Paving Project Contract OK'd

Lubbock Firm Gets City Job

Olton city councilmen Tuesday night awarded a contract for the city's paving program to Hodges and Tierney Co., a Lubbock paving firm. The Lubbock firm submitted a low dollar bid of \$381,677.36, compared with a figure of \$394,569.39 submitted by the next low bidder, E. D. Baker of Borger. The Hodges and Tierney bid was taken along with eight others at a meeting Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 22. Final action by the council came Tuesday night at a special session. The \$381,677.36 bid turned in by the Lubbock pavers was figured on about 125 blocks of paving. The 125 blocks includes all "possible" paving areas in the city and it is not expected that the final project will include nearly so many, councilmen said. The paving will go where the most interest is shown, and where it can be done without leaving disconnected strips, the council added. Actually, the council figures that between 65 and 75 blocks will be paved in the project. Based on 69 blocks, the total cost of the project would be about \$255,000 of which the city would pay about \$70,000. Property owners would pay the rest. The \$70,000 which the city would pay will come from the \$80,000 bond issue voted last September in an election approving the paving project. The other \$10,000 voted in the bond election will be used for maintenance and some street equipment. Actual cost to the property owner will average between \$4.16 and \$4.25 per foot, the council said. Front street footage will run slightly more and side street footage slightly less. Definite figures on per-foot cost will be known when the engineer's roll is prepared in January.

Olton Girl Scout Fund Drive Slated

A fund-raising campaign for Olton Girl Scouts will be launched here Friday. Owen Norfleet has accepted the post of neighborhood chairman of the drive. In accepting the post, Norfleet said: "One out of every seven girls in the United States is a girl scout. There's most likely one in your family or living right across the way. Girl scouts believe in the future of America; as contributing members of their communities, they belong; and they build for a bright and happy future for themselves, for their communities and their country. gram. To make their program for girls effective, they need the support of adults, parents and friends in the effort this year to obtain funds for council and camp administration. Helping the council in Olton to serve these girls is an important way of demonstrating that you

believe in the young people of today. Everyone's serious consideration and contribution will be time and money very well invested." Goals for the fund raising campaigns are set according to the number of girl scouts in an area. A goal of \$1,210 has been set for the Olton Girl Scouts because there are 121 girl scouts in this area. A "kick-off" coffee to begin the campaign will be given Friday morning at the home of Mrs. C. S. Silcott. Olton Study Club members and girl scout leaders will attend. Team captains for the fund drive are Mrs. Bill Langford and Mrs. Paul Burrus. Mrs. Burrus, vice-president of the Girl Scouts of the Caprock Council, attended the 35th National Girl Scout convention at St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 14-18. President of the national council, Mrs. Charles Umler of Libertyville, Ill., welcomed more than 10,000 delegates and guests to the convention.

Telephone Change Due April

All telephone numbers in Olton will change when new dial equipment is put into effect here April 13, 1961, Bob Saunders, district manager, said Wednesday at Littlefield. Numbers here will be in seven digits, starting with the numbers 285-, Saunders said. New equipment was being installed in a new General Telephone building here this week, in preparation for the changeover. Saunders said a temporary directory for Olton will be distributed about a week before the changeover. However, he pointed out that businesses or persons wishing changes in their present listings, besides the number itself, should notify the business office in Littlefield prior to Feb. 10, 1961. A permanent telephone directory for Olton will be distributed in September, 1961, as part of the directory covering this community and other towns in the Littlefield exchange.

OHS Band Wins Marching 'First'

Olton High School's Mustang Band has received, for the first time since 1955, the Texas Interscholastic League's top rating in marching. The 82-member marching band was one of three Class AA aggregations in Region I to be rated "Division I" at contest in Brownfield Tuesday night, Nov. 22. The band also received a first division rating in inspection. A total of 32 bands from the South Plains participated in the Region I contests, with 10 in Olton's class, Director Dick Bentz reported.

Other Class AA ratings included: Abernathy-I, Floydada I, Slaton II, Muleshoe II, Spur II, Tahoka III, Lockney III, Post III, and Morton IV. Judges were Dr. Ted Crager, West Texas State, Canyon; Bill Dean, Odessa High School; and Melvin Montgomery, Snyder High School, marching; and Bill Tregoe, Pampa High School, inspection. Marching is one of three divisions in which bands are rated.

Street decorations are partially up and plans call for the community square to be decorated by the women's clubs. Also being arranged is a home decorations contest.

Basketball Tourney Begins At OHS Gym

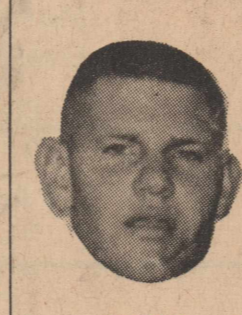

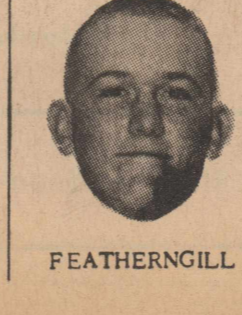

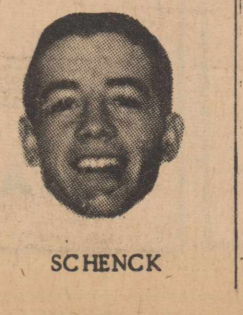

Figures Show Grid Prowess

Olton footballers rolled up an impressive record statistically in 1960 as they marched to an 11-1-0 mark for the season. This is revealed this week in a final compilation of statistics for the season. Records were kept game-by-game by Olton Enterprise staffers. Dominating the rushing statistics is Fullback Robert Priest, who gained more than 1,500 yards in 266 carries for an average of 5.8 yards a try. Randle Buchenau, speedy halfback, averaged 6.1 yards on a little more than 100 carries. Priest led the scoring with 103 points, while Buchenau had 93. Both were seniors this year. However, the Mustangs will get nine boys back for the 1960 squad. Returning will be Backs Gary DeBerry, Johnny Schenck, Charlie Burrus, George Jones and James Loveless, Centers Robert Duncan and George Phillips, Guard Johnny Conder, and End Jimmy Lawson.

Allotments On Cotton Due Soon

Operators of upland cotton farms in Lamb County should receive official notice of their 1961 farm acreage allotments through the mail within the next few days, Chairman Bud Vann of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee said, Wednesday. Growers will vote at local polling places Tuesday, Dec. 13, on the upland cotton program for 1961, and allotments are being mailed to reach all growers before referendum day, Vann said. In a change from the programs in effect for 1959 and 1960, each farm operator will receive only one allotment for 1961. This will represent the farm's share of the national upland cotton acreage allotment of 18 1/2 million acres. The allotment determines the effect of marketing quotas on the individual farm, Vann pointed out. If marketing quotas take effect as a result of a two-thirds favorable vote in the referendum, cotton from compliance farms may be marketed without penalty and is eligible for the full available rate of price support. Even if quotas are disapproved, compliance with the acreage allotment will determine eligibility for the lower rate of price support available. The Enterprise will begin printing all letters to Santa starting Dec. 8. Letters will be accepted between now and Dec. 15. Santa says: "Just drop your note to me, care of the Enterprise, and I'll be sure to get it."

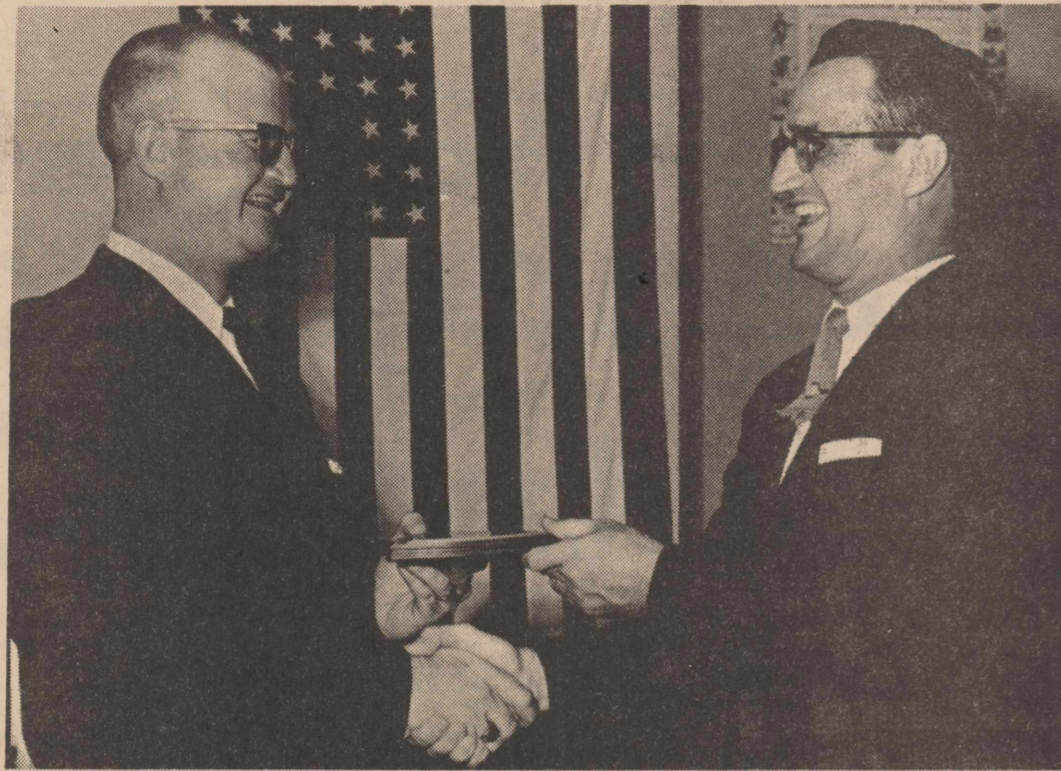

Also pushing for starting berths are John Smith, senior, and Jack Witten, junior.

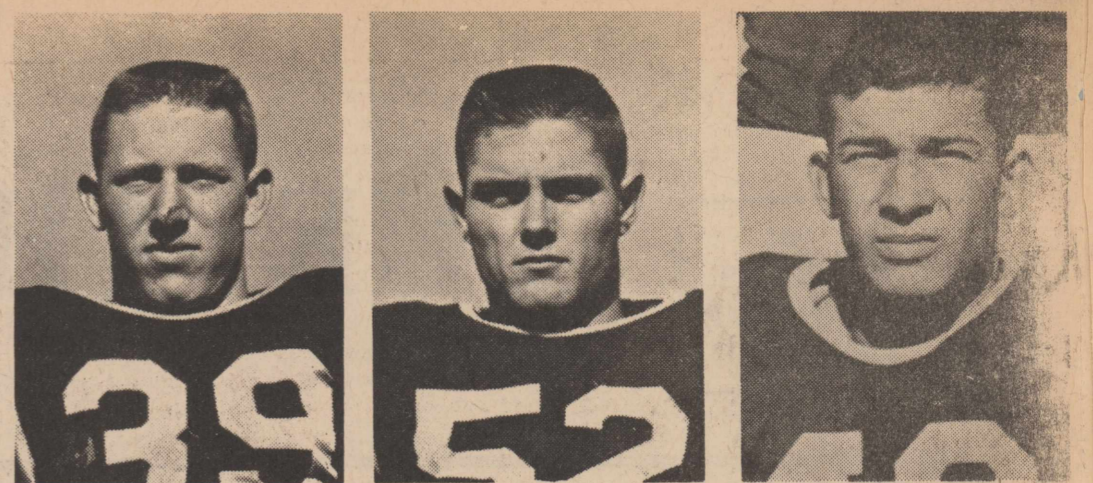

 "My hobby is one that I really enjoy doing and it is something that never grows old to me," says Mrs. A. D. Melton as she tells of her interest in growing and working with flowers and making floral arrangements.

One of those fortunate persons with a "green" thumb, Mrs. Melton has a large collection of houseplants which includes begonias, African violets, foliage plants and cactus.

She specializes in African violets and has many different varieties of these plants. Mrs. Melton has been raising violets the past 10 years.

Another factor which contributes to the success she has with her flowers and plants is the co-operation of her husband, Mrs. Melton said, "My husband certainly goes a long way in helping me grow my flowers—I couldn't do it without his help."

Mrs. Melton also stated, "I have always grown lots of flowers and have enjoyed working with them—especially since we moved to the plains where we have lots of water."

The Meltons moved to Olton 31 years ago from Childress. When they first moved to Olton, they settled near the present site of the Olton Recreation Center. They have lived at their present home 1 1/2 miles southwest of town since 1935. Melton is a retired farmer.

Mr. and Mrs. Melton have two daughters, Mrs. R. H. Perry and Mrs. Richard Perry, who both live in Detroit, Mich. A daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ellen Melton, lives in Lubbock and is attending Tech. The Meltons have 10 grandchildren.

They also provided a home for two nephews, Buster and Ray Melton, who live in Amarillo. Mr. and Mrs. Melton raised them from the time they were little boys until they were grown men.

Mrs. Melton has been a member of the Olton Garden Club for 24 years and she is one of three charter members. In 1959, she was nominated as "Clubwoman of the Year."

She has held various offices in the club, including reporter, president and secretary. Now serving as president, it has been 15 years since she last served in this position.

Although Mrs. Melton confesses that she likes to make almost any kind of flower arrangement, she now is particularly interested in making Oriental arrangements and line arrangements.

A participant in flower shows which have accredited judges, Mrs. Melton says that the best way to learn about making arrangements is to be a clerk in a flower show and listen to the judges discuss the different arrangements.

Several helpful pointers about making successful flower arrangements were given by Mrs. Melton. "Color is very important in making arrangements as well as the accessories and containers used. Placement also plays an important part and knowing where the arrangement will be used, if it will be used on a mantle, a dining table or some other place."

Mrs. Melton received a diploma in floristry last February and she has assisted in the local flower shop for one year. Also she has given lectures to the home economics classes at Littlefield and Olton and she has shown her original flower arrangements to the classes.

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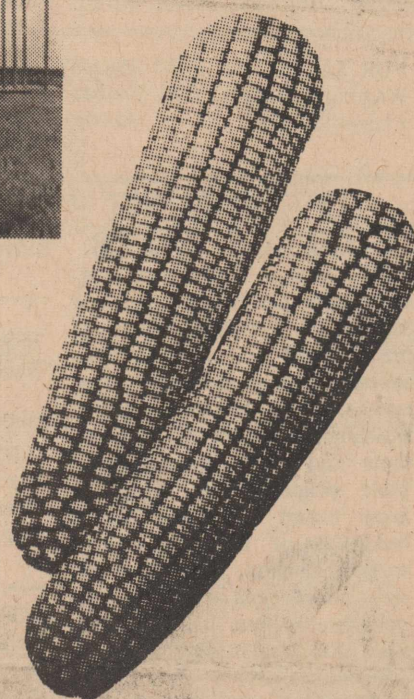
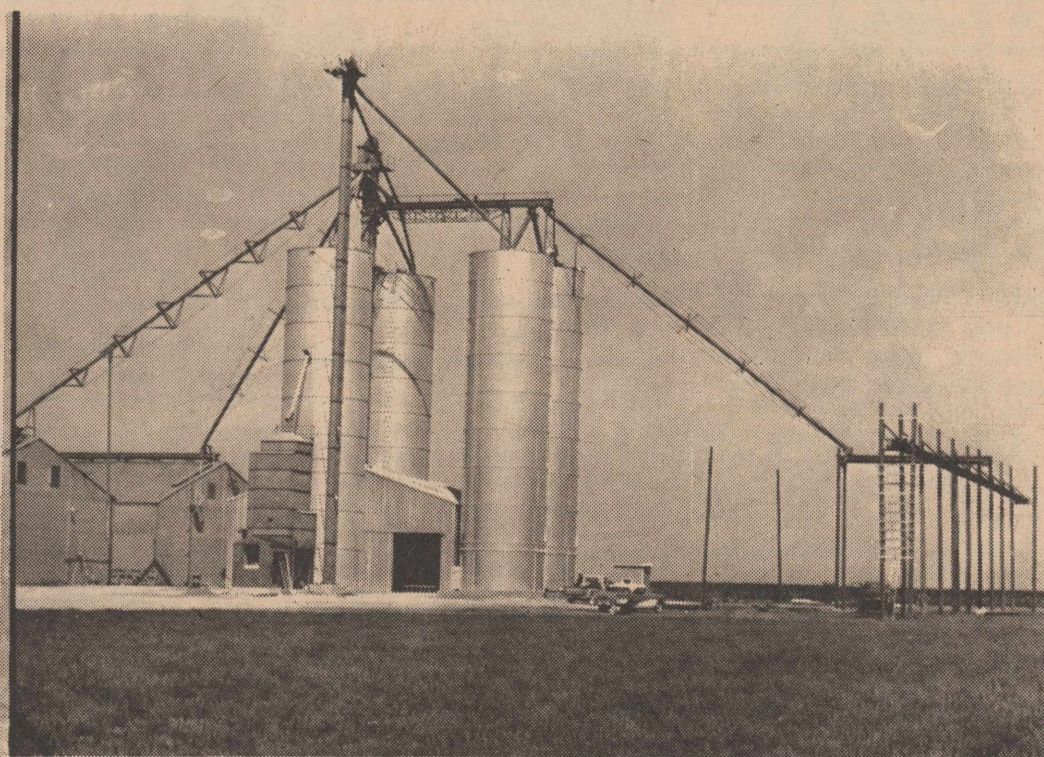

County Agent's Corner

Irrigate From Lakes

Recent rains filled many lakes. Moisture during October amounted to very good pre-planting irrigation for next year in most of the High Plains. Less preplanting irrigation water from wells will be needed next spring as a result.

Water from about 2,000 of these lakes was pumped direct onto crops in 1960. Centrifugal pumps, which fit the situation of low lift, high volume, are used on these lakes. These pumps are relatively cheap to buy and very economical to operate.

Naturally the best place for rainfall is in the soil itself. However, we get some quick rains in such volume that the soil will not take the water fast enough. As a result, lakes fill. Organic matter on sloping soil will increase intake rate of water and accumulate less lake water.

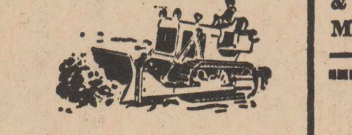

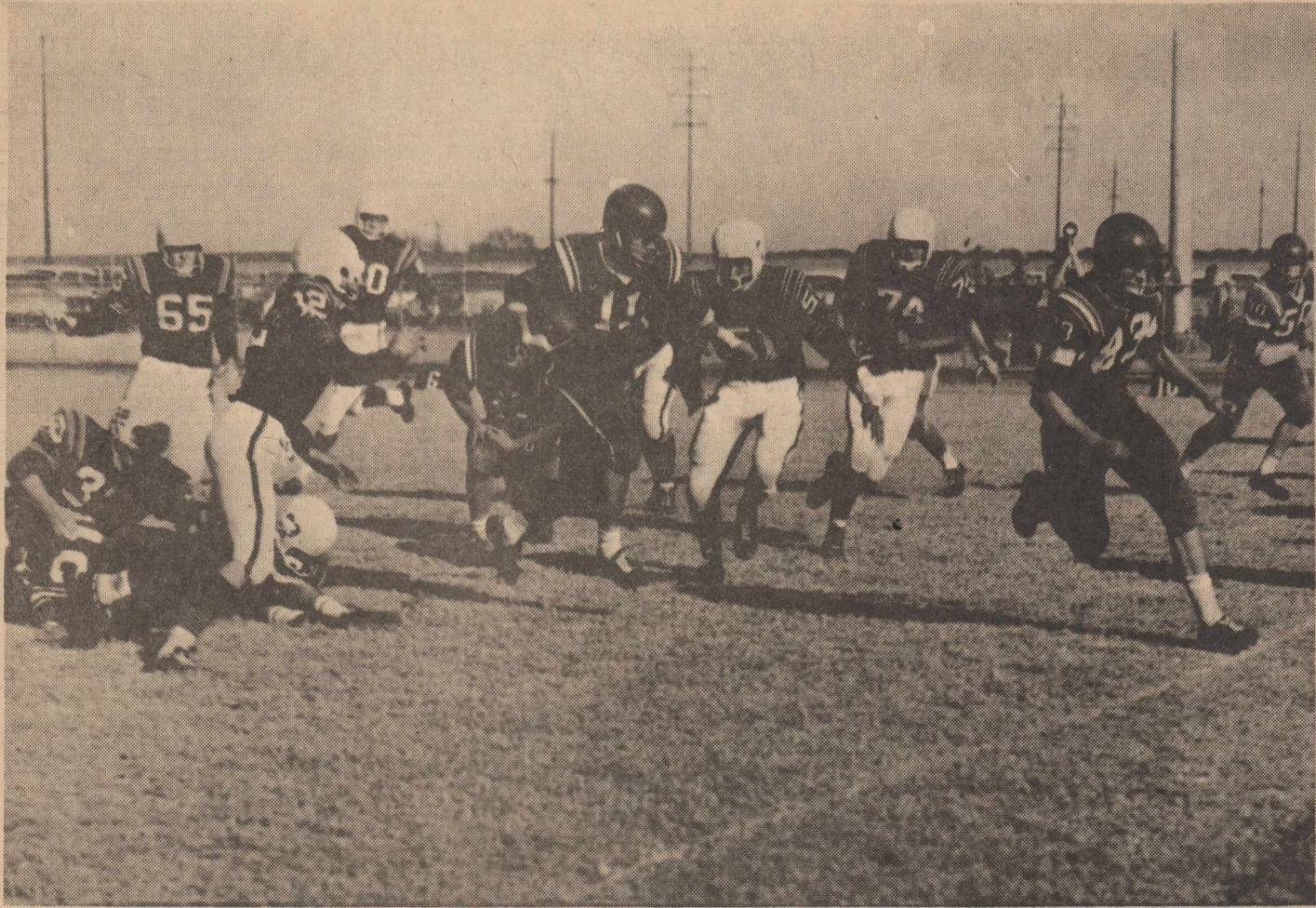

Mustangs Hang Up Gear

Denver City, led by a wild horse named Bert Gravitt, thundered past Olton, 58-0, last Thursday at Brownfield, capturing the regional AA championship and advancing to the state quarterfinals.

Olton's Mustangs were no match for the Big Red as they had their poorest day of the season.

Outweighed heavily, Olton found it was in for a long afternoon early in the game. Quarterback Gravitt scored the first of three touchdowns with 4:49 left in the first period, and from then on, there seemed to be no end.

Olton's offensive, which no one could stop during the Ponies' 11 straight victories

prior to Thanksgiving Day, never got started.

The one ray of hope for Olton came as time ran out at the half. Little Johnny Schenck, a 130-pounder, almost broke away, running 23 yards to the Denver City 28. The horn sounded before the Ponies could run another play.

Schenck's run was Olton's longest gain for the day and it was the Mustangs' deepest advance into Denver City territory.

Only one other time, in fact, did Olton move into Denver City's half of the field. Big Robert Priest gained a yard to the Denver City 49 late in the second quarter, giving Olton a first down at that point.

A moment later, Denver City drove the Mustangs back into the Olton end of the field.

It was a day of disappointments for the Mustangs. Robert Duncan, Olton's fine linebacker, was hurt early in the game and never approached the performance he usually turns in.

Fullback Priest was pounded hard every time he touched the ball and wound up with only 25 yards gained in 13 carries.

Despite the vicious offense displayed by Denver City, Olton did have a few bright spots in its defensive play. Bobby Brown, playing middle guard at times and linebacker on other occasions, was in on 12 tackles during the first half and had a hand in most of them during the last 24 minutes.

Olton found it couldn't go against the heavier Denver City line shortly after the opening kick-off.

The Ponies gained a first down at their own 15 as Rande Buchenau picked up five yards and Priest gained five in two carries.

Frankie Miller gained four and Priest picked up two more. On third down, Buchenau got three yards but missed the first down, Buchenau got three yards but missed the first down by a yard, Priest punted 46 yards

to the Denver City 30 and the Yoakum County team was on its way.

Denver City used short gains to move to the Olton 21.

Then Gravitt broke over left tackle for the touchdown. He again hit the left side for the extra points and Denver City led, 8-0, with 4:49 left in the first quarter.

After the kick-off, Olton moved to another first down, with Priest and Buchenau picking up four yards apiece and Miller getting another three. The Mustangs moved out to their own 35, but on fourth down still needed six, so Priest kicked 50 yards to the Denver City 15.

Three plays later, Gravitt ripped off 57 yards for a touchdown and Don Kinder ran the extra points to make it 16-0 with only a few seconds left in the first quarter.

Buchenau was able to run only to the Olton 5 after taking the kick-off in the end zone.

On the first play of the second quarter, Priest fumbled, then picked it up, but the Big Red was on top of him for a safety, making it 18-0.

Midway in the second period, Denver City moved to another score, with Gravitt's 22-yard run to the Olton 18 setting it up. Johnny Fulbright scored from the one to make it 24-0.

The Mustangs almost got something going after the kick-off, Buchenau turned in a 13-yard run to the Olton 49, but a penalty, incomplete pass and a fumble halted the Ponies.

Olton held Denver City at the Big Red's 24 with some good defensive work by Brown and

End Fred Riney.

After taking a punt at the Olton 41, the Mustangs got a first down at the Denver City 49, with Priest's 7-yard pickup the big gain.

On the first down, however, Denver City trapped Buchenau for a two-yard loss.

On second down, Schenck fumbled, picked up the ball, then managed to evade a host of Denver City tacklers and run to the Big Red's 28 as time ran out in the half.

On the first play from scrimmage in the second half, Gravitt ran 71 yards for a touchdown that seemed to break Olton's back, Denver City led, 30-0, and from then on it was only a matter of how high the score would go.

After Gravitt's run, Olton took the kick-off, ran three plays and Priest went back to kick. The boot was blocked, Denver City taking over at the Olton 35. Six plays later Denver City

had another touchdown, with Gravitt passing 18 yards to End Bucky Johnson on a fourth down play. Marcel Dorethy kicked the point and it was 37-0, with eight minutes left in the third quarter.

On another Olton punting situation a few moments later, Buchenau was downed on his own 22 and Denver City's second unit took over.

Olton, aided by a 15-yard penalty against the Big Red, thwarted Denver City this time, with Brown dropping Quarterback Joe Esparza for a two-yard loss on a fourth-down play.

Three plays later, however, Tommy Jones swiped a Schenck pass and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown, Dorethy kicked the point and it was 44-0.

Denver City recovered a fumble on the kick-off, taking over at the 14. Four plays later, on the first play of the fourth quarter, Don Kinder scored from the four to make it 50-0. Dorethy kicked the point.

Denver City got its last touchdown after a 33-yard punt return by Gravitt to the Olton 20. Pat Hubbard scored the touchdown from the three. Dorethy kicked the point to make it 58-0.

Denver City banged at the Olton goal two more times, but the ailing Duncan stopped one march at the seven with a fumble recovery and Brown's defensive play halted the other drive at the 19.

Brown moved to fullback the last two times the Mustangs had the ball and picked up 10 yards in three carries. Priest was hurt with about five minutes left in the game, after picking up a five-yard gain on his last carry in high school ball. Ten other seniors played their last game for Olton High. They were Brown, Buchenau, Miller, Ron Rogers, Harold Featherngill, Larry Timmins, Eddy Lovelless, Kenneth Hooper, Wendell Scribner and Fred Riney.
