Plane Stalls In Banking Turn; Engine Ripped From Fuselage

A 27-year-old Olton crop duster was killed instantly Sunday afternoon when his light spray plane stalled and spun into the ground north of Hart.

Dead is Tom Craft, formerly of Olton and now of Halfway

Mr. Craft was employed by M. E. Gibson of Plainview and had been flying the plane for Gibson's spraying service for about a month.

Mr. Gibson was a witness to the crash. He said he believes young Craft was trying to land because of an overheated engine when the fatal mishap occurred. Mr. Gibson said he was enroute
