



> They will begin at 9:00 a.m., and after taking off from 12:00 to 1:00 p.m. for lunch, will continue giving the vaccine to those over 65 and to those who have asthma, lung disease, heart condition or other serious illness as long as the vaccine lasts or until 3:00 p.m.

When more vaccine is received, they will be back to give wishes to have them. Since the vaccine is limited now, they will be giving it to those who are at highest risk.




