HAIL RIPS AREA

Hail roared out of the night Monday laying waste to some 10,000 acres of fine cotton in the Olton trade territory.

Insuranceman Howard Hall said the area northeast of town was almost unscathed.

Hit by the icy onslaught were the areas northwest, south, southwest and west of town.

Some observers said that possibly 50 percent of the trade area's cotton acreage will require replanting.

ICED DOWN

GINMAN LAUIS HAIR said that cotton planting seed will pose no problem. He said that due to the shortness of growing season left, Paymaster will be a favorite variety and there is a good supply on hand.

DAMAGE TO CROPS other than cotton was extensive. Young vegetables were especially hard hit. Farm Store Operator Don Spain said disease is an ominous threat to battered vegetable plants.

HE SAID some vegetable farmers are using a fungicide to help prevent disease to the broken plants. Even feed was hauled off to battered stubs.

Tornado Warning

Tornado warnings sent Olton folks scurrying to cellars Monday night. Police cars and Parsons ambulance attendants scouted the southwestern outskirts of town on lookout for a tell-tale funnel.

HAIL STONES drifted as much as two feet deep just south of Olton on the western edge of the L. R. Coyne place. Icy drifts still remained there Tuesday morning.

Heavy Rain

Torrential rain fell both Monday and Tuesday nights. James Gallagher, who keeps tabs on rainfall for Pioneer Gas Company, said 1.38 inches of rain fell Monday night and an additional two inches fell Tuesday night.

OLTON RESIDENTS said that the Monday night storm was one of the worst of its kind in recent years. They compare it to a hail storm which struck the community early in July of 1951. Most of those who were here during that storm agree that it was not as wide in scope as the Monday night storm.

Huge Scope

THE HAIL STORM extended as far west as Springlake and into the Earth community. It went south to the sandhills and some damage was reported in the Hart Camp community.

HOWEVER, Elma Burleson, manager of Hart Camp Co-Op Gin, said damage in his community was not extensive. Heaviest damage reported was about 25 percent and even that was spotted in scope.

HOWARD HALL said he had heard of some damage north of Hart.

Circle Hit

HEAVIEST HAIL probably was in the Circle area. Hail stones battered the E. W. Walden home 1/2 mile west of Circle. Windows were smashed and bark was knocked from trees in the area.

BILL WALDEN said some of the hail stones were about an inch in diameter. He said hail was piled in drifts about a foot deep.

Strong Wind

STRONG WINDS which followed the storm blew trailers and combines into the edge of the field at the Rex Bell place 9 miles northwest of Olton.

THE ROOF was blown from a house on the Homer Garrison place west of Hart.

ERNEST VENABLE said he doesn't believe he will have to replant. He said Vernon Venable's crop "looks like it's cleaned out."

HAILED OUT for the second time in less than two weeks, Paul Burrus said large hail stones fell at his place.

DON FRANKS said his place, 5 miles west and 5 miles north of Olton, was in the edge of the hail strip. He said several of his neighbors were in the hail-struck area.

HAIL ALSO hit the W. T. Hankins farm 6 miles northwest of town. "It was fine hail," said Mrs. Hankins. "We lost some of the best cotton we ever had at this time of the year."

Hire Former Highway Patrolman To Succeed Head As PD Ramrod

Impartial Enforcement Of Law Pledged As Cavin Takes Over

OLTON HAS a new police chief. He is Floyd Cavin, formerly a highway patrolman. Mr. Cavin was hired Monday morning. City council decided that the police chief will work under direct supervision of Mayor D. Y. Ray but will be responsible to the council as a whole. Councilman A. D. Adams admonished the new police chief to enforce the law "impartially." "If I deserve a ticket, give me one," said the councilman. He declared that a law enforcement officer should not show favoritism. The council instructed the city secretary to write to Austin for a copy of the city charter which outlines the duties of various city officials.

Fine Man
Captain Posey of the State Highway Patrol recommended Mr. Cavin. "He can come back to work for us any time," the captain was quoted as having told Mayor Ray. Motion to hire the new chief was made by A. D. Adams and seconded by Major James. The vote was unanimous. T. M. Campbell left the meeting before the vote was taken, but told the other councilmen that he would abide by their decision in the matter with the effect of making the vote unanimous by the entire commission. The new chief is from Eden. He is a high school graduate and served about 2 1/2 years with the Highway Patrol. He is 24 years old and he and Mrs. Cavin are parents of three small children. Mr. Cavin left the Highway Patrol about the first of the year to enter private business.

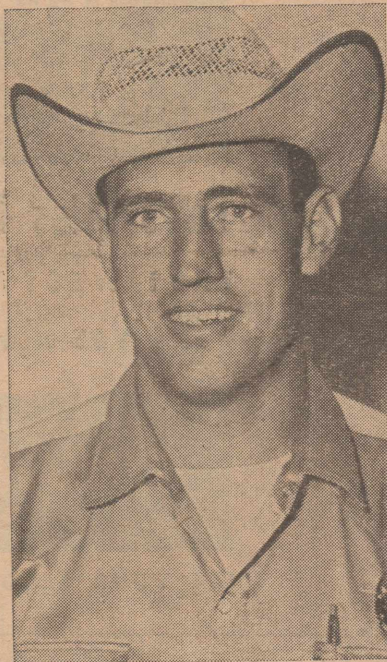
Raise Burrow

Mr. Cavin succeeds Vernie Head who was discharged by the council last week. Head's dismissal came about after a dispute with Mayor

Test Wheat Heading At Halfway

Most of the 26 varieties of wheat being tested at the High Plains Research Foundation are fully headed.

Some of the later maturing varieties are just beginning to head out. Farmers interested in comparing the wheat varieties are invited to visit the experimental farm at Halfway, Dr. Longnecker, Director, said today.

Eleven of the varieties are experimental. The fifteen released

varieties are Early Blackhull, New Triumph, Wichita, Triumph, Ponca, Crockett, Comanche, Wheatear, Triumph and Kharkof. Douglas Owen, Assistant Agronomist, stated.

In the barley research program, eleven varieties are being tested. They are Kearney, Dicktoo, Wintex, Pueblo, Harbine, Rogers, Cordova, Missouri Early Beardless and Kenbar. Two varieties are experimental.

The fertilizer experiments on wheat are definitely showing response to nitrogen.

The wheat and barley tests are being conducted in cooperation with the Texas A & M Extension Division. Seed was furnished by the Bushland USDA Station.

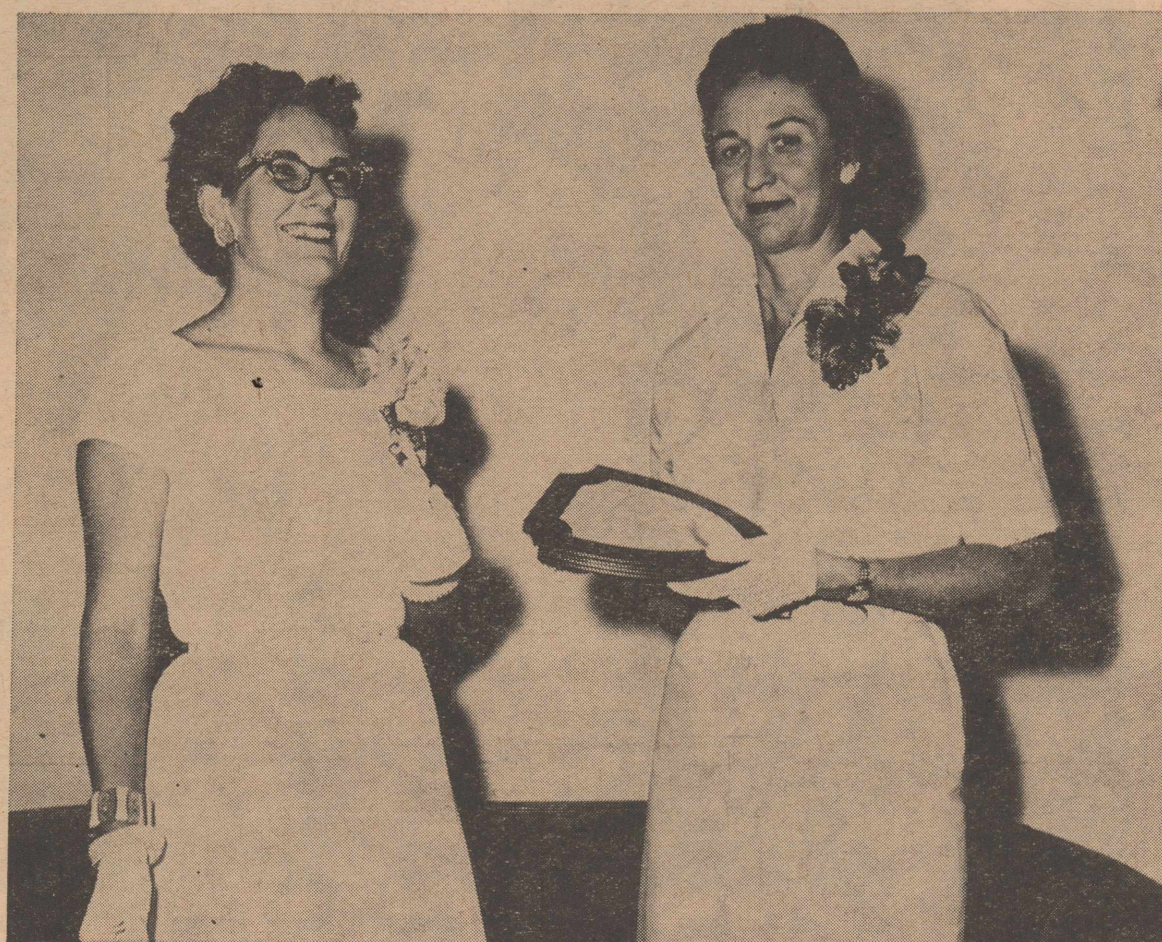

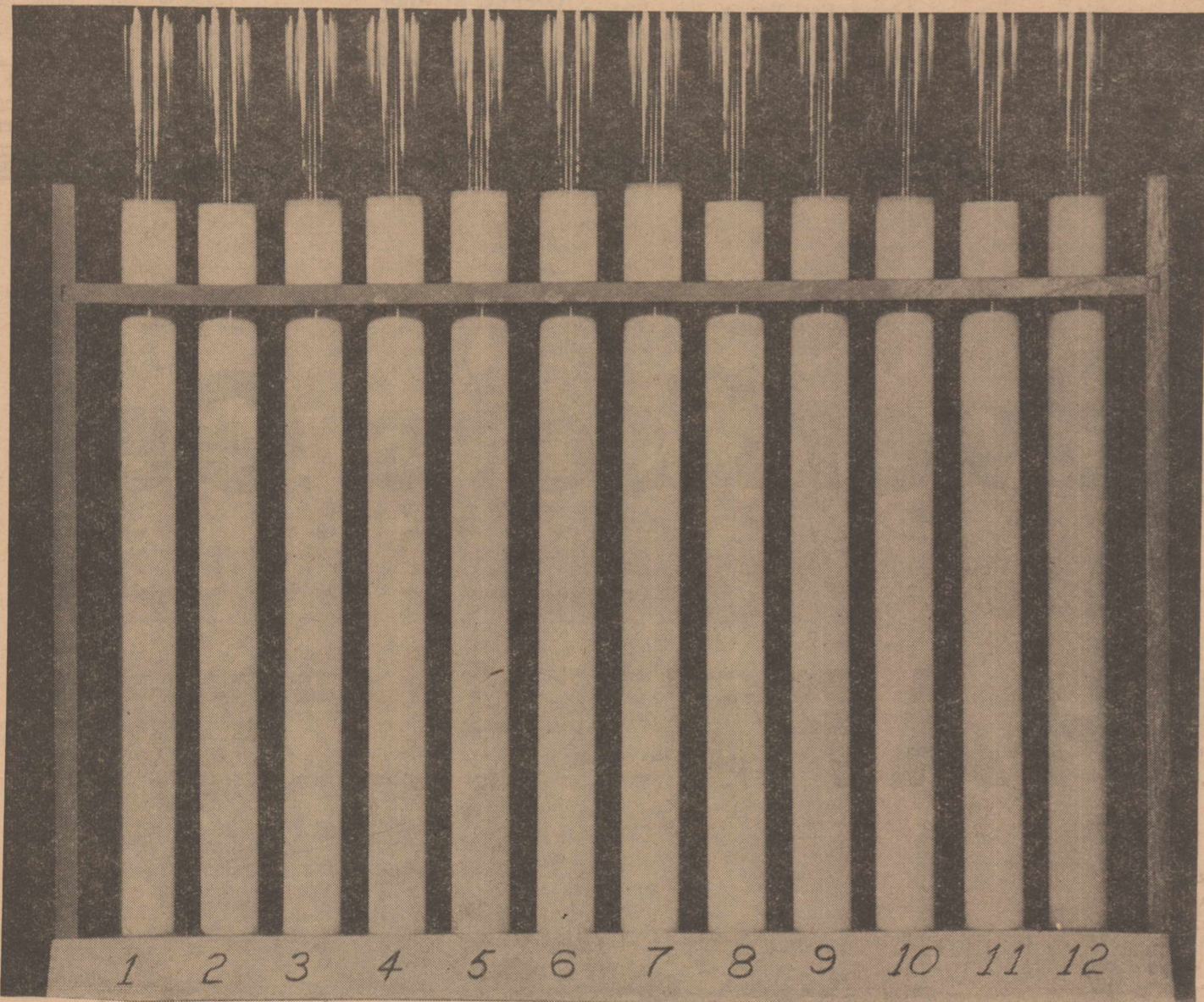

Small granddaughter of a Hart couple was seriously burned recently when she was playing with an extension cord and stuck the live wire into her mouth.

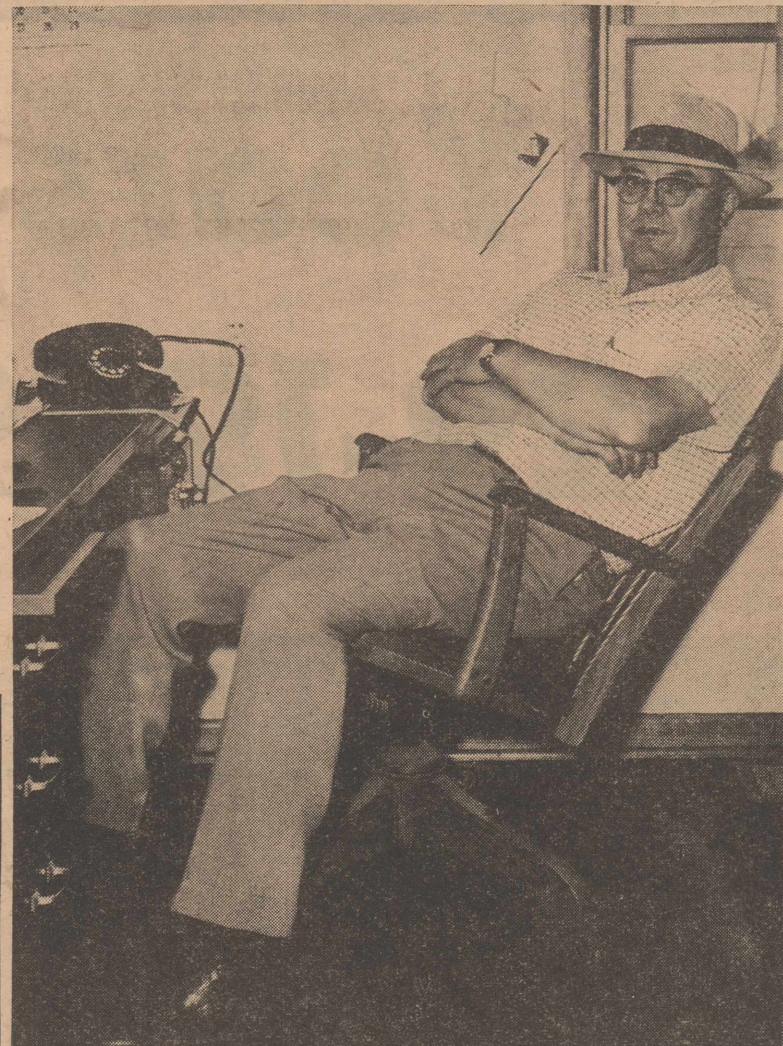
The little girl is Pamela Holland, 3 years old, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hamm of Hart.

Baked Salisbury Steak
1½ lbs. ground beef chuck
1¼ teaspoons salt
pepper to taste
2 teaspoons grated onion
1 egg beaten
melted butter

Combine all ingredients except butter. On butter shallow baking pan, mold the meat into the shape of sirloin steak about 1¼ inches thick. Brush tops with melted butter and place in hot oven (450). Bake 10 minutes then lower heat to (325) bake 35 minutes longer. Brush with melted butter once or twice during baking.

pare a double recipe and keep part of it for use later in the week if desired.

CREAMED NEW PEAS AND POTATOES
Shell 1½ lbs fresh green peas
Peel 8 small new potatoes
Cook together until well done.
Drain and add white sauce, salt and pepper to taste.

WHITE SAUCE
3 tbl. butter
3 tbl. flour
1 tsp. salt
1 cup milk
Melt butter in saucepan, blend in flour and salt until smooth. Add milk gradually, cook over direct heat stirring until thick and smooth.

Since milk is so important in the daily diet, a white sauce on vegetables helps give our families some of the calcium they need. Too many times we do not use enough milk in cooking or to drink. The lack of calcium causes leg cramps, especially in older people.
