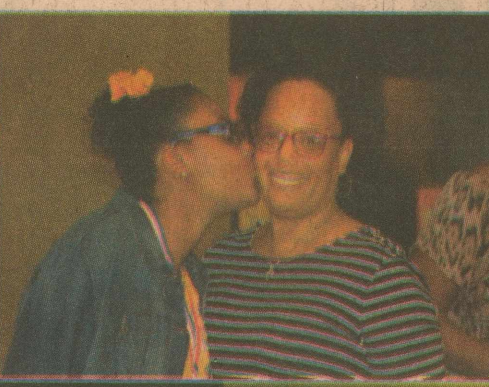
With the theme of "Rise Up", scores and scores of Lubbock citizens were in attendance of the 2018 Juneteenth Reception held at the Standard Sales Com-

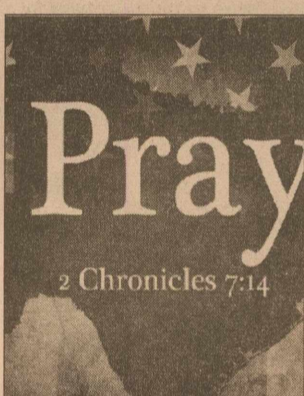
POLITICAL WAR

Afro Descendants of the Americas – Time to Organize

Portuguese explorer, Ferdinand Magellan, discovered Brazil in the year 1500 AD. The first African slaves were brought to the nation in 1525. That was the start. For the next 300+ years European nations would transport over 18 million Africans to the "New World". The legacy is full of violence – the vilest form of slavery known to humankind. Still, we survive! Today, there are more than 200 million persons of African descent living in the Americas. From Canada to Argentina we have not only survived a terrible past; we have thrived. Our blood, sweat and tears built a "Bread Basket" which provided things such as fruits, vegetables, tobacco, and sugar for the rest of the world.

There have been other forms of slavery but no other which transferred from parent to child for generations to come. Elsewhere, slavery was for the current subjects, but their children were usually born free. In the Americas we were forced to learn five principle languages: English, Spanish, French, Portuguese, and Dutch depending on which nation a colony was assigned.

As the colonies liberated themselves and formed various new nations, slavery would remain intact. Our liberation would come decades later. By the close of the 19th century most of us, Afro descendants, would become free. The final act of this freedom would be economic assimilation. However, that has yet to become fully realized. 200 million of us are spread from the tip of Canada to the bottom of Argentina. Sadly, we compose the "bottom rung" of each nation's economic ladder. No matter how rich or how

poor a nation of the Americas is the bottom component of its economy will house Afro descendants.

The above needs to change. The change will not come from civil war or in - house revolution. Bloodshed is inconvenient and unlikely to amount to pure freedom (economic or spiritually). One of our Black heroes spoke about this over 150 years ago. The Co-Founder of the American Republican Party made it clear to us. To transfer power to the point of equity and freedom, we must have a struggle. Please note the precious words of the great Frederick Douglas:

"If there is no struggle, there is no progress. Those who profess to favor freedom, yet deprecate agitation, are men who want crops without plowing up the ground. They want rain without thunder and lightning. They want the ocean without the

awful roar of its many waters. This struggle may be a moral one; or it may be a physical one; or it may be both moral and physical; but it must be a struggle. Power concedes nothing without a demand. It never did and never will...Men may not get all they pay for in this world; but they must certainly pay for all they get."

This great leader who conversed with Abraham Lincoln in a style that the equally great Dr. Martin Luther King would do with various U.S. presidents must not be forgotten. We, the Afro descendants of the Americas, have some unfinished business to complete. Our people must attain Economic Parity. That can only be accomplished through the fundamentals of Capitalism via entrepreneurship and organization. We cannot wait for it to happen. It has been more than 100 years within our nations and we have as far to go

now as we did when our journey first started (with Emancipation).

Let us, the Afro Descendants of the Americas, begin to Organize. From there we must start to Strategize. Once those two phases are accomplished we must, finally, Implement our economic freedom. Organize, Strategize and Implement must become our mantra. Let us start in unison from Canada through every nation until we complete the nation of Argentina.

If we build our own businesses and do business with each other, not only will we survive but we will thrive. This is Booker T. Washington who also dined and conversed with an American president – Theodore Roosevelt. As we go on this journey we must not get

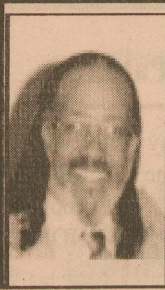

The other very important meeting is when we as a body have Bible Study on Wednesday evenings at 6:00 p. m.

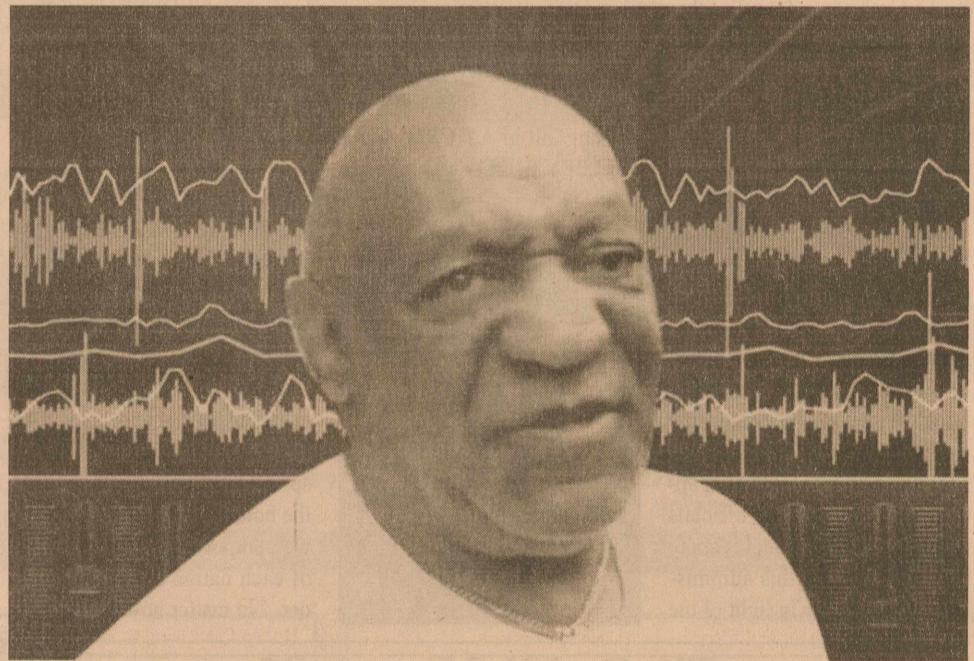
If you have missed Bible Study, then we are encouraging you to come and study with us. Shall we look for you on Wednesday evening? Hope so!!!!!!

6:10 PM PT -- Cosby's reps, Andrew V. Wyatt and Ebonee M. Benson, tell TMZ ... "No police officers entered the property nor did any officer from Montgomery County make a request that the 'live' 5-piece band for Mr. Cosby's birthday celebration, halt their music." They add ... "Mr. Cosby along with his bride (Mrs. Cosby), family and friends enjoyed beautiful jazz music to honor Mr. Cosby's 81st Birthday, however, at least 4 Montgomery County Patrol Cars are always parked outside Mr. Cosby's Philadelphia home for security purposes." Bill Cosby's neighborhood filled up with cops on the same day the comedian turned 81. Law enforcement sources tell us officers in Cheltenham, Pennsylvania received a call Thursday, July 12, 2018, for loud music on Cosby's street. We're told about 4 units responded ... a couple in front of Cosby's home and some went around back.

A witness tells us loud jazz music could be heard coming from Bill's property -- likely from a birthday party -- but once officers arrived, everything quieted down.

According to dispatch audio, the original caller said the music had been playing since 7 AM. Bill's currently awaiting sentencing after he was found guilty of 3 counts of aggravated indecent assault back in April. He could face up to 30 years behind bars for the crimes. Hall of Fame executive director: Terrell Owens won't be announced at ceremony



Terrell Owens is in the Pro Football class of 2018, but the executive director of the Hall said he won't be announced at the ceremony.

Terrell Owens has clearly hurt the Pro Football Hall of Fame's feelings.

Owens has decided to not attend the Hall of Fame's induction ceremony, even though he's part of this year's class. The HOF has said that's unprecedented. Instead, Owens has planned to give his speech at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, where he played his college ball.

Clearly that's not what the Hall's directors want. Induction weekend is a huge deal in Canton. They probably never considered that anyone would voluntarily skip their prestigious event.

So how will the Hall of Fame handle this unusual situation? In the most immature way possible. It appears they'll act like Owens doesn't exist.

How will Hall treat Owens during ceremony?

In an interview with the Talk of Fame Network, Pro Football Hall of Fame executive director Joe Horrigan said Owens will not be mentioned during the gold jacket ceremony on Friday or the induction ceremony on Saturday. It seems that if you showed up in Canton on induction weekend after being on the moon for a year, you wouldn't know Owens is in the Class of 2018.

"The focus is on the guys who are here," Horrigan told the Talk of Fame Network.

It seems that the Hall believes that to truly be in its select group, being a five-time All-Pro, finishing second in career receiving yards and second in career receiving touchdowns isn't

enough. You also have to show up and give a speech, or the Hall won't acknowledge you.

Why isn't Owens going to be there?

While Owens has never fully explained why he is skipping the induction ceremony, it seems related to his dissatisfaction with being passed over twice as a finalist before being voted in. And he was right to be angry about that.

Owens had an easy, obvious Hall of Fame resume. He was made to wait. Owens' reputation played a role. Also, some voters seemed to want to make sure Owens knew they were the ones in charge of the process and he needed to play by their rules.

Passing Owens on his first time as a finalist was wrong. Passing Owens twice was incredibly petty. Acting like Owens isn't even in the Class of 2018, just because he won't attend the ceremony, is beyond petty.

The Hall of Fame is being vindictive and punitive

It's a message from the Hall of Fame: Play by our rules or we'll act like you never got voted in. While nobody seems too happy with Owens' decision to stay away, it's still his decision. He shouldn't be obligated to go if he doesn't want to, for whatever reason. And the Hall is doing a good job justifying Owens' decision to stay away.

This isn't about keeping the focus "on the guys who are here," it's about punishing Owens for not following the Hall's rules. The Hall of Fame, like Owens, can do what it wants. It should just know that,

like snubbing Owens twice to make sure he knew his place, it's not a good look.

Rev. Jesse Jackson: California prosecutor should 'never practice law again'

The Rev. Jesse Jackson called Thursday for the disbarment of San Bernardino County's top gang prosecutor over vulgar, racist and sexist comments on social media that targeted, among others, U.S. Rep. Maxine Waters, former first lady Michelle Obama and someone shot by police.

Joining the chorus of civil rights activists condemning Deputy District Attorney Michael Selyem, Jackson said: "He has tainted every investigation he's ever touched, and that's why he should never practice law again.

barred," Jackson, a two-time Democratic presidential candidate, vowed during a news conference at San Bernardino's New Hope Missionary Baptist Church. A day earlier, civil rights activists and church leaders rallied outside the San Bernardino County Government Center demanding that all of Selyem's past cases be reviewed for potential bias or misconduct.

A spokesman for the State Bar of California said the agency cannot comment on investigations or even confirm whether a complaint has been filed against

an attorney. Lawyers who are disbarred cannot practice law for five years, after which there is a one-time chance to petition for reinstatement, said spokesman Jonah Lamb.

Since the Southern California News Group first reported Friday about Selyem's offensive social media rants, the national media has followed the story about the 12-year veteran of the San Bernardino County District Attorney's Office, catching Jackson's attention.

The longtime civil rights activist and a group of ministers gathered Thursday to demand

harsh punishment for Selyem, who is on paid administrative leave pending an internal investigation by the District Attorney's Office.

"We have a crisis in the county," said the Rev. Chuck Singleton, pastor of Loveland Church. "It's not a new crisis, but it's just showed its ugly head."

In posts on Facebook and Instagram, Selyem asked why Waters, a "loud-mouthed c--- in the ghetto" hadn't been shot, said a man shot by police was a "s--- bag" who "got what he deserved," and posted a doctored picture of the former first lady with a sign reading "Trump grabbed my penis."

"This man should not just be disciplined," Jackson said, after reading the quotes. "He must be disbarred."

"To call a congresswoman a c--- and a bitch and to say she should be shot is a threat," Jackson said. And, he warned, "Don't mess with Auntie Maxine." At a news conference Monday, District Attorney Mike Ramos said he was "offended" by Selyem's social media comments, and had ordered an internal investigation after his office received a complaint on June 28. Selyem was not placed on leave, however, until Monday, Ramos said. Twitter suspended Selyem's account, and his Facebook and Instagram accounts have been deleted.

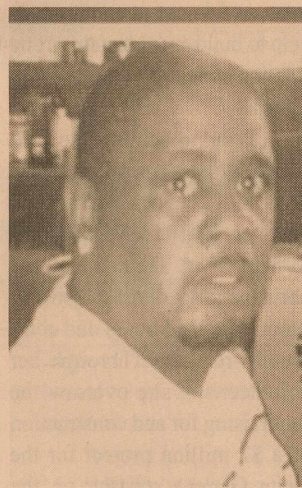

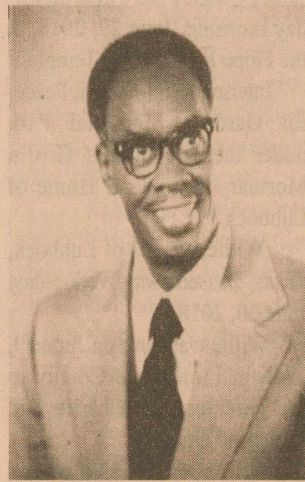

Former Sondra's Song residents awarded \$90,000 scholarships

When 19-year-old John Ever Welch learned of his award, a wave of emotions took over and left him in tears as he thought about his well-earned fortune. Welch is the third Sondra's Song resident to receive the award. The \$90,000 scholarship offered by the national Family Fellowship program Together We Rise is to provide financial support for young adults transitioning out of the foster care system. According to the organization's website, the scholarship is offered to 10 to 15 collegebound

students between the ages of 17 to 23 years old. Former Sondra's Song residents Welch and another former housemate were named 2018 recipients following in the footsteps of Tenniel-Wallace, who received the award in 2016. Welch was shocked upon learning the news. "Life got a little easier," said Welch. "I don't have to drop out of school now. I was going to, so I can make more money, and then pick classes back up. I don't have to do that anymore."

With a 3.6 GPA, Welch — who currently attends Texas Tech University — mailed in his essay and followed up with a Skype interview. From there, he flew to California for an in-person interview where he was joined by 11 students from across the nation, but he was told only 10 received the award. Sitting in the room with the other recipients, the organization's coordinator shared the good news.

"At the end," Welch said, "she just drops it, 'you all made it and will receive the \$90,000 spread over five years.'"

Wallace shared her excitement for the former residents as she is working toward her business management degree from Prairie View A&M with future hopes of attending law school upon completion. Wallace said the scholarship has allowed her to focus on school by alleviating the financial stress of college tuition.

Urging foster care youth in transition to take advantage of this program, she said it is important to take the entire process seriously.

"It may sound to good to be true," she said, "but it's a great and wonderful program to be apart of."

It seems that since the musical 'Hamilton' hit Broadway, everyone wants to know more about this historical figure from America's past.

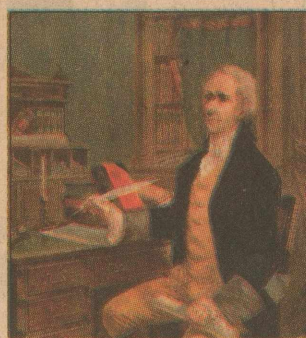

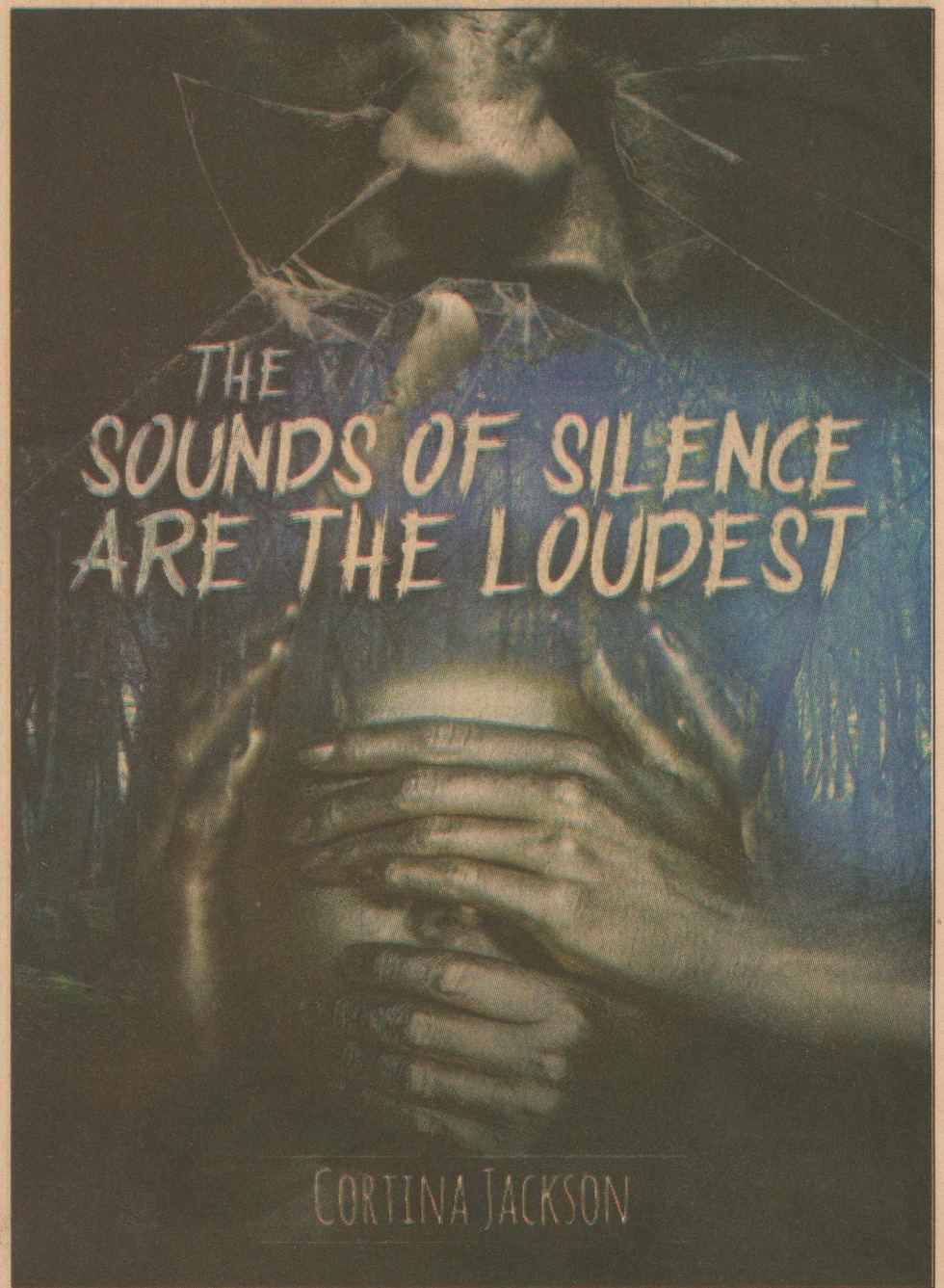
