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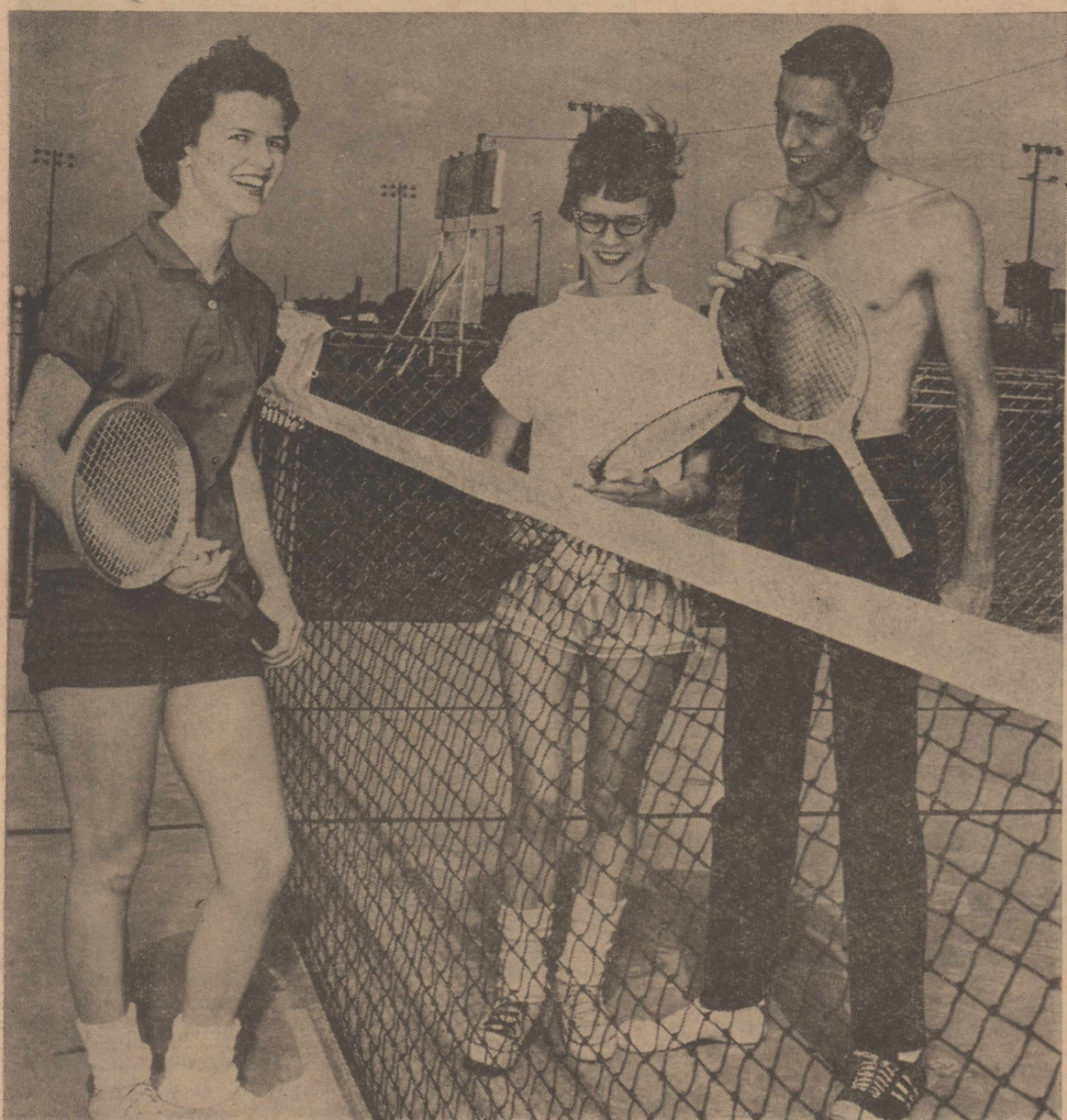

Council Passes Compulsory Trash Ordinance With City Responsible

OCCA Committee Before City Dads Seeking Street Paving Information

City council Tuesday night voted to inaugurate a compulsory trash disposal system with the fee to be added to the monthly water and sewer bill. Trash will be picked up at residences twice a month and each week at business places. Residential fee was set at a dollar a month and fee for business establishments was fixed at \$2.00 a month.

Mustang Sprinters Top State Mark; Wind Up Fourth

Running its best time of the season, Olton's sprint relay team topped the previous state record but still finished fourth in the race.

Olton's time on the 440 relay was 43.3. The previous state record was 43.6. But it was a day of record smashing. Bowie capered to a 42.8 to win. Aransas Pass was second and Olton finished behind third running Goliad.

The sprint team is made up of Rande Buchenau, Royce Bodkin, L. H. McAdams and Jimmy Robbins. The mile relay team finished third with a time of 3:27.2. Wharton was first with a time of 3:25.6 and Gonzales was second. Bodkin displayed a great leg in the mile event running his quarter in a 49 flat. Bodkin was anchor of both team.

Others on the mile team were Arno Hall, Robbins and McAdams. Lonnie Miller made the trip as trainer and alternate.

Nab Three In Two Burglaries Pulled Off Here

Three Hobbs, NM, men have been charged in the April 2 early morning burglaries of Botkin Food and Higginbotham-Bartlett Company.

Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith said two of the men were arrested Monday on the strength of a statement given by another man who was nabbed in Fort Worth April 25.

Real break in the case came while the burglary was in progress when night city officer Emmett Burrows spotted a strange car and took its license number. The New Mexico registration was traced to Hobbs where the owner told of loaning his car.

The three men alleged to have used the car eventually were arrested and now are in Lamb County jail at Littlefield in lieu of \$10,000 bond, according to Deputy Smith. Smith said at least one of the men made a statement to Sheriff Dick Dyer.

The man arrested in Fort Worth said the two firms entered had been "cased" and the movements of the night officer tabulated long before the burglary was pulled off.

The man said he stood look out and signaled the other two men by throwing rocks. He said the men who actually entered the buildings wore tennis shoes.

Olton Recreation Center swimming pool will open Friday. This announcement came this week from Elmer Moore, Center president.

Repair work is being done at the pool this week. Mr. Moore said loose tile is being replaced and the filtering and cleaning systems are getting a general check.

Sea Horse Company of Lubbock is making these checks as a part of the original contract and without cost to the Center, Mr. Moore said.

Joe Turner will be manager of the pool again this year. He was pool manager last season. The pool will open at 4 o'clock afternoons and close at 8. After that hour it will be available for rental for swimming parties.

This will be the pool's first full season. It was constructed last spring and summer.

ORC IS DREAM COME TRUE

Olton Recreation Center has become a holiday and weekend Mecca for Olton folks as the spring and summer season opens there.

Glen Miller, pro at the Center, said some 85 persons played golf Sunday. There were eight green fees with \$24.00 extra revenue for the club.

Glen said the greens are in almost perfect condition while the fairways are "coming along real nice."

The greens are going into their second growing season and the Olton pro makes no bones about being mighty proud of them.

"I would not trade them for any greens in the country," declares Miller with a lift to his chest.

Glen said there is "just worlds" of Bermuda grass coming up in the fairways. He thinks that in the not too distant future the

fairways will compare with the greens.

The Center now boasts about 30 large trees—some of them as much as 40 feet in height. Glen said they were brought in and transplanted, a number of them by T. J. Roberson. Some of the trees were donated by Vernon Nixon and others.

So huge are many of the trees that it was necessary to anchor them with guy wires. One huge tree by the pro shop is leafing out and promises to be a beautiful addition to the landscape by this summer.

Glen said almost all of the trees are rooting in. Most of them are green even if they haven't leafed out. He said the mortality rate has been very low.

C. A. Cox served two terms as Center president. Present head of the Center is Elmer Moore, who served on its first board of

directors.

From a humble beginning the assets of the Center have grown. The organization now boasts a tractor, fairway mower, rough mower, two putting green mowers and an airifier for punching ventilation holes in the greens.

In addition to this, the club owns a fine swimming pool which has proved ample for the community's needs as well as the well appointed golf course.

In the way of physical assets, there is the pro shop and the pro's home located on the center's 90 acre tract of land south of town.

Two years ago the Center's property was nothing more than a sand hill covered with a scraggly growth of vegetation that did little more than tantalize the very hungry sheep which wandered across it.

The Center started as little more

than a dream in the mind of Mrs. A. D. Melton, who could shut her eyes and visualize people having fun on her "old hill."

Mrs. Melton discussed her dream with Basil Sherman. Basil brought it up at Lions Club. The dream spread across the community and the remainder is history.

Now Mrs. Melton's dream is reality. Her hill is almost always swarming with people having fun.

Mrs. Thompson said the kittens have long hair and are 'really cute.' If you want a kitten just call 2081.

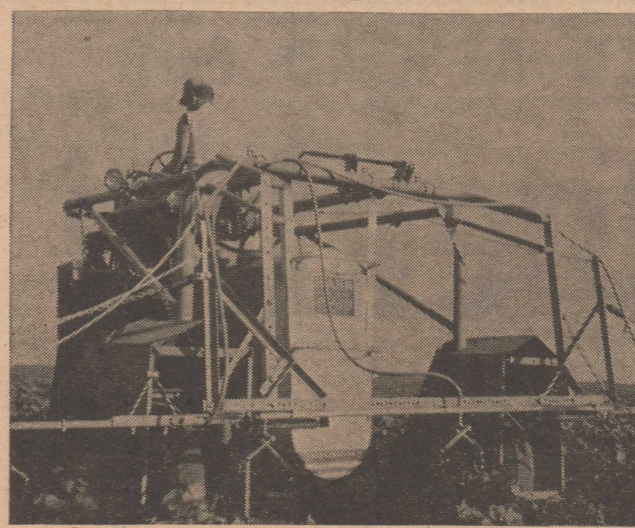

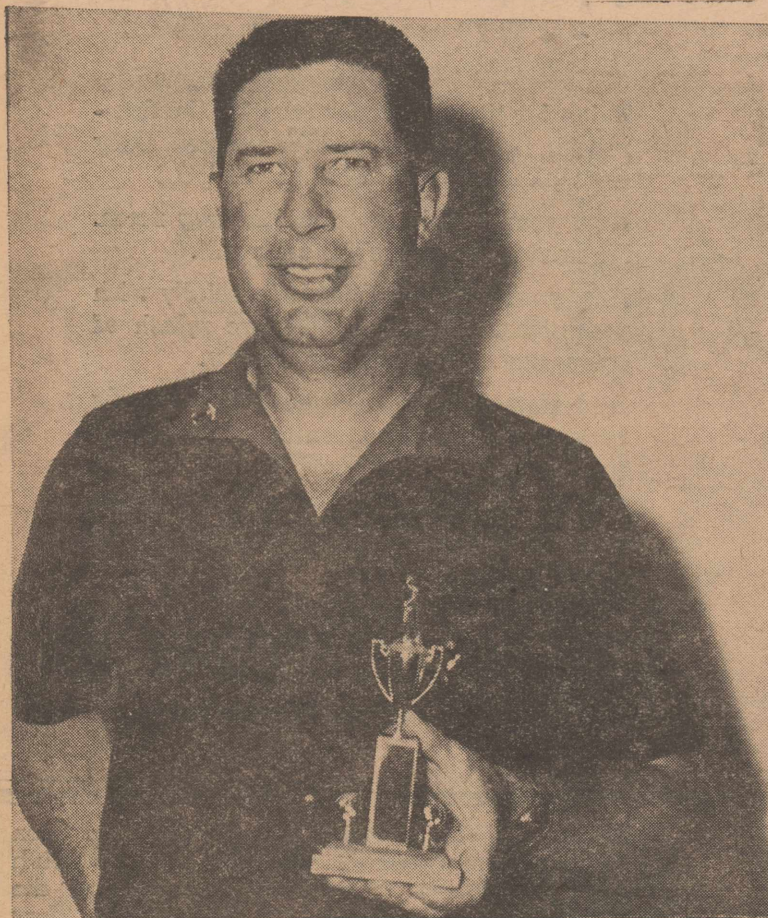

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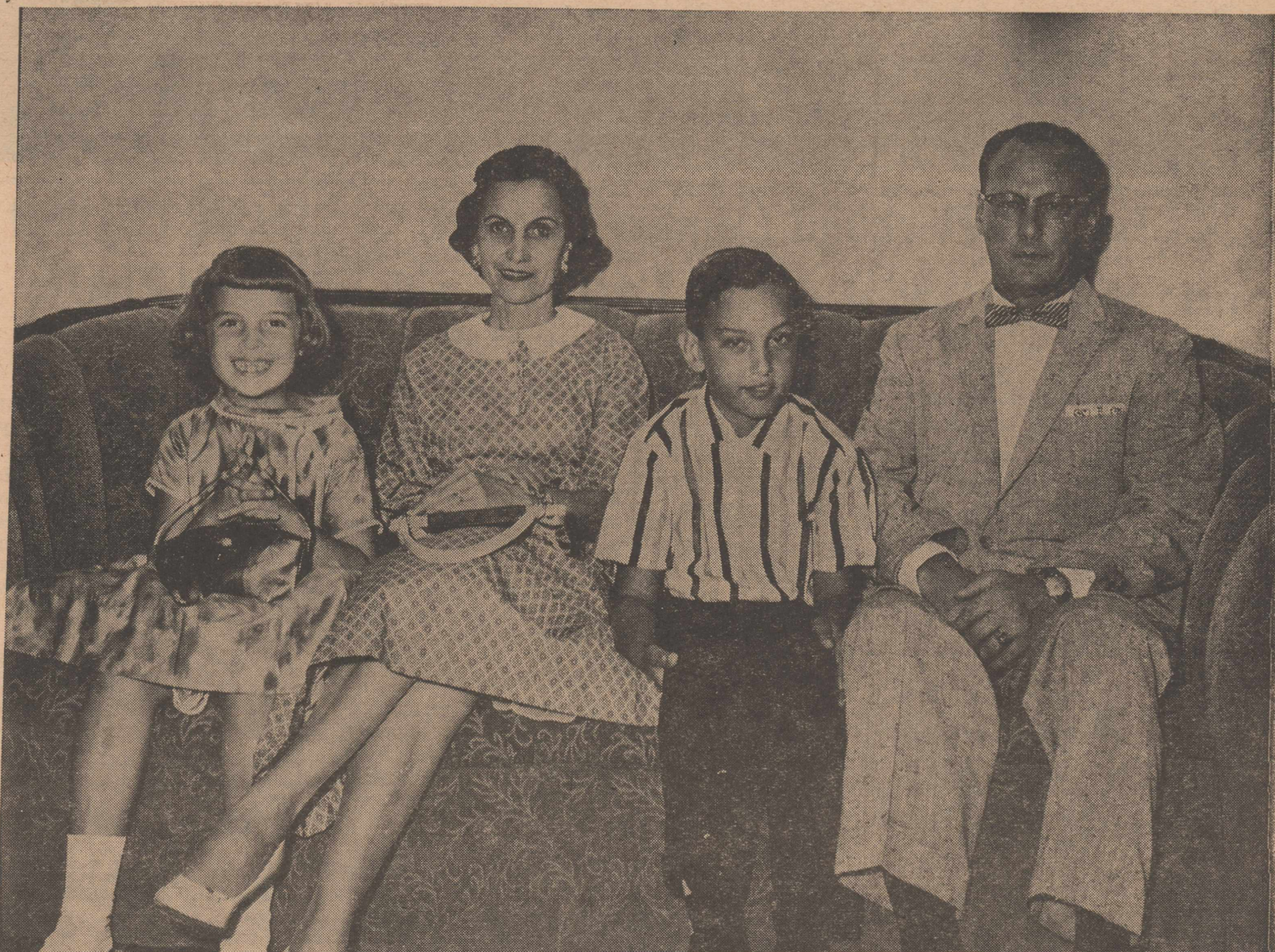

as a chicken leg. When they are all prepared, dip in beaten egg, then in cracker crumbs. Fry in skillet the same as you would chicken.

Grind all together and mix with enough salad dressing to spread easily. When preparing sandwiches for a picnic or lunch if you will spread the bread with a thin layer of oleo or butter you will find they will not dry out or become soggy.

- POTATO SALAD**
6 medium potatoes (boiled with the jackets on)
3 to 4 hard cooked eggs
6 sweet pickles
1 small cucumber
1 medium onion
Peel potatoes and chop fine; chop all other ingredients in with the potatoes. Add salt and pepper. Add enough salad dressing to blend well. Place into bowl lined with lettuce and garnish with radishes and onions. Let stand 3 to 4 hours before serving.

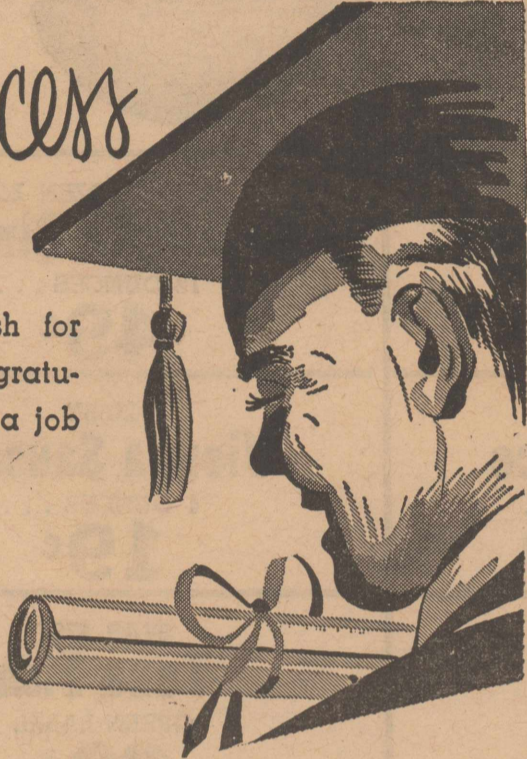
