CUCUMBERS ENJOY GUARANTEED MARKET

Vegetable Harvest Getting Under Way

Vegetable harvest is beginning to roll here this week.

Some farmers were reporting a profit on the first cucumber picking. "That is unusual," said Clovis Poteet, who is doing the weighing again this year. Clovis is being assisted by Dewey Hukill.

Clovis said the quality of the cucumbers is very good. He said they are bringing from \$2.50 to \$3.00. The first loads went out to Brown & Miller of Texarkana this week. Brown & Miller, packers of Rainbo pickles, have contracted cucumber production here. Mr. Poteet said the labor situation is looking good for cucumber growers this year. He said cucumber vines are in fine shape. Their color is better and there has been no wind or insect damage so far, he said.

Bob Worley at the onion shed here said Olton producers have lost about 100 acres of onions to hail. Yields have been running up to 300 sacks per acre, but producers have been plagued with a bad market.

Onions being processed now are bringing about \$1.50 a sack, Mr. Worley said. Grano onions are coming off now and Spanish Sweets are due about the middle of August. Seed onions should be ready by Sept. 1, Mr. Worley reported.

D. L. Witt, potato broker at Hart, summed up the potato situation in these words, "The yield is good. The potatoes are beautiful. The market is lousy."

Olton Area Battered By Hail Again

Hail battered the Olton area again Tuesday and Wednesday nights.

Hardest hit area appears to have been along the Draw northeast of town, although other localities also suffered.

Johnny Hodges north of the Draw is reported to have received hail. There was some hail at the Elmer Moore place north of town. Ernest and Owen Jones and John Norfleet received hail on their farms northeast of Olton Tuesday afternoon. Hail Wednesday appears to have been concentrated about five or six miles southeast of Olton. Reporting damage were Delmer Givens, William Neinst and Forrest Cole.

These are some of the farmers on whose damage The Enterprise received reports. Heavy rain and considerable hail fell in the down town area Tuesday. Only a sprinkle fell in town Wednesday.

Olton Man's Son Slain In Japan

Max Miller, 20 years old, son of Z. D. Miller of Olton, was slain in Japan early this week.

The young man was serving in the Far East with the US Navy. His father is employed by Ed Thompson Implement. Mr. Thompson said the Navy reported that young Miller was "slain by assailants unknown."

Mr. Thompson said he assumes that authorities believe the young sailor was murdered. Mr. Miller left for Arizona immediately upon receiving word of his son's death. Funeral arrangements are pending.

GAP BETWEEN COTTON AND RAYON CLOSING

Cotton Market Prospects Bright Says Council Man

Area ginners heard good news for the cotton industry Monday morning.

John Gregg told some 15 ginners that cotton now is competing favorably with synthetics in the market place. Mr. Gregg is with the National Cotton Council.

"Our long range market prospects are better now than in the past 25 years," he declared.

He said the Council's market research has turned up several reasons for these brighter prospects.

1. In the past two years cotton surplus has been reduced in spite of continued production.

2. For the first time since 1953 there is a belt-wide acreage expansion.

3. Domestic cotton mills will be getting cotton 4 cents a pound cheaper next month, through government assistance. This coupled with a 2 cent increase in the cost of rayon has broadened the base of the domestic cotton market, Mr. Gregg said.

Domestic consumption last year was 8 million bales. This year it will reach 8,700,000 bales. Mr. Gregg said that if the trend continues, consumption soon will go to 9,000,000 bales.

He said exports should move from 2.8 million bales to 6.5 million bales next year. This means sales of 15,000,000 bales with a production this year of about 14,000,000 bales . . . a million bale reduction of the surplus.

Cotton men are jubilant over what appears to be happening to their old competitor, rayon. Mr. Gregg said DuPont has sold out its rayon business, closing down all its plants it was not able to

Superintendent Says More Revenue Required To Operate School System

Drastic cut in state aid resulted this week in a hike of 30 cents per \$100 valuation in Olton school taxes.

The rate was raised from \$1.50 per \$100 valuation to \$1.80. Taxable property in the school district may be appraised and equalized by a tax expert.

Olton school board pondered more than three hours in special session Tuesday night before passing the tax raise resolution by unanimous vote.

Grim-faced school board members heard Superintendent Joe Harper declare that some \$20,000 in additional revenue will be needed to operate the Olton school another year. He said that if the funds were not forthcoming the only alternative would be to downgrade the quality of Olton's school system.

Change in Olton's local fund assignment by the state got the biggest part of the blame for making the tax raise necessary. Mr. Harper said Olton drew \$238,998 last year from the state. This year the school district will receive only \$211,705—a cut of almost \$18,000.

Olton's budget for the coming school year is \$416,995. Of that amount \$353,995 is required for operating the school. The remainder of the budget will be used in paying interest and retiring bonded indebtedness.

Teachers' salaries will cost the school about \$4,000 more this year than last year. Maintenance and operation of new building facilities will cost an additional \$5,000, Mr. Harper pointed out.

Mr. Harper explained the cut in state aid. He said that state aid from the minimum foundation fund is based on the county's economic index. He said Lamb county's economic index was raised this year and resulted in a corresponding cut in the amount of money which the state will provide for the school.

Cost \$23 Mr. Harper said the tax raise voted by the school board will cost land owners about \$25 per quarter section of land.

"In order for us to operate on the same basis as last year, without any undue expenditure, we must have a tax rate of \$1.80," Mr. Harper told the board. "This will bring in about \$20,000 in additional revenue if we have 95 percent collection."

At present the school district's tax valuation is \$12,100,000. The school district's board of equalization has recommended that the district's tax structure be re-evaluated and equalized and then a tax rate be assessed adequate to finance the school.

Hire Tax Expert It is this recommendation that the school board is now considering. This probably will entail the hiring of a tax evaluation expert to appraise taxable property in the school district.

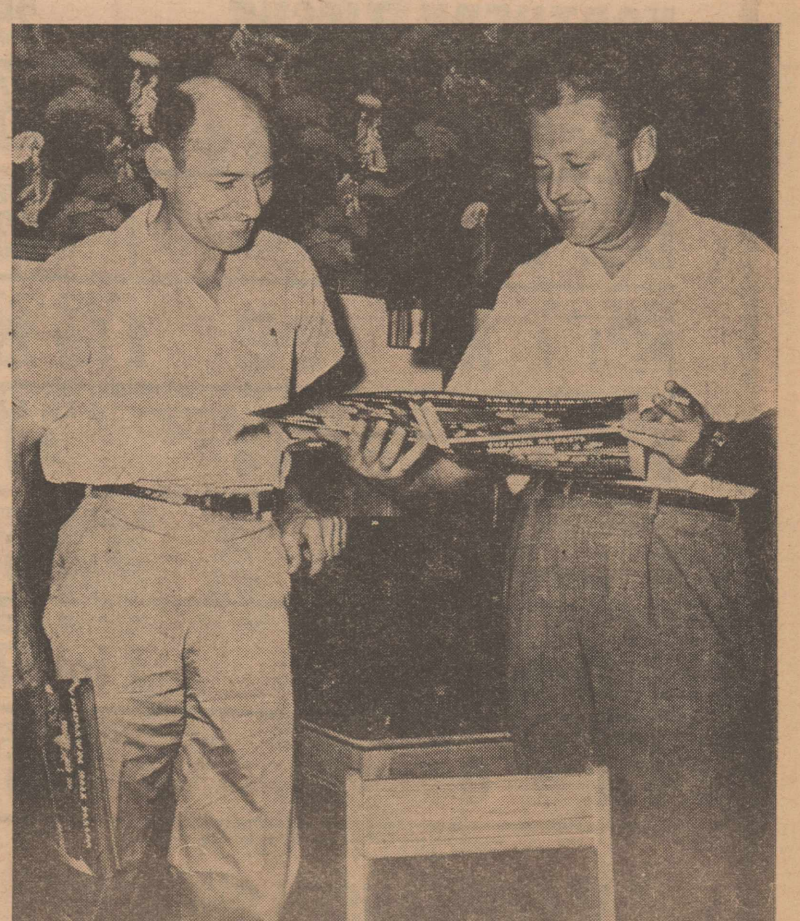
The Lions Club's share will go toward the club's community projects. A portion of the profit goes to the blind people who made the items to be sold.

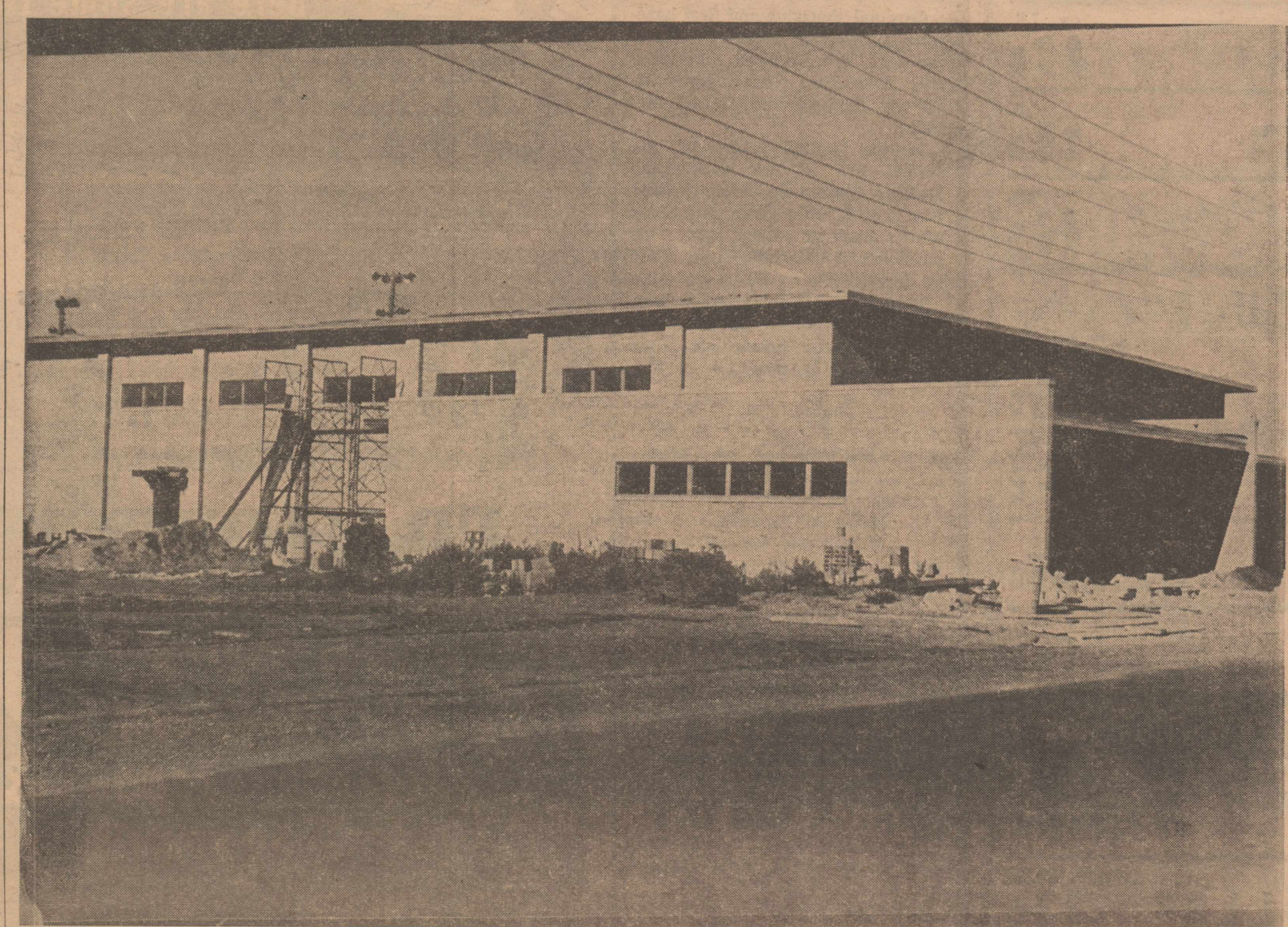

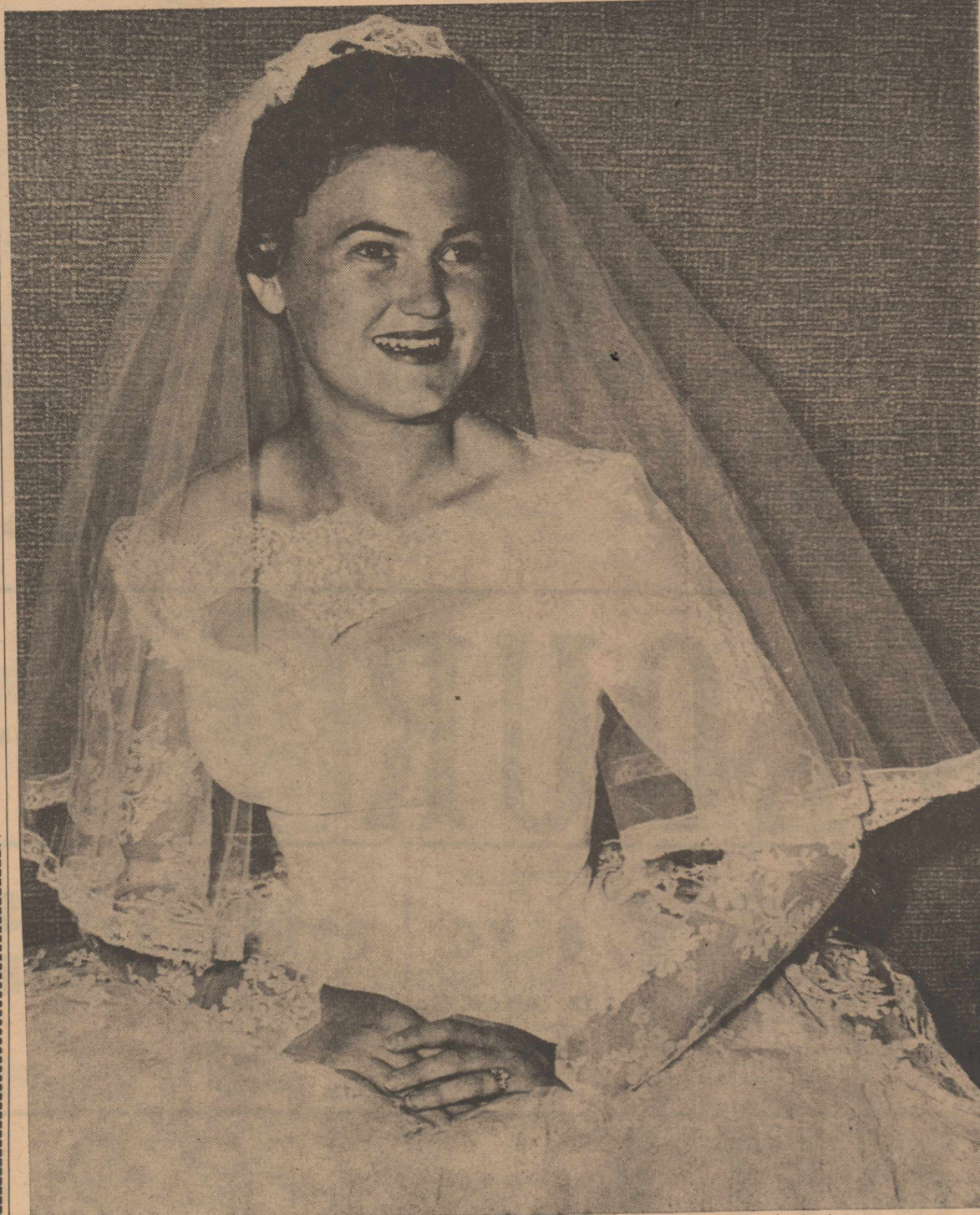

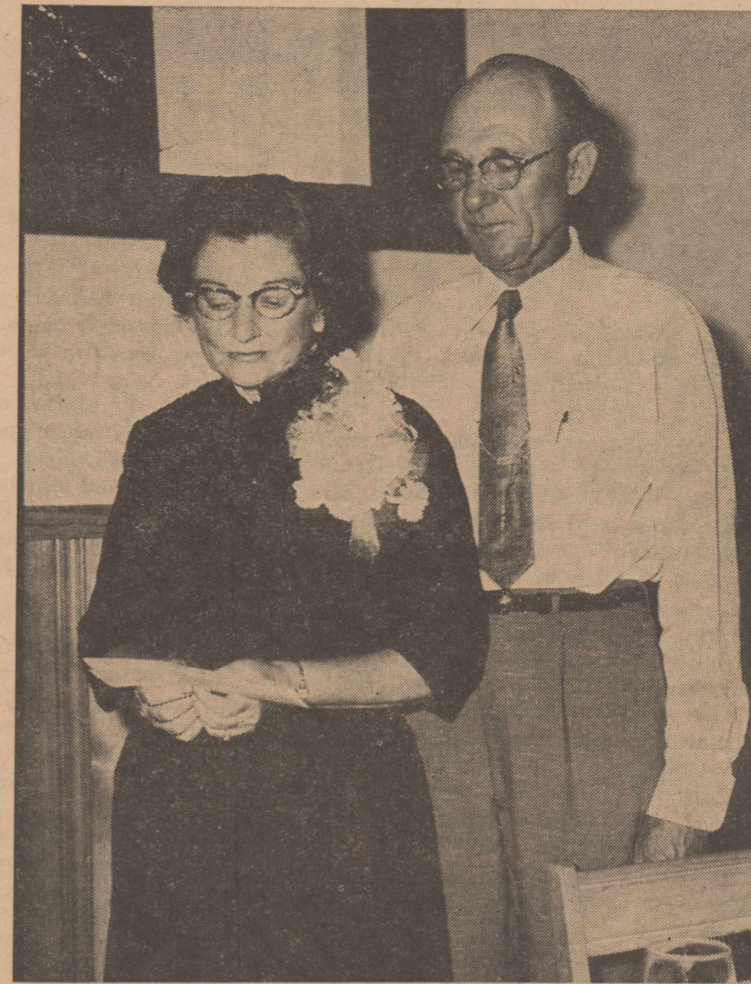

Adventures in ADVERTISING

THE FANTASTIC STORY of MUSA-SHIYA THE SHIRTMAKER



(Also Sometimes Drygoods Selling)

If the shipping department of a factory had not made an error, the world would never have known of Musa-shiya the Shirtmaker and the most astounding advertising campaign in history would never have been launched.

Following World War I an English textile factory was getting back on a peacetime basis. In error it sent a full five year backorder of shirting material to Musa-shiya, a Japanese shirtmaker who operated a small shop in Honolulu. Business was poor and Musa-shiya was near bankruptcy, when the customs office informed him that certain bales of cloth and a fat bill for duties awaited his pleasure at the port of Honolulu.

When the little shirtmaker realized what had descended upon him, he asked for time and went into the silence for purpose of mental refreshment. Remembering a friend in a big mercantile establishment, he hid himself there and sought counsel. How in the name of the horned prophet of evil was he ever to get rid of all that English shirting? And in the meantime where was he to put it? His little box of a shop wouldn't hold one bale.

"You'll have to advertise," advised his friend. "Leave it to me. I'll have our advertising agents help you out."

This merely compounded the little Japanese shirtmaker's troubles. Advertising to him was an uncharted sea. The advertising agent called on Musa-shiya and suggested \$300 as a modest starter. "Too-o-o much. Maybe I think thirty dollar plenty," said the shirtmaker. He was told that wouldn't even get him in print. The agent explained the costs of various advertisements and finally Musa-shiya agreed to try the plan and what was destined to be the most astounding and far reaching campaign in the history of advertising was launched.

Two column by five inch ads then started appearing regularly in the Saturday Honolulu Star-Bulletin. The ads were written just the way Musa-shiya talked—in colorful pidgen English which is used throughout the Orient. Here is an example of one of Musa-shiya's ads:

"Well here come storek again—but Musa-shiya, the shirtmaker, is able prepare. Wonderful accumulation of baby things in dry goods selling corner of Musa shop. Everything for the baby—especially diaper. Exclusive of storek, which find most easily, many persons not finding little shop of Musa-shiya the shirtmaker in King Street, Moka side, between fish market and river."

Tourists started sending copies of Musa-shiya's ads to their friends in many countries. Soon Musa-shiya was receiving orders from all over the world as well as doing a thriving business in Hawaii.

And that is the story of how a well planned, small advertising campaign made an unknown Japanese shirtmaker not only wealthy but world famous.

Your local newspaper doesn't promise to duplicate this story for its advertisers, but it does take your sales message into the homes of your customers where full and careful consideration is given your suggestions. Who knows, perhaps you too can be a Musa-shiya.

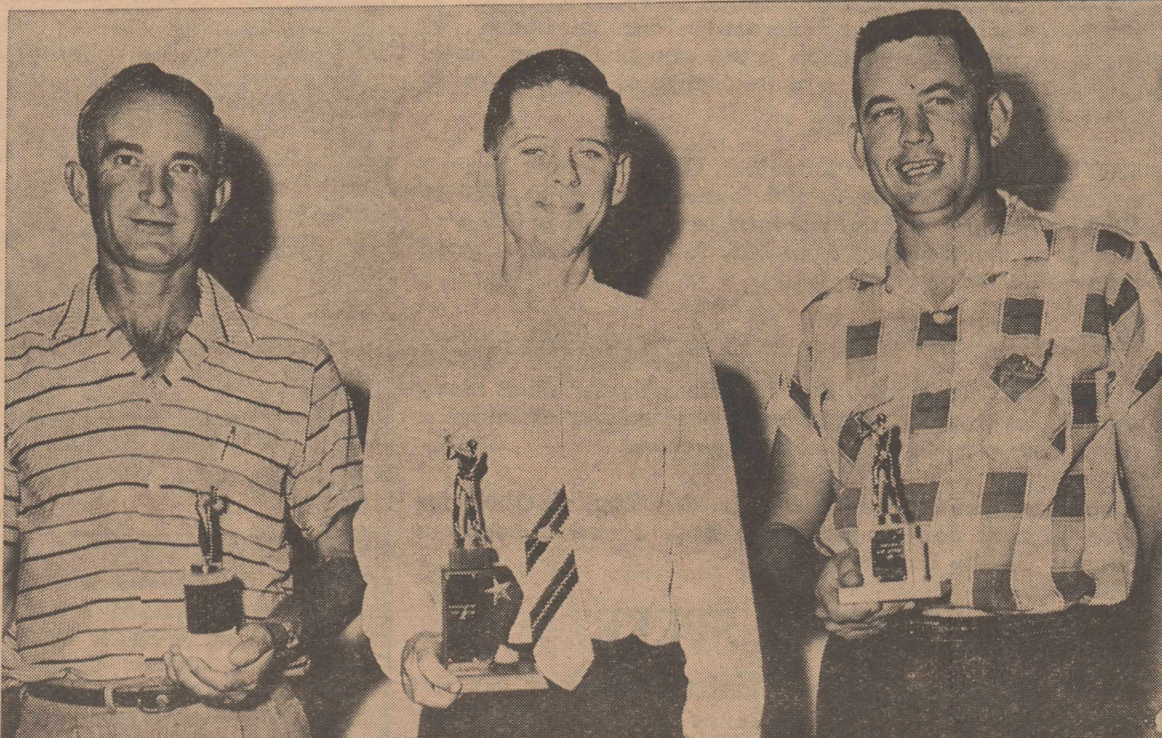

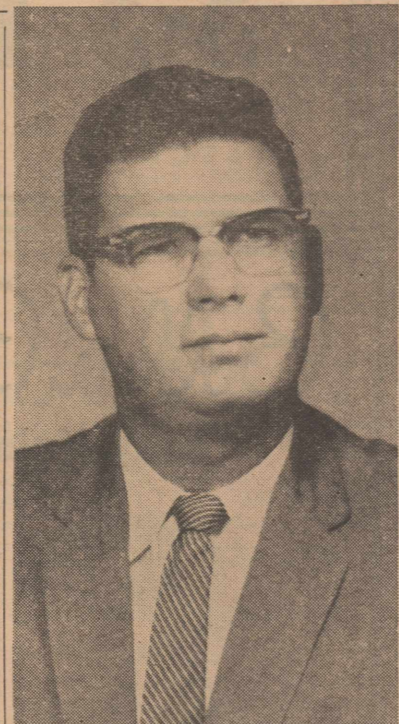
