## Fitts Hat In Mayor Race No Date Set For Ballot

"I can get the job done and I think I'm about the only one in town that can."

With these words B. C. "Shorty" Fitts this week opened his campaign for mayor. Mr. Fitts will be a candidate to fill out the unexpired term of D. Y. Ray.

Mr. Ray submitted his resignation as the town's chief magistrate at the regular meeting of the city council held Tuesday night of last week. A. D. Adams was named acting mayor.

However, Mr. Ray presided at a called meeting of the council Thursday night of last week when the city dads set water and sewer rates for the school system. Mr. Ray's resignation does not become effective until Dec. 8.

A special election must be called after effective date of the resignation. No date has been set for the special mayoralty election but it is expected to come some time in January.

Mr. Fitts exudes self-confidence. "I think I've got what it takes to do a job from a standpoint of business and construction too," the candidate declared.

He said he has been in the

construction business since 1925. He was in charge of public works including streets, water, sewer and other utilities for four years during World War II at Clinton Naval Base at Clinton, Okla.

"You campaign like Harry Truman," a listener told the candidate. "I know him pretty well," Mr. Fitts retorted.

Mr. Fitts said he has been in business for himself in Texas for the past 15 years. He now has holdings at Big Lake, Midland, Andrews and Levelland as well as at Olton, where he is associated in the firm of Fitts & Townsend.

"I think I'm a good enough businessman to get things straightened out," Mr. Fitts declared. "I'm going to cut down on expenses until they think its terrific. We'll get some sewers and pavement and save money too."

"I think the board will go with me on it," he added.

Mr. Fitts moved to Olton in 1957. He is Olton's member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Asked if he had ever held such an office before, Mr. Fitts replied, "I have never lived in a town before where it was necessary."

## Don Waldrip Rated Tops In Doctoral Work

High School Principal Don Waldrip has been admitted into the doctoral program at Colorado State College.

His first summer of residence at the school was last summer and was a trial period. He will require four such periods of work to complete his doctorate.

The graduate committee considered the following criteria in making its decision. Considered were test data from graduate record examinations, letters of recommendation from individuals for whom Mr. Waldrip has worked, recommendation from his research professor, graduate advisor and faculty interviewing committee.

Only one third of the candidates who were in Mr. Waldrip's class last summer were allowed to continue in the doctoral program. Mr. Waldrip was in the top three percent of his class in tests on education.

He was highest, with a grade of 98, on English usage in the entire program. Twelve hours were required to complete the examination.

Being underdog is nothing new to Olton—sporting probably the most improved football eleven in the state.

Olton lost the flip to Canyon Friday night and will play at Buffalo Stadium. Coach Joe Turner tossed his lucky buck and Coach Davis of Canyon called heads.

**Heads it was and the Mustangs travel.**

Olton will sit on the east side of the stadium. The seats there are equipped with electrical sockets for electric blankets.

Admission is \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for students. Tickets are on sale at Olton High School. Superintendent Joe W. Harper said tickets will remain on sale here until 10 o'clock Friday morning. He said it will be helpful if those who plan to attend the game buy tickets here.

**Full Strength**  
Coach Joe Turner said his team will be at full strength.

Olton goes into bi-district sporting a 6-4 win-loss record. The Ponies have beaten Petersburg, Hale Center, Hereford, Muleshoe, Merton and Abernathy. They have lost to Floydada, Littlefield, Dimmitt and Lockney.

Canyon beat Dimmitt in the fourth quarter of play last Friday

night at Canyon. They knocked off the Bobcats 14 to 12. Dimmitt was the Mustangs' only common foe with the Eagles. Olton lost to Dimmitt 38 to 12 earlier in the season.

**Split Series**

Olton split a two-game series with the Eagles played in 1956 and 1957. The Eagles trounced Olton roundly in 1956, but lost to the Mustangs on a 27-27 ball game the following year. Olton won the last contest 5-4 on penetrations.

Chuck Nester is Canyon's leading ground gainer this year. He has gained 762 yards in 170 carries and has scored 68 points.

Nester weighs 150 pounds and plays fullback. He is a quick starter, hitting top speed in three or four steps.

**Needle Threader**

Quarterback Jerry Richardson is the Eagles' second ground gainer with 625 yards to his credit in 110 carries for 5.7 yards a carry. He has scored 64 points and was all-regional last year. He also is a threat as a passer having tossed 93 times for 38 completions this season.

Canyon's lonesome end is 150-pound Jimmy Killingsworth. He gets down field and snags those passes continually pulling the opposing team off balance.

Billy Triplett is a standout Eagle lineman playing offensive guard. He weighs 145 pounds. Defensive standouts are Ronnie Harris at tackle and Tommy Henderson as linebacker.

**Marrs Hurt**

Jimmy Marrs was injured in the Dalhart game. He plays halfback and is a speed demon. He has scored 32 points, but has seen little service since being injured. He handled the ball one time against Tulla and scored from 19 yards out.

John Ware is Canyon's most potent pass receiver. He, naturally, plays end.

Most Olton business houses will close at noon for the trek to Canyon, according to Wayne Cooper, manager of Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

and people of Chili. He showed slides of landscape and pointed out cities of major interest in Chili.

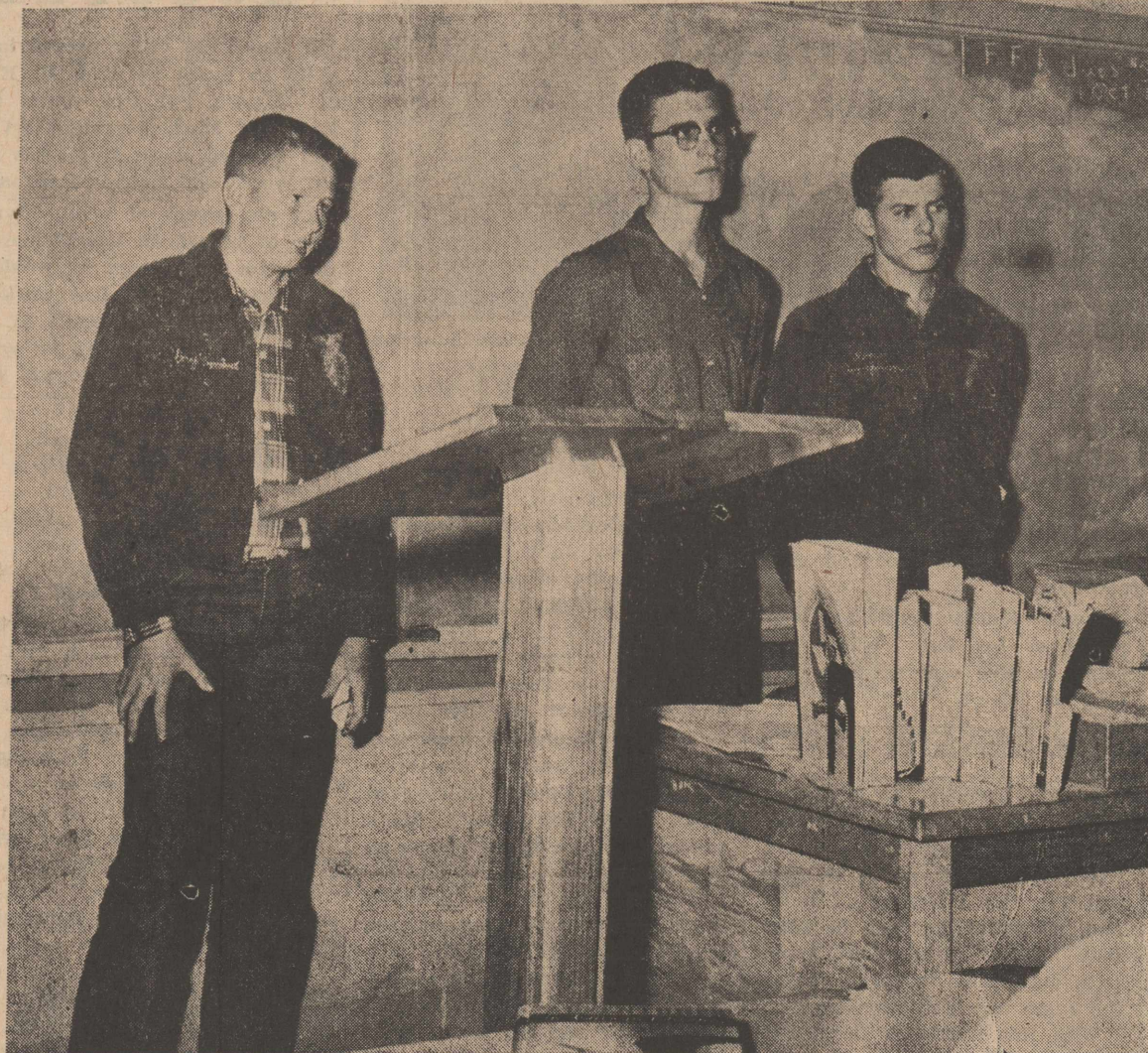
Mr. Holmes expressed his concern about the inflation in that country. He also spoke of the agriculture of Chili and showed pictures of the vast vegetable markets.

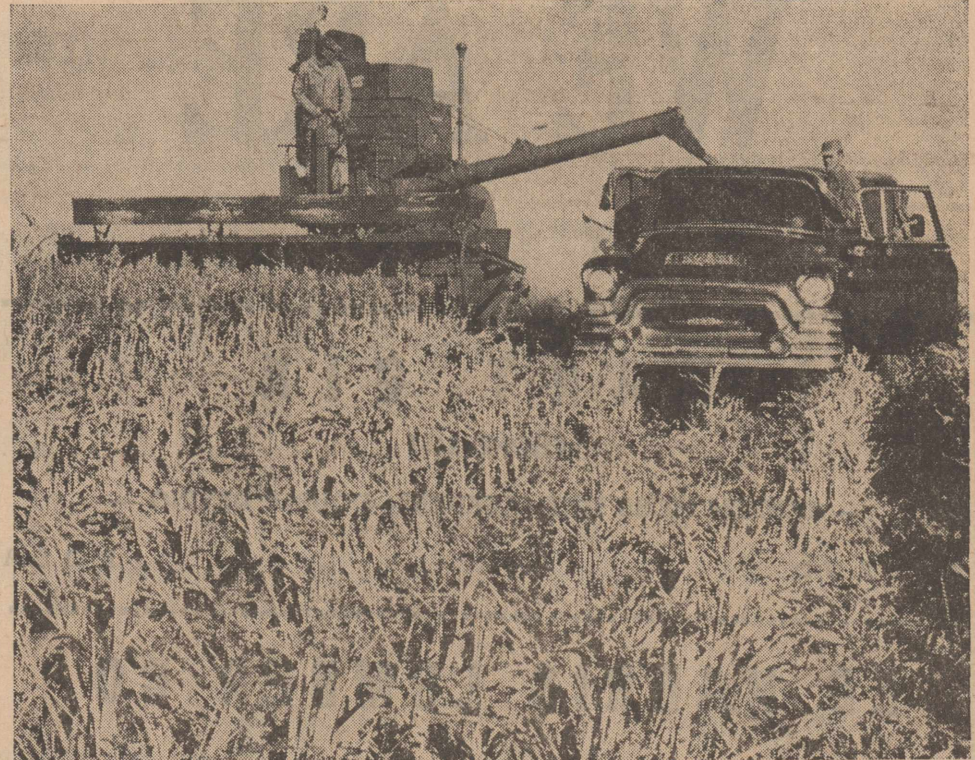

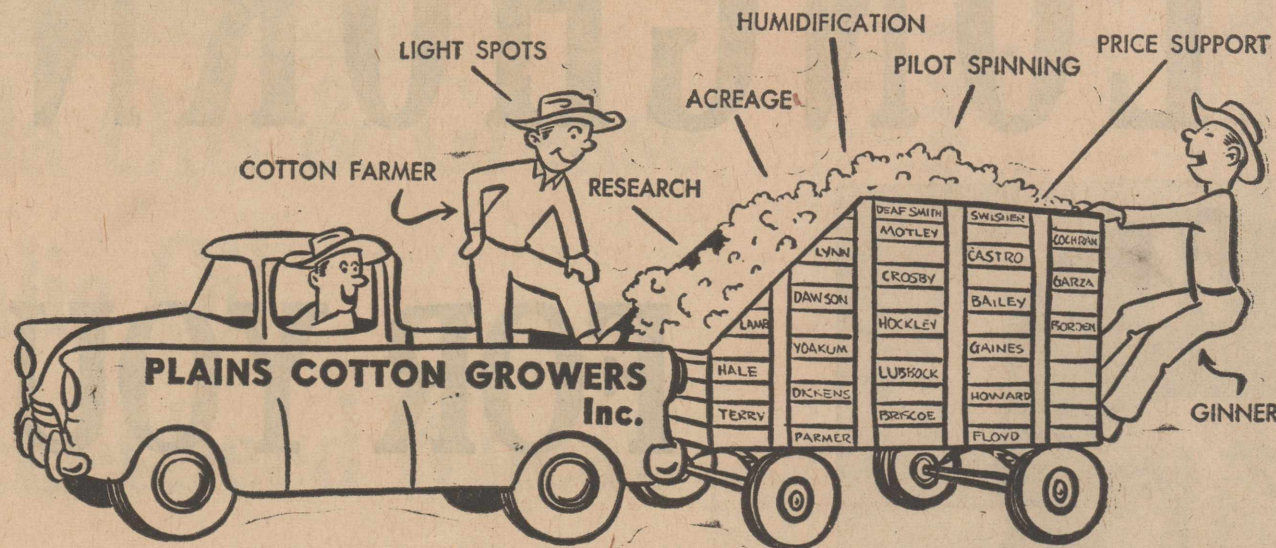

The only plowing this field of DeKalb received was to make a water furrow, and broadcast rotary hoe when 3 inches tall, 40 acres was fertilized with 200 lbs. of 10-20-10 the other 20 acres had been fertilized for cotton and received no nitrogen. It was watered twice and harvested Nov. 10, with an average yield of 6500 lbs. per acre on the 60 acres.

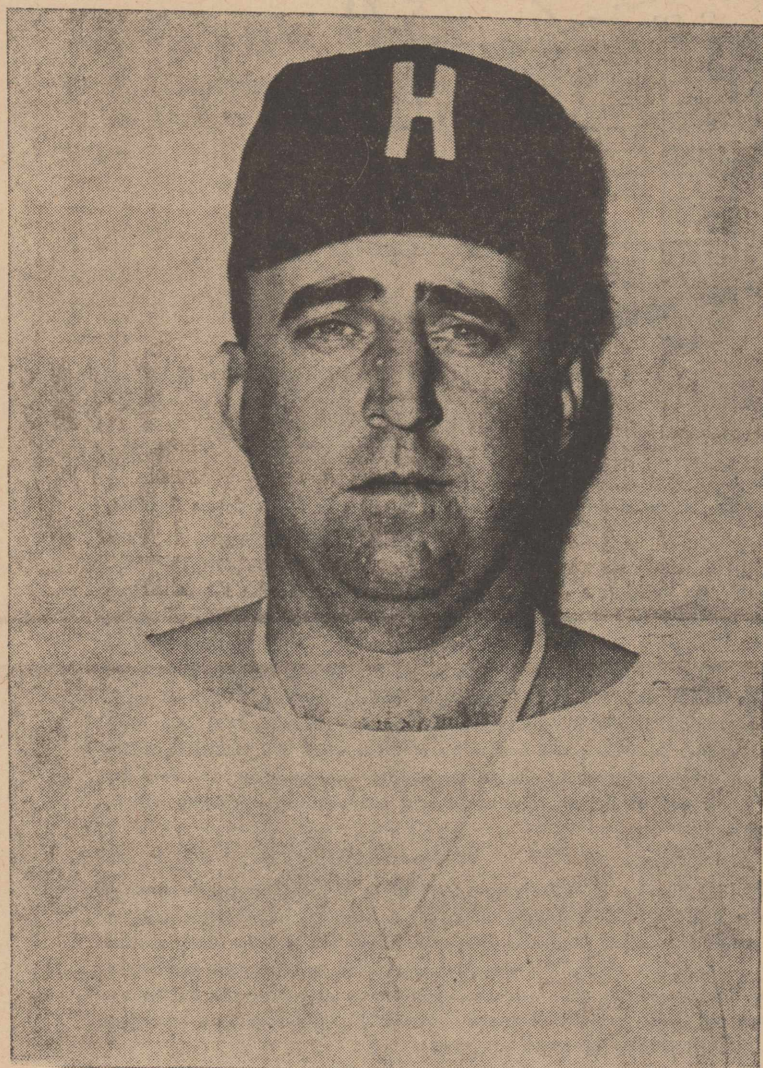

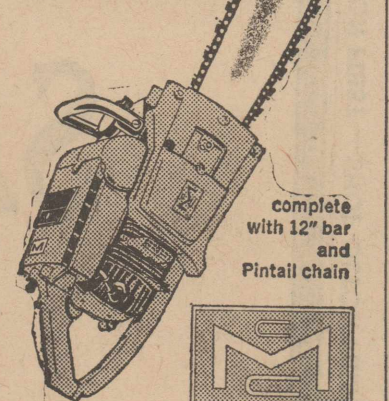

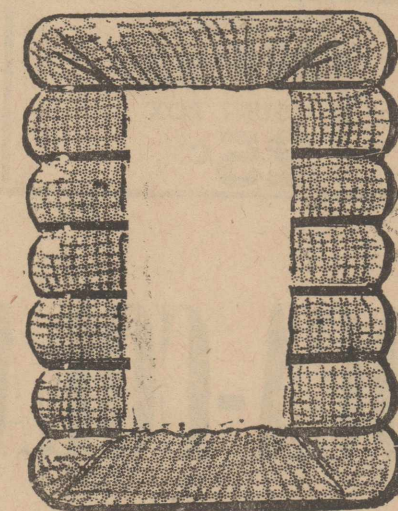

**LEGAL NOTICE**

**ORDINANCE NO. 110**  
AN ORDINANCE PHOIBITING  
THE KEEPING OF HOGS, CAT-  
TLE, HORSES, SHEEP, GOATS,  
JACKS AND JENNIES WITHIN  
THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY  
OF OLTON, EXCEPT FOR EXHIBI-  
TION OR SHOW PURPOSES,  
AND PROVIDING THE PENALTY  
FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF,  
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY  
COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OL-  
TON:

**SECTION I:** That from and after  
the passage of this Ordinance and  
the publication thereof, it shall be  
unlawful for any person, firm or  
corporation to keep any living  
hogs, cattle, horses, sheep, goats,  
jacks and jennies within the city  
limits of the City of Olton.

**SECTION II:** It shall not be a  
violation of this Ordinance where  
hogs, cattle, horses, sheep, goats,  
jacks and jennies are kept for a  
period of not more than seventy-  
two (72) hours where such animals  
are in a show or on exhibition and  
are kept in a barn or on grounds  
used for such purposes.

**SECTION III:** Any person, firm  
or corporation violating any of the  
provisions of this Ordinance shall  
upon conviction be fined in a sum  
not less than \$5.00, nor more than  
\$100.00, and each and every day  
that any such animal is kept and  
maintained in the said City in vio-  
lation of this Ordinance, shall con-  
stitute a separate offense.

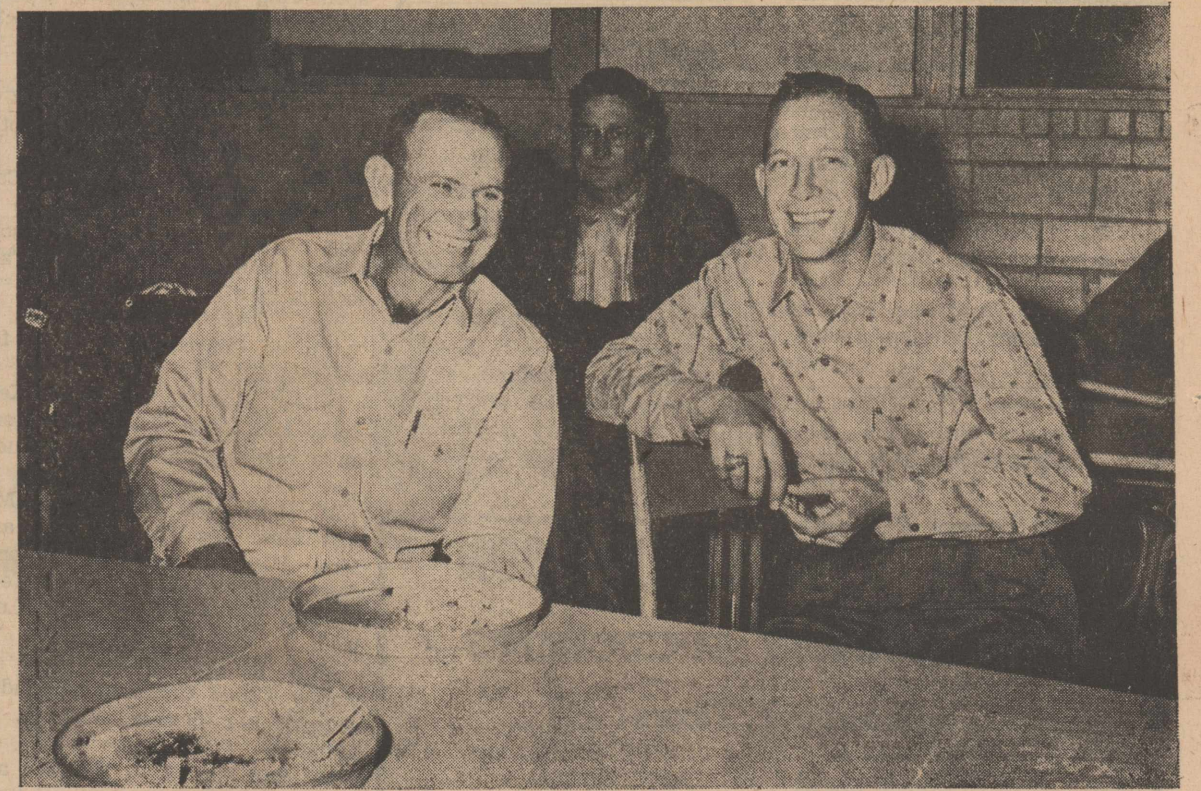
