agriculture Department, which revoked current cattle brand inspection services in Texas, prompted him to introduce this legislation.

In the past, the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association has been authorized to perform and charge for brand inspection on livestock originating in or shipped from Texas. A number of prominent officials have expressed deep concern about this matter and some have said that it would open the door, wide open, to cattle thievery.

Bailey praised the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association for doing an outstanding service for the cattle industry in Texas and stated that the Legislature should study and enact adequate legislation to safeguard proper registration and identification of cattle brands in Texas.

Unlike many other western states, Texas has no state-wide brand registration. The state law provides for county - by - county registration, which permits duplication of brands.

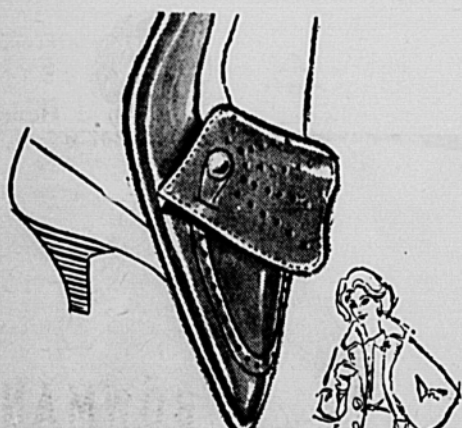

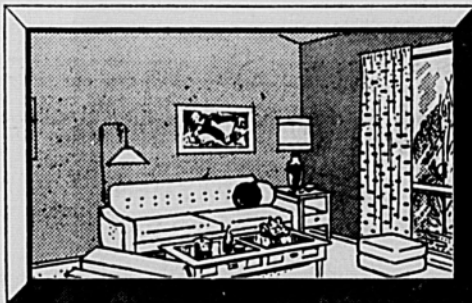

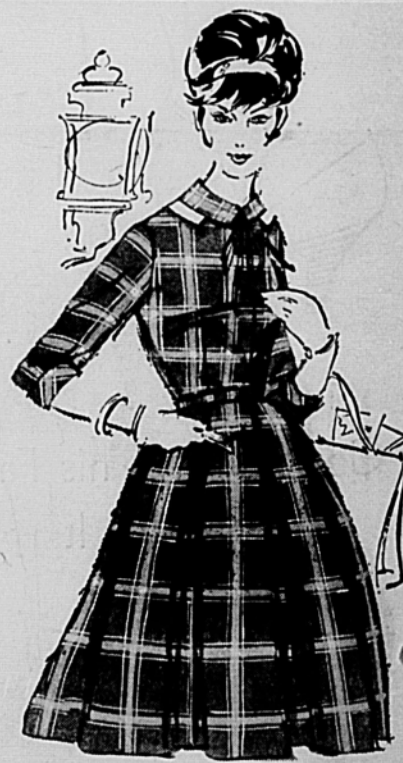

**Marine Reservists Can Apply For Duty**

As part of the building up of a 190,000 man Marine Corps authorized by Congress, local Marine reservists in the grades of corporal and below can now apply for active duty tours of two, three and four years with the regular Marine Corps. Capt. F. L. Bourne, Inspector-Instructor of the 87th Rifle Company, Abilene, announced today.

"This is strictly a voluntary program," Capt. Bourne stressed "and applies to all Marine reservists regardless of whether they are in an organized unit or not."

The regular Marine Corps door opened to reservists August 1st, when Marine Commandant David M. Shoup announced that 2,500 reservists up through corporal rank could apply for extended active duty. Until the Commandant's announcement, reservists generally could get active duty only by vacating their reserve status and joining the regular Marine Corps for four years.

Capt. Bourne pointed out that local reservists desiring active duty should contact him at the Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Training Center, 1941 South 3rd Abilene, or check with the Marine Recruiting Substation in the Old Post Office Building at 930 North 3rd, Abilene.

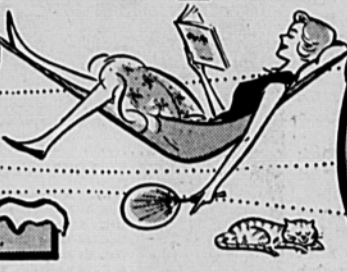
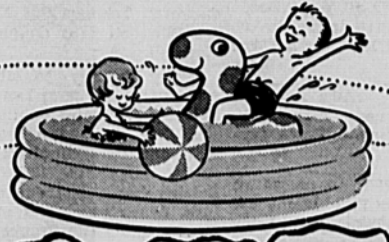
