Nab Three In Two Burglaries **Pulled Off Here**

Three Hobbs, NM, men have been charged in the April 2 early morning burglaries of Botkin Food and Higginbotham-Bartlett Company.

Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith said two of the men were arrested Monday on the strength of a statement given by another man who was nabbed in Fort Worth April 25. Real break in the case came

while the burglary was in progress when night city officer Emmett Burrows spotted a strange car and took its license number. The New Mexico registration was traced to Hobbs where the owner told of loaning his car.

The three men alleged to have used the car eventually were arrested and now are in Lamb County jail at Littlefield in lieu of \$10,000 bond, according to Deputy Smith. Smith said at least one of the men made a statement to Sheriff Dick Dyer.

The man arrested in Fort Worth said the two firms entered had been "cased" and the movements of the night officer tabulated long before the burglary was pulled
