CITY'S SECOND LITIGATION WITHIN A WEEK

City Files Suit Against Dennis In Fire Zone Case

Olton Monday found itself embroiled in litigation for the second time in less than a week.

City Attorney Frank Day filed for a court order Monday in an effort to force H. L. Dennis, Olton contractor, to move a building which the city contends he illegally placed in the city's downtown fire zone.

The building, a metal structure which houses Dennis Builders Supply, was moved onto a foundation on a site just east and across the street from Olton Butane and just west of the I. B. Holt home. The building was moved in Saturday.

The city contends that Dennis "knowingly moved said sheet iron building within the fire limits of the city" in violation of a city ordinance establishing fire limits.

Petition further states that presence of such a building within the fire limits increases the fire hazard to property of others.

Question of fire insurance rates also was mentioned in the petition. It states that maintenance of such a building at its present location will increase fire insurance rates of remaining property owners and will bring about a penalty on fire insurance.

The petition says that Dennis

was requested by officers and officials of the city not to move the building within the fire limits and that he has been "requested to move same after having placed it within said fire limits" and that he refused to do so.

The city asks the court that Dennis be "mandatorily commanded and enjoined to remove said sheet iron building from the fire limits of the city of Olton and

upon a final hearing that he be permanently enjoined from erecting or maintaining said sheet iron building within the fire limits of the city of Olton."

The city also asks that Dennis pay all costs of the suit.

Dennis moved the building in question from a location in north Olton, in the block just off Highway 70 and fronting on Main Street.

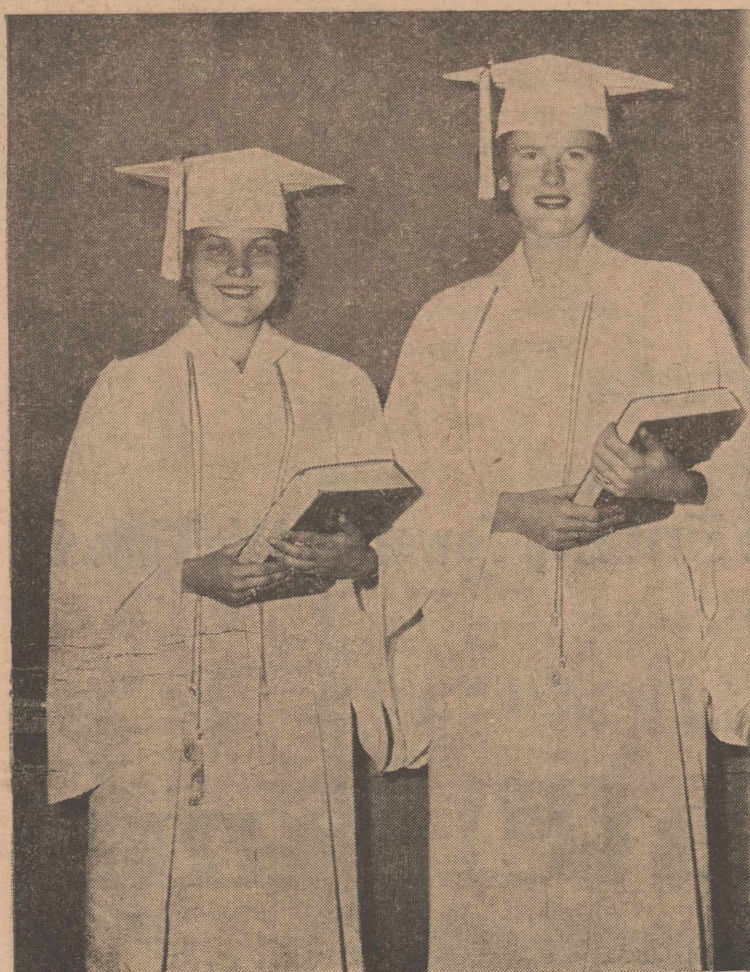

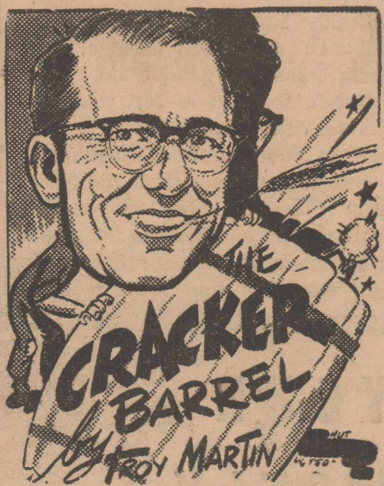

HEAD GETS AX

Police Chief Vernie Head got the ax Monday. No official reason for the firing was given but sources close to city hall said Head "talked too much." The source presumably referred to newspaper stories in which Chief Head appeared critical of Mayor D. Y. Ray.

Storm clouds gathered over city hall Thursday of last week when Mayor D. Y. Ray was served with papers in a \$100,000 damage suit. The suit was brought by Lupe Martinez, Olton bootlegger, who charged false arrest.



If the people of Olton are ready to be rid of vice, then they can be rid of it. If six months from now the situation has not been changed, then it will simply reflect that the situation suits the people just as it is.

If people talk and are not willing to act, then it means they are not disturbed enough to act. We've heard that youngsters have been buying bootleg whiskey and beer in Olton. If this is true then the people who know it to be true shouldn't let their shirtilails hit their backs until they get before a grand jury and tell their story . . . that is, if they're bent on battling bootlegging.

Parents, if your son has bought whiskey from a bootlegger and you don't like it, then you should see the grand jury. There is a due process of law to wipe out vice in our democracy . . . that is, if people really want it wiped out . . .

As is usual when an unfavorable story breaks, a lot of heat was turned on the newspaper. We want to reiterate that we are here running a newspaper, not a Chamber of Commerce bulletin. The Chamber of Commerce puts out its own bulletin.

In our case, our subscribers pay us a fee to give them the news. Anyone who thinks himself too adulated to be entrusted with news of what's going on should apply for entry into a mental institution and not subscribe to any newspaper.

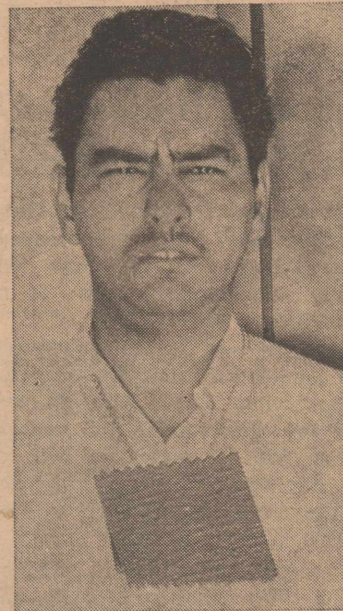
One of our best customers here in Olton gave us a description of a newspaper which we like very much.

"A newspaper is like a set of books," he said. "It merely reflects what has already happened and is badly needed to keep in balance."

When something happens that involves the tax payer's money and The Enterprise doesn't print it, it will simply mean that The Enterprise just couldn't get it. We'll try. We'll try.

And to use an old phrase: "WE AIN'T MAD AT NOBODY," we just happen to run a newspaper and take it deadly serious.

A harassed city council fired Head in a called meeting Monday afternoon. The firing followed close on the heels of a detailed statement purportedly made by Head and published by a Lubbock newspaper Monday morning.

Full Council

The full city council was present and Mayor Ray was presiding when the decision to fire Head came. Russell Grimes staffed the meeting for The Enterprise.

The Enterprise reporter said the vote was unanimous. Head was relieved of duty immediately and granted two weeks severance pay.

Councilman Major James notified the police chief that his connection with the city had been terminated.

Mayor Ray has consistently declined comment. Concensus of opinion has been that Head lost his job as a result of stories in out of town newspapers in which he was quoted profusely.

Martinez Suit

The suit against the city stems

the arrest was carried out by Ray in the home of Martinez and "without legal authority."

Martinez is alleged to have been held 10 hours in city jail. Complaint charging vagrancy was signed by Mayor Ray. The mayor said Head refused to sign the complaint.

Refused To Arrest

Head said that he had advised the mayor not to make the arrest. He said he accompanied the mayor to the house where Martinez was staying.

Head quoted the mayor as saying he was going to run Martinez out of town or put him in jail.

"You've got to have something to put him in for first," Head said he told the mayor. "I tried to talk him out of doing it."

No Warrant

The former police chief said the mayor ordered him to act without a warrant in the case. He said the mayor on other occasions had ordered him to act without proper legal authority.

"I refused to do it," Head declared.

The suit against the city alleges

that Martinez lost his job as a result of being jailed for a day and asks \$25,000 on that count.

Humiliated

Lupe maintains he was humiliated another \$25,000 worth. He says in his petition that he was deprived of his constitutional rights and asks \$50,000 exemplary damages.

In the meantime, Lupe was "humiliated" in Plainview, but this time for only \$300—and that on the installment plan.

Lupe entered a plea of guilty in Hale County May 5 to charges of liquor law violation. Hale County Attorney Frank Gaston said Lupe was fined \$300.00 and court costs. Gaston said Lupe was paying it out in the installment plan.

Plainview officers were after Lupe again this week. They said he missed a couple of installments but settled quickly when it was "brought to his attention."

Lupe has had numerous brushes with the law, mostly on liquor law violation charges.

Hearing on the vagrancy charge here is scheduled for Monday in city court.

Pastors Back Ray "In Spirit"; Score Law Enforcement Laxity

A group of Olton preachers Saturday gave their blessing to Mayor D. Y. Ray in his efforts to wipe out bootlegging here.

Some members of the group went on to score city and county enforcement officers, the county attorney and even the city council for what they termed laxity of law enforcement in connection with illegal sale of liquor in Olton.

The group met after the city of Olton and Mayor Ray were named in a \$100,000 damage suit. Ray and the city of Olton are defendants in a false arrest case brought by Lupe Martinez, Olton bootlegger.

Lupe was nabbed Wednesday of last week in a house in the south part of Olton. Mayor Ray told the ministers that he was accompanied by Police Chief Vernie Head to the house but that he himself arrested Martinez.

He also stated that he did not

have a warrant at the time of the arrest. Martinez alleges that he was illegally detained in city jail for about 10 hours. Mayor Ray told the preachers that Head refused to sign a complaint against Martinez.

Ray said he (Ray) finally signed the complaint charging vagrancy, a misdemeanor, which will be tried in city court June 1.

The ministers said they would not approve any illegal action that might have been taken but would back the mayor in the "spirit of what he was trying to do."

Present at the meeting were Rev.

Russell McAnally, Methodist pastor; Rev. J. W. Douglass, Nazarene; Rev. Glen Godsey, Baptist; Mayor Ray and Publisher Troy Martin, who had been specifically requested to be present and report the meeting for the newspaper.

Mayor Ray and Rev. McAnally dominated the meeting.

Mayor Ray said he has been working in close cooperation with the liquor control board the past few weeks. He called for help from the public.

Rev. McAnally asked how the ministers could help.

Ray said the public should ask the city council to adopt a stronger policy in the matter. "I think they will," Ray declared.

Rev. Godsey said one of the city councilmen had called his home and expressed a desire for the Ministerial Alliance to publicly declare itself in accord with the city council in an effort to handle the bootlegging situation here.

Rev. Douglass said the Alliance already has made such an expression.

Rev. McAnally was particularly critical of county law enforcement efforts in connection with bootleg-

ging problems. Both Rev. Godsey and Rev. McAnally criticized the county attorney's office for what they termed "lack of action."

On the subject of search warrants, both Rev. Godsey and Rev. McAnally were in accord that "very few" have been issued in Olton during the past few years.

"We have been to the county and they said they had one or two which they couldn't produce, or never did, anyway," Rev. McAnally declared. "They said we'd find them over here and we went to this man over here and he said he hadn't issued one single one."

"I thought it was two or three," Rev. Godsey interrupted.

Rev. McAnally could recall only one. "It was for out south of town," he said.

The Methodist pastor said he wants to back the city in more than just helping settle the present law suit in a satisfactory manner. He said he wants to help clean up the town.

County Attorney Wilkinson was contacted Tuesday afternoon.

"I have no comment at the present time," he declared. "However, I may have a statement at a later date."

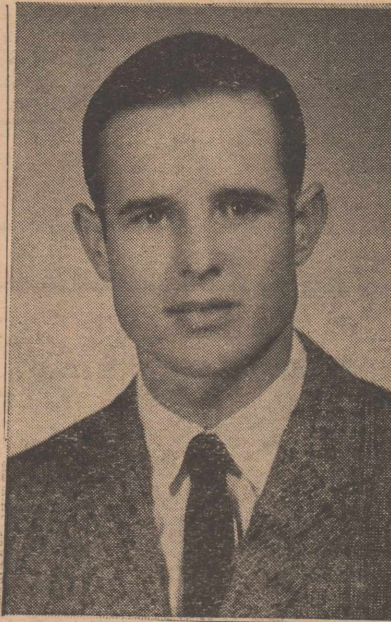

Maenette is a member of The Church of Christ and has been in the Girl Scouts for three years. Her plans after graduation are indefinite.

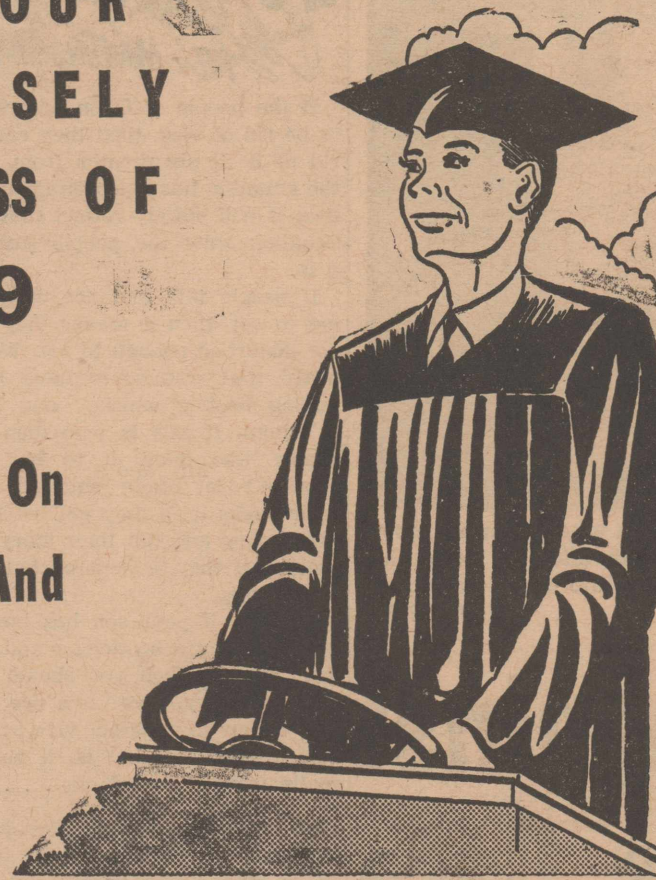

Other than school activities, Charlotte is a member of the Church of Christ, the Girl Scouts, and the Rainbows.

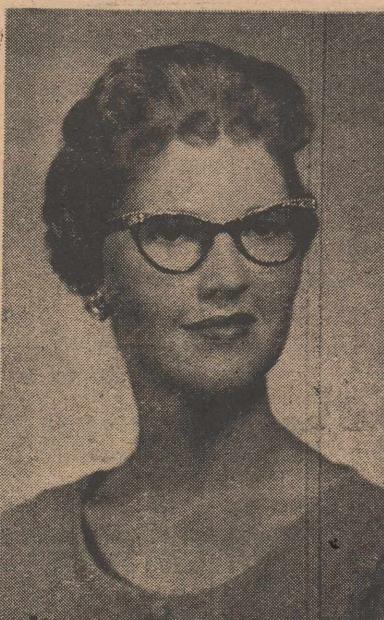
Charlotte has been an officer of her class twice, and of the FHA and NHS, once.

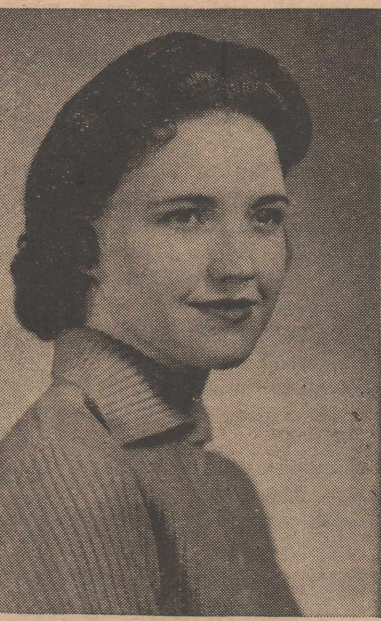
Mary has attended Olton schools for nearly five years, having enrolled in schools at Mobeetie and Holly, Colo.

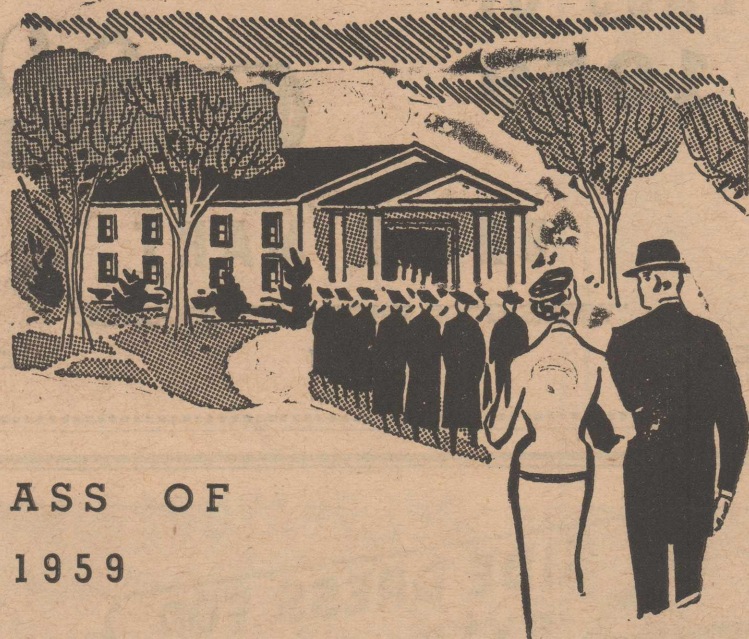

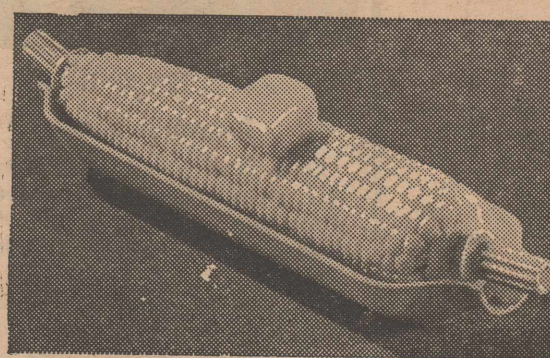

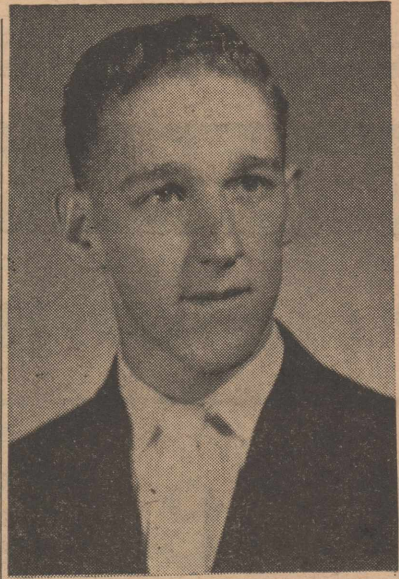
Francis holds her State FHA degree, being a member of the club four years. While at Spade, Francis was an officer of the FHA.

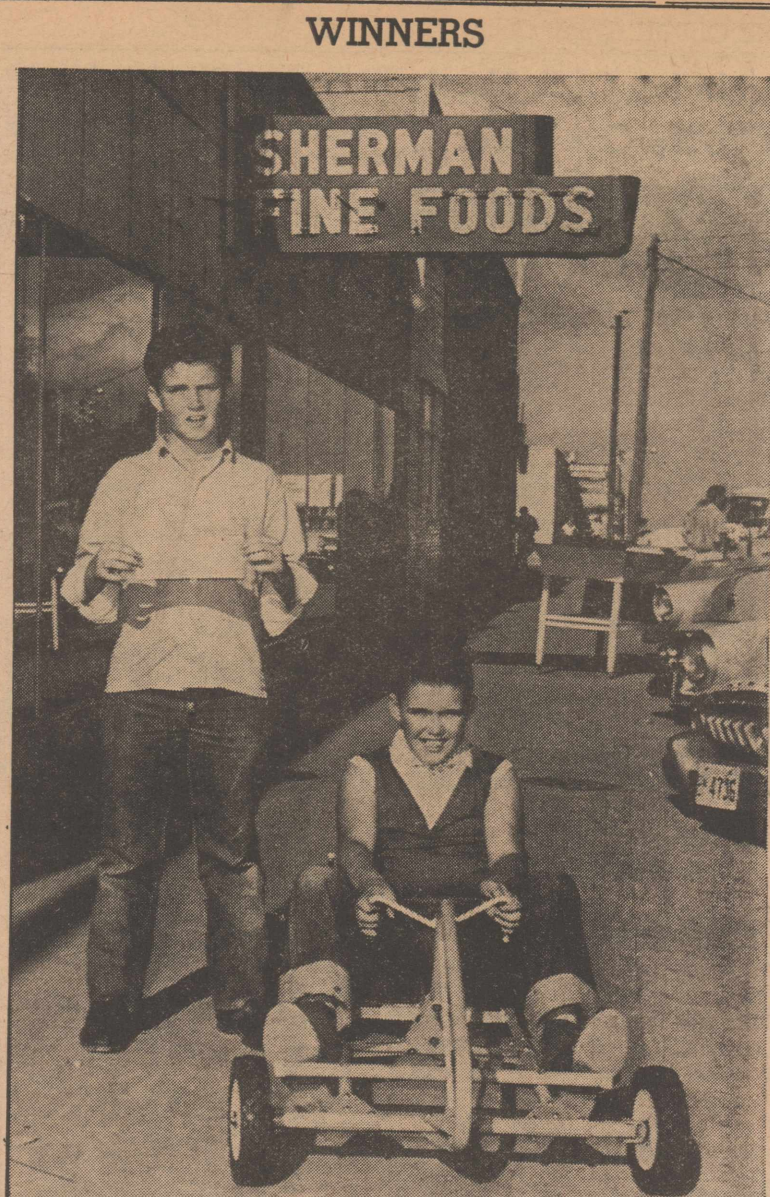
Hail Damage In Olton Area Monday Night

KITCHEN KORNER

Since warm weather is with us we will be wanting refreshing drinks to serve our friends when they drop by. Here are a few we like.

Pineapple Punch (Serves 20)
 Combine in large bowl:
 2½ quarts sweetened pineapple
 ¼ cup lemon juice
 ½ teaspoon salt
 2 quarts vanilla ice cream

Beat with electric mixer or rotary egg beater until ice cream is half melted. Serve at once. Grape or orange juice may be substituted as a variation.

For attractive drinks put pretty ice cubes in them.

Fill ice cube tray one third full of water. Place a maraschino cherry in each section. Freeze. When frozen fill to top with water and freeze. Mint leaves may also be placed in sections.

Fill ice cube trays ½ full of water colored with food coloring. Freeze. Then fill to top with cold water of a different color and freeze. Any of these cubes can be prepared ahead of time and stored in plastic bags in your freezer. Children love these colorful cubes and they do not change the flavor of any drink you serve.

For pretty glasses when serving cold beverages, dip the tops of glasses in frothy egg white, then in granulated sugar, let stand in refrigerator to set.

Fruit Juice Medley:
 Juice of 3 oranges
 Juice of 2 lemons
 1 cup pineapple juice
 2 cups ice water
 Sugar to taste

Combine all ingredients and serve well chilled. Five to six servings depending on size of glasses.

When making hot chocolate for children drop 1 large scoop of vanilla ice cream in each cup just before serving. This cools the drink just enough to drink besides making it more nutritious.

Easy Ice Cream Sodas:
 Put 2 scoops vanilla ice cream in large glass. Pour ½ bottle of strawberry or your favorite flavor of pop over ice cream. Stir slightly and serve.

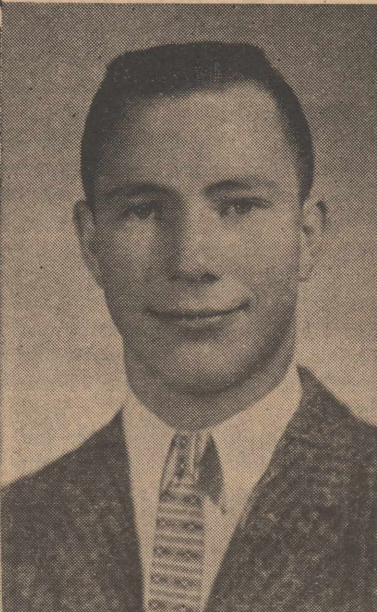
