



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

The five varieties for the test vere secured from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. They were planted on April 17 and germinated by April 20. The varieties being tested include Nebraska 6 & 10, Pacific 1, Gila (Arizona) and an experimental strain number

These varieties were planted in two row plots 22 feet long in four plots for each of the 5 varieties. In addition to this test, three acres each of Nebraska 6, Pacific 1 and Gila were planted for observation.


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
