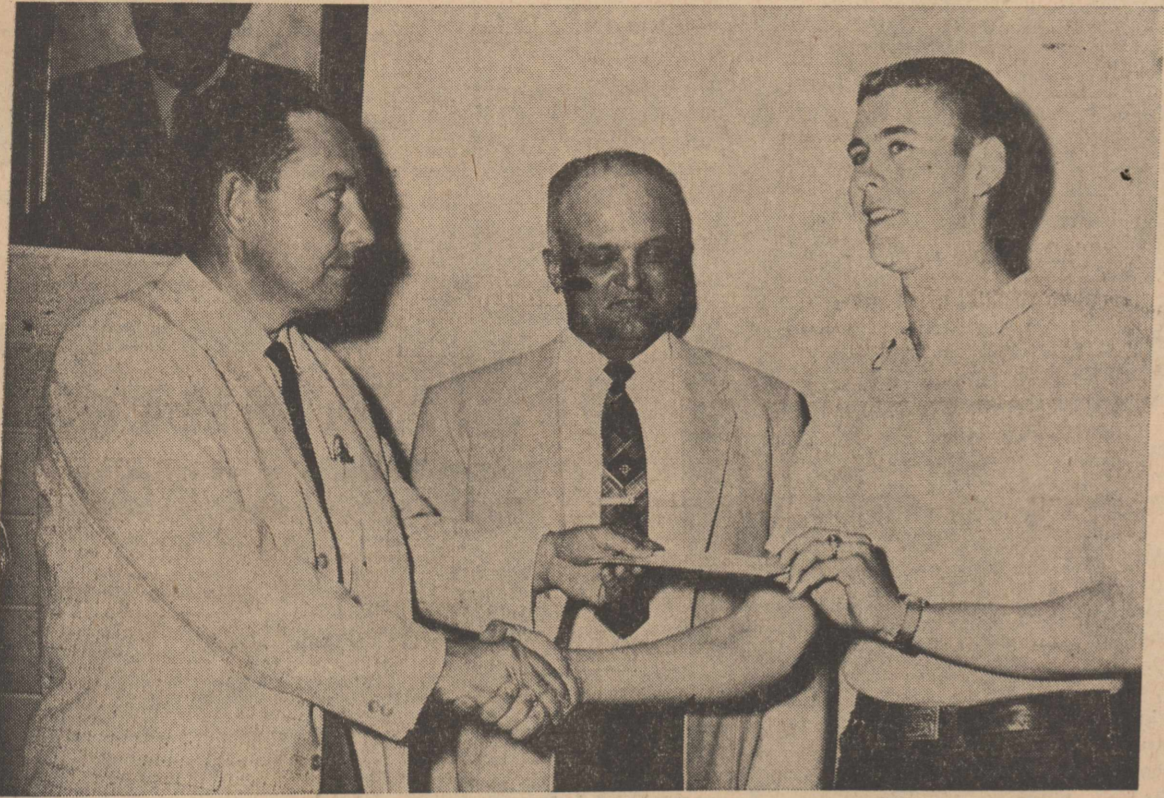

## Sweet Corn Shed To Be Built Here

Final plans are being made for construction of a sweet corn conditioning shed to be built on Clovis Poteet's land in northwest part of Olton.

About 100 acres of sweet corn will be planted here this year. Plans call for construction of a 60 by 30 foot shed equipped with a cooling tank. The tank will be 40 feet long, 10 feet wide and 4 feet deep and will be cooled to the vicinity of 32 degrees.

Field heat must be cooled from the corn before it is ready for shipment.

# Volunteer Workers, Trucks Sought For Monday Clean-Up

## Citizens Asked To Cooperate By Stacking Trash For Easy Pick-Up

Monday has been designated as clean-up day in Olton.

Mayor Pro Tem C. A. Cox issued a proclamation making Monday official clean-up day for the city. City Water and Street Superintendent Forrest Davis said every available truck and man will be placed on the clean-up job by the city.

HEART ATTACK  
A. B. Young was in a Littlefield hospital suffering from a heart attack. Mr. Young was released from the hospital Friday.

He called for volunteers from among the townspeople to help on the job. He especially requested trucks and men. Mr. Davis said that anyone wishing to help but unable to do so personally may hire a man to do so.

He said that the sanitation department is able to cope with regular trash disposal but said that there has been a build up of tree limbs and other trash not assembled at trash barrels for pick-up.

Stack Trash  
Mr. Davis suggested that people stack such trash along alleys to facilitate pick-up. He said the city dump will be open all day Monday.

Mr. Davis described the Monday clean-up campaign as an overall battle against disease normally spread by unsanitary conditions in populated areas.

He said City Health Officer Basil Johns has advised people with open privies to get rid of them. Mr. Davis hinted at action later if this advice is not taken now.

The water and street superintendent also oversees the city sanitation department.

New Alleys  
He reported that alleys are being cut in many blocks where alleys did not exist before. He pointed out that this will accommodate the city fogging machine, which will be in operation in the near future.

Mr. Davis said the fogging machine is being repaired and will be ready to go when the need arises. The city garbage truck has been equipped with a nozzle spray. When garbage barrels are emptied hereafter they will be sprayed with an insecticide.

"This will eradicate a prime breeding place for mosquitos and flies," Mr. Davis declared.

G. B. Stanley is to give the invocation and the benediction is to be said by Rev. John E. Lewis.

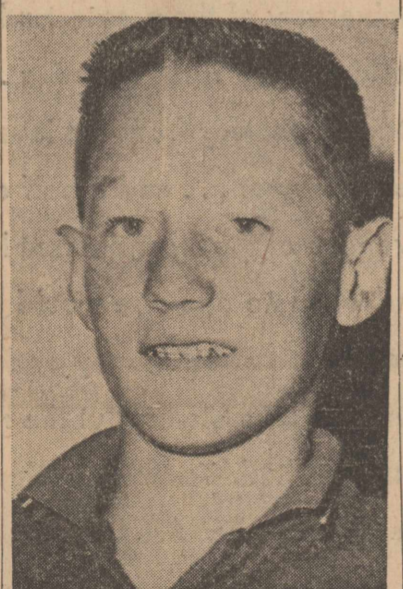

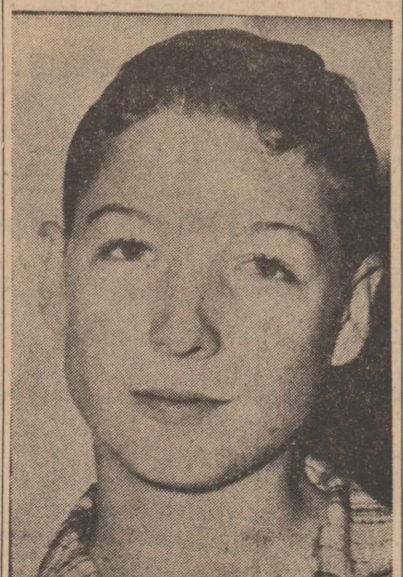

# Olton FFA Chapter Gets SWPC Check

The Olton High School Chapter of the Future Farmers of America, won the Southwestern Public Service Company's Chapter Achievement Award for the best farm electrification program for the 1959-60 year.

Roy Neal Jones, chapter president, accepted the award, a check for \$100. The award winner was announced at an Area I FFA convention at Palo Duro High School in Amarillo last Saturday.

The check was presented by Sam Thomas, agricultural development manager for Southwestern Public Service Company at a special assembly at Olton High School Monday.

Max Malone and Calvin Horn, co-sponsors of the chapter and vocational agriculture teachers, were also given awards for their part in developing a prize-winning chapter.

Mr. Malone was presented with a Hotpoint garbage disposal unit, and Mr. Horn was given a Jo-Jan electric yard light complete with post and electronic eye, for automatic operation. Ralph Glover, manager for the electric light and power company, made these presentations.

This was the inaugural year of Southwestern's FFA Chapter Achievement Award Program, and the students submitted an entry based on five classifications, electrification home activities; electrical projects constructed by the chapter; chapter exhibits pertaining to farm electrification; demonstrations performed by the students on wiring, lighting and safety; and classroom periods devoted to the study of farm electrification.

## Nineteen Cotton Variety Tests At HPRF Station

Nineteen varieties of cotton were planted on April 25 at the High Plains Research Foundation.

This research project is a continuation of the search conducted since the Foundation was organized in 1957 for varieties that give the best returns. This test for yield and quality includes varieties best adapted to the various methods of cotton harvesting currently practiced by farmers in the High Plains.

Each of these varieties were planted in four row plots, 100 feet long with four rows to each plot. The tests will be made from the two center rows in each of the four row plots, reports Dr. E. H. Collier, chief agronomist at the Foundation.

## A Loaded Gun Pointed At Our Heads

For those who would co-exist, we strongly recommend a look at the front pages of almost any Thursday morning daily of this week.

Prominently displayed on front pages across the country is a picture of Nikita Krushchev, Russian foreign minister Andrie Gromyko and Marshall Rodion Malenovsky.

Look into the faces of these three men who butchered Hungary, who killed people in their own country literally by the million for resistance. There is one thing you will not find there—mercy.

We hope the people of Olton will think seriously on this matter. Krushchev's boast that he would make war on the US cannot be considered in the abstract sense by people who live in the Olton community. This man has a loaded gun pointed at our heads.

If we allow Krushchev 15 minutes head start in a future war, the chances are good that 75 percent of the people of Olton will not see the next hour strike.

Consider this, even before Amarillo became a base for planes of the Strategic Air Command it was reported to be Russia's Prime Target No. 15 in event of attack.

Now think on this, a Cobalt nuclear warhead explosion scoring a base hit on Amarillo would demolish that city in a boiling, searing instant. In all probability the area would be patterned with explosions something like depth charging for submarines. This would insure destruction of all adjacent bases and industry.

In event this should happen, Olton, too, probably would be flattened. Those who die in the first terrible concussion will be the lucky ones. The rest would perish from the hideous radiation burns that would accompany Cobalt fall-out.

IF WE TAKE THE ATTITUDE THAT THIS SERIOUS MATTER IS SOMETHING HAPPENING FAR AWAY AND OF NO CONCERN TO US, THEN WE ARE LIKE STUPID CATTLE WAITING FOR SLAUGHTER.

Through our legal representatives in Congress we can demand that this country be placed on a national emergency basis equivalent to ALL OUT WAR. We must mobilize our industry and man power even where it is necessary to invoke martial law to gain cooperation of industry and trade unions. We must put ourselves in position to lay down ultimatums in securing the freedom of people across the earth and then be prepared to back these ultimatums with force.

IT IS NO LONGER A MATTER OF PRESERVING OUR FREEDOM—OUR VERY LIVES ARE AT STAKE.

## Telephone Rate Raise Request Looming Here

General Telephone Company of the Southwest has indicated that a rate raise request will be made to the city of Olton in the near future.

A brochure already has been submitted to the city government purporting to support such a request. R. E. "Bob" Saunders, manager of General's Littlefield office, described the current request as "an open-ended case."

No specific rate increase is mentioned in the brochure. Figures in the brochure are intended to substantiate that the company makes less than 2 percent net return on investment here at present rates.

Mr. Saunders said the company desires a return of 7 to 7.5 percent. No date has been set for a meeting between telephone company officials and the city council.

The daughter of Mrs. Maria Julia De La Cerda was born August 20, 1941, in Melvin.

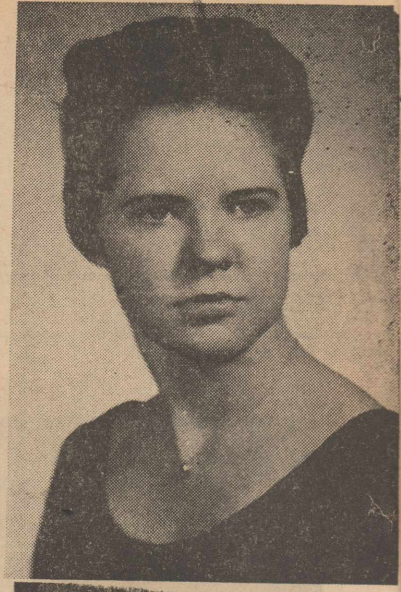
While in high school, Mary Lou De La Cerda, has been a member of the Pep Squad and the Spanish Club.

Gayle Machen, the third ranking senior, scholastically, plans to attend college, but is undecided as to which college.

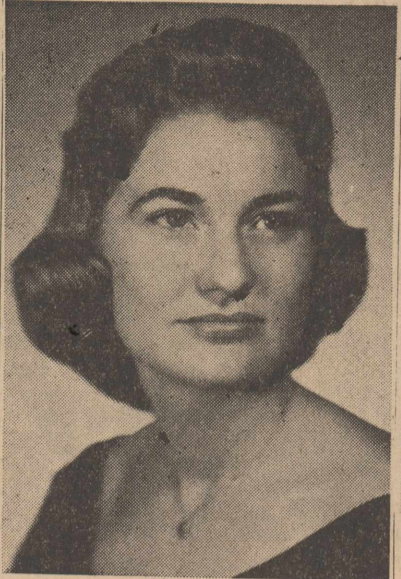
