Olton Group May Establish Driving School For Latins

TO THE PEOPLE OF OLTON:

When I came to Olton, I set out to see that the laws of the State of Texas and the City of Olton were enforced. That is what we have done and that is what we will continue to do. We have played no favorites with anyone and we do not intend to play favorites with anyone. We will enforce the laws fair and impartially, regardless of race or creed, or whether you are rich or poor. We don't feel that any one person is better than anyone else and we don't intend to treat any one else like they are better than any other person. If we have stepped on someone's toes, we do not apologize, that is just how the ball bounces in the game of fairness and impartiality. We only hope we will not have to step on them again, but I promise that if it is necessary, then it will be done again. I pledge to each and everyone of you fairness and impartial enforcement of the law at all times. If this Department can be of service to any of you, night or day, please feel free to call upon us.

Farmers Fear Shortage Of Hands; Merchants Feel Boycott Pinch

Driving school for Latin-Americans is being investigated as a possible answer to the dilemma of farm laborers without drivers license.

This was the solution hit upon by a group of about 25 farmers and businessmen who met with the city council Monday night to discuss the problem.

Farmers say they are feeling the pinch in getting hands. Some of those present felt that Mexicans are shunning Olton because of the "tough attitude" of the city police department.

Police Chief Floyd Cavin pointed out that only 66 tickets were issued by the city during the month of June. He said that of that number, only about 25 counts involved Mexicans.

Sixteen tickets were issued during June for driving without a valid driver's license.

Enforce Law
Several of the farmers present agreed that the law should be enforced.

Cavin told of issuing a ticket to one Mexican National recently. "He didn't have a muffler, he had run two red lights and didn't have a driver's license," Cavin declared. "I just couldn't turn him loose."

Cavin also pointed out that the National had been given a ticket June 5 for driving without a driver's license.

Driving School
Paul Natzger, was one of the spokesmen for the farmers. He highly approved of the plan to investigate the possibility of establishing a driving school here for Latin-Americans.

It was suggested that after the school is established, a Latin-American caught driving without a license be given the alternative of obtaining a driver's license within a specified length of time or being fined.

Debunk Stories
Cavin debunked several stories being circulated in the Latin American section of town.

One story has been making the rounds that one Latin-American

planned that their businesses are suffering because Latin-Americans who contribute heavily to the retail economy of the community are shunning Olton. Some farmers said they are sending their hands out of town to trade because they fear the hands would be arrested if they come to Olton.

Five Tickets
In the meantime, records at city hall do not substantiate the rumors that "the heat is on" in Olton. Cavin thumbed through corporation court dockets Wednesday morning revealing that only five tickets have been issued here since the first of the month.

The police chief said two tickets have been issued drivers for driving on the wrong side of the road. One has been issued for failure to appear in court on the date appointed, one for vagrancy and one for drunkenness.

The box score for the month reads two white men, a Negro and two Mexicans.

Olton Has Two Tornado Alerts

Olton had two tornado alerts over the weekend.

One came early Sunday morning and one early Tuesday. Screaming sirens sent residents scurrying for the cellar.

Meantime, spasmodic rainfall has kept farmers out of fields during the past few days. Weeds have gotten a head start and promise to pose a problem in this year's crop.

However, farmers say crops are growing off fast. On the vegetable scene, potatoes are now being harvested and cucumber season is just around the corner.

City Cleaning Dump Grounds In South Olton

Olton is cleaning up its dump ground in the south part of town. In fact, it's almost cleaned up now.

A big cat tractor is moving tons of earth to bury unsightly, bacteria-breeding rubbish.

Operating the cat is Harold Lloyd. Trenches eight to 12 feet in depth are being excavated. The trenches are 100 feet long and about eight feet wide.

Work began on the project about six weeks ago and has been going on at odd times since. The dump ground will be leveled as soon as all the rubbish is buried.

The dump ground was started in its present location about 12 years ago. Mayor D. Y. Ray said trenches are being dug for current use and the present dumping site will be sufficient for a dozen more years.

The city now is dickering with someone to use the water in the nearby city lake for irrigation. The water in the lake is deodorized and decontaminated by use of bacteria.

Mrs. Franks said the little fellow must have fallen off the machine when it hit a rough place.

Mr. Franks rushed the child to the hospital where X-rays failed to reveal any injury.

Mrs. Struve was born July 5, 1885 at Cypress.

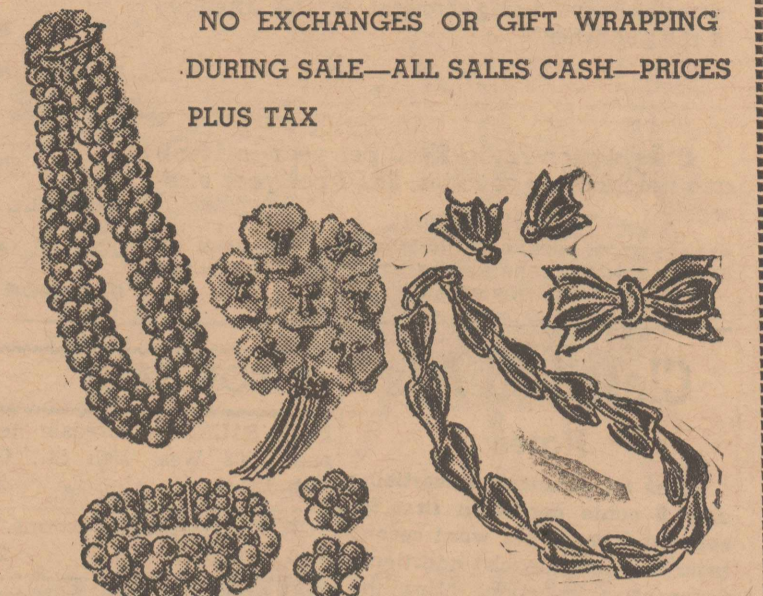

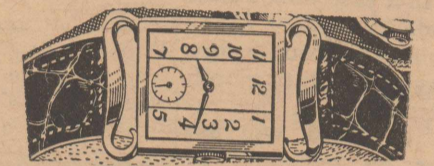

It is no secret that law enforcement has created a furor here during the past few weeks. We hope that leaders of this community—farmers, businessmen and city officials—will do some serious thinking on this problem.

We think we all want the law properly enforced. We think that a town of this type is as important to the farmer who goes to church here and sends his children to school here as it is to the people who actually live inside the city limits.

Some wild stories have been making the rounds about what is going on around town. There is one story to the effect that the police chief has been sitting up in front of the drive-in theater and giving out traffic tickets. The drive-in theater is outside the city limits in the first place and not under city jurisdiction. In the second place, Chief Cavin lives out there by the theater.

There's another story to the effect that Chief Cavin went to the Catholic Church here and issued tickets as the congregation was leaving. The fact is—we have it from a member of the church—that he went to the church to visit and didn't hand out a single ticket.

Chief Cavin may have been guilty of some mistakes in judgment. But who hasn't?

The number of traffic tickets issued here during the past month does not justify the hubbub that's being raised.

We think that poor public relations on the part of the city has contributed heavily to dissatisfaction.

ALSO THERE APPEARS TO BE A COOLY CALCULATED EFFORT BEING MADE TO DISCREDIT THE CITY OF OLTON AND ITS LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY.

Let's look at the record book for the month of July. Olton has issued five tickets. Two were issued to drivers alleged to have been driving on the wrong side of the street. One of these tickets went to a driver involved in an accident in which two persons were injured.

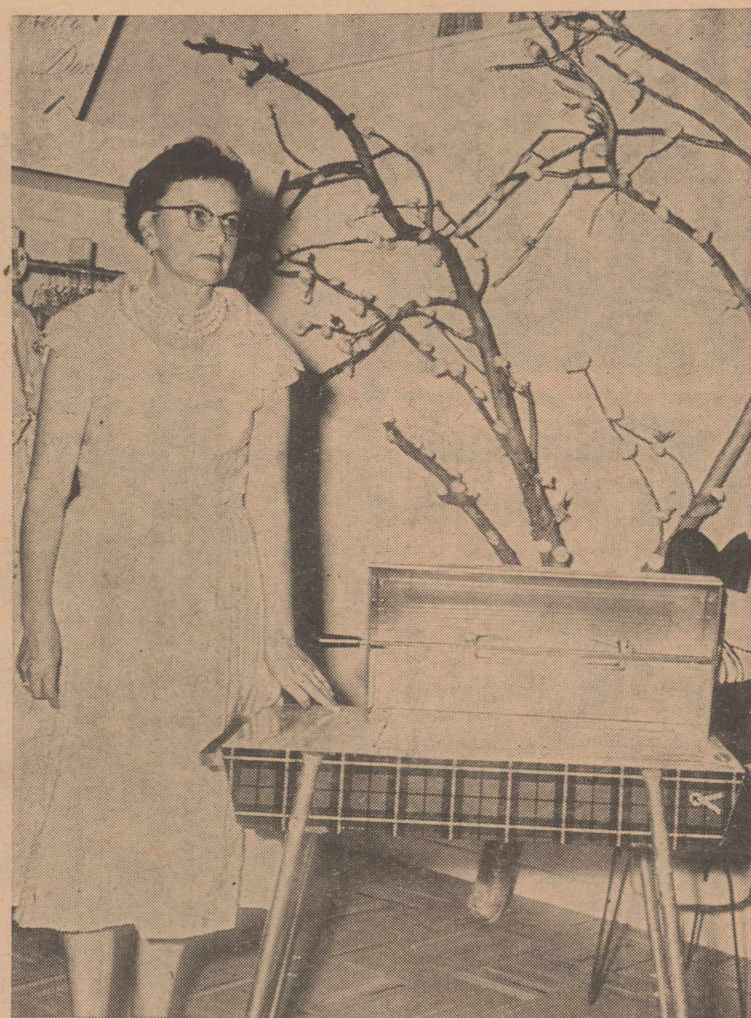
One ticket went to a Negro for drunkenness. At the time he was picked up, he had (1) torn the seat out of his pants (2) lost his shoes and (3) didn't even know where he was.

Only two Mexicans were arrested or received tickets. One of these was Lupe Martinez, arrested for vagrancy, and the other was a man who failed to appear in court as he had agreed to do. Not a single ticket was issued for no driver's license.

For the information of our readers we checked police dockets at Littlefield and Plainview for the first 15 days of July. Littlefield police issued 13 traffic

tickets alone during the period. Police Clerk Mary Feagley said 4 tickets were issued for no driver's license and 9 for other traffic violations.

During the same period Plainview Police Department issued 111 tickets for various traffic violations. Of that number 24 were issued for no driver's license.

We talked to the Plainview chief of police. The chief said that Plainview has collected \$27,914.15 in fines since October of last year and more than two thirds of that figure was accounted for in traffic fines.

That is more than Olton raised in taxes last year. The Plainview Chief said his department used to have a lot of trouble with Latin-Americans who did not have driver's license. "We began cracking down," he declared, "and they began getting license. We have very little trouble with that now."

We certainly hope that a driver's license school can be established here. We believe it will be a great step forward in the town's public relations program in this matter.

We sincerely hope that everyone involved will work together in mutual understanding for a better Olton.

Fred Butler, minister, states the seating capacity for the auditorium will be increased by almost one-half its present capacity.

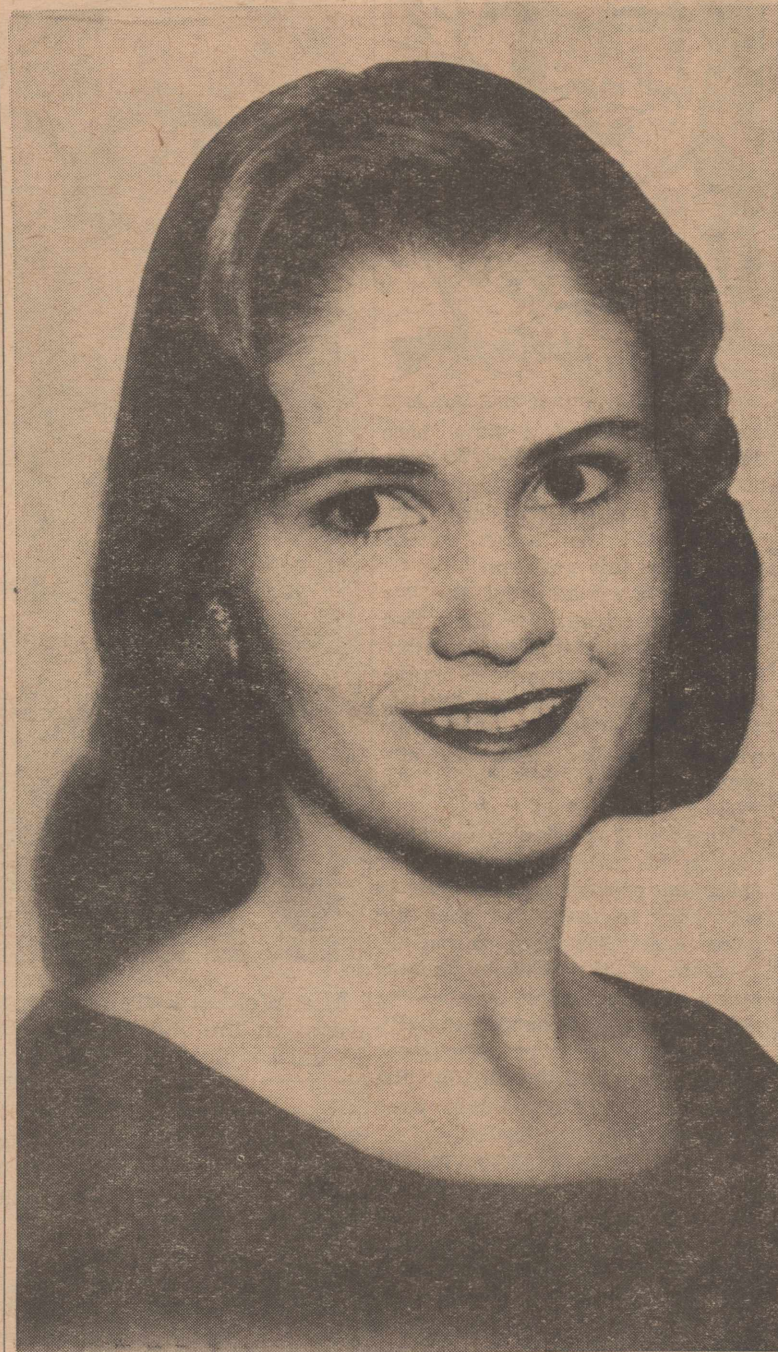
Six classrooms, running west, will be added to the north side of the building, with the present classrooms combined into additional auditorium space.

Ham is just about the best buy in meat when you consider the number of servings obtained. Three or four center slices can be removed for broiling or pan frying. The butt end can be baked for company meals and the shank end can be baked or used as the hub of the boiled dinner.

Baked ham slice
Creamed potatoes
Creole green beans
Sliced tomatoes, green onions, Radishes
Hot biscuits
Coffee or tea
Peach cobbler

Baked Ham Slice
1 thick slice ham
¼ cup brown sugar
1 t. dry mustard
milk to cover ham
Place ham in casserole, rub with mustard and sprinkle with sugar. Pour enough milk to cover ham well. Cover casserole and bake in moderate oven one hour or until ham is done.

Creole Green Beans
1 can whole green beans
3 slices bacon, cut fine
1 small onion
salt and pepper to taste
Brown bacon and onions well; add drained beans and simmer until well done.

Vegetables should always be cooked uncovered. Vegetables cooked until just barely tender have a better flavor, better appearance and retain more food value than when cooked longer.

Peach Cobbler
Plain pastry for single crust
4 cups sliced fresh peaches
¼ cup sugar
One-eighth t. almond extract
2 T butter
Place peaches in baking dish and sprinkle with sugar and almond extract. Dot with butter and cover with pastry. Bake in hot oven (450) for 20 to 25 minutes.
