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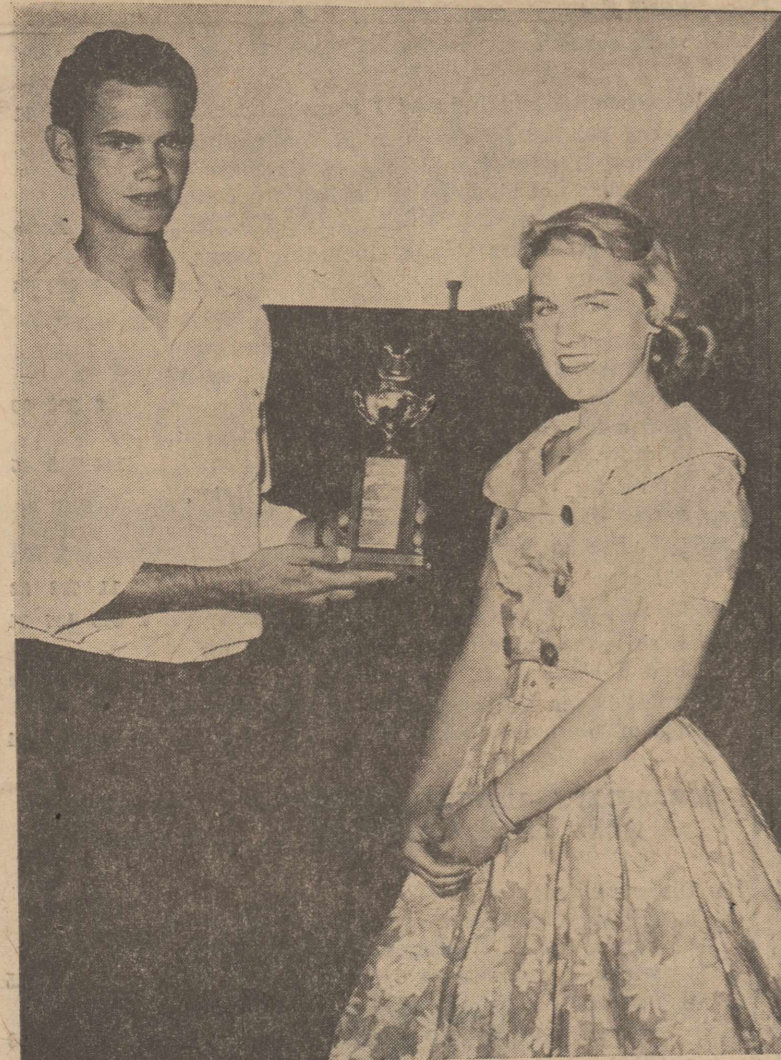

## Set Date For Christmas Program; Hopes High For New Freight Dock

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will elect officers to serve for the next two years at a general meeting of the membership to be held in the school cafeteria at 7:30 o'clock Thursday night of next week. Coffee and doughnuts will be served at the meeting.

Twelve farmers and 14 businessmen have been nominated to fill six vacancies on the 12-man board. The six vacancies—three for merchants and three for farmers—will be left by expiration of terms of present directors.

Six Directors  
Businessmen directors whose terms will expire January 1 include Major James, president; Bob Duncan, secretary-treasurer; and Don Williams. Retiring farmer directors include Fred Hicks, Merrill Brigance and Melvin Hines. Melvin was appointed this year to serve out the unexpired term of Bill Bearden.

Christmas Program  
Committee members are presently being appointed to organize a Christmas program. First meeting of the committee will be held some time next week.

December 12 has been set as the date for the community Christmas program this year.

Widen Highway  
OCCA Transportation committee has met twice recently with O. L. Crane of the Highway Department in Lubbock in connection with the proposed widening of Highway 70 through Olton.

The committee also seeks to get the state to curb and gutter the highway through town. "Prospects are brighter at this time than in the past," said OCCA Manager Wayne Cooper. "But a lot of work is still to be done before it becomes a reality."

Cooper said it now appears that the center line of the existing highway must be moved before the project can be completed. The Highway Department office at Lubbock has agreed to present a proposal for a 90-foot right-of-way instead of the original 100-foot formerly required.

Freight Dock  
This committee also has done a great deal of work toward securing a freight dock in Olton for daily motor freight delivery. At present the outlook is favorable, Mr. Cooper commented.

The Chamber manager said there is a possibility that the dock will be in operation this year. Paul King, Miller & Miller freight lines representative, will be in Olton in the near future to work out a contract for local delivery. Miller & Miller, Lang and Hub Lines may work together in bringing this service here.

Present plans call for the dock to serve not only Olton but Springlake and Earth as well.

# 2-AA Lead On Line In Friday's Game

Olton's meeting here Friday night with traditional rival, the Morton Indians, will find both teams riding the crest of what some might term upset victories.

Morton tripped Abernathy in a close one, 8 to 6, last Friday night. The Antelopes were favored and had been picked in pre-season predictions to place second in the district this year.

Last Friday night found a herd of fired-up Olton Mustangs trampling pre-season favorite Muleshoe Mules to the tune of 49 to 8.

Both Morton and Olton will be hanging on to a district lead for dear life. The winner will be top dog on the heap for at least a week since Lockney had an open date last week end.

Even in pre-season prognostication, most 2-AA coaches conceded that Morton was a dark horse pick for district championship. The Indians rely a great deal on the passing and running of big, speedy left halfback, Butch Nairn. Nairn tips the scales at 185 pounds and is conceded to be fast.

He is also able to toss the pigskin in Indian aerial attacks. The Indians will weigh in about 10 pounds a man heavier than the Mustangs. In addition nine starters from last season grace the Morton roster.

# Mustangs To Honor Team Of 1932

During half-time activities of the Olton-Morton football game Friday, recognition will be made of the Olton Mustangs of 1932. This recognition should come as a surprise to the few remaining members of that team.

Elmer J. Moore, now curriculum co-ordinator for the school system, was the Mustang coach of 1932. Manager of that team was Pat Brown.

Of the fifteen members of the 1932 team, only two now reside in Olton. Two ex-members live in Plainview, one resides in Lubbock and one lives in Morton.

The rest of the team is scattered throughout six states.

The 1932 Football Roster looked something like this: — M. C. (Sickem) Ledbetter . . . Capt. HB (Morton), Luis Hair . . . QB (Olton), Fred Daugherty . . . HB (Clovis), Dee Cates . . . FB (Arizona), J. M. Fuller . . . E (Joplin, Mo.), J. E. Fuller . . . T (Compton, Calif.), Euel C. (Naz) Jones . . . T and FB (Olton), Ralph Nafzger . . . T (Plainview), Earnest Ragle . . . G (Plainview), Owen Roebuck . . . G (Massachusetts), Grover Dennis . . . C (Albuquerque, NM), Kirby Hubler . . . G (deceased), Jack Fuller . . . QB (Santa Fe, NM), Cleo Richards . . . E (Lubbock), and Brooks Lewis . . . C (Albuquerque, NM.)

The two members of the 1932 Mustang team who have remained in Olton are Luis Hair and Euel C. (Naz) Jones. Both are prosperous, popular and civic-minded citizens.

Luis is manager of the Farmers Gin Co. He is married to a former classmate, Ruth Dennis, and has four lovely daughters. The Hair harem includes Sydney, a college freshman, Lana, high school junior, Phyllis, high school freshman, and Pamela, who is in junior high. Luis and Ruth's girls are attractive, popular and straight A students.

Luis is past president of the Olton Lions Club and was selected "Man of the Year" of that organization. He served as president of the school board last year and was chairman of the building committee of the First Methodist Church.

Euel C. (Naz) Jones graduated from Texas A & M College with a degree in Agriculture. He has since operated a successful farm in Olton. Naz is married to the former Ruth Owen of the class of '34.

Naz and Ruth have three children: Ellen, a freshman at Abilene Christian College, Paula, a junior high student, and Scotty, who is in the third grade.

The Jones' are members and outstanding workers in the Main Street Church of Christ of this city.

In addition to farming, Naz controls ranching and mining interests in Colorado.

It seems appropriate that the 1932 football team be honored at the Olton-Morton game, as the captain of the '32 team was a star athlete in Olton and is presently a star football fan in Morton.

District Judge M. C. (Middleton) Coleman, Sickem, "C", M. C., Led, Ledbelly and The Hon.) Ledbetter, now resides in Morton. M. C. is married to the former Mary Lois Gowdy and is the

father of six children. Five of his children are girls. Charles Coleman, the son, is the only hopeful aspirant to the brilliant athletic career of his father.

Mary Lee and Vivian are in high school. Betty Lou is in junior high, and Margaret and Zoe Ellen are in grade school. The children are active, personable, talented and handsome.

M. C. is a graduate of Baylor University Law School, where he received an athletic scholarship. He was County Attorney of Cochran County for fifteen years, and has recently been appointed District Judge.

The judge has taken his turn at all the hard-working, thank-

less jobs a fast growing community can dream up, including Chamber of Commerce, Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Campfire Executive, Sunday School Superintendent, Little League Baseball and Quarterback Club.

The Ledbetter family was selected "Methodist Family of the Year" for the Seventh District in 1958. This year the family was named "Family of the Year" by the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

While Captain of the 1932 football team, M. C. lived with his aunt and uncle, the Bill Millers, who now reside in Clovis, NM. He worked his way through school by assisting Jack Straw

in his Olton drug store. At one time during his years at Baylor, M. C. was hitch-hiking back to school. He accepted a ride with some men who promptly slugged him, robbed him, and threw him out of the car.

The people of Olton heard about the incident on the radio, and by the time M. C. reached Waco, a sizeable sum of money from friends in Olton awaited him.

These three outstanding members, as well as the coach, of the 1932 football team, have been ardent rooters of their cities' teams since the days they left their illustrious marks on the Mustang turf.

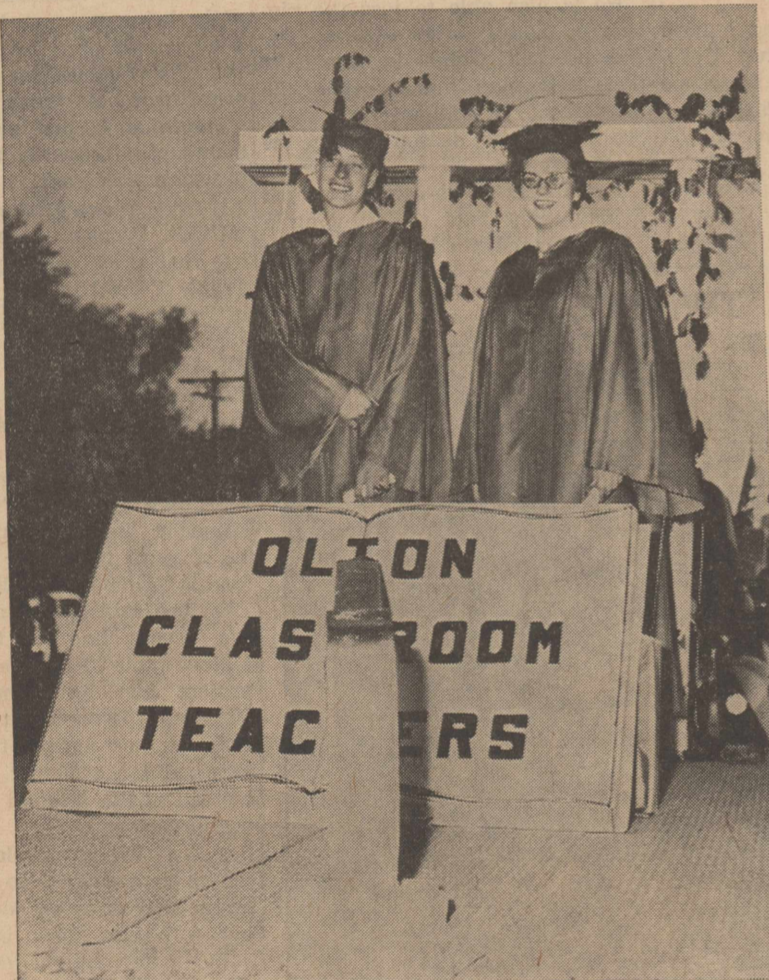

**Statement Is Issued By PD Chief**

Police Chief Floyd Cavin this week issued a statement on the status of the Olton Police Department. Cavin said that the force is at the same strength as last year at this time. He said it has two full-time members, himself and Emmett Burrows. David Maxey is a part-time officer, the chief pointed out. "There are several other men in town who hold a city policemen's commission but do not receive pay from the city of Olton," the chief declared. "One of these men is Forrest Davis, who is water superintendent and receives no pay for work he does for the police department. Another is Charlie Flores. He is paid by Steve Boruk." Cavin said several members of the Olton Fire Department hold commissions. "These men are used in emergencies," he pointed out. He said they draw no pay for the constabulary work they do. Cavin said his records are always open to anyone who wants to inspect them.

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# Mustangs Wallop Mules, 49-8

Olton's Mustangs stamped over the Muleshoe Mules 49-8 Friday night before a thrilled and wind-blown homecoming crowd.

Playing a determined and not to be denied type of football, the Olton lads gave the fans a real show of both offensive and defensive power to turn back the pre-season District favorites of 2-A.

The Mustangs scored on the first play from scrimmage, completely outmanned the Mules and turned what was rated to be a close

contest into a run away. Operating from a single wing, the Ponies were sparked by Fullback Robert Priest and inspired by the hard running of John Wayne Hair and Rande Buchenau. They turned in their best offensive punch of the season.

Tough line and down-field blocking proved to be the deciding factor as the locals turned in their best game of the season in that department also.

Play in the game is as follows: Neinst's kick was taken at the 20, fumbled and recovered at the 11 yard line. The Mules tried the Mustang line three plays and were faced with fourth down still needing three yards. The Muleshoe kick was good to the 34 yard line with no run back.

**First Score**  
On the first play from scrimmage, from the single wing formation, Priest passed complete to Buchenau who was all alone for the first Olton score. Buchenau's kick was short and the Mustang's led 6-0.

Neinst kicked to the 25 and the ball was returned to the 39 yard line. Muleshoe picked up a first down on the 50 yard line and on next play Neinst recovered a Mule fumble at the 43.

Priest picked up yardage to the 37 and Buchenau ran to the right side of the line for an Olton first down at the 33 yard line. Hair went around right end to the 28. Hair gained to the 27 and two Mustang passes fell incomplete as the Mules gained possession of the ball at their 27 yard line.

Still hitting the Mustang line, the Muleshoe eleven picked up a first down at the 38 yard line. In three plays the Mules gained to the 50 yard line, but were penalized for illegal use of the hands on offense and were forced to punt on fourth down to the Olton 45 yard line.

Buchenau carried to the 48, but the Mustangs drew a 5-yard penalty for illegal motion to the 40 yard line. Priest's pass to Robert Duncan fell incomplete and on second down Hair connected on a running

pass play to Brown at the Mustang 40, for a first down. Priest carried around left end behind good blocking as Wilson took out the last two defenders. Priest scored from 40 yards out. Hair ran around the left side of the line for the 2 points and the Mustangs led 14-0, with 3:46 remaining in the first quarter of play.

**Many Penalties**  
Neinst kicked to the 20 and the Mules returned to the 37. Muleshoe picked up a first down at the 48, and a second down pass was intercepted by Duncan at the 35.

At this point both teams had trouble with numerous penalties but the Mustangs were able to pick up first downs at the Muleshoe 44 and 33 yard lines as the first quarter ended.

Hair hit the right side of the line to the 30 yard line. Buchenau went through center to the 27. Olton was penalized 5 yards for illegal motion and from the 35 yard line Priest's screen pass to Hair clicked as Hair followed good blocking for the third Mustang touchdown. Hair's pass was intercepted on the try for 2 points and the Mustang eleven led 20-0.

Muleshoe returned Neinst's kick to the 31 yard line and the Mules were penalized 15 yards on a personal foul to the 16 yard line. The Mules found the going too rough to handle at this point and punted from the 15 to the 43. Olton was penalized for roughing the kicker and the Mule's kick was good to the Olton 47 yard line.

**Priest Plows**  
Buchenau carried into the left side of the line to the 39 for a first down. Three plays later Priest's pass to Buchenau was good for another first down at the 23 yard line.

Buchenau went through the center to the 16 and Hair carried around right end to the 8 yard line for a first. Olton was penalized for backfield in motion to the 13 yard line and Hair's running pass to the right was complete to Brown in the end zone for the score.

Priest plowed through the center of the line for the 2 points and Olton led 28-0 with 6:38 remaining in the first half. The Mules took Neinst's kick at the 25

but were thrown for a loss at the 20 yard line by Duncan. Muleshoe gained enough yardage for a first down at the 30 yard line.

The Mules managed to put together their only scoring threat of the game and combined a good pass attack with their running game to score from the 35 yard line on a well executed pass play. A completed pass for the 2 points made the score Olton 20-Muleshoe 8.

Buchenau took the Mule kick and returned to the Muleshoe 49. Priest hit the right side of the line to the 46. Priest's pass to Hair fell incomplete and Hair tried left tackle for no gain. Buchenau's kick went out of bounds at the 10.

Muleshoe picked up a first at the 20 and gained to the 25 as the first half ended, Olton 28-Muleshoe 8.

A short kick by Neinst was taken at the 40 and returned to the 42. The Mustangs threw up a stubborn defense and Muleshoe kicked on fourth down from the 46 to the 32.

**Through Center**  
Priest carried through the center of the line to the 41 and Hair hit the right side for a first at the 46. Priest went over center to the 47 and two plays later Hair went wide around right end to the 36 for another first down. Buchenau, Hair and Priest in order carried in three plays to set up a first down at the 22. Hair tried the right side of the line to the 19 and a pass from Priest to Fred Riney fell incomplete.

The Mules were off side and from the 14 Hair went around right end for the score. Priest hit the center of the line for the extra points and the score was Olton 36-Muleshoe 8.

Neinst's kick was returned to the 37 yard line and the Mules were able to pick up just half of the needed distance before kicking on fourth down to the 27 yard line.

Priest hit the right side of the line to the 29. Hair carried to the 34 but the Mustangs drew a 15 yard penalty to the 14 for offensive holding. Priest tried the left side of the line to the 15 and Hair carried to the 30 but the Mustangs were forced to kick and Buchenau kick was good to the Muleshoe 39.

Again the Mules could pick up only half of the needed 10 yards and punted out of bounds to the Olton 39.

**Mustangs Roll**  
The Mustang's offense rolled along as Hair carried around right end for a first at the 49. Buchenau went to the left side of the line for a first at the 38. Priest hit the center of the line to the 36 and Hair carried around right end to the 25 for another first down. Buchenau went around left end to the 12. Hair carried to the 6 yard line as the third quarter of play ended.

Buchenau went to the left for a first down at the 2 yard line. Priest carried to the 1 and a pass from Priest to Duncan was good for the score. Hair passed to Buchenau complete but the officials ruled the ball was caught out of the end zone and the Mustang eleven led 42-8.

**Neinst Kicks**  
Neinst's kick went into the end zone and was returned to the 20. Two plays later Duncan intercepted a pass and the Mustangs set up shop at the 30.

The Mustangs were unable to gain the needed yardage and Priest kicked into the end zone. From the 20 yard line the Mules were penalized to the 15 for having an ineligible receiver downfield. Priest and Riney threw the Mule passer for a loss at the 2. The Mules gained to the 4 and quick kicked to the 23 yard line.

**Passing Attack**  
Buchenau carried around right end to the 25 and Olton lost 5 yards for delay of the game. Priest passed complete to Buchenau for a first down at the 12. Priest went to the left to the 4 yard line and carried to the 2 on the next play, but the Mustangs were penalized to the 19 for offensive holding.

Hair's pass to Brown was incomplete and Johnny Schenck's pass to Buchenau was complete at the 19. Priest hit Buchenau for the score from the 19 and Hair's kick was good for the extra point as the Olton eleven continued to give the score board a work out, Olton 49-Muleshoe 8. The Mules returned the kick to the 13. They picked up a first down at the 27 and gained to the 34 before they were forced to punt. The kick was

blown dead at the 43. Priest carried to the 42 and down to the 35 yard line. Buchenau tried the right side of the line for no gain and a fourth down pass by Buchenau was intercepted at the 33 yard line. In two plays the Mules picked up a first at the 47 and were at

the 41 when the game ended.

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
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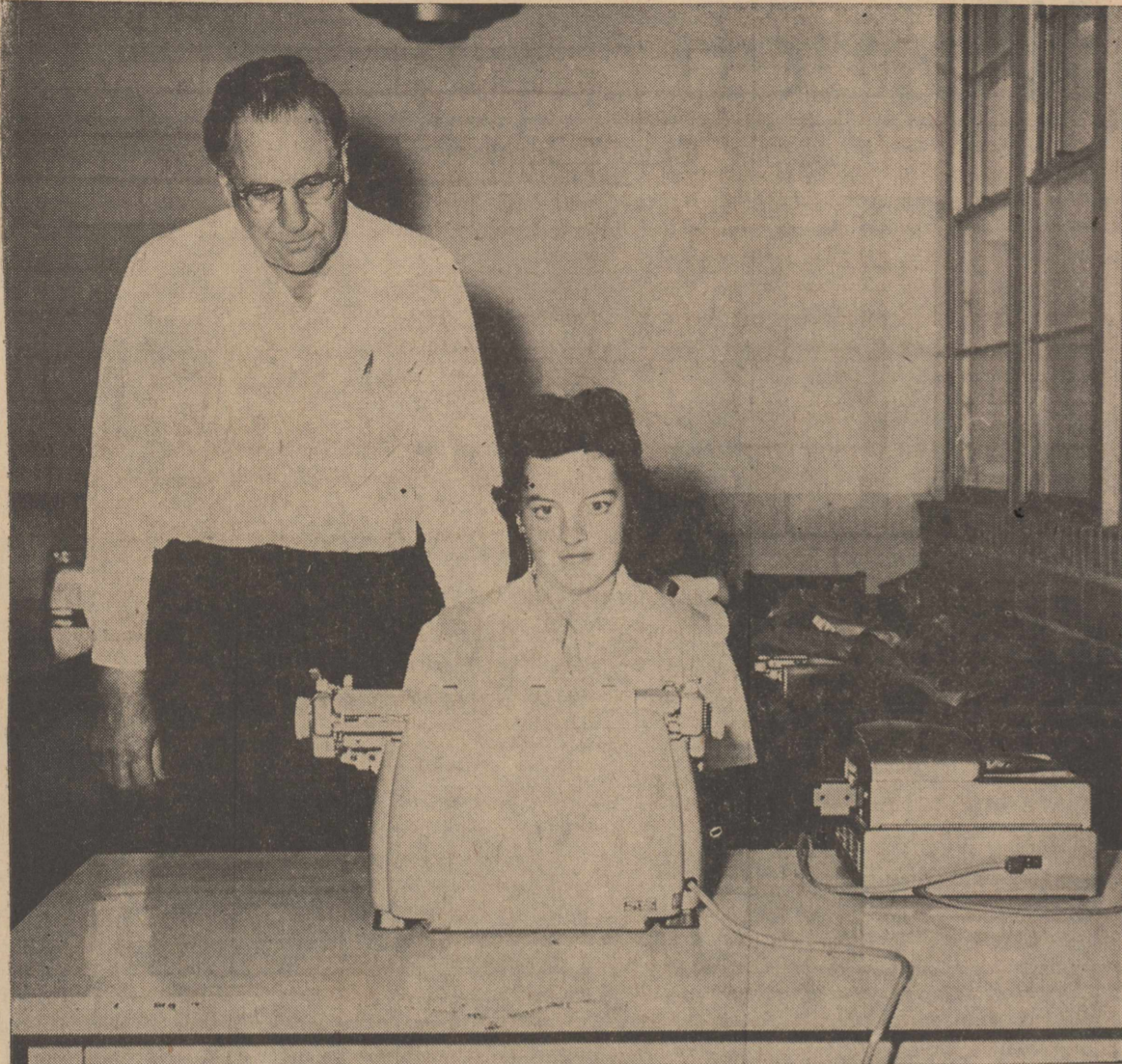

# New Course In Office Machines Now Offered

New office equipment of the most modern design has put Olton High School on a par with most business colleges.

Commercial Instructor David Howton took a special course in business machines last summer to add to his years of experience in the teaching of commercial subjects.

Mr. Howton has taught commercial subjects for twenty-two years. He has taught in schools in California, Oklahoma, Arizona and Texas. The commercial teacher received his education at North Texas State College in the school of Business Administration. He has both bachelor and Masters degrees from that institution.

The past summer Howton attended a two-week workshop in Austin, where he took a methods course. He also attended summer school at North Texas for six weeks. There he studied business English and office machines.

Although he took a business English course this summer, Mr. Howton is not teaching it this year. In order to keep from overloading the commercial teacher, business English is being taught by an English teacher, Mr. Howton

stated this year is the first time "he has had a period off in his twenty-two years of teaching." He finds it a relief to have a free period, but is a little disappointed that it was not possible for him to teach the course for which he was trained this summer.

In addition to the five classes Mr. Howton teaches, he sponsors the sophomore class and drives a school bus.

Courses offered in commercial subjects this year are Typing I, Shorthand, Bookkeeping and Office Machines. The latter subject has recently been added to the curriculum and is in the "experimental stage."

In his office machines class, Mr. Howton has fourteen girls and "one brave boy". The class is instructed in the use of adding machines, calculators, duplicating machines and audogram, a combination transcriber and recorder.

Two electric typewriters which the school has recently purchased, aid in teaching the "modern" method of typing. The class is also taught filing and the correct use of the telephone.

A complete telephone unit which includes teacher and student manuals has been donated to the department by the General Telephone Company of the Southwest. This apparatus is valued at \$1000. Olton High School is the first school on the Plains to experiment with this unique means of teaching telephone courtesy. According to Mr. Howton, it has proved to be a very desirable teaching aid.

In the bookkeeping class, Mr. Howton teaches by using practice sets. He also instructs the students in check writing, depositing money, payroll accounting and record keeping. He is planning to teach the students how to fill out that "all important Nemesis" . . . the income tax return, "after the first of the year."

During the first semester, shorthand classes are taught the theory and characters used in that subject. The second semester is spent in their taking dictation at increasing rates of speed. It is necessary that shorthand students have one year of typing, as they must transcribe their shorthand on the typewriter.

Typing I classes learn how to operate the typewriter. They have timed writings and daily copy lessons. Typing II is not offered as students need only one year in which to learn the operation of the typewriter. Typing speed can be increased only by practice.

Plans to improve the commercial department include the addition of a key driven calculator. Mr. Howton stated by purchasing more adding machines each student will have more time to use the machine; thus the students can become more proficient and accurate in the operation.

One-half year or more of practice on the electric typewriter is necessary to learn the art of using it. Mr. Howton hopes more electric typewriters will be added, so students may have a longer period of practice time on the electric typewriter.

The commercial teacher plans for his shorthand students to take dictation from various teachers and administrators of the school, thereby adding to the students proficiency and alleviating some of the work of the school secretary. It is obvious in talking with David Howton, he is a true teacher in every sense of the word. He loves his work and is genuinely and personally interested in each of his students, and in presenting up-to-date methods in the commercial subjects.

## Myrick Farm Photo Displayed At State Fair

An impressive installation service was held last Wednesday evening for the new officers of the Hart Baptist Church Women's Missionary Union.

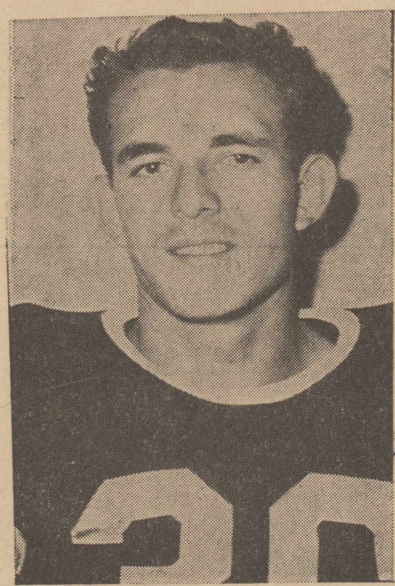

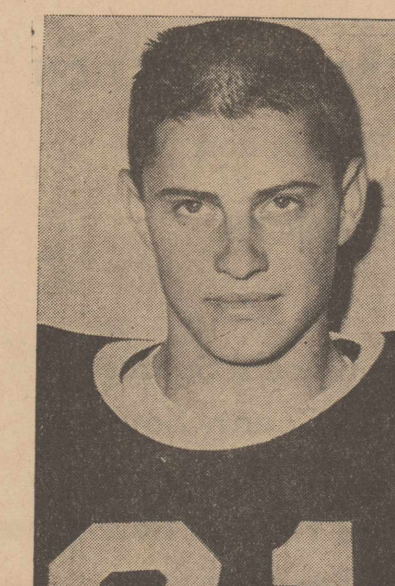
