



#### **Snake Collector**



# City Council Grants Telephone Rate Hike **OK's Increase Of 15 Per Cent**

Olton city council Wednesday granted a local rate increase of almost 15 per cent to General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

The action came in reverse order of the usual procedure and without wrangling.

In a letter mailed Tuesday, the council answered General's rate increase request with the 15 per cent proposal.

General Telephone's district manager, Bob Saunders of Littlefield, then met with the council Wednesday afternoon and told council members the proposal was acceptable. Ordinarily a telephone company




