Olton Relay Teams Headed To State Meet

Olton's two great relay teams are Austin bound.

The 440 relay team took the regional last Saturday with ease on a sweltering track at Texas Tech in Lubbock. The time was 44 flat.

The team is made up of Rande Buchenau, Jimmy Robbins, L. H. McAdams and Royce Bodkin.

Robbins turned in a great performance on the mile relay. He ran his quarter in 51.6, his best time this year and spotted teammates enough distance to assure a win.

Olton's time on the mile relay was 3:31.1.

The team is made up of Arno Hall, Robbins, McAdams and Bodkin.

Buchenau ran fourth in the 100 yard dash and Bodkin was third in the 440.

The Mustang relay teams go to the Red Raider Relays next Saturday and there will find their toughest competition to date.

One of Texas' greatest school-boy relay teams — that of Andrews — will be in the meet. The Andrews team clocks a mile in 3:21. Saturday they will be out to smash the national record of just a fraction over 3:17 held by Brooklyn.

Olton's relay teams will go to the State meet in Austin May 8 and 9.

Measles Keep Youngsters From School

More than 50 youngsters were absent from primary school Monday because of illness, according to Principal Fred Gordon.

Mr. Gordon blamed much of the absenteeism on measles.

He said 53 children were absent. The primary school has an enrollment of 526. Mr. Gordon said the situation improved some Tuesday.

Robert Fisher, elementary principal, said absenteeism was heavy Monday in his grades. He blamed throat and ear infections rather than measles.

Doane Men Arrive To Begin Survey

Representatives of Doane Agricultural Service were scheduled to arrive in Olton this week.

A meeting of leading area farmers and businessmen was slated for Thursday night in vocational agriculture rooms at Olton High School to discuss the forthcoming survey.

The group scheduled to arrive here include Russell Kruetzman, Elmer Dennis and Jim Bobst.

Here are some of the phases of Olton agriculture to be explored in the survey.

1. Study existing agricultural situation.
2. General attitude and ambitions of the people of Olton.
3. Resources available in the area which may be used for expansion of agricultural production.
4. Farm and ranch enterprises which can be produced.
5. Whether markets exist or may be developed to justify production of these enterprises.

6. Study two or more representative groups of farms and ranches and establish one or more typical operation within each group.

7. Endeavor to determine the farm enterprise or combination of farm enterprises best suited for each typical operation.

8. Seek operational plans which would maximize net farm income for each typical farm. These plans will be actual farming guides with variations depending on levels of capital and other resources available to farms in this area.

9. Determine the type of organization which should be established to guide the proposed agricultural program.

The survey is to be made of Olton Independent School District.

McGill Named To Committee As Lamb County User's Group Forms

Some 150 Lamb County farmers last Friday night heard three speakers blast the US Department of Labor for what they termed efforts to legislate farm labor laws without action or consent of Congress.

Scored was the USDL custom of entering directives into the Federal Registry. These directives then become binding and in effect are laws of the land without ever having gone before Congress.

Speakers for the farm labor meeting, which was held in the county court house at Littlefield, were Al Muldrow of Brownfield, member of the Mexican sub-committee from Texas to the Department of Labor; John Kendrick, Brownfield banker; and Joe Sooter, president of the West Texas Employers Group.

McGill Named
Elmer McGill of Olton was named to a three-man committee to head the Lamb County Users

Group which was formed Friday night.

Mr. McGill said area farmers have kicked in about \$1,500 to send representatives to Washington on farm labor matters when necessary.

Lamb County farmers are particularly bitter about proposed USDL directives which would bring farm labor under wage and hour laws if put in force.

Lamb County farmers have been warned that if USDL enters the directives in the federal registry they might well become the law of the land without ever having been passed by Congress.

Law By Directive
Mr. Muldrow said the Labor Department's directives would bring all domestic as well as foreign labor under federal wage and hour law if employment is obtained through a state or federal employment agency.

Those using either type of labor through the state or federal agency would be required to furnish housing approved by the USDL and in many instances to furnish transportation from the last place of employment.

Union Feared
Speakers at the Friday night meeting also expressed fear that efforts may be made in the near future to unionize farm labor.

Farmers of the area were urged to send letters and telegrams to government officials asking that the secretary of labor withdraw proposed regulations which would put farm labor under provisions of the wage and hour law.

Olton Swine Judging Team Top At Lubbock

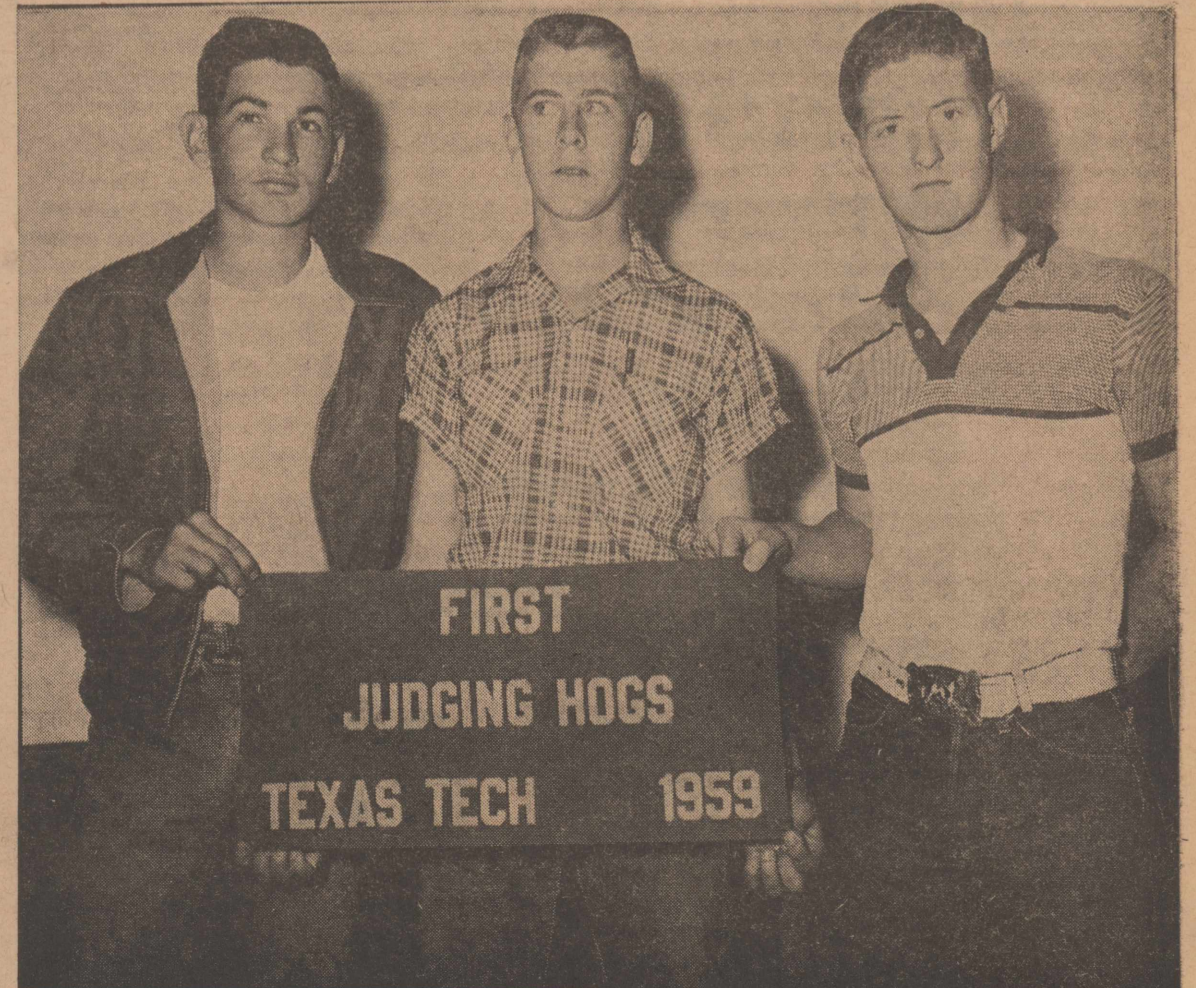
Olton's FFA swine judging team was tops in the judging contest held at Lubbock last week end.

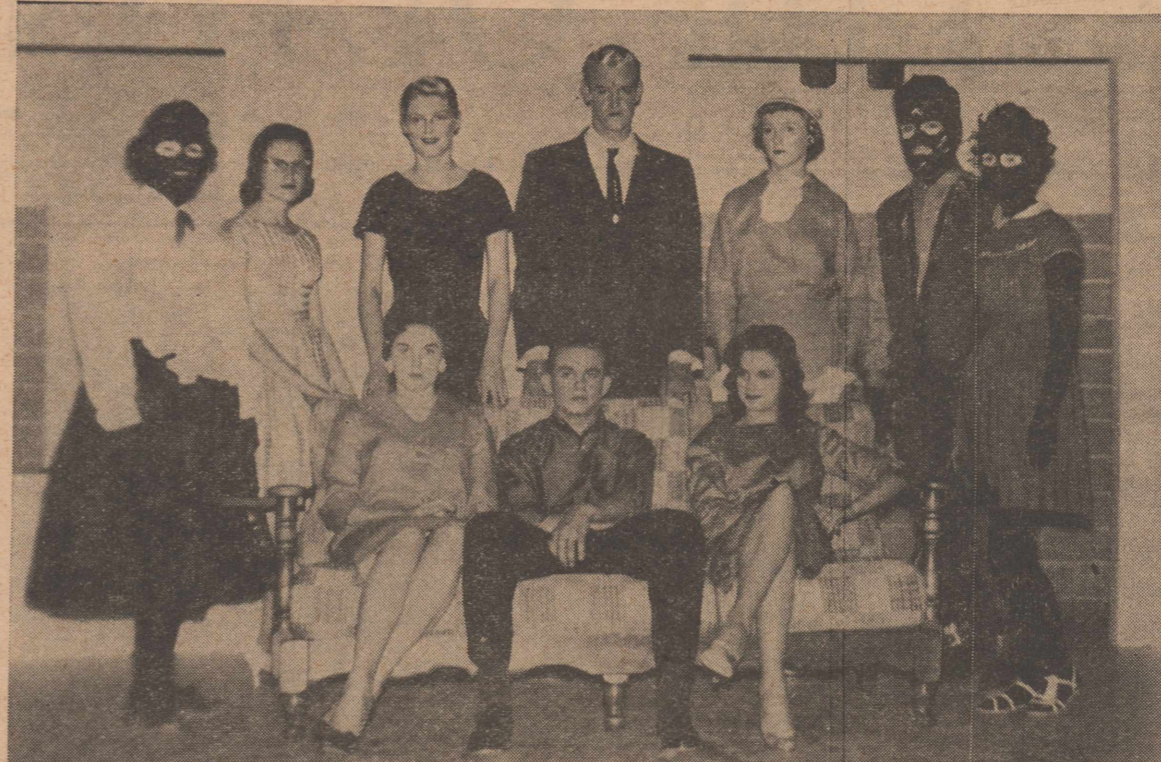

Hart Thinclads Quality For State Finals After Winning In Regional Events Saturday

Led by Thomas Holster, the Hart Longhorn track team made a good showing at the Regional Meet Friday and Saturday in Lubbock. Hart's team placed sixth in a field of 60 Class B schools participating.

Holster set a new record for Class B by tossing the shot-put 45 ft. 11 inches in final competition Saturday. In the Friday preliminaries, Holster had qualified with a toss of 43 ft. 4 in. He will be eligible to participate in the State Meet to be held at Austin on May 8-9.

Another Longhorn who did well was Gene Varner. In the preliminaries, Varner won his heats in the 100 yd. dash, 180 yd. low hurd-

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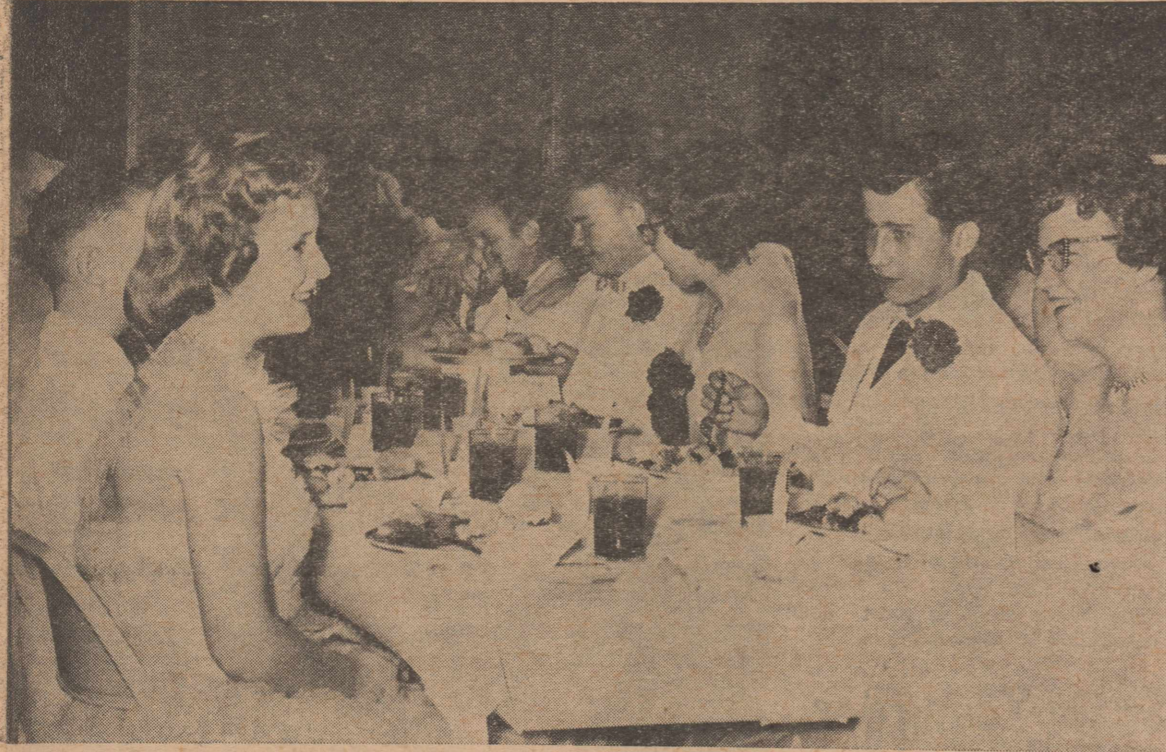

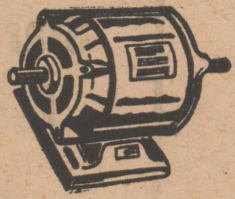

Safflower Is Added For Study By HP Station

Safflower has been added to the 1959 research program at the High Plains Station of Texas Research Foundation at Halfway. Dr. Johnny H. Davis, Associate Head, stated today.

This new research program has been included at the request of farmer supporters of the Station who want information on Safflower varieties suitable to the area.

The five varieties for the test were secured from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. They were planted on April 17 and germinated by April 20. The varieties being tested include Nebraska 6 & 10, Pacific 1, Gila (Arizona) and an experimental strain number A-5731.

These varieties were planted in two row plots 22 feet long in four plots for each of the 5 varieties. In addition to this test, three acres each of Nebraska 6, Pacific 1 and Gila were planted for observation.

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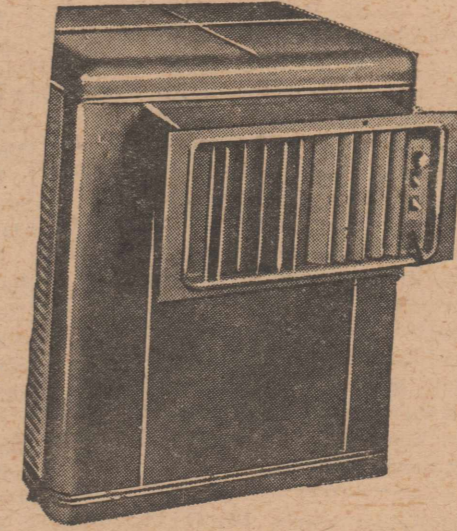
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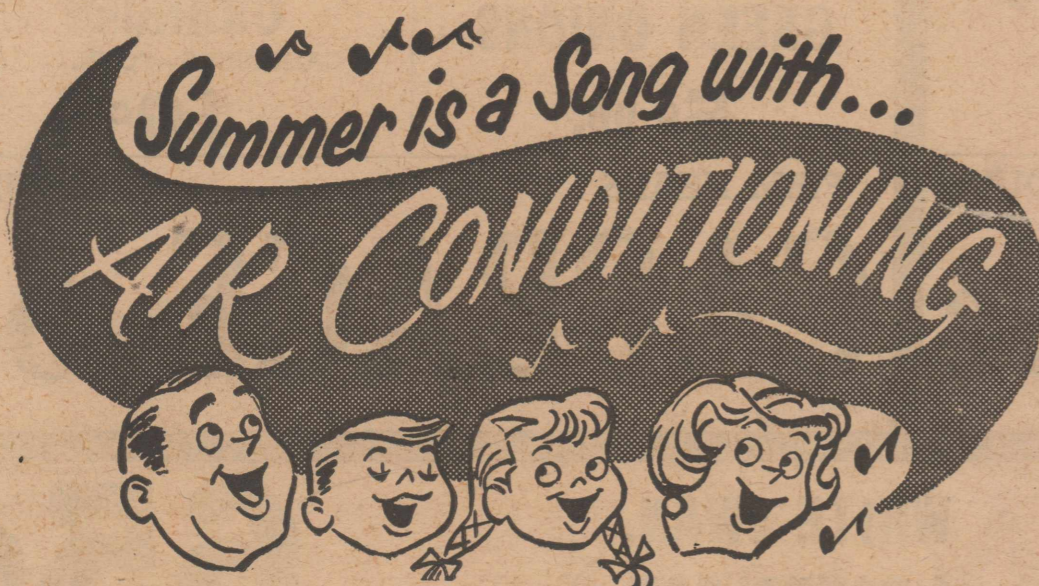
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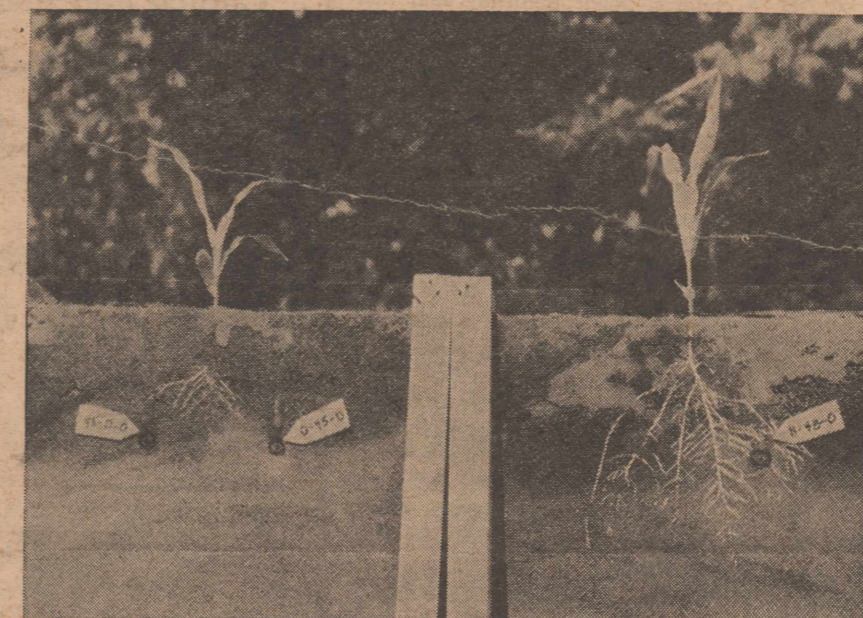
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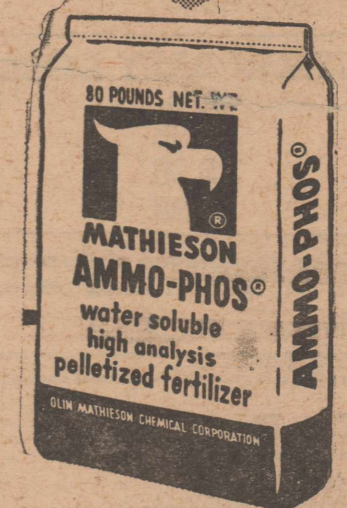
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SIDE DRESS YOUR COTTON EARLY IN THE SEASON WITH AMMO-PHOS—
