Chief Tom Smith Maps Tornado Warning Plans

Tornado season is here again and Firechief Tom Smith says Olton is as ready as it was two years ago when the Fire Department's warning system was credited with saving scores of lives.

Chief Smith said his committees are functioning and are aware of their duties in event disaster strikes.

Police Chief Vernie Head is in charge of communications and law enforcement. He would call for assistance from members of the Fire Department in event of a tornado.

Dr. E. J. Souders is in charge of medical aid. Eldon Franks is in charge of obtaining station wagons to be used as ambulances.

Percy Parsons has been put in charge of rescue operations. Chief Smith said signals for tornado alert will be the same as last year. Emergency vehicles will cruise through town with sirens open for alert.

"When we give a blast on the big siren, it's time to get in the cellar," Chief Smith declared.

Two years ago this month Olton was struck by a vicious tornado. The Fire Department's elaborate warning was credited with saving many lives. In fact, there was no loss of life.

The team chalked up 1643 points while first place Corsicana had only 1648 points. There were 75 teams from all over the state entered.

Olton Bands Top Rated In Contest

Both Olton bands took first division ratings in the Region 1 band contests last week in Plainview.

In the high school category, Class AA, Olton rated first in sight reading and concert to receive a special award plaque.

Jerry Meyer was given top rating as a student conductor for the second year in a row.

It was the first interscholastic league contest for the Cadet Band and gave them a batting average of 1,000 for the year. The Cadet Band won two parades earlier this year.

In high school class AA competition, ratings included Tahoka three in concert and two in sight reading; Spur three and three; Post, two and three; Morton four and three; Muleshoe two and two; Slaton, two and two; Floydada, one and one; and Abernathy, one and one.

In Cadet competition, Olton and Abernathy were the only schools to receive first division in both concert and sight reading.

MUCH ACREAGE ALREADY A STAND

Farmers May Have Early Cotton Crop

Olton has some of the earliest cotton in the community's history this year.

Estimates Wednesday placed cotton planting at about 90 percent completed. Some farmers already have a stand.

"There is going to be lots of cotton up by Saturday," one farmer declared Thursday.

Oddly enough, farmers have been able to get cotton stand in spite of the drying winds that have raked the South Plains almost continuously for the past several days.

Observers credit the good germination to the fact that mois-

ture has been rising in the ground at night furnishing the moisture for seed to germinate.

Farmers say cotton is coming up to a stand quickly. Again the rising moisture is credited.

Travis Bundick has some of the earliest cotton in the country. He is reported to have had a stand for several days.

Brown & Snyder also have a stand as does Alva J. Spain and many others.

Some of the earliest cotton planted in recent years was in 1956. Enterprise files show that about 75 percent of the crop was in the ground by May 10 that year.

Researchers Will Seek Possible Markets For Area Farm Products

Agricultural survey of Olton Independent School District is underway.

Three representatives of Doane Agricultural Service of St. Louis were here last week familiarizing themselves with the area preparatory to beginning the survey.

Elmer Dennis, Jim Bobst and Russell Kruetzman met with farmers and businessmen Thursday night of last week to discuss agricultural problems and ambitions of the community.

Market Needed Doane's men readily agreed that markets appear to be the area's foremost problem at the present time. Olton men at the meeting pointed out that Olton has

abundant water and rich soil and is capable of producing most crops in abundance.

"Our biggest problem is markets," said Archie Sorley, Olton farmer. Many of the farmers present have grown vegetables. They testified that this is a good vegetable country.

Most of those present agreed upon their dissatisfaction with availability of markets for vegetables grown here.

Visit Farmers

Doane men visited farmers and businessmen Friday of last week. Mr. Dennis said a team of Doane representatives will arrive here about a month from now to begin field work on the survey.

"Purpose of this visit was to familiarize ourselves with the area, its basic problems and opportunities," declared Mr. Dennis. He said he and his three companions were here to establish contacts and seek sources of information to be used in evaluating the area's resources.

He said information gained here last week also would be a determining factor in selection of personnel to do field work.

Mr. Dennis said his group will make an intensified search for markets for products of this area.

Research Markets

"From now until the time we come back we will be making contacts with marketing organizations," he asserted.

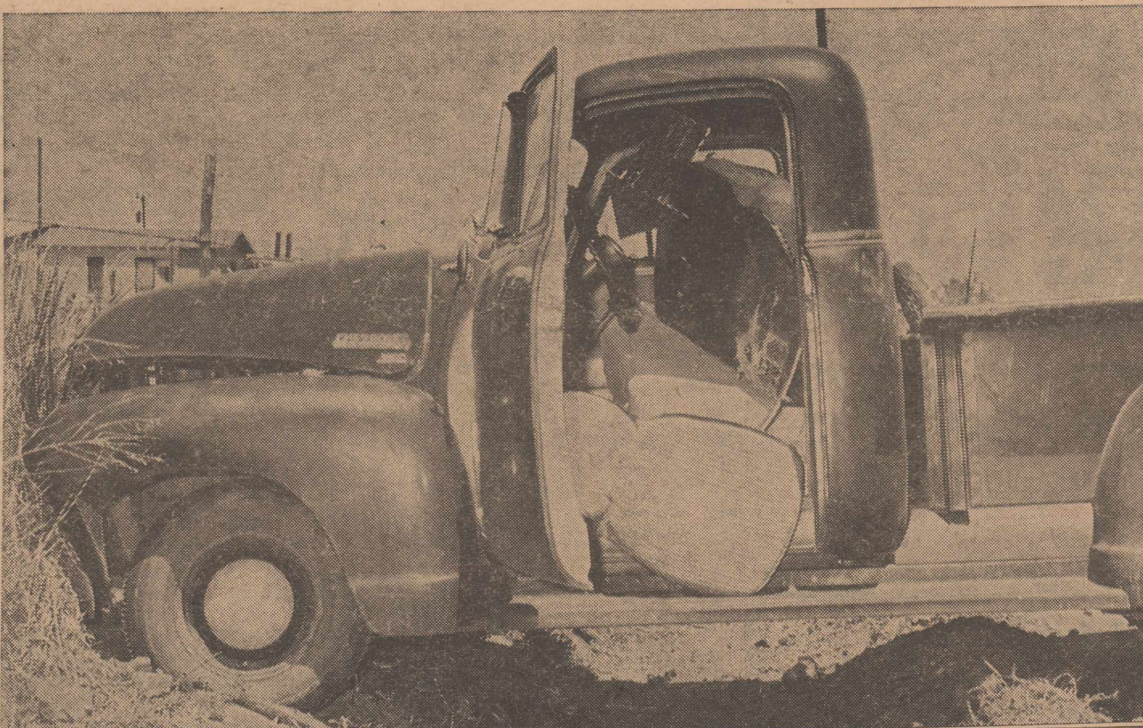
He said the next group to arrive here will do some work on linear programming the farming activities of at least three typical area farms.

He said Doanes will work in cooperation with all local, state and federal research agencies in making the survey. "In our course of this study we will attempt to take advantage of research that has already been done by other public and private research agencies," Mr. Dennis asserted.

He expressed confidence that the survey will result in a great deal of good for the community. "We are extremely impressed with the caliber of experience and leadership here," Mr. Dennis declared.

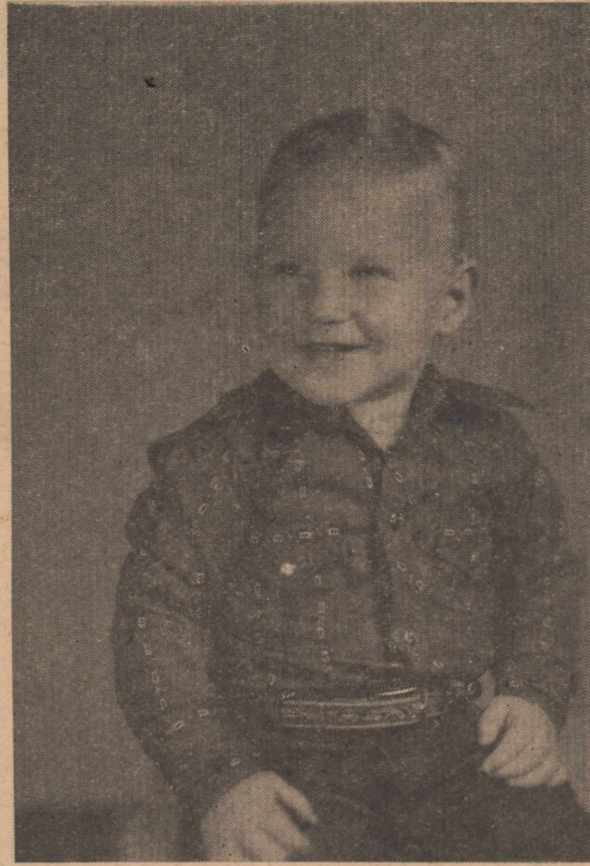

KITCHEN KORNER

It is hard to plan our meals this time of year as our weather changes so fast we may have a very light meal planned and by the time we are ready to eat the weather has turned cold.

Swiss Steak
1 piece of round steak, cut 2 inches thick. Cut across the steak about 1/4 inch deep turning and cutting all around, do this on both sides. Rub as much flour as you can into both sides. Salt and pepper well. Brown in small amount of grease on both sides. When well browned, add 1 large onion cut in two pieces. Pour 1 can tomato juice over steak, cover and bake in oven 2 hours or until done. The last hour you can put potatoes and carrots in with steak and have a meal in one. You may have to add water once or twice during cooking.

Menu for Swiss Steak
Swiss Steak
Potatoes (cooked with steak)
Carrots (cooked with steak)
Lettuce salad
Hot rolls
Cherry cobbler

Highlight your party punch by floating candles on it. Put birthday candles in lemon slices and they will float.

To avoid spillovers and keep range clean, grease a ring around pans. Greasing inside top rim of pans keeps macaroni, rice and other foods spilling over.

Angel Cake with Strawberries
1 angel food cake
1 pint strawberries sweetened (or 1 box frozen strawberries)
1 pint whipping cream

Cut top half of cake off spread half of strawberries on bottom half of cake. Lay top half of cake on this and put the rest of strawberries on it. Whip cream and cover sides and top of cake as if frosting a cake. Chill and serve. This is very good to freeze and have on hand for a quick dessert as it thaws sooner than most cakes.

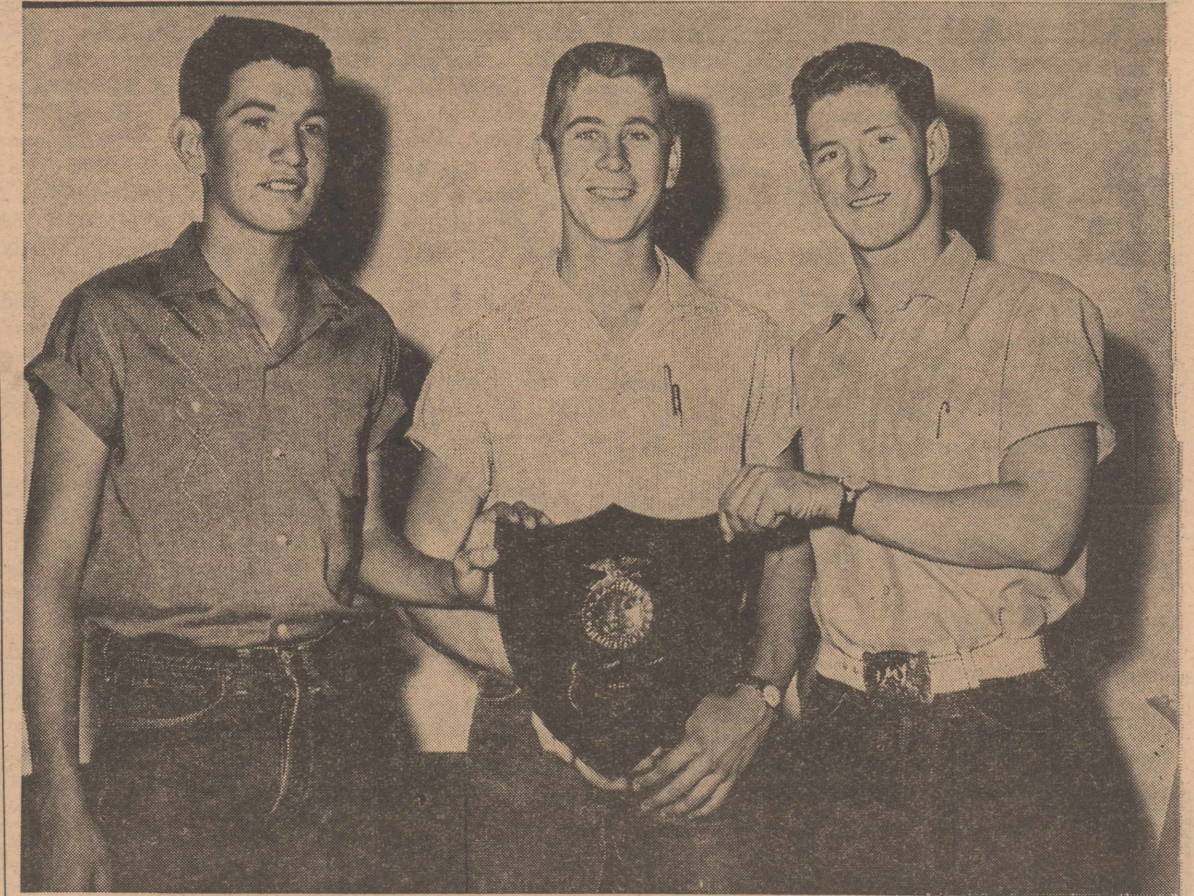

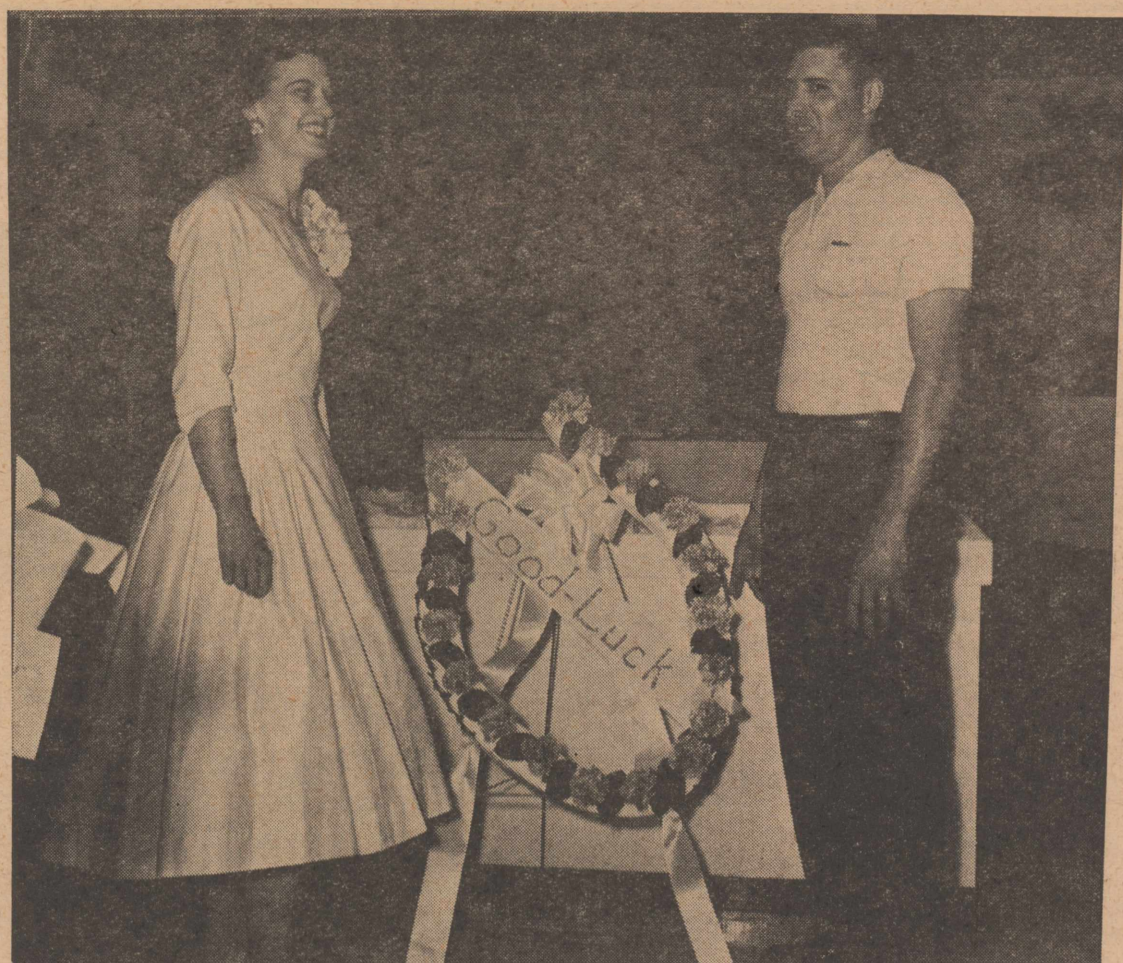

Wiley R. Scott Taken By Death; Edited Olton Newspaper In 1930s

Death Wednesday of last week wrote "30" to the half-century newspaper career of Wiley Raymond Scott, 69 years old, Plainview, former editor of The Olton Enterprise.

Mr. Scott died at an Amarillo convalescent home following a long illness.

Funeral services were held Friday of last week at Quitaque First Methodist Church.

Mr. Scott entered the newspaper field as an apprentice printer when he was 17 years old. He worked on papers in Paris, Tex., and with his wife edited and published newspapers in West Texas and Plains towns for almost 25 years.

He was with The Paris News and Lamar County Echo for 15 years.

In 1933, the couple leased The Olton Enterprise. They operated the paper here until 1937 when they bought the Quitaque Post. In 1942 they purchased The Enterprise at Turkey and pub-

lished it in conjunction with The Post until Mr. Scott suffered a stroke in 1932.

Mrs. Scott now is women's editor on the Plainview Daily Herald.

Mr. Scott was a newspaperman of the old school, trained in the hard knocks version of journalism.

He was a member of Quitaque First Methodist Church.

A native of Honey Grove, he was born Oct. 3, 1889.

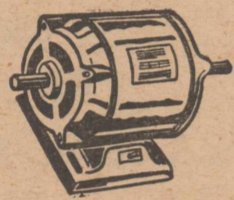
He was married in 1917 at Waco to Miss Dora Hirsh.

USDA Announces 1959 SUPPORT PRICES for 11 Classes of DRY BEANS

WASHINGTON, APRIL 8, 1959

The prices are set to return to growers the national average support price announced on February 18 (press release USDA 467-59) at \$5.35 per hundredweight, which is approximately 60 percent of the February parity price of \$8.88 per hundredweight (announced January 30).

Classes of Dry beans included under price support are pinto, great northern, pea, and medium white, small white and flat small white, red kidney (including dark, light, and western), pink, small red, large lima, and baby lima beans. The class support rates listed in the table in this release are for U. S. No. 1 grade cleaned and bagged beans with all charges, except receiving and loading out, paid through maturity dates for price support loans on the 1959 crop. (Discount for U. S. No. 2 grade beans will be 25 cents per 100 pounds.)

As under past programs, beans will be supported through loans and purchase agreements, which will be available from harvest time through Jan. 31, 1960. Maturity dates for loans and agreements will be Feb. 29, 1960, in Michigan, Pennsylvania, and New York, and April 30, 1960 in all other States.

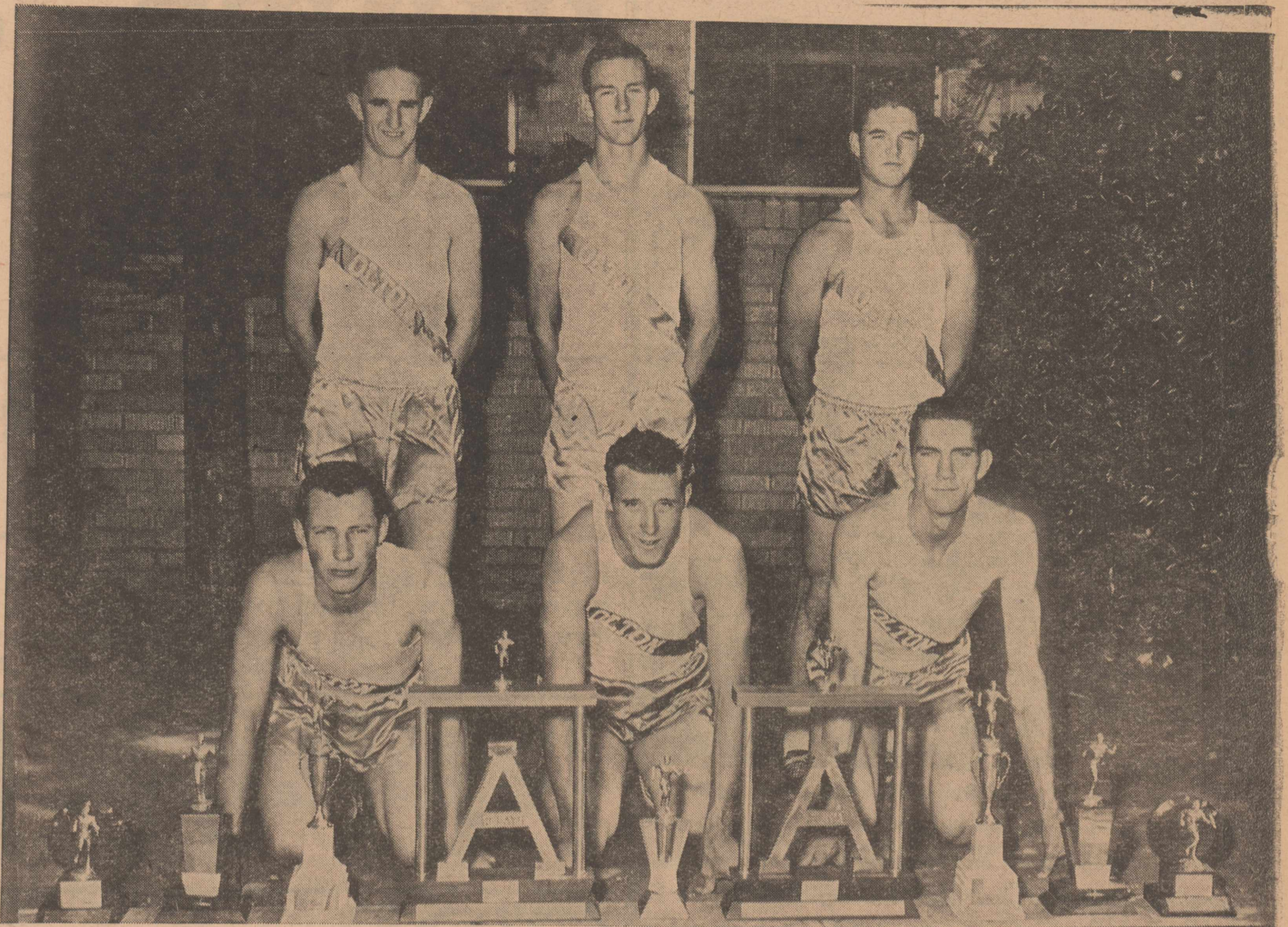
