## 'Safety Sunday' December 10

Sunday, December 10, has been designated by Governor Price Daniel as "Safety Sunday" to mark the opening of the annual Statewide Christmas - New Year's traffic safety campaign. In a special proclamation, the Governor said that "experience indicates that the solution to the traffic problem lies in the hands of the individual driver," and urged all citizens "to join in a united effort to awaken the conscience of every driver."

The Governor urged pastors of all Texas churches to "remind their members of their personal and moral responsibility to drive carefully, obey the traffic laws and to protect the sanctity of human life in our State." "Safety Sunday" has been observed by a steadily increasing number of Texas churches and church organizations since it was first proclaimed by Governor Daniel in 1958.

The special Statewide proclamation was requested by J. Lloyd Evans of Dallas, State vice-president for religious activities of the Texas Safety Association. This year, Mr. Evans will formally present the Governor's proclamation as a series of regional conferences on "Religion and Traffic Safety," to be held in Abilene, Midland, Lubbock and Amarillo. The Association and the Governor's Highway Safety Commission will make a Statewide effort to secure the cooperation of as many Texas churches and pastors as possible.

## Ten Commandments For Winter Driving

J. O. Musick, General Manager of The Texas Safety Association, today posted a list of ten "safety commandments" for motorists to observe "if they want to get through the coming winter season without a breakdown, mishap or causing a dangerous traffic blockade."

1. Flush the cooling system of your vehicle, have it checked for leaks and put in anti-freeze.
2. Make sure all tires have good treads.
3. Always carry a pair of reinforced tire chains. Though snow is not too prevalent in areas of Texas, it does occur. Sleet and ice are always a possibility. In deep snow and ice, tire chains enable you to go and stop safely, thus preventing skid wrecks and traffic tie-ups.
4. Windshield wipers should be in good condition. Wiper blades should exert an arm pressure of one ounce per inch of blade length to sweep snow and sleet off instead of sliding over it.
5. Make certain the heater-defroster is capable of keeping the windshield clear at all times. Know your heater-defroster and how to use it to prevent interior fogging.
6. Be certain both headlights work on upper and lower beams

and that stop lights, taillights and directional signals work also.

7. Have brakes adjusted, re-lined if necessary, and be sure brake linings are free of grease.
8. Tune-up your engine. A winter tune-up is essential to assure cold weather starting and to avoid stalling. Winter starting strains the battery, when its efficiency is already lower.
9. Inspect the muffler, and correct any defect - replacing it if necessary. A rusty, leaking muffler or exhaust pipe causes a carbon monoxide hazard, particularly if you become stalled in traffic or in a blizzard.
10. Install and use seat belts - good in all types of weather but especially valuable under hazardous winter driving conditions.

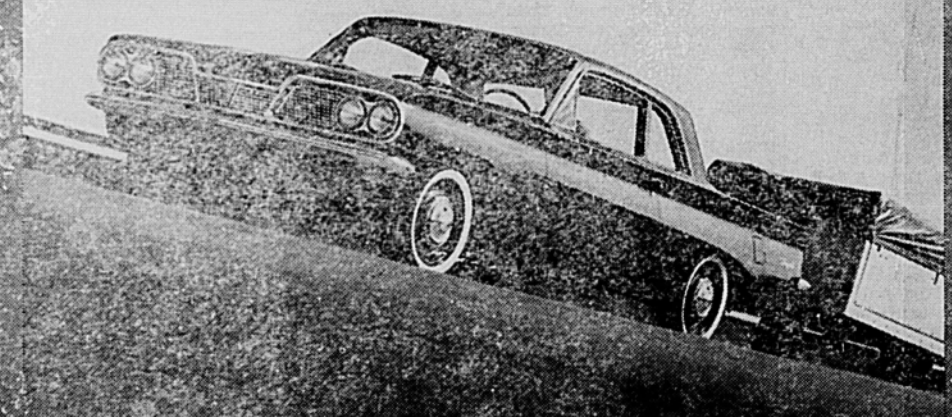

**Many Have Diabetes  
And Don't Know It**

Feeling tired lately? Hungry and thirsty all the time? Losing weight? Aches and pains in the fingers and toes? You might have diabetes.

Of course, you could have these symptoms and not have diabetes at all. It might be something else. Or, you could have diabetes and not any of these symptoms. Only your physician can tell for sure.

The American Diabetes Association tells us that about 1,250,000 Americans are walking around with diabetes and don't know it. There are another 1,500,000 diabetics who have been diagnosed and are under medical care. Almost all of these folks are leading fairly normal lives. It's those of us who have undetected diabetes that are the major concern of the American Medical Association and the ADA this fall.

November 12-18 is Diabetes Week. All over the nation communities will be putting on local Diabetes Detection Drives. The main idea is to remind all of us to go get a check up to find out whether we have diabetes.

The most likely targets for diabetes are persons who are related to diabetics, because the disease is hereditary. Other likely candidates are persons who are overweight or past 40 years old. Women are more likely to contract diabetes than men.

Diabetes can't be cured, but it can be controlled, by diet, exercise, and, when necessary, by insulin. Neglect of diabetes can lead to all sorts of complications such as heart disease, failing eyesight, hardening of the arteries, kidney disorder, gangrene, cerebral hemorrhage or diabetic coma.

There are simple tests to determine sugar content of the urine. If the test show too much sugar, the physician usually then follows up with a blood test for glucose tolerance. The best approach is to call your family doctor and tell him you want your whole family to have the diabetes test. He'll tell you what to do thereafter.

The diabetes tests are easy and painless. Don't take a chance on undetected diabetes

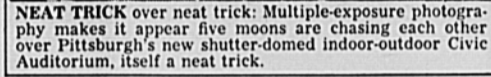

For the past 7 years, peak loads in the Abilene social security office have been in January, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager. He adds that claims filed in January are usually delayed in processing because of such high workload.

Tuley suggests that persons 62 or older planning on retiring in January or February of 1962, drop by the office to discuss possible advantages of getting their claims filed before January. With the liberalizations in the 1961 Amendments, everyone over 62 who has had three years or more of social security credits should investigate the possibility of collecting at least some retirement benefits in 1962 even though continuing to work. If expected earnings for 1962 are to be less than \$3,000, Tuley urges a discussion with a member of his staff about payment possibilities.

**Texas Farm Bureau  
Exceeds Quota**

The Texas Farm Bureau ended its fiscal year October 31, with the highest membership in its history, the organization director has announced.

Millard Shivers said the 1961 membership totaled 82,362, an increase of 1,370 over last year's figure of 80,992. This the ninth consecutive year for the state's largest farm organization to show a gain in membership, Shivers said.

The Texas Farm Bureau, by virtue of its gain this year, will retain its position as fourth largest in the nation. The state organization has been the largest Farm Bureau in the South for the past two years.

The TFB's 1961 national quota in the American Farm Bureau Federation was 81,617. This quota was exceeded by 745, making the fifth year in a row for the Texas Farm Bureau to exceed its national quota, Shivers said.

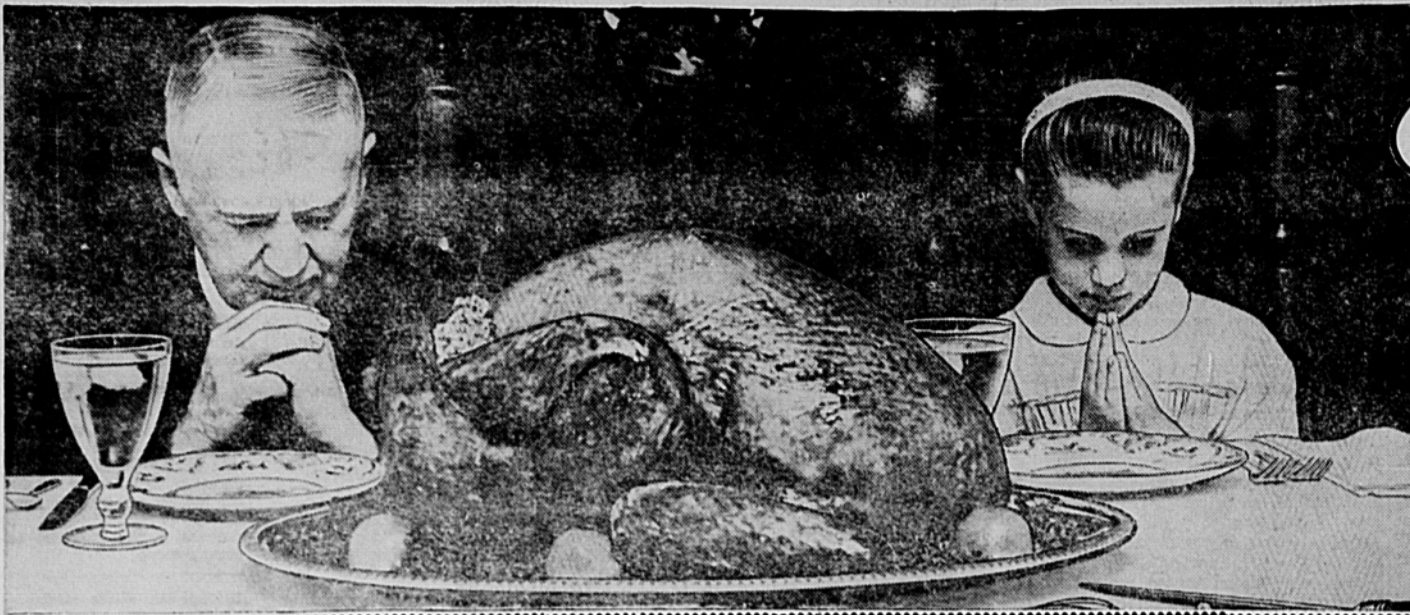
