## Hedges Is LCC Fund Drive Head

Buddy Hedges has been named county chairman for Lamb County in the Lubbock Christian College \$2,000,000 fund-raising campaign. The campaign is being carried on to improve and enlarge the campus and \$300,000 is needed Dec. 31 when the land option expires. To date Lamb County has reached 25 per cent of its \$64,200 goal.

The money is needed to acquire 229 additional acres for future expansion and school officials feel the land is worth more than double the option price of which it can be purchased.

Included in the campaign is the payment of campus indebtedness, building a men's dormitory and completing a plant fieldhouse which will be one of the largest in the nation. The campaign will continue until all these goals are reached. Approximately 114 men have been selected to serve as county chairmen for the school covering a wide area of West Texas and New Mexico with each county given a goal. Working with Hedges as Olton chairman is Don Williams. Alton Hollingsworth heads the drive at Springlake.

## Olton: 68-0

## Cotton Quotas Get Landslide Approval

Olton and area cotton farmers joined the rest of the nation Tuesday in approving marketing quotas on the 1961 crop.

Lamb County as a whole voted for the quotas, 704-28. The turnout was about 100 more than voted in 1959.

Olton farmers unanimously endorsed quotas, voting 68-0. At Springlake the vote was 27-1 for quotas, and at Spade and Hart Camp, the vote was 68-2, for.

Marketing quotas have been proclaimed both upland and extra long staple cottons as required by law. However, the quotas would not have become operative unless approved by at least two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum.

All growers received, prior to the referendum, official notice of their 1961 farm acreage allotments. The allotments determine the marketing quotas for the individual

farm. In a change from the programs in effect for 1959 and 1960, each farm operator received only one allotment for 1961. This represented the farm's share of the national upland acreage allotment of 181 1/2 million acres.

As a result of Tuesday's vote, all cotton from compliance farms will be marketed without penalty and will be eligible for the full available rate of price support. If quotas had been disapproved, compliance with the acreage allotment would have determined eligibility for the lower rate of price support available.

During the past two years, farm operators had a choice between regular allotment and price support rate and a larger allotment at a reduced rate of support. However, the law that provided this special program applied only to the 1959 and 1960 crops.

## 8-Inch Snowfall Estimated

Eight inches of snow, highways made slick by ice, fields left muddy by moisture and chilling cold slowed activity to a crawl in the Olton area during the past week.

In town, many events were postponed by the weather and on the farm, fields were too soggy to allow farmers to get in and finish the cotton harvest.

Temperatures dipped to as low as 13 degrees last weekend following a six-inch snow last Friday.

Despite the cold and moisture, which alternately turned to slush in the daytime and ice at night, shoppers started their Christmas buying.

Just about everybody was hopeful that pretty weather would return, but late Wednesday afternoon it didn't look that way. Skies became cloudy after an afternoon of sunshine.

Approximately 1,500 to 2,000 bales of cotton were ginned off yards at six ginning firms in the Olton area during the week.

This raised the ginnings total to about 34,000, surpassing the total of 33,000 last year.

Ginners estimate that approximately 2,000 bales remain to be harvested in the Olton area. Another 1,000 bales are estimated to be on gin yards, waiting for better weather before processing continues. Some gins are caught up.

Despite the fact that little cotton remains in the fields, farmers were anxious for good weather so they can finish up.

The six-inch snow of last Friday was followed by drizzle over the weekend and more snow, about two inches, Tuesday. All told, observers estimated more than an inch of moisture for the week.

No auto accidents were reported during the week in Olton or in the immediate vicinity, despite the fact that roads were slick as glass.

Bad weather forced postponement of Christmas parties planned by the Garden Club and Study Club and rubbed out

## Switchman Loses Legs In Rail Mishap

W.R. (Bill) Evans, 49, of Sterley, a switchman for the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad, was seriously injured about 12:35 p.m. last Friday when he was pinned behind a derailed boxcar at Hart. Evans' legs were amputated as a result of injuries received in the mishap. He also suffered a broken shoulder. The accident occurred while Evans was flagging a boxcar loaded with sheetrock on the house track just west of the

Hart Depot. The car was derailed, pinning Evans against a loading dock. Dr. Jack Harris of Hart attended Evans until a Dennis Ambulance, Dimmitt, arrived. A Plainview bone specialist performed surgery. Evans is married and the father of six children. Cause of the accident was unknown, but a four-inch covering of snow on the track may have contributed to derailling of the box car.

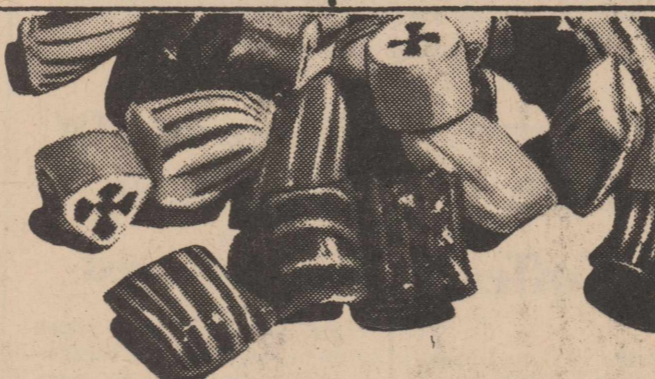

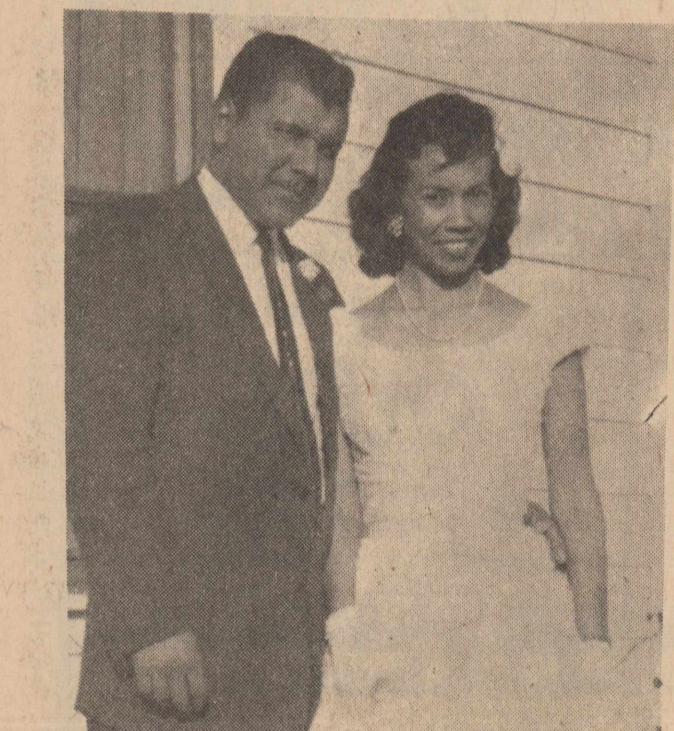

## It's Good Thing Santa Doesn't Have To Use Highways

Santa has never failed to make his rounds yet, possibly because he uses an air-borne sleigh for transportation. But judging from the record, if the jolly old gent had to use Lamb County highways, he might not get to your house for Christmas.

So far this year, automobile accidents have killed six persons, injured 55, and have caused property damage amounting to \$63,585 in this county.

In November the Highway Patrol investigated 16 accidents in this county. These wrecks accounted for one person killed, five injured, and property damage of \$8,352.

"Ninety-seven persons were killed in Texas automobile mishaps during the Christmas-New Year holiday period last year," Highway Patrol Sergeant D. S. Lawson of Littlefield warned. "Sixty-eight per cent of these deaths occurred on rural roads and highways. Therefore, motorists should drive with caution when making holiday trips this year."

The Department of Public Safety has predicted 90 traffic deaths during the 1960 Christmas holiday season. But in an effort to reduce that grim

figure, the Department of Public Safety has assigned all officers to round-the-clock duty using all means available to rid the highways of those twin menaces to public safety—the drinking driver and the speeding driver.
