

Recharge Expert Joins Staff At **Halfway Station**

James Valliant joined the staff of the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway recently as associate water engineer.

His primary responsibility will be the study of underground recharging with lake water. This will include silt and bacteria control and study of irrigation values on crops as well as evaluation of bench leveling. Several methods of silt control

are being tested in the recharge research.

These include use of Dow Chemical Company's AP 30 Separan, applied by plane and added to lake water by chemical means and use of various materials to catch silt and clay before water flows into underground sand.

Studies also are being made of methods of cleaning the recharge well of silt, clay and sand during the recharge period.

Both dry land and irrigated sections of benched land will be evaluated from the soil and moisture conservation standpoint. Use of both commercial fertilizer and manure applications also will be studied.

Mr. Valliant is a graduate of Pecos High School and will receive his BS Degree in agricultural engineering at Texas Tech this summer.

During the past year he worked on recharge research at Texas Tech. His experience includes seismograph work and managing a feed store at Pecos.






