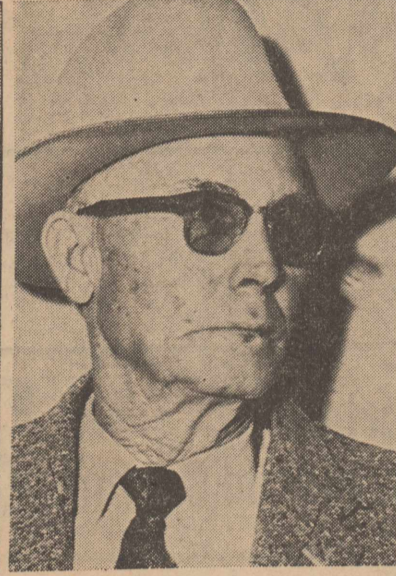

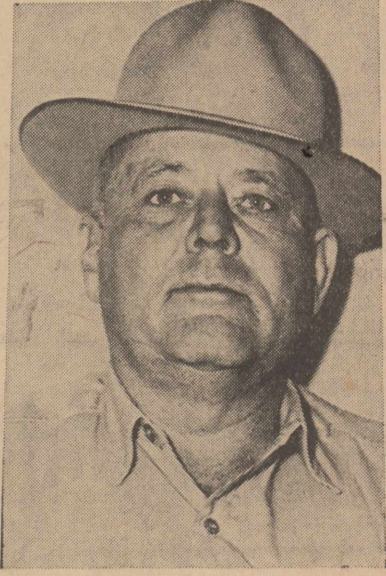

MORE THAN 200 PROJECTS ON DISPLAY

Hundreds View Exhibits At Olton's Science Fair

"In science, truth is truth regardless of the opinion of the multitude" was the motto of budding scientists competing in the first Science Fair staged in Olton Schools.

Some six hundred parents and students viewed the array of science exhibits in the elementary building Friday and Saturday.

In looking over the 227 projects displayed, one parent was overheard to admit, "I can understand the first grades' project, but after that it's all beyond me."

This evident lack of scientific knowledge among parents and students, had led Classroom Teachers' Association and science teacher, James Caley, to realize the need for a school-wide Science Fair.

Increased interest and knowledge gained from this project has spurred sponsors into planning the Science Fair as an annual event. Caley stated he hoped to organize

the affair to coincide with Public School Week. He encouraged students to begin planning projects to exhibit next year.

High School Science Club served as hosts for the Fair. Committee members included Messdames J. W. Russell, Ruby Sturch, J. W. Dale and M. G. Fisher; and Messrs. Caley, Fred Gordon, Roscoe Trostle and Morrison Asman.

Local rules, divisions and point scoring used in the Fair were the same as those used in the National Fair. Elementary, Intermediate, Junior, and Senior Divisions were designated. Each entrant received a participation award and rating. Ratings included Gold Star, first, second and third place.

Judges for the scientific displays were Gene Phillips, Seagraves; Gordon Creel, Plainview; and Roscoe Thomas, Olton. Projects were judged on the basis of scientific thought, creative ability, thoroughness, clarity and dramatic value and technical skill, in that order of importance.

A possible total of 100 points was the standard used in scoring. Mrs. Fred Gordon's third grade

Six Seek Three Council Posts; Four Offer Selves For Mayor

Olton voters will elect a mayor and three council members next Tuesday.

Running for the office of mayor, left vacant last December by the resignation of D. Y. Ray, are Basil Sherman, Major James, Edd Hestand and Lefty Hollingsworth.

In the race for city council are W. A. Cure, Carroll Cox, Lynn Fite, Clovis Poteet, Marshall Stone and Charles A. McClain. Retiring members of the council are, T. M. Campbell, Major James and A. D. Adams.

Rather uneventful, for Olton where city politics usually are taken seriously, have been the days immediately preceding the election. If any "politicking" has gone on at all, it has been done quietly.

Leaflets Rumored

There was persistent rumor at press time this week that the political cold war might turn hot in the waning hours before balloting. Rumor had it that Olton would be flooded with leaflets in last-minute campaigning Monday night or Tuesday morning of next week.

Most interest is focused on the

mayorality election.

Mr. Sherman, an Olton groceryman, has never held a political office. He is a past-president of Olton Lions Club and was active in forming of Olton Recreation Center.

Mr. James is a past-president of Olton Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture. He has served one term as a member of the city council.

Mr. Hestand has lived in Olton for the past 10 years, having moved here from Springlake. He is a past commander of the Olton American Legion Post and an elder in the Church of Christ.

Mr. Hollingsworth is a former mayor of Olton, having served in that office three terms. As a write-in candidate, he opposed D. Y. Ray in the mayorality election last year. Mr. Hollingsworth operates a service station here.

Turning again to the council race, successors for A. D. Adams, T. M. Campbell and Major James will be selected from a field of six candidates.

Mr. Cure is a farmer. He is a member of the Olton fire department and is active in Masonic work.

Mr. Stone also is a farmer and a member of the Olton fire department. Like Mr. Cure, he is active in Masonic affairs.

Carroll Cox is a former member of the city council. As president of Olton Recreation Center its first two years of existence, he spearheaded most of the worthwhile undertakings of that organization during his tenure. He is manager of Higginbotham-Bartlett Company here.

Mr. Poteet is a farmer and is active in Olton Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture. He is chairman of the Chamber committee on agriculture and has been instrumental in securing new cash crops for Olton.

Mr. McClain is a member of the Olton fire department and is in the insurance business.

Lynn Fite is a former member of the city council and a former member of Olton Recreation Center board of directors. He is active in civic affairs of the town. He is an osteopathic physician.

Howard Hall, election judge, said the polls will open at 8 o'clock next Tuesday morning at city hall and will close at 7 o'clock Tuesday evening.

Mr. Hall will be assisted as election judge by G. T. Sides. Election clerks are Mrs. Era Mae Walthall and Mrs. Ann Blythe.

Mr. Vaughn had been in failing health since he was ill with influenza about two months ago. He suffered a heart condition and coronary failure was listed as cause of death.

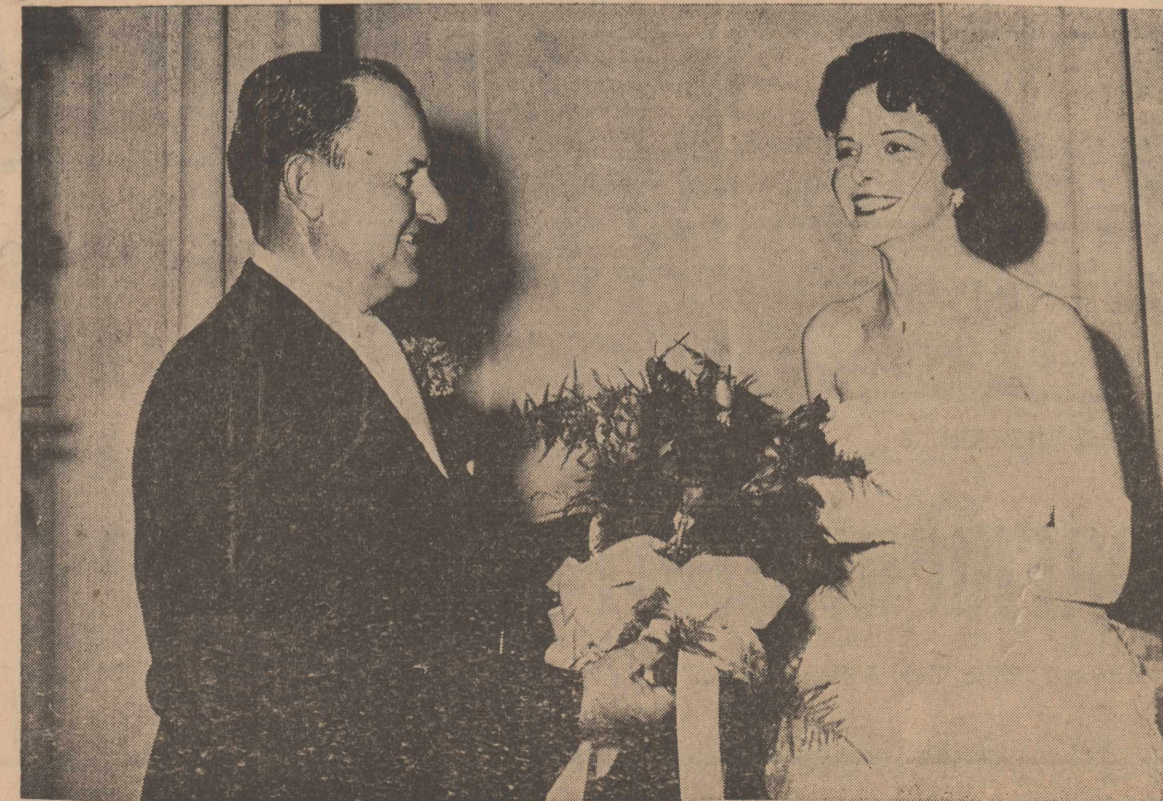
Mr. Vaughn had lived in Olton for the past four years. He moved here from Carlton. He was a retired farmer and was a member of the Baptist Church.

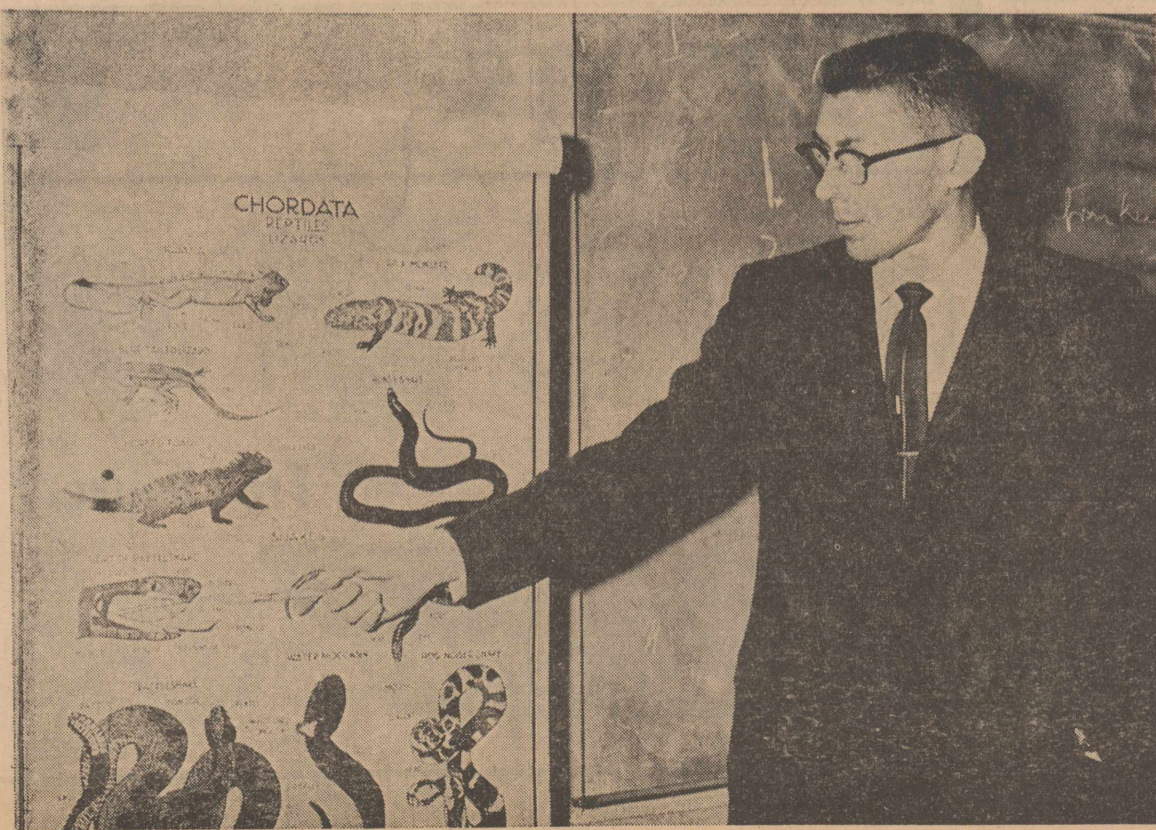
Son of a printer, Jim himself feels at home with printers ink smeared across his hands and face. He held several jobs as a printer while working his way through school.

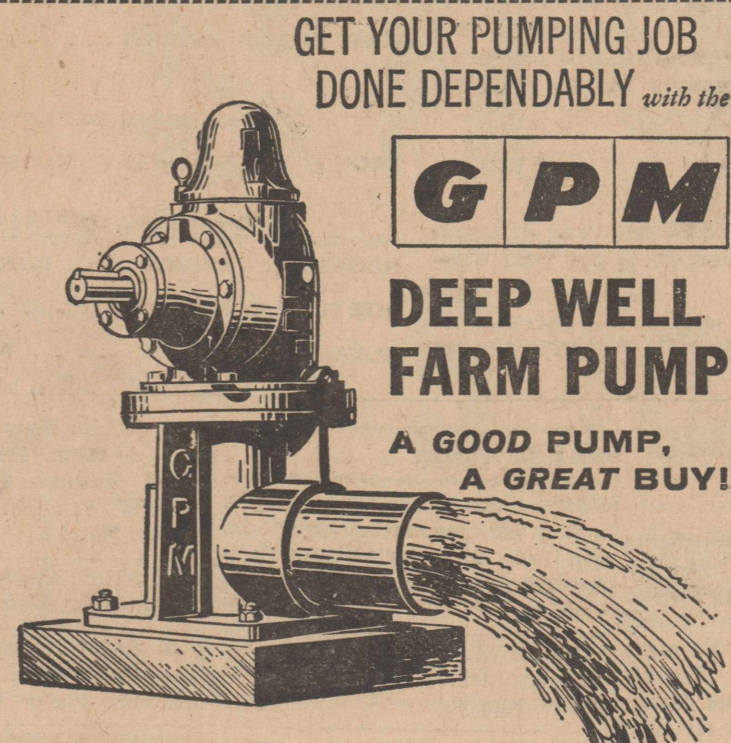

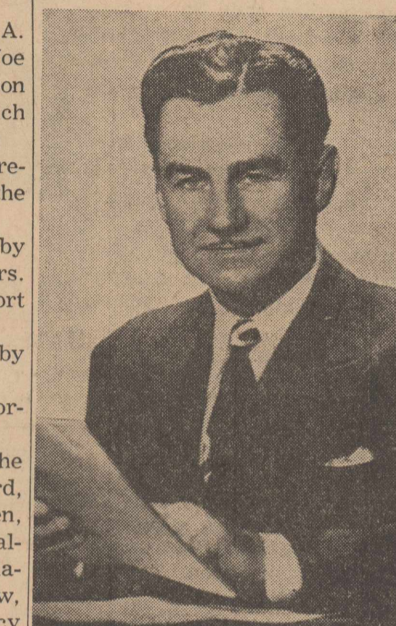
Mrs. Locke Teaches Ladies Bible Class

Can't women be silly sometimes? Far be it from me to criticize. In viewing some of my own actions in retrospect I find myself blushing here in front of a blank wall that couldn't care less.

One of the silliest things I've heard in many a day was related by a lady who works in a courthouse. The lady was hard at work at her duties when she was approached by a man whom she vaguely recognized as having been around the building for several days previously.

He asked excitedly if there were a television set in the courthouse. He made it plain he had to find one in ten minutes.

The woman told him there was not, but thinking he was anxious to see a friend on TV, or some such matter of personal importance, she told him she had a set at home he was welcome to use.

The excited man thanked her breathlessly, but stated with a worried frown, he had to find a portable set he could bring to the courthouse.

Seeing the lady's puzzled look, the man turned and hurriedly explained, "My wife is on jury duty and can't leave the courthouse, but she positively can't miss 'As The World Turns'. It comes on in ten minutes and I must get her a television set! She has never missed a program, and is in tears because this jury duty will spoil the whole story for her!" Don't you know this level-headed lady juror would be just the person to judge a man's innocence or guilt? I imagine the men on the jury probably felt like "hanging" her before the case was over.

Maybe our silliness, mixed with an uncanny reasoning, eventually balances out the scales. For the million stupid little things a woman is guilty of doing, there are a few reasonably intelligent ideas to her credit.

For example a young mother confided that her son had picked up a "bad word" from neighborhood friends.

The little boy naively used the word in the presence of his mother. Without any show of surprise or horror, the mother inquired, "Where did you hear that word?" The little boy retorted, "Some friends always say it when they get mad."

"Well, it doesn't sound very pretty to me," replied his mother, but I know one that sounds a lot worse!" The little boy coaxed, begged and teased, but his mother refused to reveal the tantalizing "bad word" she knew.

After half-an-hour of this, the mother finally conceded, "Ok, I'll tell you. But you must not use it unless you are very provoked. It's so bad, I'll have to whisper it!"

The eager little boy leaned forward and listened rapidly while his mother whispered "goodness sakes" into his ear. Hearing his mother say a "bad word" made such an impression on him he promptly forgot the other word.

As a consequence the little boy thereafter used his mother's "bad word" in place of the more expressive epithet, . . . when in earshot of his parents anyway . . . and to top it all, each time his mother unconsciously muttered "for goodness sakes", the boy would warn her that it didn't sound very nice, but she could use it around him, if she wouldn't say it in front of anyone else!

This must be some sort of reverse psychology, but it seems a good way of handling a situation that could have been made infinitely worse by being mis-handled. Who but a woman could think of such a solution?

How can women be so senseless at times and so sensible at other times? A woman seems to be a composite of all the incongruities that exist.

For instance, what descriptive words are generally associated with the word "woman"? . . . senseless, vain, flighty, extravagant, catty, insincere, clothes-and-money-mad . . . Pretty or not, this is the universal conception of the word.

Yet, who but a woman can become a mother, and what descriptive words are associated with "mother"? . . . warm, gentle, tender, patient, understanding, self-sacrificing, loyal and loving . . . These are beautiful words, and they, ironically, describe the same person as the foregoing.

A mother is usually a hard-worker, if not in civic, church or club work, certainly in the home. And what descriptive words are associated with "worker"? . . . untiring, diligent, dedicated, helpful, eager, ambitious, reasonable,

capable, out-going, co-operative, and realistic.

Yet, this same woman-mother-worker is somewhat of a dreamer, a book-lover, an appreciator of things lovely, artistic, atmospheric and romantic. This puts her in the introvert class as refined, reserved, quiet, lazy, unrealistic, intellectual, idealistic, moody, moony and romantic.

Women seem to be a paradoxical bunch. It's no wonder a woman is sometimes irrational and appears to be about "half here". It's probably just as well she hasn't much time to dwell on thought of "why she did this . . . or that" or try to psychoanalyze herself.

She might emerge with an image of herself as some sort of animal without sense enough to come in out of the rain . . . yet one who can raise a houseful of children . . . and a husband . . . to be fairly intelligent individuals. It's enough to send a body running to a psychiatrist's soothing couch!

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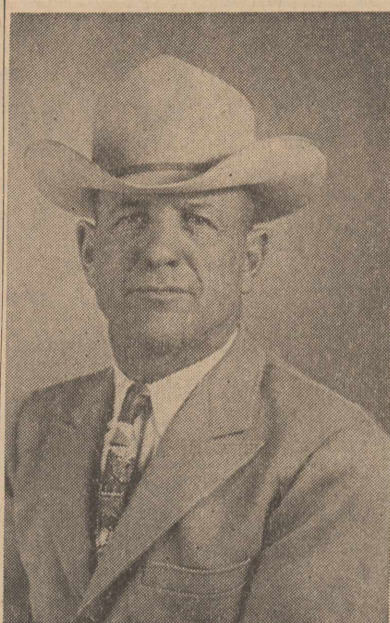

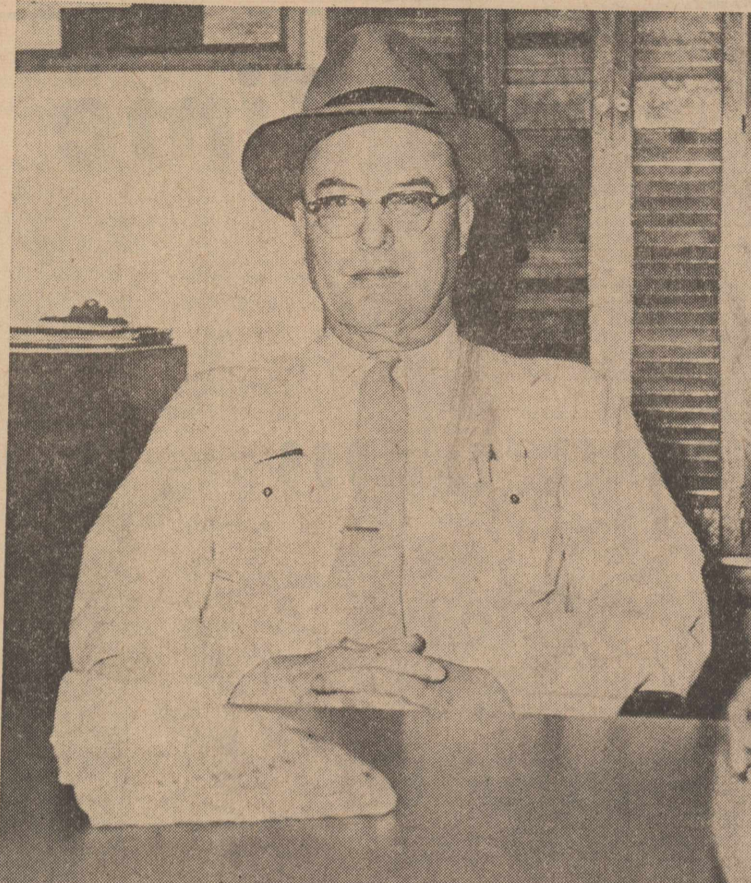

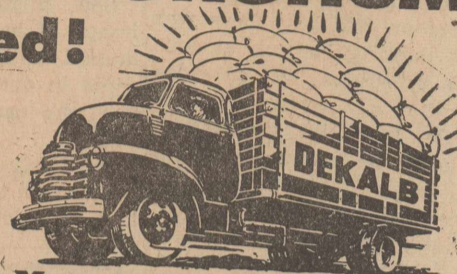

Mr. Caley is a co-sponsor of the sophomore class and sponsor of the Science Club.

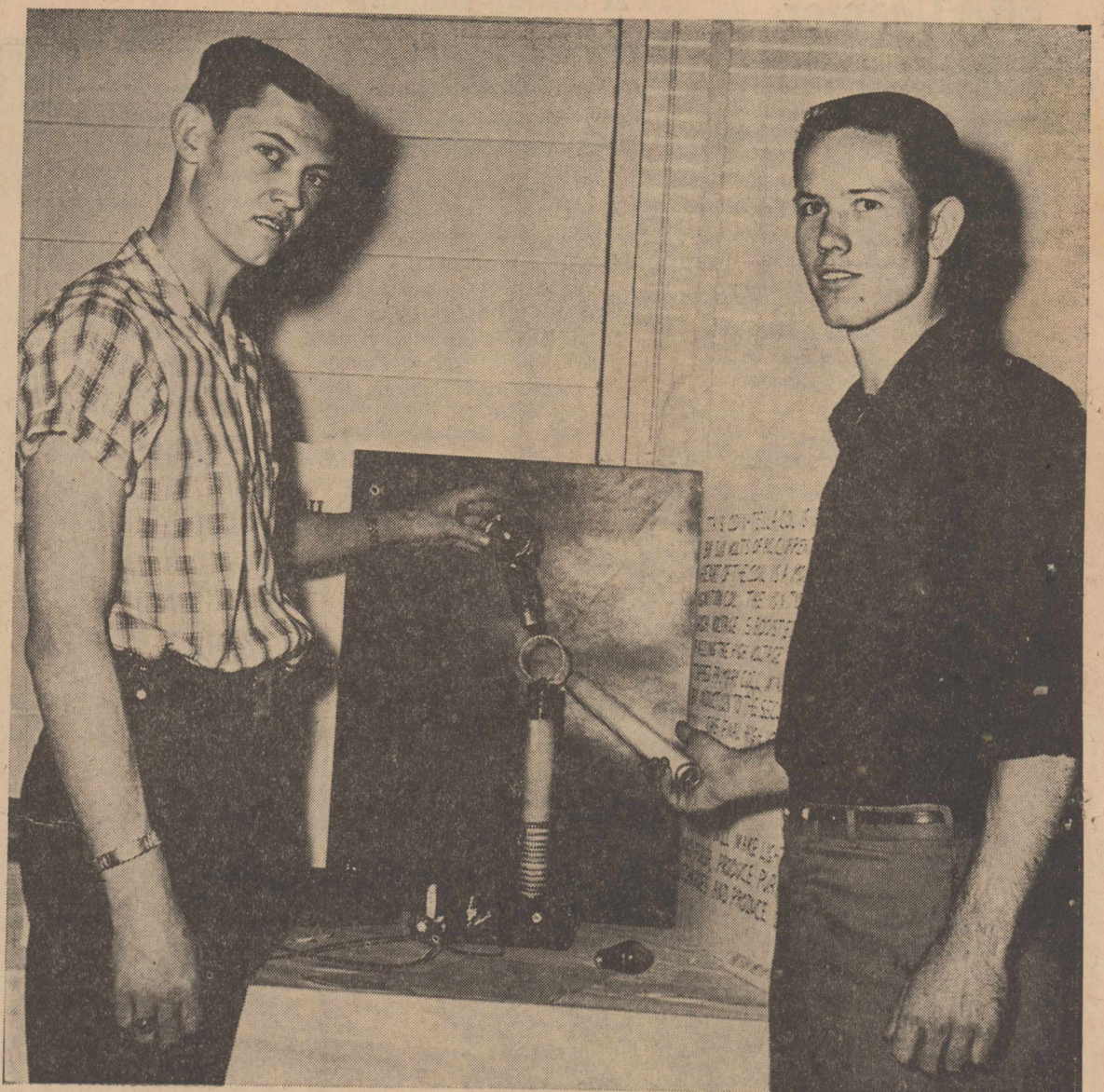
Ex-students attending five different colleges testify to Mr. Caley's ability in the class room by saying that college chemistry is among the subjects they find easiest.

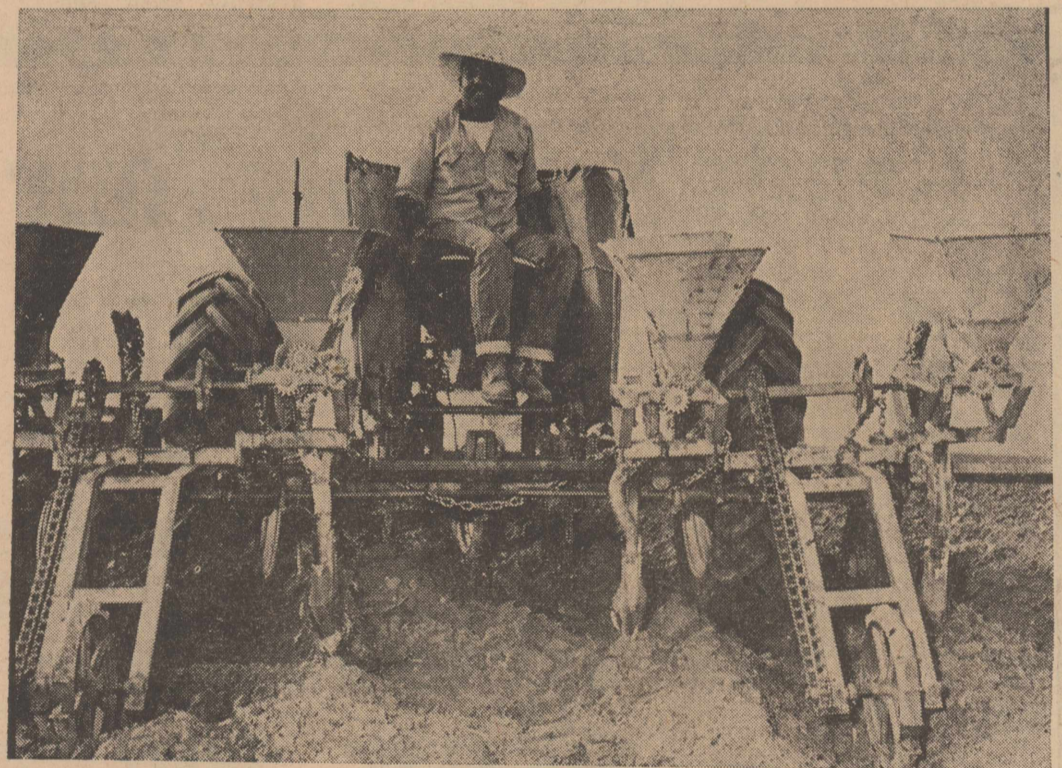
