# Write-In Possibility Looms, Three Announce For Council

## Safflower Crop Discussed At Two Meetings

Some 70 prospective growers Tuesday night heard Dwite Wilson of Farmers Union explain some of the details which will be included in safflower growers contracts.

In the meantime, Wilton Bodkin of the executive board of Texas Farmers Union said further action on securing safflower acreage commitments from farmers here will be suspended until contracts have been prepared.

He said the Farmers Union legal staff is now at work preparing these contracts and they should be ready by April 1. Texas Farmers Union and Safflower Oil Corp., plan to build a processing plant from oil bearing seed.

Mr. Bodkin is holding meetings with farmers all over the area in an effort to secure acreage. Acreage planted this year will be devoted to production of seed, which in turn will be used for planting of commercial safflower crops next year.

Mr. Bodkin said seed are expected to arrive here within the next few days. He said TFU wants about 20,000 acres of safflower planted this year. This would be about 1,000 acres to the county in the 20 odd counties in which it will be grown in the Panhandle and Plains area.

However, the TFU board member indicated that more than this

acreage probably will be planted. TFU and Safflower Oil Corp., plan to build a huge extracting plant. Also they will construct a green house for experimentation with safflower seed. There is prospect that both these facilities may be located at Olton.

Farmers may sign up for acreage at the offices of Elvis Hatley and Murrie Machen located in the Producers Co-Op Building. Mr. Bodkin said definite acreages cannot be guaranteed due to limited seed supply.

Mr. Bodkin made a talk on safflower production to a group of farmers here Friday night.

## Former Mayor Says Would Serve; No Comment On Campaign Plans

Prospect of a write-in candidate for mayor loomed this week after incumbent D. Y. Ray filed for re-election. There is been possibility that some voters may write in the name of former Mayor Lefty Hollingsworth in the April city elections.

Three men filed for two seats on the council. They are Fred Thompson, Ed Hestand and Bob Duncan.

Mayor Ray filed for re-election shortly before deadline Saturday. Ex-Mayor Hollingsworth talked to an Enterprise representative early this week. He said he had been approached by a group who asked whether he would serve as mayor if elected on a write-in. He said he told them he would.

## Girl Killed In Accident Near Andrews

Carmen Rodriguez was killed Sunday night when the car she was driving went out of control and overturned near Andrews. Miss Rodriguez, 21 years old, was a 1957 graduate of Olton High School.

Investigating officers said the accident occurred when the car edged off the pavement onto the road shoulder. Miss Rodriguez apparently attempted to return the vehicle to the pavement too quickly, causing it to skid and overturn 1 1/2 times, officers said.

Riding with Miss Rodriguez were her mother, Mrs. Mary Rodriguez, 52, Olton; Johnny Romo, 23, Springlake; and Lupe Saldivar, 18, Olton.

Miss Rodriguez suffered from shock and Romo suffered cuts and bruises. None of the three were hospitalized.

Police said the car belonged to Romo. The group had been to Odessa visiting the dead girl's father and were returning home when the mishap occurred.

Miss Rodriguez was born Jan. 14, 1938 in Presidio. She had lived here since 1950. While in high school she was a librarian and was a member of the pep squad and dramatics club.

At the time of her death she was employed by the Mexican National Association at Muleshoe.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon in St. Peter's Catholic Church in Olton. Father Vincent Dauntin of Littlefield officiated.

Burial was in Olton Cemetery under direction of Parsons Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Pablo Saldivar, Lupe Saldivar, Johnny Romo, Uesbio Saldivar, Margarito Hernandez and Joe H. Alcorta.

Survivors include the mother; the father, Apolonio Rodriguez of Odessa; a sister, Aida Saldivar, Olton; and a brother, Rodolfo Rodriguez, Eagle Pass.

## Two Hurt In Accident At Springlake

Two persons suffered minor injuries Monday afternoon in a pick-up car crash at the intersection of Highways 51 and 70 at Springlake.

Taken to the hospital in a Parsons Funeral Home ambulance were Alvin Leifstie, 70, Llano, and Treva Jo Conner, 14, Springlake.

Neither was seriously hurt.

Involved in the mishap was a car driven by Aaron Floyd Buie, Llano and a pick-up operated by Mrs. Lorena Conner of Springlake.

The Conner vehicle was traveling east on US 70 and the car was traveling north on Highway 51. Officers said the car went out of control and struck a flashing light pole at the intersection. Mr. Leifstie was thrown from the car.

Pens will be flushed daily into a pit and the waste pumped to Mr. Jones' fields as liquid fertilizer.

# Lamb SCD Cites Olton Man As Farmer Of Year

Diversified Farmer Euel C. Jones has been named Lamb County's outstanding conservation farmer of the year.

He was selected at a recent meeting of Lamb County Conservation District board of supervisors.

Mr. Jones lives about a mile east of Olton and farms about 500 acres. He has pioneered in some phases of soil conservation and at the present time is pioneering in producing pork on a production line basis.

Mr. Jones is a native of Lamb County and a graduate of Olton High School and Texas A&M College.

He has been a cooper with Lamb County Soil Conservation District and served as supervisor for Zone One until 1957.

His conservation program includes varied conservation measures designed to conserve soil and water and increase efficiency and production.

Mr. Jones has installed 10,800 feet of underground concrete pipeline to increase watering efficiency. He has bench levelled several acres around a large lake in order to get maximum benefits from rainfall and irrigation water and to prevent erosion.

Mr. Jones was one of the first to install a re-charge well on his farm. "If everyone did it," he declared, "it would help to raise the water level."

Mr. Jones considers the re-charge well highly successful.

Mr. Jones uses a diversified type of farming which includes row cropping and stock farming. He uses alfalfa grasses and alfalfa for grazing and soil improvement.

Mr. Jones has developed a conservation cropping system which includes legumes, grasses, cover crops and narrow spaced grain sorghum in rotation with cotton.

He manages crop residue in such a manner as to leave adequate cover on soil surface during the critical spring blowing period. He also has planted a windbreak for protection of his farmstead from wind damage.

Mr. Jones is going into the pork producing business with all the thoroughness which has made him one of the county's leading crop farmers.

His operation includes farrowing barn, weaning barn and finishing barn. Sows farrow in the farrowing barn and the pigs remain there with their mothers about two weeks.

From there they go to the weaning barn where they stay until they weigh 50 pounds. When that

weight is reached they go on into the fattening barn for finishing.

Both the farrowing barn and the weaning barn are heated with electric coils under the concrete floor. From farrowing to market, a Euel C. Jones pig will never touch the ground.

Mr. Jones hopes to produce 2,500 to 3,000 head of porkers a year in this production line fashion.

The pork producing program will fit right in with his crop farming.

# Doane Half Done Deadline Nearing

Fund raising for the Doane agricultural survey has passed the halfway mark but only a few days remain to reach the goal of \$5,300.

This information came this week from Wayne Cooper, manager of Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Saturday has been set as the deadline but there was indication this week that the campaign may be extended a few days to give workers time to make all the contacts possible in the community.

Doane agricultural survey is a survey dealing primarily with farm management, markets and crops.

Such a survey has been run in Sherman County on the North Plains.

"The farmers here are having their farms linear programmed as fast as Mr. Goale (Doane representative) can handle them and still do his other work."

This statement made recently by Charlie Lamb of Stratford points up the enthusiastic reception that farmers in that area are giving this newest of agricultural tools, linear programming.

"LP", as it is sometimes called, is a part of the development program for the Olton area proposed by the Doane Agricultural Service, Inc., of St. Louis. This program to raise the standard of living of all residents of the Olton area was outlined to a group of farmers and businessmen here last February 20. Since that date a committee headed by Cotton Lewis has been heading up a drive to collect the \$5,300 necessary to set up a program in the Olton area.

It was agreed at the meeting that the Doane organization would be given the go ahead when the entire amount had been subscribed.

Recent contacts with the Doane people have given further indication of the nationwide interest in community development programs especially those which have included Linear Programming.

The Doane people report that nationwide attention was focused on Sherman County and their experiences with their development program. Theirs was the first program to use Linear Programming.

Articles were published in Capper's Farmer, Wall Street Journal, Agricultural Leader's Digest, National Livestock Producer, three major banking magazines, West Texas Livestock Weekly and others. Additional publications are seeking articles, the Doane people report.

The groundwork has been laid for a development program in this area. The Doane people have indicated that opportunities for immediate and long range accomplishment through a development program in the Olton area appear to be as good as any area in which they've worked.

It has been pointed out by the Doane people, the Sherman County residents that visited Olton, and others who are familiar with development programs that this is not a program based on governmental assistance.

It is based upon a desire of the people involved to help themselves.

Other officers of the corporation are Elmer McGill, president and Roy Roberts, vice-president.

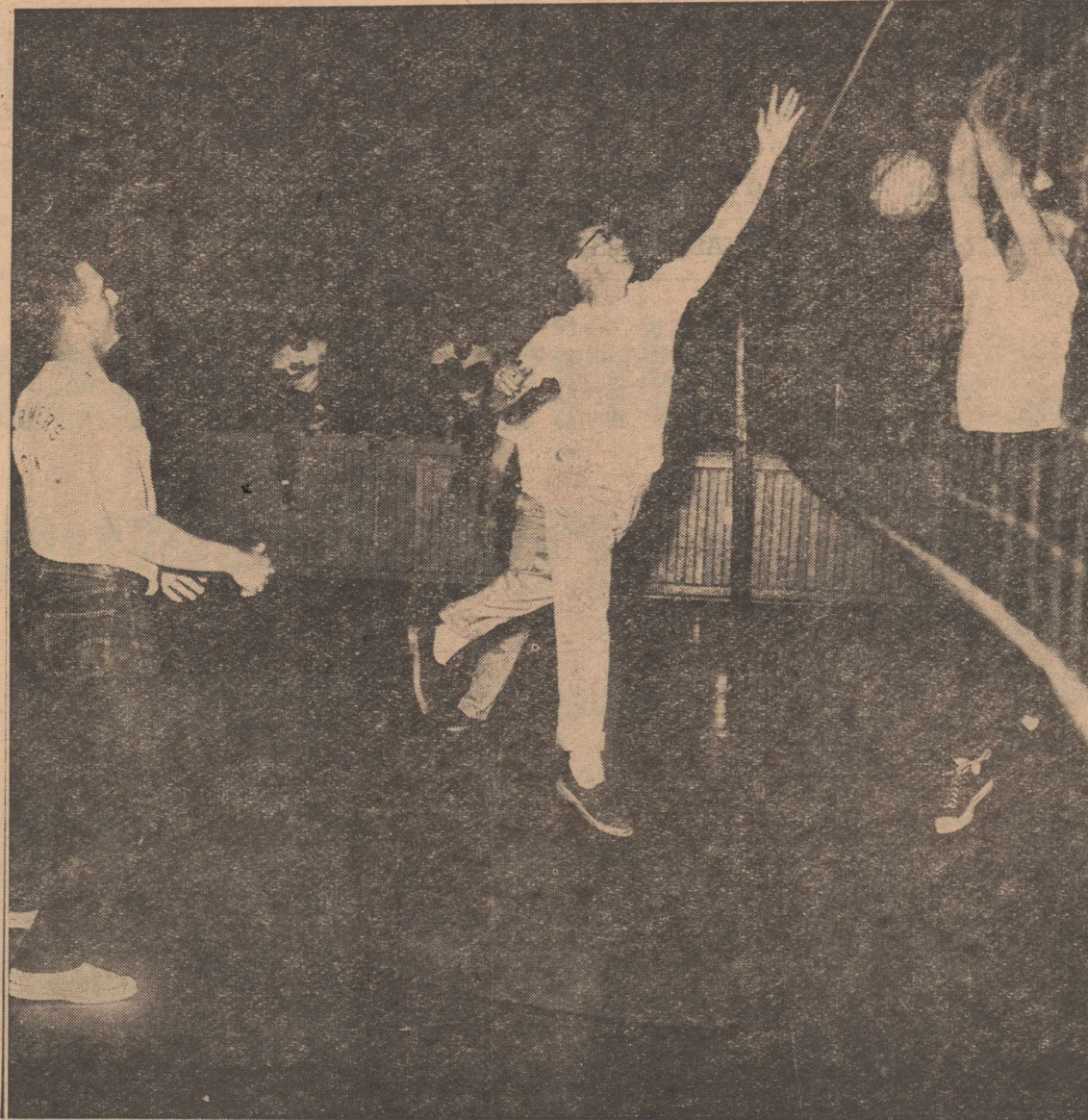
### Olton Man's Sister Dies

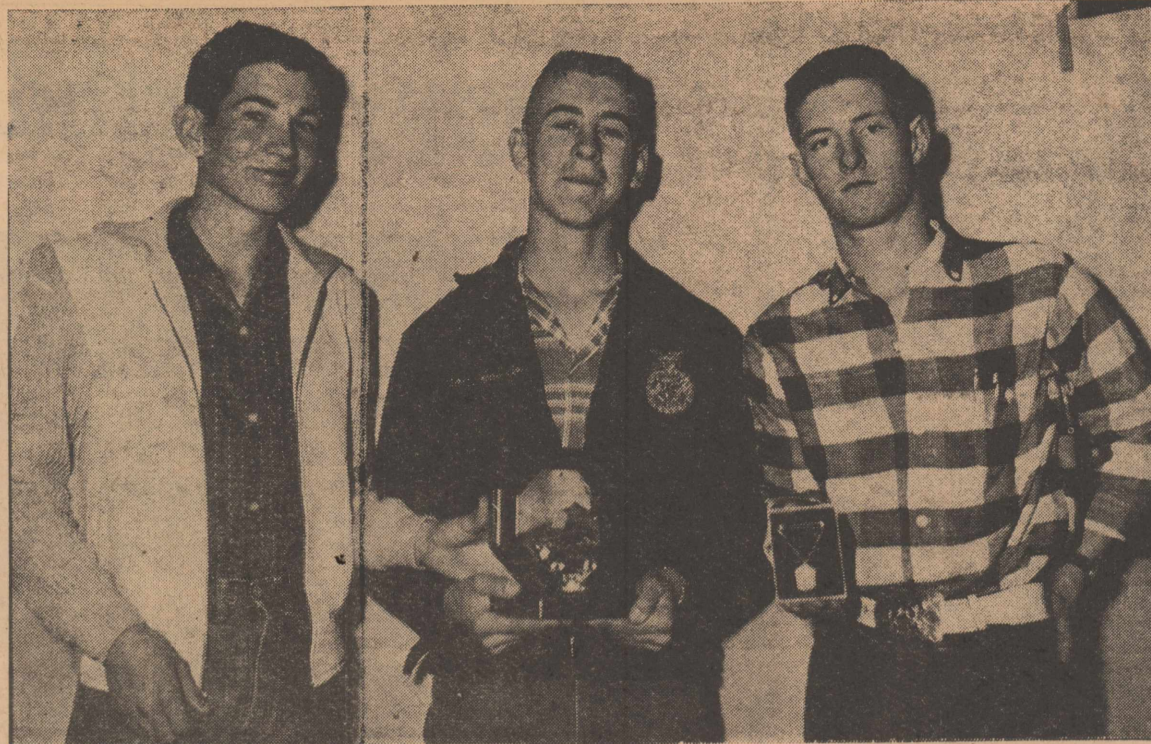

Golfing Rules Are Listed

Cleaning the Ball and Lifting an Embedded Ball

It is sometimes advisable to permit cleaning the ball and or lifting an embedded ball. On specific days when warranted, part or all of the following may be adopted as local rules:

Local Rules—Applicable Today Only

PUTTING GREEN

1. A ball lying on the putting green of the hole being played may be lifted without penalty, cleaned, and replaced on the spot from which it was lifted; in match play, the ball must be replaced immediately if the opponent so requests.

2. On the putting green, a ball which by force of impact remains embedded in its own pit-mark may be lifted without penalty, cleaned and placed as near as possible to the spot from which it was lifted but not nearer the hole; in match play, the ball must be replaced immediately if the opponent so requests. The

pit-mark should not be repaired until the players have holed out (Etiquette 7.) However, there is no penalty for repairing a pit-mark if it is not in the line of putt (Rule 35-1b) or could not affect subsequent play of the hole, or if by so doing the player does not test the putting green surface (Rule 35-1d).

3. "Through the Green" a ball which by force of impact remains embedded in its own pit-mark may be lifted without penalty, cleaned, and dropped as near as possible to the spot where it lay and must come to rest not nearer the hole. (See Rule 22.) A ball may not be cleaned "through the green" unless so embedded.

("Through the green" (Definition 34) is the whole area of the course except—  
a. Teeing ground and putting green of the hole being played;  
b. All hazards on the course.)

**Caddying Double**  
When one caddie is employed by two players, it is recommended that the following apply:

1. **Match Play**  
**SINGLE AND THREE-BALL**  
The caddie is an outside agency under Definition 22 except when he acts upon specific directions of

a player, in which case he is considered to be that player's caddie.

Instances in which he could be considered a player's caddie could arise under the following Rules, among others:

Rule 9—Advice.

Rule 16—Ball Played as It Lies and Not Touched.

Rule 17—Improving Lie or Stance Prohibited.

Rule 18—Loose Impediments.

Rule 23—Lifting Ball.

Rule 26—Ball in Motion Stopped or Deflected.

Rule 27—Ball at Rest Moved.

Rule 34—The Flagstick. The caddie is always deemed to be employed by the player of the stroke.

Rule 35-1—The Putting Green.

**Threesome, Foursome, Best-Ball And Four-Ball**

A caddie carrying double should be assigned to the members of one side.

2. **Stroke Play**  
The caddie is always deemed to

be employed by the player affected.

In foursome and four-ball competition, a caddie carrying double should be assigned to the members of one side.

3. **General: Decision by Equity**

If any point be not covered in the Rules or the foregoing, the decision shall be made in accordance with equity.
