### Tanner First To Harvest Pinto Beans

Buster Tanner has harvested his 25-acre bean crop for an average yield of 896 pounds per acre.

James Cowart, whose machinery processed and cleaned the beans, said net to the farmer was about \$5.75 per hundred. James believes this to be considerably better pay off than that received from grain sorghum.

The crop had been damaged by hail. James said Mr. Tanner pre-watered his beds before planting but did not water the crop. "You might say they were dryland beans," Mr. Cowart declared.

"The beans he got were good beans," the processor asserted.

James said he expects some yields here this year to run between 1,500 and 2,000 pounds per acre.

## City Cuts Inspection Fee; Enforce Plumbing Statute

Olton city council Tuesday night voted a cut in plumbing inspection fees and for more rigid enforcement of plumbing regulations here.

The council agreed to cut the fee from \$5.00 to \$1.00 for the first inspection at a house or building and require a 50 cent fee for inspection of each additional fixture.

The council noted in passing that the City's general fund will be operating about \$1,400.00 in the red by the time the fiscal year ends Aug. 31.

Discussed was the Council's study of a new paving method in which cement is mixed with top soil instead of using caliche. City Engineer James McMorries has been studying the method but has made no conclusive report.

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture has requested the council sanction a paving program here.

City board of equalization is scheduled to complete its deliberations this week.

City officials noted that anyone wishing to contact an officer at night should call either the Plainview or Littlefield police department. The night officer usually is curbing in a radio police car and is in radio contact with these two departments. Police department calls may be made without charge.

# Olton Man Remembers Cawthon As Tough But Good Grid Coach

Twenty years ago this fall Bob Duncan reported to varsity training at Texas Tech for tutelage under one of the most "hell bent" for leather football coaches in the annals of the gridiron. This week Bob remembered some of the highlights of his years under Texas Tech's fabulous Pete Cawthon. Cawthon's antics provoked mirth throughout the sporting world but

his actions also provoked respect among his adversaries on the football field. Cawthon's pictures in various contorted poses of sideline acrobatics once were spread across several pages of a Minneapolis newspaper. A photographer had been assigned to do nothing during the game except take pictures of the lively Red Raider Coach. Duncan started his Tech career in 1938 on the freshman team but had his first real brush with Cawthon the following year. Duncan played left end and was graduated in 1942 after making all-conference in his position. Cawthon had a reputation of

being a tough coach. Duncan learned just how tough when the Raiders played El Paso that first year. The Big Reds lost the game 6-0. Now Pete had a natural antipathy to losing, especially to the School of Mines and especially after fumbling ten times inside the 10 and not being able to score. Dolefully and with a sense of foreboding, the team made its way to the dressing room. Cawthon was not far behind. And speaking of behinds, that's just what he started kicking when he got there. "We dived into the showers with our suits on just to get out of

his way," Duncan recalls with a grin.

One of Duncan's team mates had declared that he would have it out with Cawthon if he "ever lays a hand on me." It wasn't long until he had his chance.

That particular Raider was running in the clear seconds before the half. He looked back to see if he were about to be tackled, stumbled and fell on the 10-yard line. The Raiders didn't score.

In the dressing room, Cawthon grabbed the hapless player by the jersey and shook him. The boy wilted.

"Why didn't you hit him like you said you would," other players ribbed. "I just couldn't," the youngster replied doggedly.

Also in 1939, Tech lost to the University of Miami, Duncan recalls. Cawthon wouldn't let any of the players shave until they won a game.

"We went five weeks without shaving," Duncan declares.

Playing San Francisco in 1940, Clarence Tillery, Tech left end, was running with the ball. Cawthon took off down the side line paralyzing him.

Tillery was tackled from behind. Cawthon fell like he had been shot.

"When they got you, they got me too, Tillery," Cawthon told his charge later.

Once while playing on the coast, Tech was all tied up with its opponent 20 to 20 with about 30 seconds to go.

Cawthon sent his ace field goal kicker into the fray. The Red Raiders drew up in kick formation. The crowd waited.

Gulls circled overhead. Cawthon just couldn't look. He covered his face with his hands and looked sorrowfully skyward. The snap, the kick! The crowd roared as the pigskin sailed gracefully between the uprights to give the Raiders a 23 to 20 victory.

"I just knew that ball was going to hit one of them birds and fall down," Cawthon told his team a few minutes later.

Cawthon played no favorites among his team members.

One lad thought his prowess on the previous Saturday entitled him to extra privileges. The boy reported extremely late for practice. It cost him his place on the team.

Cawthon had a flair for the dramatic and friends admit that he was a bit vengeful. Once when Miami edged Tech, the Florida coach had a cannon fired

every time his team scored.

Not to be outdone, Tech downed Miami 62 to 14 the following year and Cawthon had a cannon fired for every touchdown.

"I just couldn't face that audience after losing that game," Cawthon told his team mournfully.

Once when the Raiders were playing Montana and led 21-0 at half time, Pete was up in the dressing room trying to convince his team that the game still wasn't on ice.

"They're gonna hit you like this," Cawthon declared lashing out with a fist. Unfortunately he rammed his arm through a nearby window and several stitches were required to close the wound.

Duncan said Cawthon talked with a pronounced drawl and was not too careful with his grammar.

One of his favorite expressions was: "I treats you like Notre Dame and what does you do? You plays like a normal college."

If Cawthon was tough, he also was cognizant of a job well done. "Duncan," he once told Bob, "you know what I likes about you? You gets down field and gets the ball and when you gets it you runs with it."

Duncan declares that Tech probably never had a tougher coach nor one better loved by those who played under him than was Pete Cawthon of football legend.

**KITCHEN KORNER**

Since there are so many potatoes grown in our area it would help our neighbor and friends if we were to use more potatoes in our meal planning.

It has been a proved fact that potatoes are not as fattening as we are sometimes led to believe. It would help a lot if we would serve potatoes at one meal each day. Be sure to ask your grocer for the home-grown potatoes. There are many ways to serve the potato, so I will give you a few ideas to refresh your memory.

**Parsley Potatoes No. 1**  
Enough small potatoes to serve your family or guests. Boil with

jackets on. Peel, and brown in butter, remove from skillet and sprinkle with parsley flakes.

**Parsley Potatoes No. 2**  
Pare and boil in water (the small potatoes). When well cooked, drain and pour a white sauce over them, add small amount parsley flakes, heat through and serve while hot.

Try serving potatoes and onions fried together for a change. We like hash brown potatoes. I think they have a better flavor if they are cooked with the jackets on first, then chopped and fried in small amount of butter or shortening. Turn quite often to keep from burning.

Have you tried riced potatoes lately? I like them for flavor and they are high in nutritional value too. Cook well-washed potatoes with the jackets on. When well done, put in ricer, add one cup milk and 1 T butter, then rub through ricer, serve at once.

**Potato Water for Light Bread**  
Cut up in small pieces one medium-sized potato and boil in 2½ cups water until well done. Add enough water to make 2 cups liquid. Mash potato in this liquid and

use instead of water when making your next batch of light rolls.

**Chocolate Potato Cake**  
(3 layers)  
Cream together:  
2 cups sugar  
1 cup shortening  
Add 4 whole eggs and beat well  
Sift and add alternately with 1 cup buttermilk:  
2 cups flour  
5 T cocoa  
¼ t. salt  
1 t soda  
Beat well after each addition.

Add 1 cup hot mashed potatoes and 1 t vanilla. Bake in moderate oven 35 to 40 minutes, or until top springs back when touched lightly.

There are many more ways to serve the potato, so let's try and use them more often.

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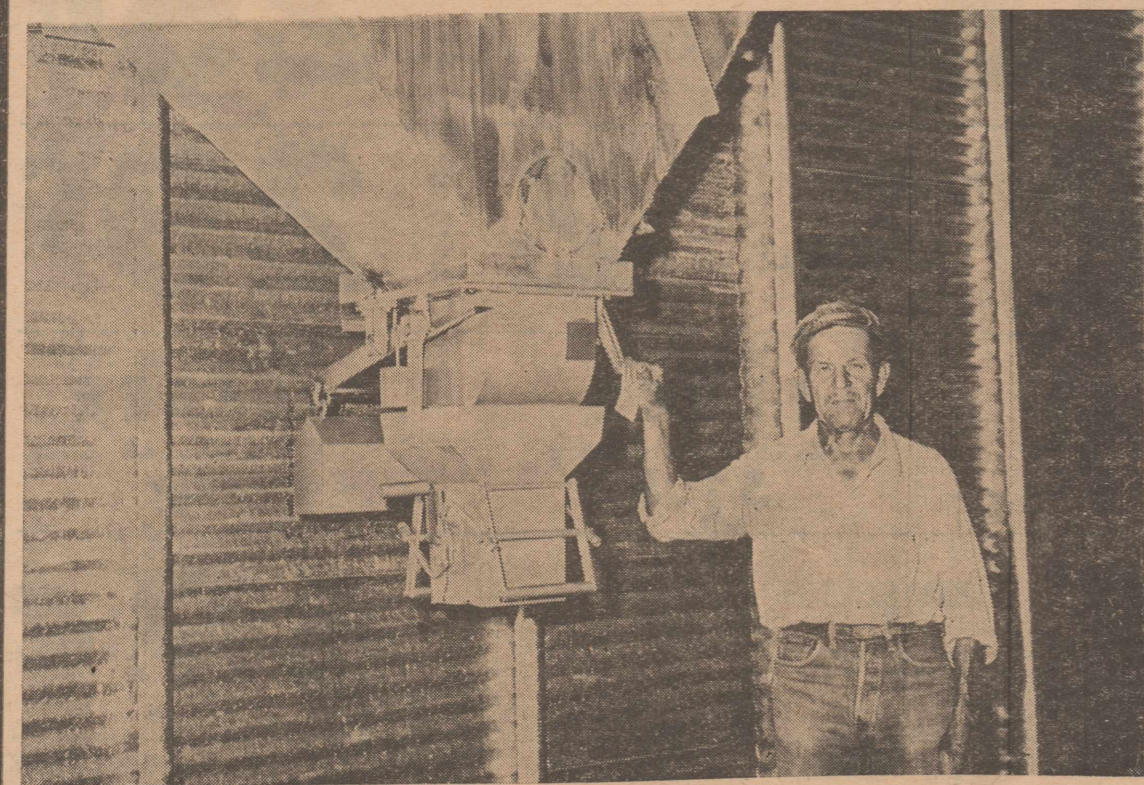
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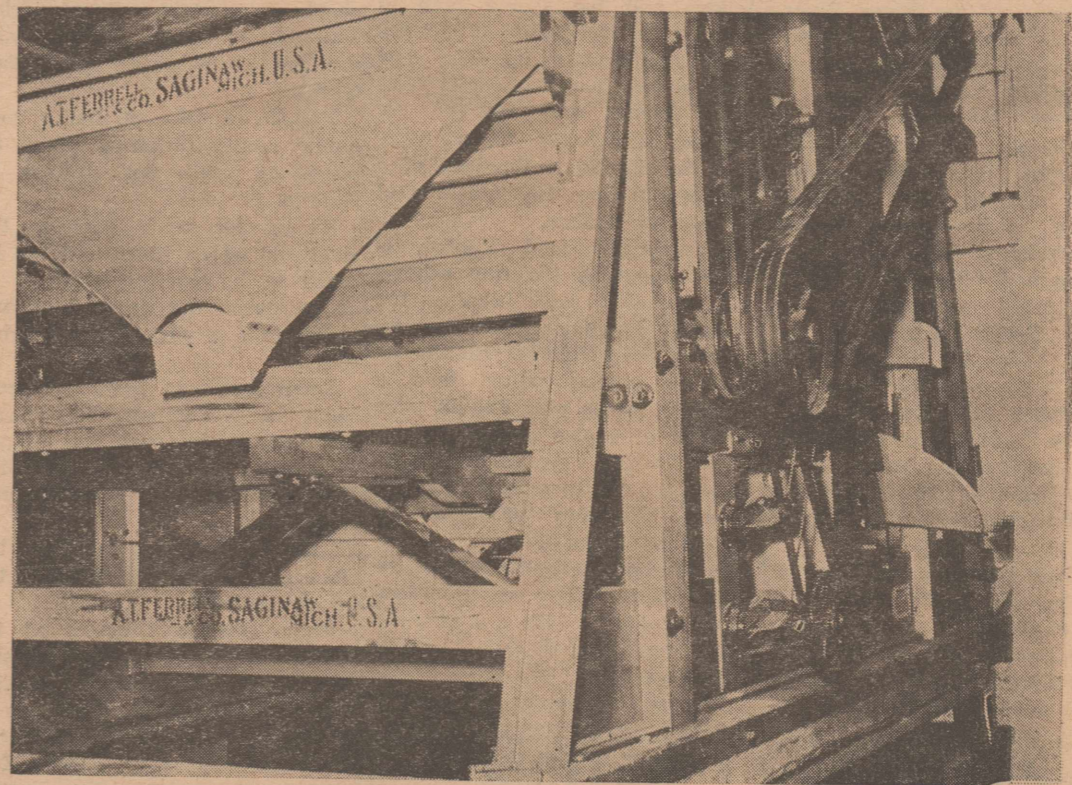
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
