He was chosen from among six candidates by a committee representing Olton civic clubs and will compete for the title of Texas Teacher of the year.

The state competition is sponsored by Federated Womens Clubs of Texas.

A spokesman for the committee said Mr. Stockdale was chosen on the basis of a three-point rating which includes scholastic achievement, interest in his work beyond the call of duty and interest in community, state and national civic affairs.

Other candidates for the honor were Mrs. B. C. Cooner, Mrs. John Campbell, Mrs. Fred Gordon, Mrs. Eldon Franks and David Howton.

Ernest Frederick Stockdale, Jr., is a native of Fort Worth and is 25 years old. His father is an attorney and former Cochran County judge.

Fred came to this part of the country in 1949 and settled at Morton with his parents. He is a 1951 graduate of Morton High School.

He attended Eastern New Mexico University at Portales, where he majored in music education. He was graduated in 1956. "I laid out a year and worked as a fireman on the Santa Fe," Fred confided.

While at ENMU, Fred met a beautiful freshman and never allowed her to become an upper classman. He married her and to Jo can go some of the credit for Fred's success as a schoolman.

The Stockdales have two sons, Stevie, 4 and Freddie, 1.

Fred became Olton band director in 1956, fresh out of college. Since that time his bands have won some of the outstanding awards offered.

Fred belongs to Kappa Kappa Psi, national honorary band fraternity. He also is a member of the National Association of Rudimental Drummers. Fred is a member of the Music Educators National Conference, Texas State Teachers Association and the Olton Recreation Center.

## Tennis Court Is Assured Say Civic, School Leaders

School officials and civic leaders say a double tennis court with a cyclone fence is almost a reality for Olton School.

Cost of the court is expected to run somewhere near \$4,500. This includes the cost of the cyclone fence. Olton civic clubs and individuals already have raised about \$1,800.

Civic clubs will stand expense of the cyclone fence while the school will pay for pouring the slab for the courts.

Interest in a Doane Agricultural survey here rose considerably Tuesday night as Olton people heard its benefits discussed by groups of farmers and businessmen from Stratford in Sherman County.

Doane made a survey of Sherman County and folks from that area seem very pleased with the results.

Here from Stratford for the meeting Tuesday night were C. W. Donelson and W. O. Bryant, farmers; Paul Chesmer, businessman; and Charlie Lamb, vocational agriculture instructor with the Stratford school.

Question, Answer Tuesday night's meeting was conducted on a question and answer basis with questions coming from the floor. Chamber officials reported a good response.

The group voted to bring a representative from Doane here about Feb. 18 or 20. A representative of the firm will be in Clayton, NM, about that date.

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is trying to secure a survey on Olton School District only. It has been assured that such a survey can be made.

No figures on the cost of the survey are yet available.

Steering Committee Chamber president Major James set up a steering committee to furnish farmers with information on the survey and create interest. It is made up of Don Spain, Calvin Horn and Frank Struve.

Banker Speaks H. M. Flores, vice-president of First State Bank of Stratford, wrote an extensive article on Doane Survey in a recent issue of a national magazine for bankers.

The Sherman County development Association which secured the survey for Sherman County was formed in early 1958.

The Mustangs also fell before



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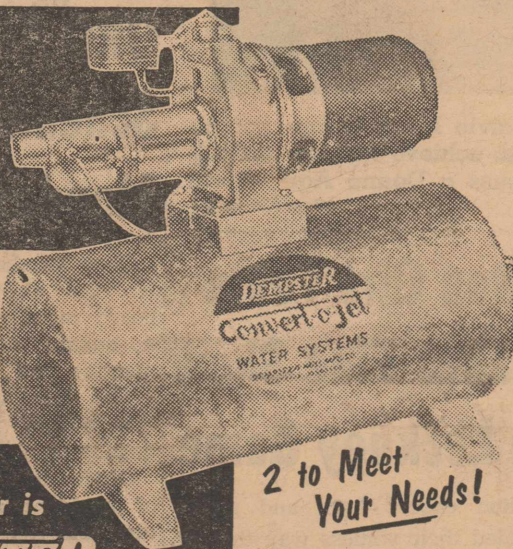
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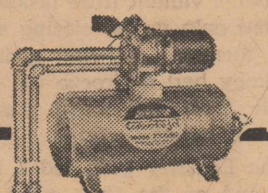

## SCHOOL COSTS MONEY

In an interview with Mr. Paul Kennedy, Superintendent of the Hart Schools, I found out something of the financial structure of the school system. I have always felt that it took a lot of money to operate the schools, but after looking over the budget, I feel the money allotted to the schools is not being wasted. Our big problem, of course, is the fact that we have a new building which is not paid for. Our bonded indebtedness costs approximately \$20,000 a year which would go a long way toward other school expenses. However, we are proud of our new building and know that this expense is necessary.

The Local Board of Education Secretary, Rodney Smith, countersigns all checks written by Al Goodin, Business Manager, except the salary checks. There are twenty-seven employees at the school, including administration, teachers, custodians, lunchroom and bus personnel. Our teachers are paid just slightly over the state minimum which makes it difficult to get and hold competent instructors.

Personally, my feeling is that we have an excellent group of teachers at Hart this year and I hope that we are able to keep them. My children are learning so much more this year and the opportunity is there for them to learn, if they will accept it.

It takes around \$150,000 a year to operate the school at Hart. Of that amount, about \$105,000 is spent for the salaries of all the personnel. \$3,800 is set aside for books, teaching supplies and library needs. It takes around \$6,700 to operate the school buses. This figure includes the cost of one new bus which may or may not be purchased this year.

Operation and maintenance of the plant costs \$7,400. Furniture and equipment capital outlay this year will cost around \$4,700. These figures are approximate and certain adjustments may be made.

Our operating income comes from county, state and federal sources. All federal aid is apportioned through the state. It includes 5 to 6 cents per meal served at the lunchroom and four and one half cents per half pint of milk served in the afternoon.

For those of you who do not know, the lower eight grades are served milk in the middle of the afternoon. The children pay part of the cost. Also included in this federal aid is the major part of the salaries of the Vocational Ag and Vocational Home Economics teachers. Their activities are governed a great deal by federal law and have been for 35 years.

Mr. Kennedy is proud of the confidence the Board has placed in him. They have unanimously voted to approve any NEEDED expenditure over and above the estimated budget for local needs.

The school budget is available to anyone at anytime and it is hoped that many of you will take the opportunity to check it and see where the money goes.

## Hobbies Dominate Zealot Club Meet

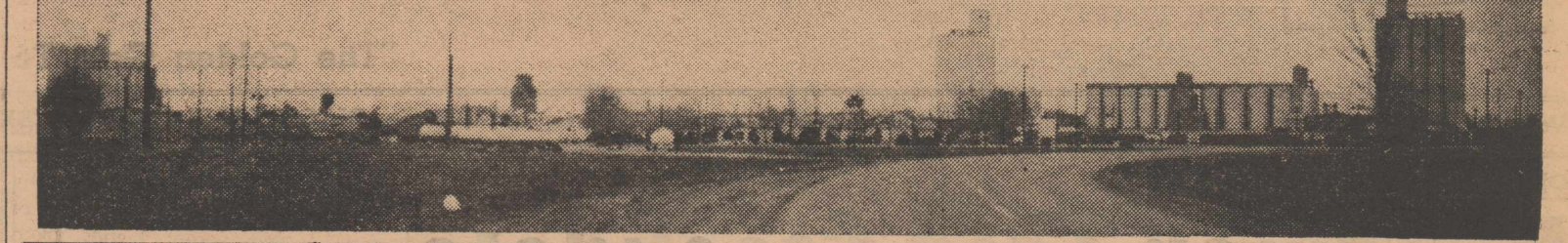
Hobbies was the topic of discussion at last week's meeting of the Hart Zealot Club held at the home of Mrs. Jimmy Davis.

Hart B girls came from behind to defeat Bovina 38 to 36 with Freddie Sue Popejoy as high pointer with 15 points.

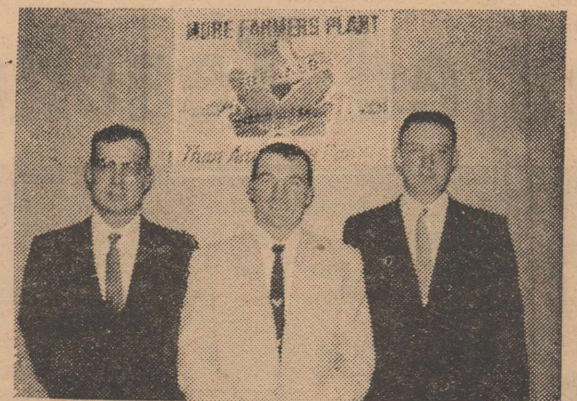
The "B" boys chalked up a 25 to 18 win over Bovina with Ralph Myrick taking scoring honors. He hit the hoop for 12 points.

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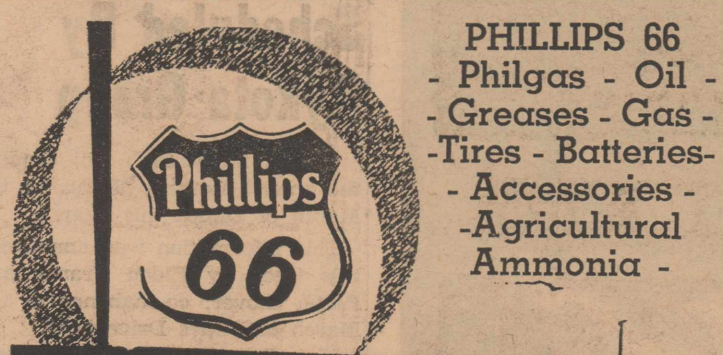

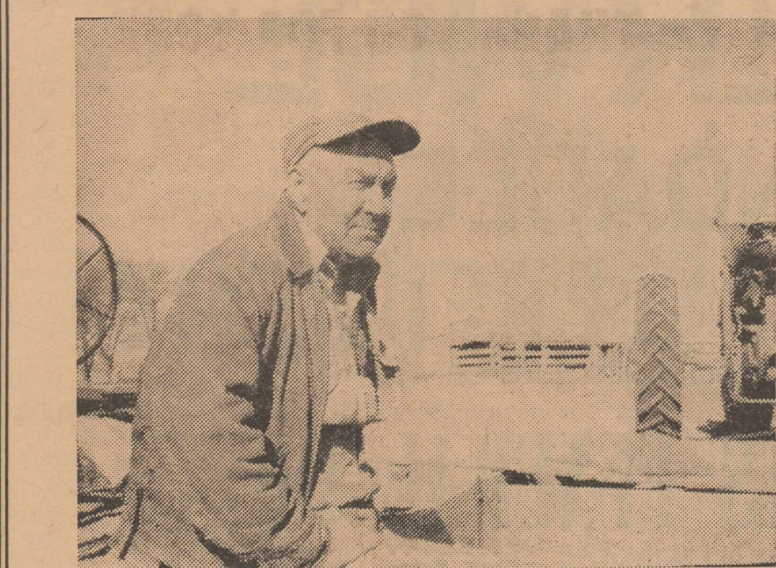

## Books On Parade

By Mardema Ogletree

Education and Freedom, by H. G. Rickover, Vice Admiral, USN, Dutton, \$3.50.

This just-published book is as Edward R. Murrow says, "... a remarkable book, packed with salient facts, dictated from experience and inspired by wisdom."

The author was assigned to build the first nuclear power plant for naval use, and in his search for highly educated specialists he found that American education was and is inadequate for the Atomic Age.

This discovery led to further investigation and research, and the result is a book that will make Adm. Rickover very unpopular with some groups who have more pride than good judgment.

He shows the need to develop in all children the highest level of intellectual competence of which they are capable. Education is a matter of survival in this highly technological age for many reasons other than the need for scientific knowledge in our defense system. Population increases and the growing scarcity of natural resources are factors he considers.

The ingenuity of highly trained specialists are needed in all fields, and we are lagging far behind Europeans and Russians in most of them, according to Rickover.

One consequence of one of the inadequacies of our school systems is "... that we have a diplomatic service where only 50 percent now have command of a foreign language and where—still worse—a mere 30 percent of the

incoming recruits speak any foreign language.

"At a time when the United States has commitments all over the world we have only one ambassador in a communist country who speaks the language; in the Near East and North Africa among the most critical areas of world politics today, only two of our ambassadors speak Arabic."

He discusses the problems incurred by the shortage of teachers. He deplores the emphasis put on Education courses in our colleges. He thinks that higher standards (academically), higher salaries, and more appreciation from the public for the profession will help the situation.

The neglect of the gifted child in our public school system is given a great deal of space in his book.

He says, "There is ample evidence that in any class which includes slow and fast learners the slower group sets the pace and receives more attention from the teacher. The above-average children are kept from advancing at the speed appropriate to their ability, with the result that some lose interest in learning as such, others develop sloppy habits, and a few build up a false sense of

superiority which convinces them that they are so smart that they will never need to apply themselves to anything.

Talented children whose minds are not challenged become frustrated and often turn into poor

pupils from sheer boredom. . . . He says that there is a need to unshackle minds from ignorance, from dependence on the opinions of others, and from fear of disagreeable facts if we are to keep our democratic freedom.

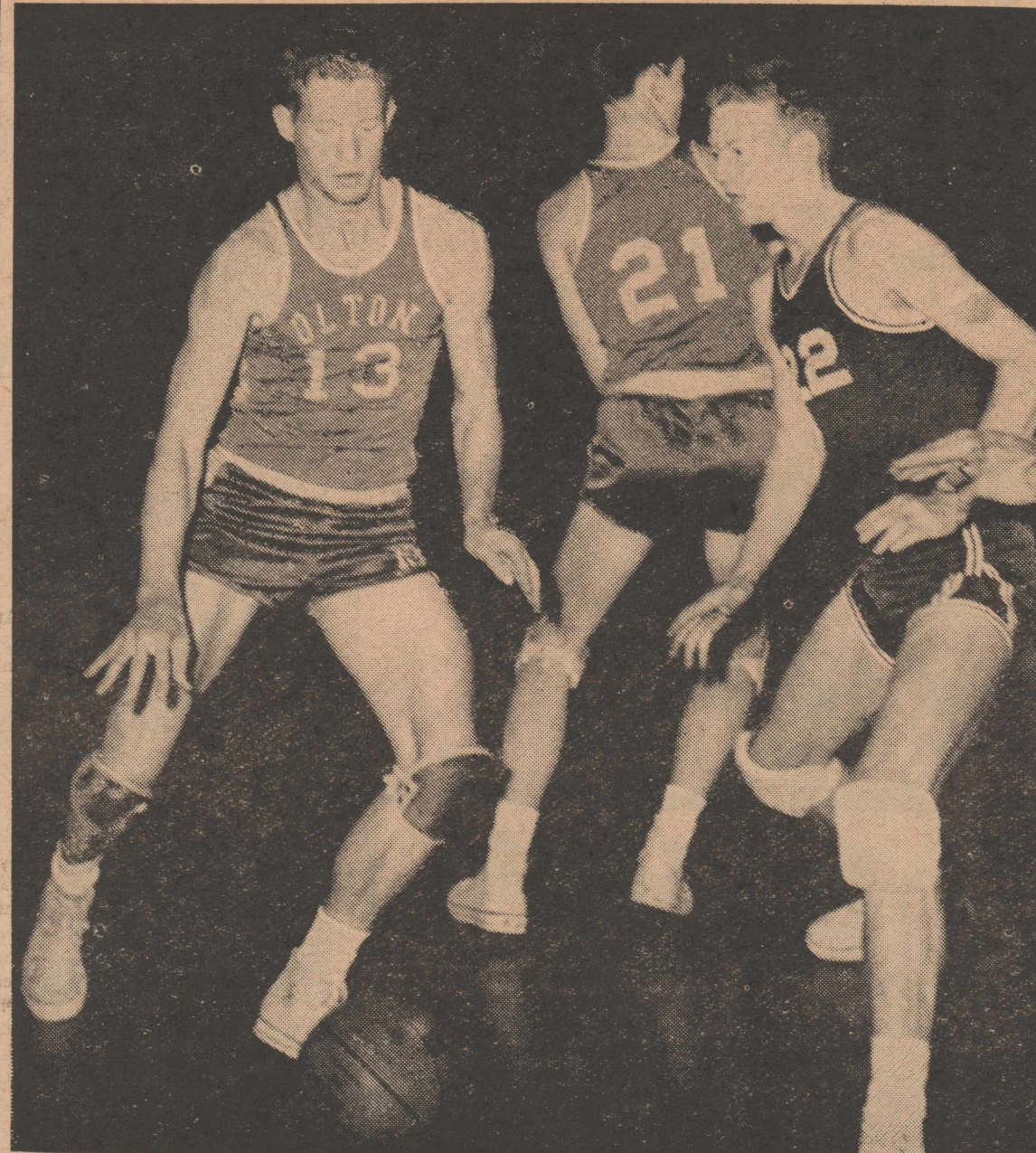

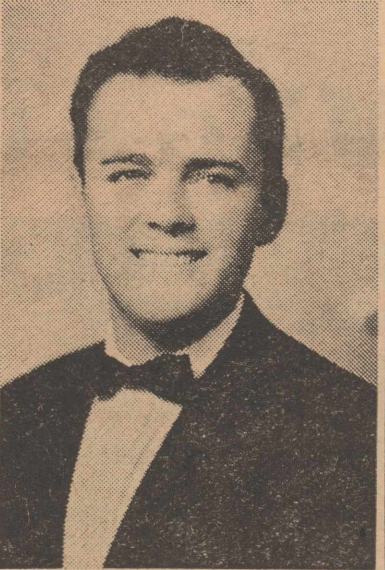
### Class Play To Be Given By Juniors

**Golfing Rules Are Listed**

**RULE 37 THE PLAYER**  
**1. Conditions**  
 The player shall be responsible for acquainting himself with the conditions under which the competition is to be played.  
**2. Caddie and Forecaddie**  
 For any breach of a Rule or Local Rule by his caddie, the player incurs the relative penalty. The player may not employ anyone to act as a forecaddie, under penalty of disqualification. If a forecaddie be employed by the Committee, he is an outside agency (Definition 22).  
**3. Infringement Assisting Partner**  
 If a player infringe a Rule or Local Rule so as to assist his partner's play, the partner incurs the relative penalty in addition to any penalty incurred by the player.  
**4. Handicap**  
 Before starting in a handicap competition, the player shall check his handicap from the official list, and in the case of match play or bogey competitions shall inform himself of the holes at which strokes are given or taken.  
**5. Time and Order of Starting**  
 Players shall start at the times and in the order arranged by the Committee.

**Penalty For Breach of Rule 37-5: Disqualification.**

**6. Discontinuance of Play**  
 Players shall not discontinue play on account of bad weather or for any other reason, unless:—  
 a. They consider that there be danger from lightning, OR  
 b. There be some other reason, such as sudden illness, which the Committee considers satisfactory.

If a player discontinue play without specific permission from the Committee, he shall report to the Committee as soon as possible.  
**General Exception:—** Players discontinuing match play by agreement are not subject to disqualification unless by so doing the competition is delayed.

**Penalty For Breach Of Rule 37-6: Disqualification.**

**7. Undue Delay**  
 Players shall at all times play without undue delay. Between the competition of a hole and driving off the next tee, a player may not delay play in any way.  
**Penalty For Breach Of Rule 37-7:**  
 \*Match play—Loss of hole; Stroke play—Two strokes. For repeated offense—Disqualification.  
 \*If the player delay play between holes, he is delaying the play of the next hole, and the penalty applies to that hole.

**RULE 38 Scoring In Stroke Play**  
**1. Recording Scores**  
 The Committee shall issue to each competitor's marker a score card containing the date and the competitor's name.  
 After each hole the marker shall check the score with the competitor. On completion of the round the marker shall sign the card and hand it to the competitor; should more than one marker record the scores, each shall sign the part for which he is responsible.  
**2. Checking Scores**  
 The competitor shall check his score for each hole, settle any doubtful points with the Committee, ensure that the marker has signed the card, countersign the card himself, and return it to the Committee as soon as possible.  
**Penalty For Breach Of Rule 38-2: Disqualification.**  
 The competitor is solely responsible for the correctness of the score recorded for each hole. The Committee is responsible for the addition of scores and application of the correct handicap.  
**3. No Alteration of Scores**  
 No alteration may be made on a card after the competitor has returned it to the Committee.  
 If the competitor return a score

for any hole lower than actually played, he shall be disqualified. A score higher than actually played must stand as returned.

The application blanks can be filled out in the Soil Conservation Service office in the court house in Littlefield.

There are two different ages of trees available this year through the Lamb County Soil Conservation District. They range in size from potted seedlings (approximately 6 inches high) at \$.25 each to two year old plants (approximately 12 to 24 inches high) for \$1.35 each which will come in gallon buckets.

The trees will be available and can be picked up around May 1st at the nursery. Applications for less than 25 trees cannot be accepted.

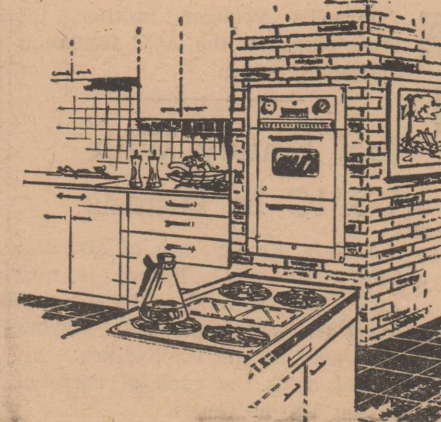

The lanky middle-distance runner had never a halfmile better than 2:02.0 until last spring when he spun off a 1:51.9. As a freshman at ACC he broke a foot and

did not run a single race.

At Olton High School he earned letters in football, basketball and track. His best track performances were 52 flat for the 440 and 2:02.0 for the 880.

This season Edwards will threaten the all-time ACC 880-yard record of 1:51.5 set by Leon Lepard in 1951.

As a sophomore he also ran the mile in 4:18.3 and turned in a 48 flat leg on the mile relay team which set a school record of 3:11.5 on the ACC track last spring.

Jerrell's younger brother, 6-8 Don, plays on the ACC freshman basketball team.
