"Few city people realize or are told that most price support loans are repaid. It's a fact that over a 25-year period CCC has been repaid 84 cents on every dollar loaned in price support activity."

"Who's feeding at the public trough?" asks Doane. "Subsidies in industry started back in the colonial days. The same magazines that harp about agriculture with such inaccuracy are receiving postal subsidies, even after rate increases. It is estimated that in 1956 the postal subsidy to 14 large magazines amounted to \$38,775,000. The postal deficit in behalf of business was greater in the 1945-56 period than the cost of CCC price support programs for the past 25 years."

"What is the answer to these charges, Mr. Benson?"

Sometime, somewhere all of us will have to stand on our own feet free of government entanglement if the country is to pass on to our children the freedoms we have enjoyed. But the farming industry cannot stand alone in a subsidized, socialized economy. If we are going to wipe out government give aways then it must be done across the board. Let us go on record as being in favor of starting with newspapers and magazines.

From what we have been able to learn about the school tax situation, some adjustments are in order. We hope the school board soon will hire a firm of expert appraisers to set values on property for school tax purposes. We think this type of program is working out just fine for the city.

It simply is not justice for one property owner to pay on a percentage of the actual value of his property and his neighbor pay on less.

In other words, let all property in the school district be appraised at actual value. Then let the tax structure be adjusted so as to provide money for operation of the school plant.

In this manner everyone will pay taxes on what he actually owns and no more. It will take a group of experts to accomplish this end.

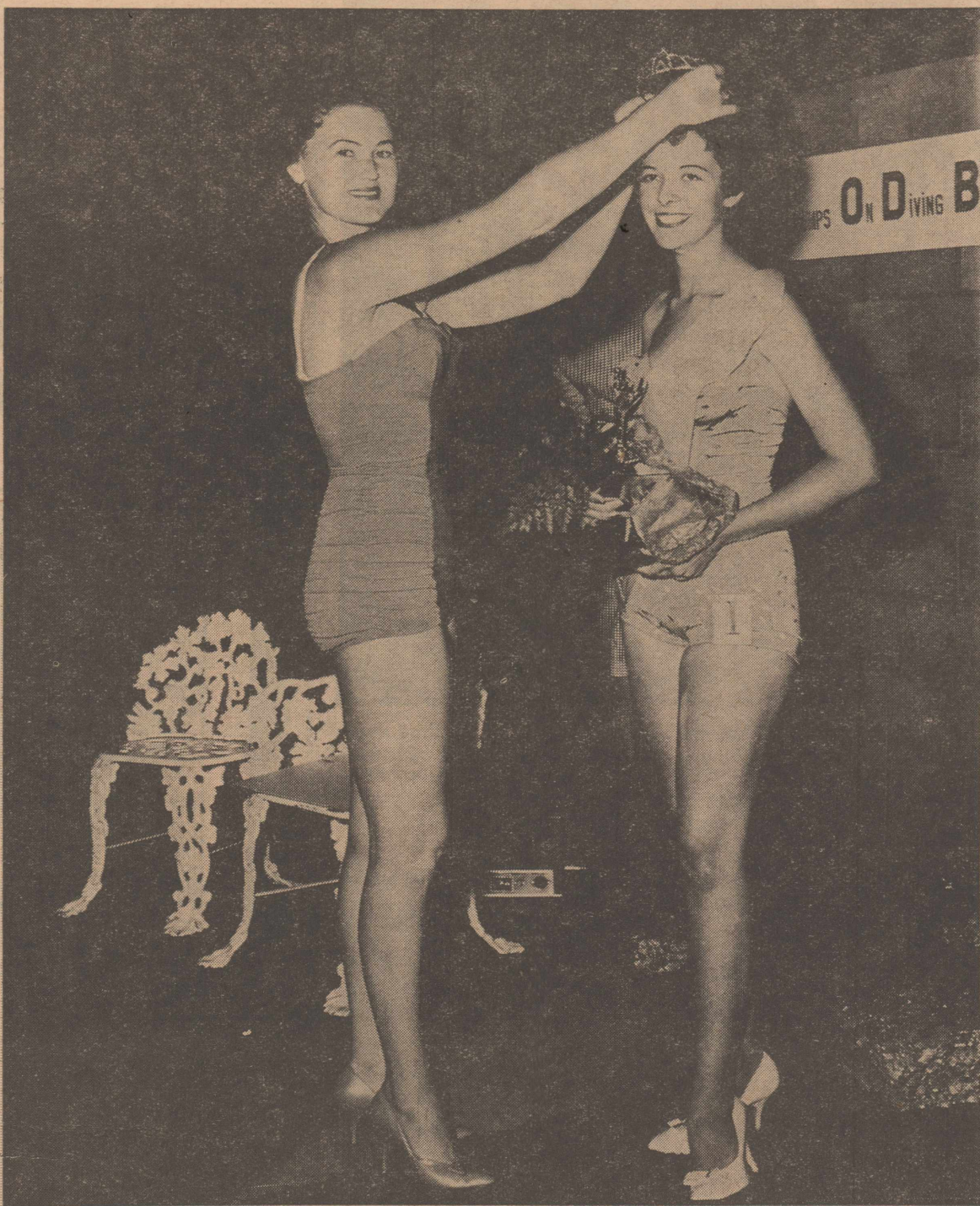
Bryant Gets Scholarship To Texas A&M

GIRLS OF THREE TOWNS GATHER

Ninety Attending GS Day Camp Here

Girl Scout Day Camp attendance is averaging about 90 girls per day in its five-day session this week. Scouts from Olton, Earth and Springlake are attending.

Mrs. Tom Carlisle is director of the camp. She is assisted by Mrs. George Brown, Jr.

Brownies compose the largest number of girls enrolled in the camp. The Brownies are located on the Girl Scout grounds.

Brownies are making a study of insects and rocks. The flag ceremony opens and closes each session. Sessions are from 1:30 to 6:30 PM each afternoon, Monday through Friday, of this week.

Settlement Believed Near In Olton Feed Lot Dispute

PARTNERS OFFER TO MOVE OUT OF HOUSING AREA FOR \$4,000

Settlement on Olton's feed lot dispute seemed near Thursday.

C. M. Moss and George Caddel said that for a consideration of \$4,000 they would call off construction on the Moss place just south of Hillcrest in west Olton and look for another site.

A meeting of the Hillcrest group will be held at 8 o'clock Friday night in Legion Hall to discuss the proposition.

Mr. Moss and Mr. Caddel contend that they have spent something more than \$2,600 in preparing the area for feed lot operation.

They say that their schedule for supplying beef to packers will have been upset. They will have to seek another site for the feed lot.

Must Abandon

Some of the watering facilities constructed at the Moss place must be abandoned. In addition, Mr. Moss said he originally purchased his place on the western outskirts of Olton with the plan in mind of converting it into a feed lot operation as soon as he was able to do so.

He pointed out that the proposed lot's mixing facilities are located at Merrill's Farm & Ranch Store, which is owned by Mr. Caddel. He said that moving the site will entail hauling feed stuff further than had originally been planned.

Martinez Nabbed Wednesday Near Olton Ice House

Lupe Martinez was back in jail here Wednesday night.

Lupe, whose name has figured prominently in a damage suit against the city of Olton, was arrested in front of the ice house operated by his father, Frank, in downtown Olton.

Lupe's attorney said his client was charged with vagrancy.

Interviewed in city jail, Lupe said he came to Olton from Plainview to pick up a refrigerator. He said he worked all day Wednesday at an onion shed in Plainview.

"I sure wish I'd stayed in Plainview and left that refrigerator over here," Lupe declared.

Martinez brought suit against Mayor D. Y. Ray and the city of Olton in May. He charged false arrest and asked for damages totalling \$100,000.

Lions Club Show Is In Progress

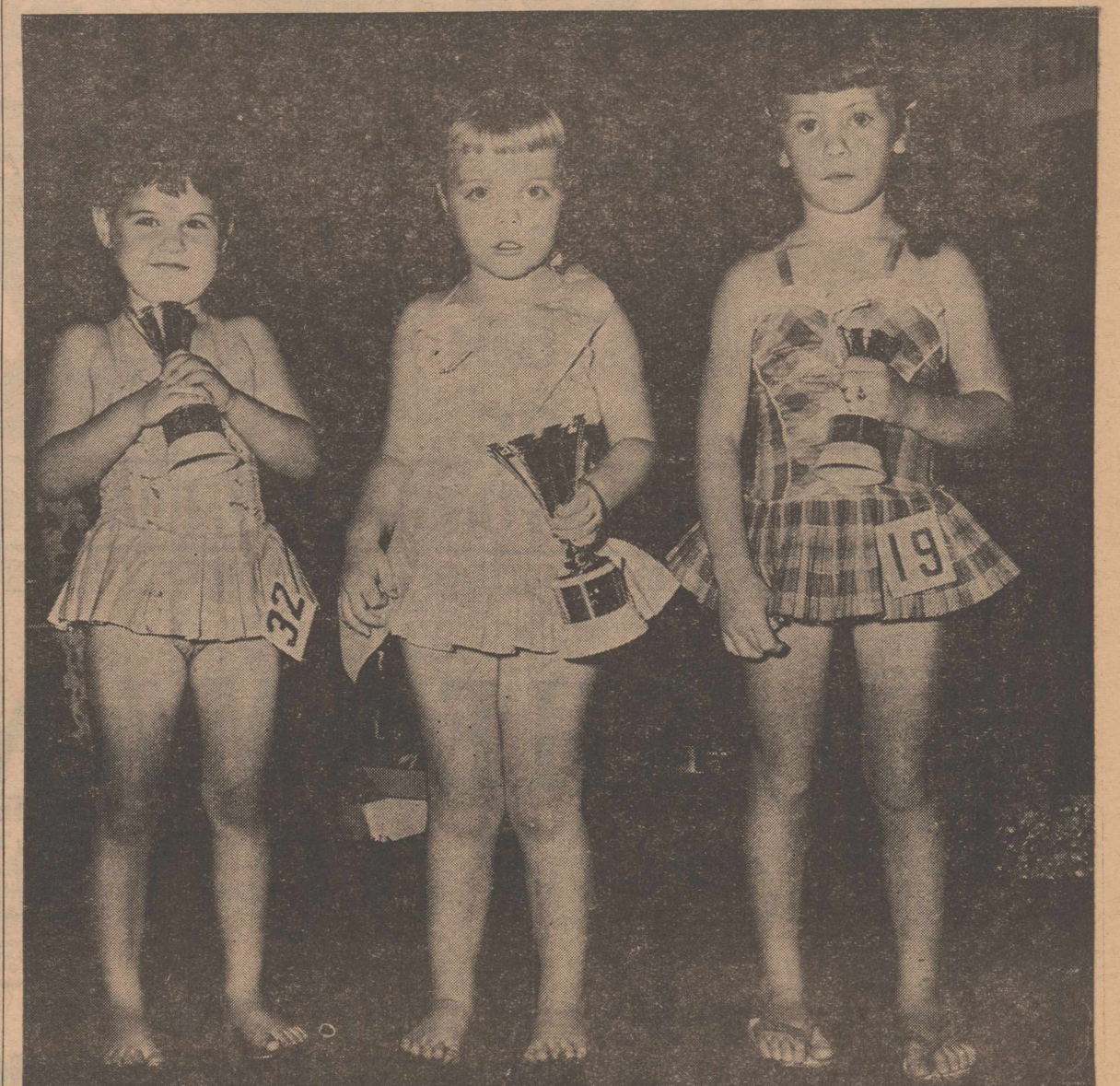
Olton Lions Club carnival will continue through this week on the hospital square.

Goulash Recipe

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 3 cups cooked macaroni
- 1 can tomatoes
- 1 can tomato juice
- 1 large onion
- 2 tbl. butter
- Saute meat and onion in butter, stirring until all of meat has lost the red color. Add the rest of the ingredients, salt and pepper to taste. Cover and simmer until well done. On cool days this may be put in a baking dish and baked in oven.

- 1 cup angel flake coconut
- 1 vanilla
- Cream sugar and butter; add eggs and vanilla; beat well. Sift dry ingredients together and add. Stir in nuts and coconut. Chill two to three hours. Slice and bake 12 to 15 min., depending on thickness of slice.

Peach Milk

- Combine in bowl:
- 1 cup cold milk
- 1 cup crushed fresh peaches
- 1/2 cup vanilla ice cream
- 1 cup crushed ice
- Beat with electric mixer at high speed for 30 seconds. Serve at once.

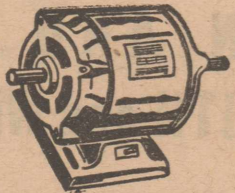
