ONE CRITICAL IN LUBBOCK HOSPITAL

Car Flips Sunday Hurting Four Men

Jesus Arana was in critical condition this week as an aftermath of an automobile accident near here early Sunday morning. Arana was under treatment at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock for a crushed chest and severe head injuries.

Highway patrolmen said Arana's car went out of control on a dirt road about 7 miles northwest of Olton and overturned. Arana was pinned beneath the vehicle.

Three others were less seriously hurt. Treated and dismissed were Jose Hernandez, 24; his brother, Pedro, 21, and Reyes Quintana, 24. All three received minor cuts and bruises.

Another man escaped injury. All five involved are Mexican Nationals employed in this area as farm laborers.

Highway patrolmen said the car was operated by Arana. Officers said tracks indicated that it criss-crossed the road before overturning.

Passerby lifted the car off Arana, according to Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith. Deputy Smith said the men had been enroute to church at the time of the accident.

The deputy said the steering wheel of the car was very loose. He said the vehicle apparently flipped three times before coming to rest.

He believes that Arana lost control of the car, it criss-crossed the road and overturned after hitting the road shoulder.

An Olton duster pilot spraying cucumbers on the Lacy Armstrong place had a narrow escape Monday afternoon when his Super-Cub plane crashed.

Pilot was Bill Stockham. The crack-up was blamed on a mechanical failure. Stockham was going into a turn when the accident occurred.

He eased in sidewise in what spectators described as superb flying. The left wing plowed into the ground, according to reports. The wing and propeller were damaged.

The spray plane came to rest on its back. It glances were broken and the pilot was dangling upside down suspended by his safety belt.

Stockham suffered only minor knee injuries. It was his first crash in nine years of duster piloting.

COACHES THINK MORTON MIGHT BE DARK HORSE

Pick Mules To Win 2-AA; Olton Seen As Runner-Up

Muleshoe is touted to win the district football championship this year. This is the consensus of opinion of coaches over District 2-AA. Olton is generally conceded second spot, although there is little visible evidence to support this concession.

Coach H. W. Callan, an old Olton rival from LeFors, is the new mentor at Muleshoe. He will have 48 experienced Mules back in his stable this fall. This will be a third larger than Olton's entire roster, counting freshmen and all, according to Coach Joe Turner.

True to the nature of his profession, Coach Callan already has hoisted the crying towel. He says he lacks speed, depth and experience.

Olton, picked to win second, lost six of its starters. Back this year will be Phil Neinaat at center, Tommy Wilson at left guard, John Wayne Hair at quarterback, Robert Priest at fullback, Rande Buchenau at halfback, Coy Carlisle at halfback and Kenneth Hooper either at guard or tackle.

Coach Turner says he knows of only 15 boys who definitely will be out for football this fall besides freshmen. He says it is Olton's shortest roster in 10 years.

Olton's seven starters are the team's hope. Olton this season will have something it has lacked since R. V. Allcorn left the ranks of the Blue and White back in 1954—a scoring threat every time the ball is centered.

There is going to be speed, experience and ability "in them thar backs" this season.

District 2-AA coaches say it a toss up between Abernathy and Lockney for the third spot. Sonny Davenport, former line coach at Howard Payne, has replaced Royal James as head coach for the Antelopes at Abernathy. He also is former Ballinger head coach.

Abernathy graduated 15 senior lettermen last year. The Antelopes are defending champions. Coach Davenport says his team's strong point is desire and its weak points are lack of experience, speed and size. Also, the Antelopes will be studying a new offense this year.

Elvin Lyon, a former Olton boy, is head coach at Lockney. The Longhorns' strongest point will be Dan Smith who made all district in the line last year. Lyon has seven or eight wheel horses back. He lost eight lettermen by graduation.

Even though Morton is picked for the cellar, this may well be the wampus year for Coach John Paul Jones' Indian charges. Jones formerly coached at Memphis High School. Jones has eight starters back and the Morton team has most experience in the district. The Indians might win.

Olton Mustangs will begin football practice Aug. 17. All coaches will leave Sunday for coaching school in Fort Worth. They include Turner, Jeff Smart, Travis Reecer and Charlie Rand.

First game of the season is with Petersburg.

CITY BEGINS GARBAGE COLLECTION

Dr. Souders Asks Mosquito Control

City Health Officer B. J. Souders and Water and Sanitation Superintendent Forrest Davis this week joined in a plea for people to eradicate mosquito breeding places.

Dr. Souders said that stagnant water where air conditioner hoses have been allowed to drain without frequent moving is one of the worst offenders.

He also pointed to weeds, tin cans and other such refuse as favorite mosquito haunts. Dr. Souders said Lockney has had several cases of encephalitis and closer to home, Hart has had one case. He said mosquitoes are known carriers of this dread disease sometimes known as sleeping sickness.

Mr. Davis called on Olton folks not to waste water. He said the city now is using about 1,200,000 gallons a day.

He said the city is making every effort to bring mosquitoes under control. He said the town is being fogged with mosquito spray three times a week.

He advised Olton folks to cut the weeds on their property. "The city is trying to cut all the weeds possible," he stated.

Mr. Davis said the mosquito fogger is running through alleys. An attachment is being added

to the spraying machine for the purpose of disinfecting garbage cans. "This will cut down on flies," Mr. Davis declared.

The city took over garbage collection chores this week. Garbage formerly had been collected here by Guy Ashley.

Mr. Davis said garbage collection should get on a regular schedule in the near future.

Benny Guzman Taken By Death At Edinburg

Benny Guzman died last week some seven months after being critically injured by an electrical charge.

He died at Edinburg. He was the father of four small children. Benny was critically injured last November when he came into contact with high tension wires on the Alton Hollingsworth place near Springlake. He was working on a cotton trailer attached to a mechanical cotton harvester.

He was first treated at Community Hospital here. He later was transferred to a Lubbock hospital.

Officers Arrest Olton Man On Liquor Charge

Frank Ruiz was fined \$100 and court costs Monday in county court after entering a plea of guilty to a charge of liquor law violation.

Officers said it was a first conviction in Lamb County for Ruiz. He was arrested by Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, accompanied by Police Chief Floyd Cavin about 11:30 o'clock Sunday morning at a house north of Olton.

Officers said Ruiz had about five cases of beer in quarts in his possession. Some of it was iced down, authorities reported. The beer was seized.

Officers Issue Three Tickets

Three tickets were issued by city police over the weekend.

One was issued for no driver's license, one for excessive noise and one for speeding. Involved were a white person, a Negro and a Latin-American.

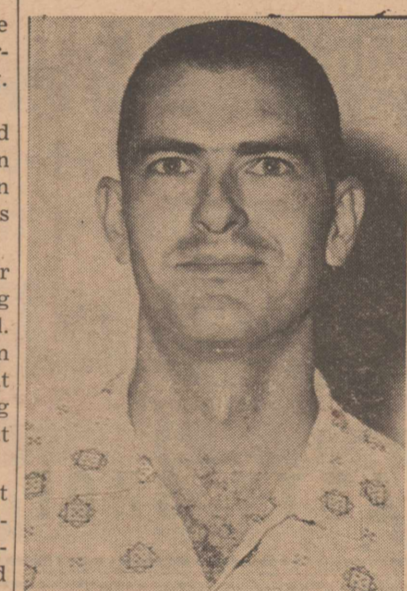

KITCHEN KORNER

Try the less expensive cuts of meat for your next barbecue. Beef ribs are very inexpensive and yet good, cooked on our barbecue grills. Have your butcher cut the ribs a little longer than when you use them for stew.

MENU

Barbecue ribs
Roasting ears
Salad plate—cucumbers, onions, green pepper, avocado and lettuce wedges
Double corn sticks
Lemon chiffon cake

Barbecue Ribs

3 to 4 lbs. beef ribs
Barbecue sauce

Lay ribs on grill and baste with sauce; let cook for 30 min., turn over and baste. Let cook another 30 min or until done.

Put roasting ears, that have been husked and washed on grill, cook for 30 min., turning every little while. They should be a golden brown when done.

We have been getting some very nice vine-ripened tomatoes lately. They have a very good flavor and are less costly. Roasting ears are quite plentiful now, too.

This is a little different corn stick recipe you might like:

Double Corn Sticks

1 cup flour
2 T sugar
2 t baking powder
¼ t salt
1 cup yellow corn meal
1 well beaten egg
1 cup cream style corn or (1 small can)
¾ cup milk
2 T salad oil or melted shortening

Sift together dry ingredients. Blend egg, corn, milk and salad oil and stir until just blended (do not beat).

Fill pans two-thirds full. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) about 20 min., or until a golden brown.

I have been asked for a sundae sauce recipe, and we like this one real well:

Chocolate Sauce

1 package german chocolate (or 1 package chocolate chips)
½ cup evaporated milk

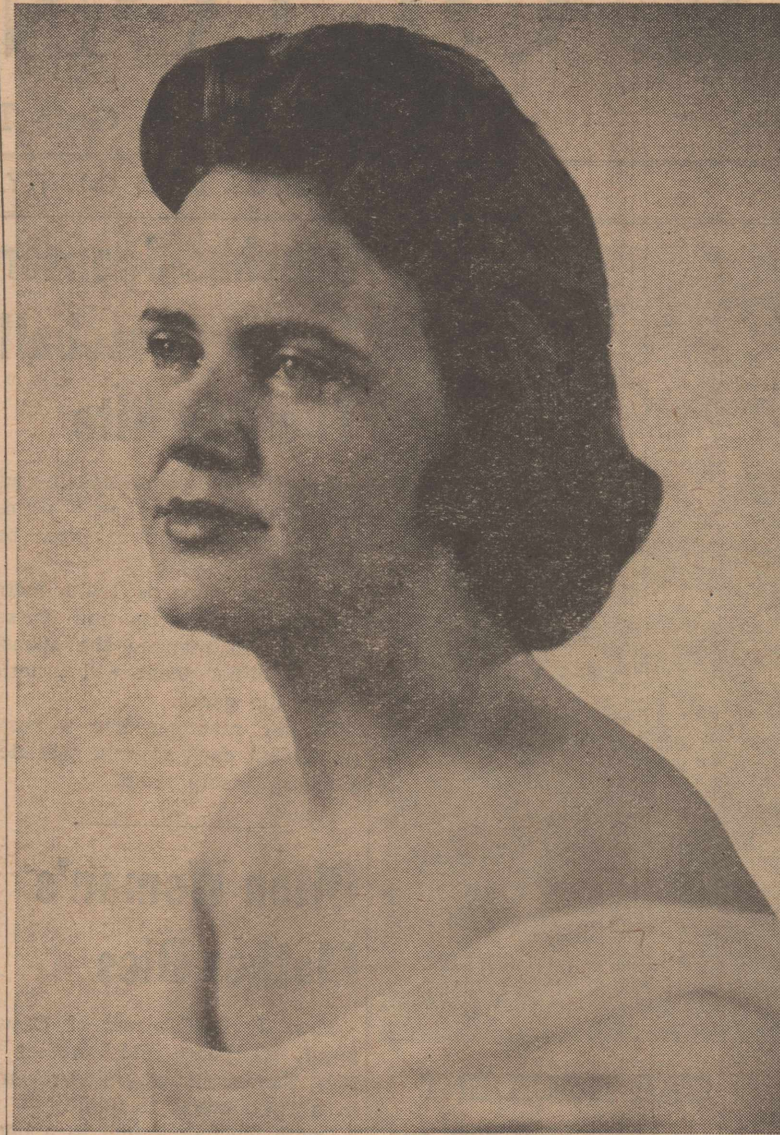
In a heavy sauce pan heat chocolate and milk stirring constantly until well blended. Serve warm or at room temperature. Makes 1 cup.

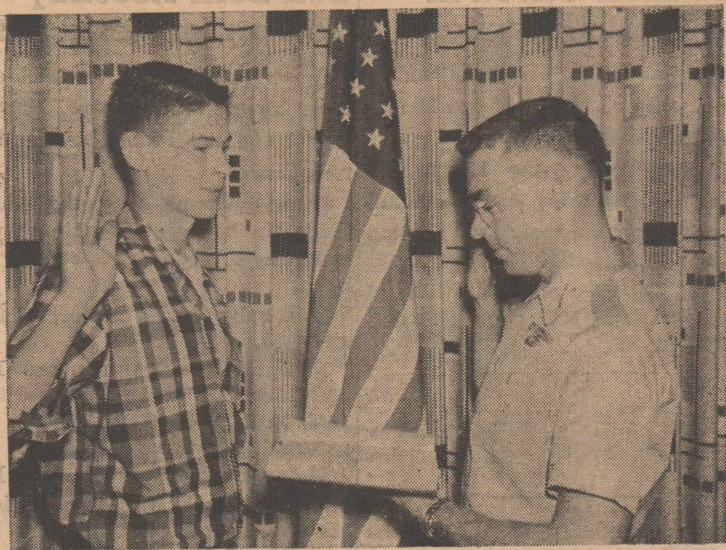

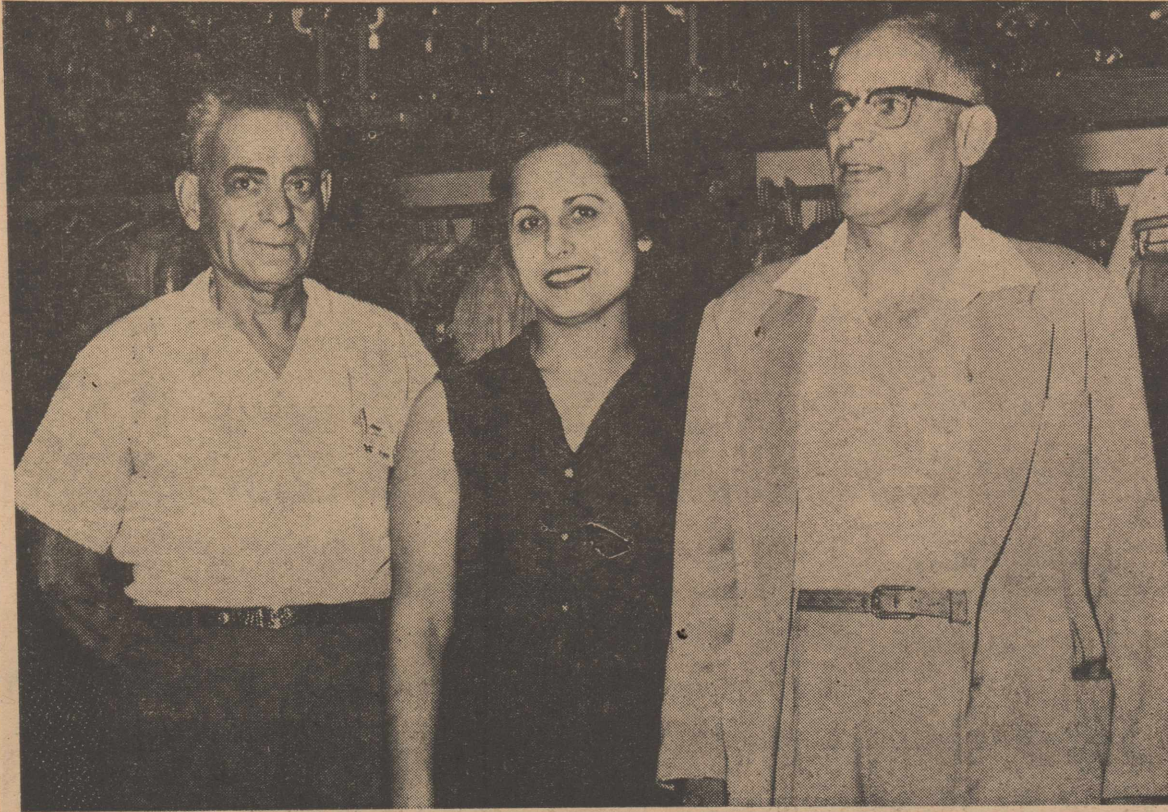

FUAD SALMAN HERE TO SEE BROTHER

Lebanese Business Man From Venezuela Visits

A modest Lebanese cobbler who has amassed a fortune during the past decade as an emigrant merchant in Venezuela is visiting in Olton in the home of a brother.

Fuad Salman, erstwhile of Beirut, Lebanon and now of Maturin, Venezuela is here visiting K. Salman, who is an Olton

merchant. Mr. Salman operated a shoe shop and made shoes in Beirut until 12 years ago. In 1947 a brother in Venezuela told him he ought to try his luck in that oil-rich country.

Fuad departed for South America, leaving behind his wife and

five children—four boys and a girl. In Venezuela he plied his cobbler trade but without much success.

He decided to go into dry goods business. The brother already in Venezuela had amassed riches there. With the brother's assistance Fuad set up for business.

It wasn't long after that until he was able to send for his family. Now he has four stores in that country and his children are helping him run them.

The name Salman appears to be well on the way toward becoming a prominent name in Venezuela. Mr. Salman does not speak English but was perfectly at home here talking to Latin-Americans as his Spanish is nothing less than fluent.

He and his brother, K., talked in Arabic as he was being interviewed.

Mr. Salman was in Beirut during World War II. He was there when French tanks rolled through the streets during the post-war unrest.

There are five of the Salman brothers. K., lives in Olton, of course. Fuad lives in Venezuela and another brother lives in Brazil. A fourth brother, formerly lived in Venezuela but now has returned to Beirut. One brother lives in Rochester, Texas.

Mr. Salman said income tax in Venezuela amounts to very little, about five cents on the dollar. Maturin is an oil town of about 55,000 population. He said oil field workers are very well paid and that business is good.

Goods for his four stores come from all over the world. A son now is in New York buying for the four outlets. Mr. Salman talked to his son last Saturday morning. He was about to purchase a Pontiac automobile for shipment back to South America.

Mr. Salman came to this country for treatment at John Hopkins Hospital. He has been suffering with a back ailment but at the famous hospital he learned it was not serious.

Mr. Salman left Olton Saturday night for a visit with his brother in Rochester. He will come back here before returning to Venezuela.

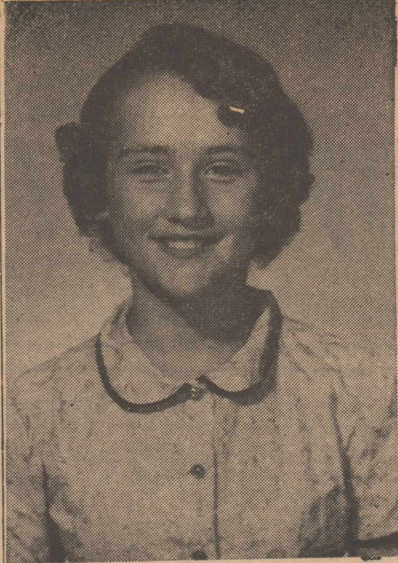

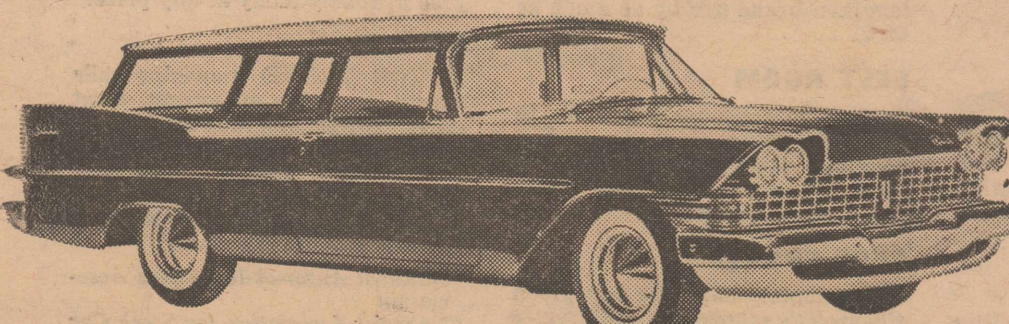

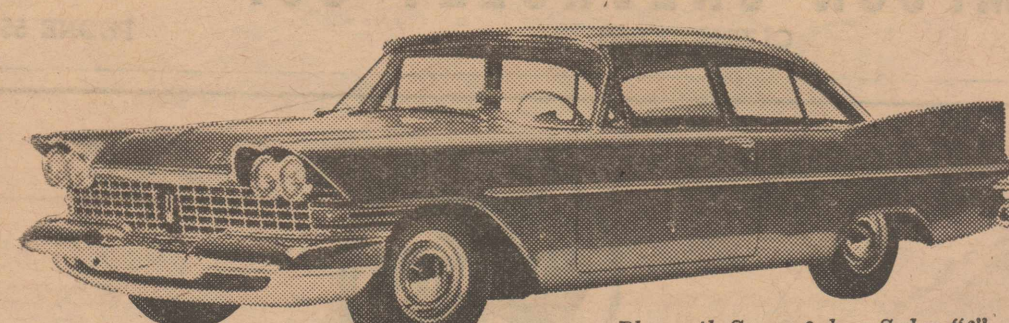

Bean Crop Flourishing; Market Prospect Good

Olton is going into bean production in earnest this year.

company has the only bean cleaning and processing plant in Lamb County.

Opening of the bean processing plant this fall will be the advent of a small industry for Olton. Johnston said the beans will be packaged here, if there is a demand for such an operation.

The company has constructed a steel building on Highway 70 in west Olton to house the processing plant. Johnston has encouraged the planting of an irrigation hybrid variety of bean known as the K-111. It was developed in Idaho. The firm received shipment Friday of a truck load of bean seed, although time is running out for planting. Johnston said harvest of beans should be complete within 90 days after planting.

Several farmers who have been hauled out during the past few days may take a chance and plant beans on the wasted acres. In the meantime, thousands of acres of pinto beans are flourishing already in this community. Most notable is a 20-acre patch being farmed by Harold Mills and Garland DePrang southwest of Olton. Mills & DePrang planted their crop June 15.

Although they have watered only once so far, they know that their plants are going to require a great deal of moisture from now on. The vines are beginning to bloom. Johnston said beans need a great

deal of water from the time they start to bloom on through the bearing season.

In fact, he said the amount of water given the plants during the bearing season has a great deal to do with the yield.

Mills & DePrang say they farm their beans about like they would farm cotton. They knifed the crop once and have plowed it twice. They put on about 100 pounds of anhydrous to the acre.

Mick McGill, who has about 15 acres of beans, says it is a good idea to get the beans up on a bed as soon as possible.

At harvest time, the crop first is cut and then is wind rowed. After it has dried out the combines come along the wind rows and do the threshing.

Being developed in this community is a special apparatus for cutting beans. It is a rod weeder which will be mounted on a tractor tool bar.

Johnston said the price outlook is good for beans. He said there is no surplus in government loan at the present time. Beans are a staple food both in this country and abroad.

Johnston envisions a South Plains which eventually may produce a lion's share of this non-perishable food stuff. Until now, Colorado has led the nation in bean production.

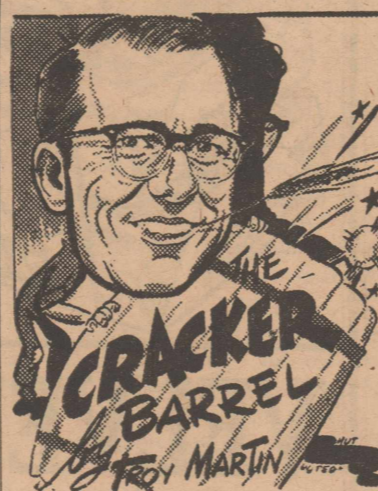
