



NOTICE! To Parents Of School Age Children

Olton, Texas

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year.

All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1959, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 21 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone Superintendent at No. 3611 or the School Tax Office No. 3781 and

2. Call in person at the school Tax office and get a census blank and fill

Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. Ist he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older on next Sept. 1st he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most often overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to over-

Please read the census blank carefully, fill it out completely, and return it by your child next day to the teacher. Thank you.
