

All Around The Town

Last week, the women of the Silverton United Methodist Church were circulating petitions asking for the restoration to each school district the right to make local decisions on the school prayer issue. The petitions were to be sent to our elected representatives.

There comes a time when people must stand up for the things in which they believe, when the judges and others who make our laws and rules are brought to realize their accountability to the people they represent.

Our school board members are caught in a difficult situation. When they took office, they swore to uphold the laws of the state and nation. In many Texas communities, however, citizens disagree with the recent court ruling that eliminates prayer at football games and other school events and are encouraging board members to ignore the court's decision.

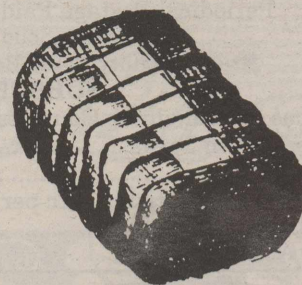
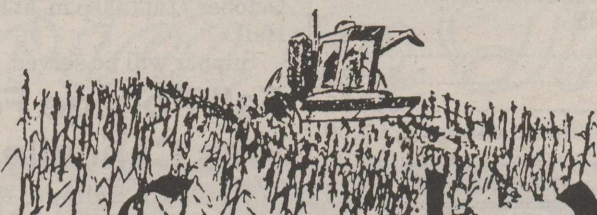
The Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in *Doe v. Santa Fe Indep. Sch. Dist.* that school districts cannot allow student-led, student-initiated prayer at football games because it violates the Establishment Clause of the United States Constitution. The Fifth Circuit Court has jurisdiction over Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi; therefore, the decision is binding on Texas school districts.

Although the court's decision has been appealed to the United States Supreme Court, school districts are responsible for complying with the Fifth Circuit Court's ruling unless the Supreme Court reverses the lower court's decision. Failure to comply with the court's ruling could result in liability to the district and to the board members, thereby diverting education resources (time, energy and dollars) away from schoolchildren.

Those who don't go to the high school football and basketball games probably aren't familiar with the content of these prayers. They don't contain anything about doctrine or religion really; they are petitions to a Higher Being for the safety of those taking part in the game and those driving home from the game, and for a general spirit of friendship, sportsmanship and fair play to prevail during the game.

Texas school boards must uphold the laws of this country; however, we are committed to finding a way to change the current laws concerning prayer at school events.

If you believe that student-initiated, student-sponsored prayer and moments of silence should be permitted at school events, please contact your state and national elected officials and ask their help in getting this unpopular law stricken from the books.

Owls Travel to Three Way To Open District Campaign

Silverton's Owls will travel to Three Way Friday night to open district action against the Eagles, who are 2-3 for the season after losing to Melrose, New Mexico 66-52 last week. The Eagles are considered one of the league's playoff contenders, and are usually tough on their district foes.

The Owls are coming off a 49-31 loss to Samnorwood here last week, but are beginning to get some of their players back into the lineup and ready to play. They have a couple of players who are out for the season and another couple who quit the team, but other than these just about everyone else is in condition to play.

Clint Ivory kicked off to open the game here Friday night and brought down the returner on the Samnorwood 32. Red Ivory knocked down an Eagle pass on third down, bringing about a fourth-down punt.

Nathan Francis completed a pass to Issac Garcia for a first down, then completed passes to Paul Segura and Daniel Reagan for another first. A pass to Segura brought about another first down, after which Francis passed to Garcia for a short gain and the ball went over to the Eagles on downs.

The Owl defense held the Eagles, but the Owls fumbled the fourth-down punt and the Eagles recovered.

Clint Ivory, Adrian Ramirez and Nicholas Vargas were providing good defense, along with others Owls, but the Eagles picked up a first down on the Silverton four. Vargas, Francis and Clint Ivory were making things hot for the Eagles, and on fourth down the ball came back to the Owls.

Francis completed two passes to Garcia to move the ball to the 19, then passed for a first down and 12-yard gain by Clint Ivory. Francis passed to Isaiah Ivory, before seeing the ball go over on downs.

This time the Eagles saw Ramirez break up one of their passes, but came back with a touchdown with 7:57 remaining in the second quarter. They ran the PAT into the endzone, to make the score 7-0.

After the kickoff, Francis ran for eight yards, then passed to Ramirez for a first down, the play

covering 23 yards. Francis passed to Clint Ivory, after which the ball went over on downs.

The Eagles threw three incomplete passes and punted out of bounds 12 yards downfield.

Francis completed a pass to Garcia before seeing an aerial intercepted by the Eagles.

This time the Eagles ran for nine yards, stopped by Clint Ivory, Garcia and Ramirez, and Reagan stopped their first-down play. They scored with 2:50 still to be played before halftime, kicked the PAT, and moved ahead 15-0.

Samnorwood kicked off, and Garcia returned for the Owls. Francis passed complete to Clint Ivory, after which he passed complete to Garcia for a first down. He passed complete to Isaiah Ivory twice, with Isaiah going into the endzone on the second one. The PAT kick was blocked, and the Owls narrowed the score to 15-6.

Clint Ivory kicked deep and Duncan Vernon and Nicholas Vargas stopped the return on the 28. After two incomplete passes,

on the 11 and scored on the next play with 36 seconds remaining before halftime. There was no PAT, and the Eagles moved into a 21-6 lead.

Ramirez recovered the onside kick on the 28, and three plays later Francis passed to Ramirez for another touchdown. The PAT kick was blocked, and with 11 seconds remaining in the first half, the Owls moved to within 21-12 of the Eagles.

The Eagles kicked off to open the second half of play, and held the Owls, causing the ball to go over on downs. Francis stopped the first play after a four-yard gain, and on the next play Francis knocked the ball loose and the Owls recovered the fumble.

Francis passed complete to Garcia, then ran for the first down. He passed to Ramirez for the touchdown with 6:32 remaining in the third quarter. The PAT was blocked, and the score became 21-18.

The Owls kicked off short, and Segura stopped the runback on the Samnorwood 23. The Eagles made a first down at midfield before scoring with 5:25 remaining in the period. There was no PAT, due to the ball being blocked

by Segura, making the score 27-18.

Samnorwood kicked into the endzone and the Owls started with a touchback. The offense was unable to move the ball, and Francis punted away with 4:04 still to be played in the third quarter.

The Eagles made a first down, stopped by Red Ivory and Ramirez, and scored with 1:55 still remaining in the third quarter. They passed for the PAT, and moved ahead 34-18.

Once again the Eagle kick resulted in a touchback. Francis ran a couple of times for about a 10 yard gain, then passed to Clint Ivory for a first down. A pass to Ramirez moved the ball nine yards, after which Francis ran into the endzone for another score. Francis passed to Reagan for the PAT, to make the score 34-25.

As the fourth quarter began, the Owls kicked off and the runback was stopped by Segura. The Eagles scored with 7:59 remaining in the game, passed for the PAT, and moved into a 41-25 lead.

The Eagles kicked off deep and Garcia returned short. The Owls were unable to move the ball, and Samnorwood got the ball on the Silverton nine-yard line. They scored with 5:49 remaining on

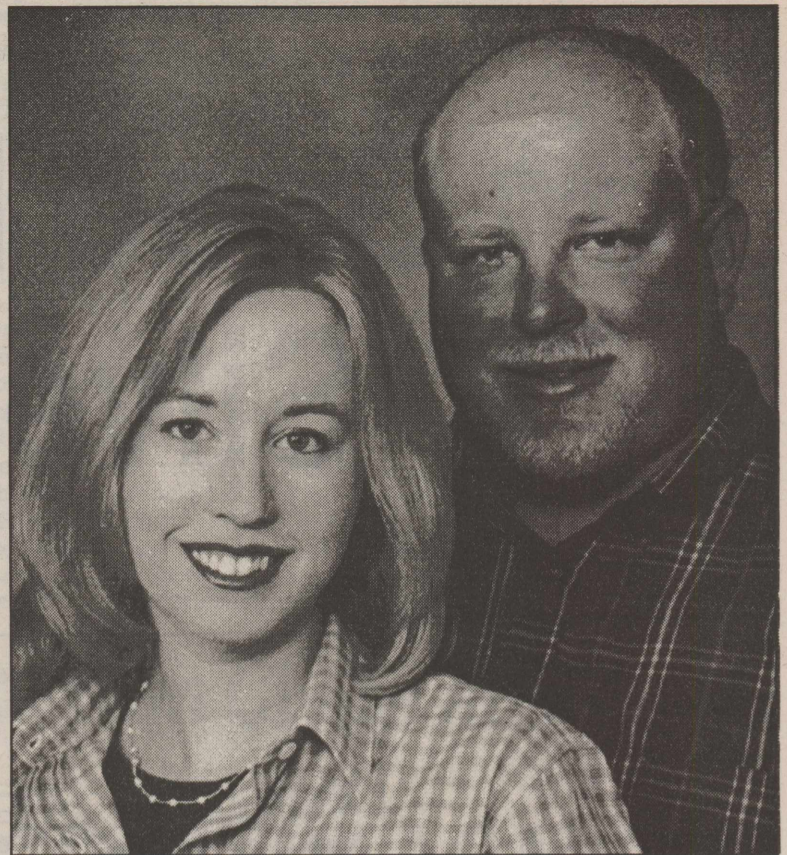
the clock, kicked the PAT, and moved into a 49--25 lead.

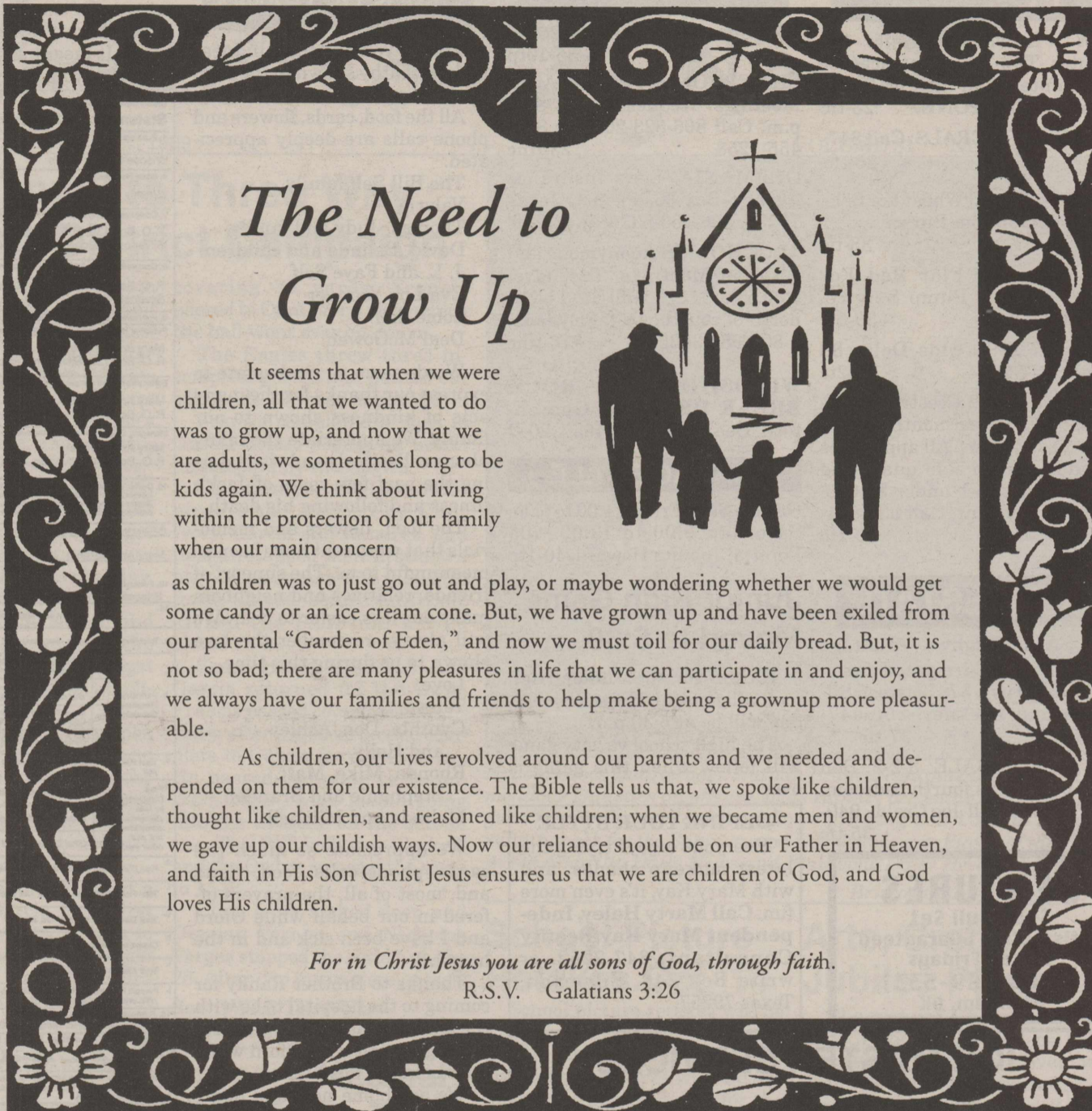
