Three men filed for two seats on the council. They are Fred Thompson, Ed Hestand and Bob Duncan.

Write-in tickets are nothing new to Olton. Mr. Hollingsworth himself was swept from office in April of 1955 by a write-in ticket headed by G. H. Bley.


