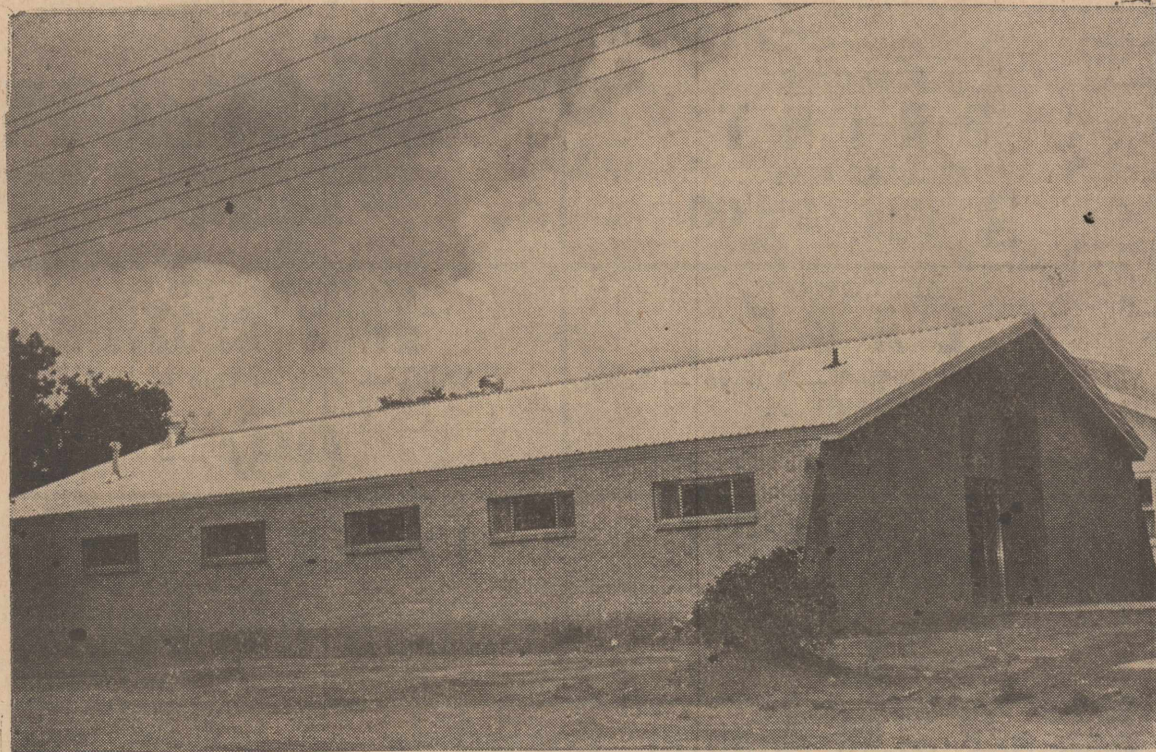

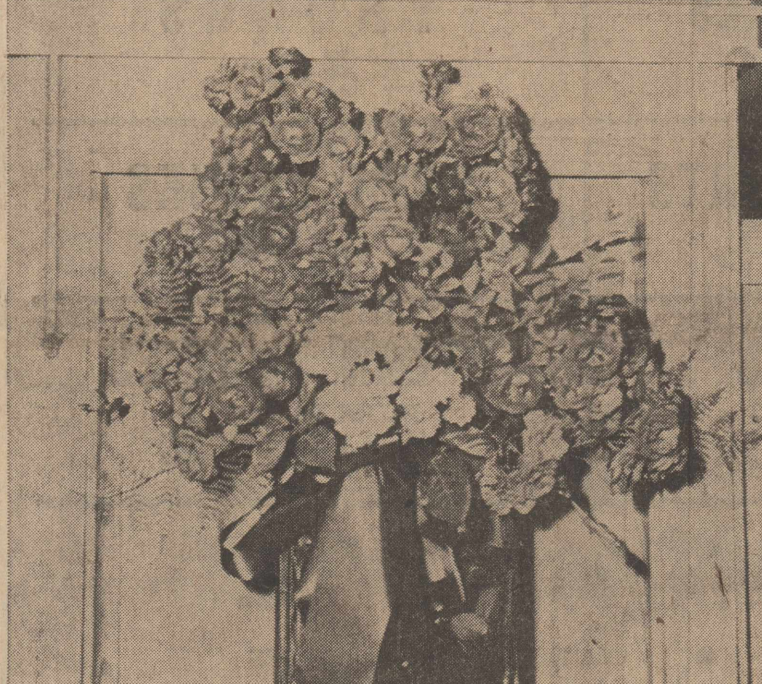
## New Building

## Dedicate Cumberland Church Here Sunday

Dedication services for the new building will be held at 2:30 o'clock next Sunday afternoon at the church. Call to worship will be by the pastor, Rev. Gerald Thomas. The congregation will sing "Lead On Oh King Eternal" and then the invocation will be given by Rev. J. R. Jennings. There will be a choral arrangement by a Lubbock Choir. Recognition and remarks will be by Wilton Bodkin. A Lubbock quartet will sing and then the church

history will be read by Charles Black. The congregation will sing "Holy, Holy, Holy". Principal address will be by Rev. E. M. Jennings. Dedication will be by Rev. Thomas and the benediction will be by L. S. Kennedy. Cumberland's new church was built principally by donated labor of church members. It is 72 feet long and 42 feet wide. It is a brick and masonry structure with floors of cement and asphalt tile. It houses a pastor's study, vestibule, nursery, choir stall and two Sunday school rooms. The sanctuary will accommodate about 250 persons. The ceiling is acoustical fiberglass. Lighting is direct with fluorescent lights. A firm of Lubbock architects drew plans for the build-

## Cumberland Presbyterian Church Dates Back To '26

The history of Olton Cumberland Presbyterian Church dates back to 1926. In that year Thomas H. Campbell, a Presbyterian ministerial student and Rev. H. R. Allen conducted the first Presbyterian Revival Services in the school auditorium.

The first church was organized Sept. 4, 1926 with 13 members. Meetings of Sunday School and Young People's Society were held in the school auditorium. The first year the church had no regular pastor.

The first pastorate position was held by G. O. Dean in 1927. The same year, the congregation voted to erect a church building, which was completed in 1928. This building was used until the recently new constructed church was finished.

A. A. Collins was in charge of the first services held in the church building in 1928. Shortly after the building was erected, the Olton Church was admitted to the Amarillo Presbytery.

In 1928 a Presbyterian parsonage was built. The same year, G. O. Dean resigned as pastor and Rev. A. A. Collins served as temporary pastor for three months. Rev. E. M. Jennings then became

the first resident pastor of the church. He held the pastorate for two years.

From 1930 to 1934 Rev. J. Garland Stokes, Rev. O. A. Mealer, Rev. C. L. Bolding, and Rev. O. N. Baucom served as pastors respectively. During this time the parsonage was sold.

In 1935 the congregation voted to purchase a new parsonage. The same year Rev. J. R. Jennings was called as pastor of the church and served three years. The largest membership in the church's history, 68 resident members and nine non-resident members, was during his pastorate.

The pulpit was filled respectively by Rev. A. A. Collins, Rev. L. E. McCoy, Rev. Joe Ingram, Rev. Edwin A. Keasler, and Rev. J. R. Jennings during the years of 1928 to 1951.

A former pastor, Rev. E. M. Jennings, again accepted the pastorate in 1951 and served until 1953, when he was succeeded by Rev. Charles Littleton who resigned in 1956.

Rev. Jerry Anderson served the Olton Church two years as pastor, from 1957 to 1959.

The present minister, Rev. Ger-

ald Thomas, accepted the pastorate after Rev. Anderson's resignation in 1959. A new church building has been erected since he became pastor.

Construction on the new building began in August, 1959. It was finished in May 1960. Dedication of the new Cumberland Presbyterian Church will be June 5, 1960. Rev. E. M. Jennings, a former pastor, will give the main address.

Membership of the Presbyterian Church numbers 50. Only one charter member of the Olton Cumberland Presbyterian Church, L. A. Kennedy, still resides in Olton.

## Commissioner, Legislature Races Most Hotly Contested On Ballot

Two contests will hold the spotlight here Saturday as Olton voters go to the polls in the Democratic primary run-off election.

Of paramount interest will be the race for county commissioner, Precinct 1. In this contest A. J. Spain and C. M. Moss will be slugging it out to determine which will serve on the county's governing board.

Moss led balloting in the first primary, polling 477 votes as compared to 400 compiled by Spain. These two edged out H. A. Hysinger and Delmer Givens.

The 286 votes rounded up by Givens and Hysinger in the first primary will be the deciding factor in the run-off.

Another race which has the focus of attention here is that for state legislature, 96th district. Competing there are Jesse Osborn of Muleshoe and Clarence Hamilton of Springlake.

Mr. Osborn is the incumbent having served in the legislature for the past several years. Seeking to unseat Osborn, is Mr. Hamilton who is a Springlake school teacher.

Hamilton carried the Olton box in the first primary with a whopping majority of 524 votes. Osborn received 160 while Bill Shelby, Hart football coach received 140.

Run-off candidates for several state offices will appear on the ballot.

Election judge Saturday will be Eldon Franks. His assistant will be Louis Hair. Election clerks will be named later this week.

Voting will be in the lobby of the H. P. Webb Elementary Building. Polls will open at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and close at 7 o'clock Saturday evening.

## Candidates Gun Shy As Mayor Deadline Looms

Olton voters face the dismal prospect of going to the polls in

another mayoralty election a week from Saturday with no one on the ballot for whom to vote.

With deadline only two days away Thursday not a single candidate had reared an adventurous head to compete in Olton's third mayoralty election in six months.

Olton's mayoralty dilemma began to unwind last September when Mayor D. Y. Ray announced his resignation. A special election was called for January.

Only one candidate was on the ballot in that contest and he was not elected.

Carl Hooper was elected on a write-in vote-all the while protesting that he would not serve if elected. Hooper's campaign was conducted largely by friends as a prank.

Hooper made good his threat not to serve. He didn't. He probably served a shorter term as mayor than any other chief magistrate in Olton's history. He didn't even

preside over a single meeting.

Four candidates were on the ballot in the special mayoralty election in April. Lefty Hollingsworth was elected. He presided over one full-scale meeting before submitting his resignation. Mayor Hollingsworth resigned as an aftermath of a severe heart attack and upon instructions from his doctor.

Now another election. Now no candidates.

The nearest thing to a candidate is Major James who said he would serve if elected on a write-in. And he may just be, in this city where a write-in candidate seems to have a better chance of winning than a man who has his hat in the ring and his name on the ballot.

Joe was an outstanding student

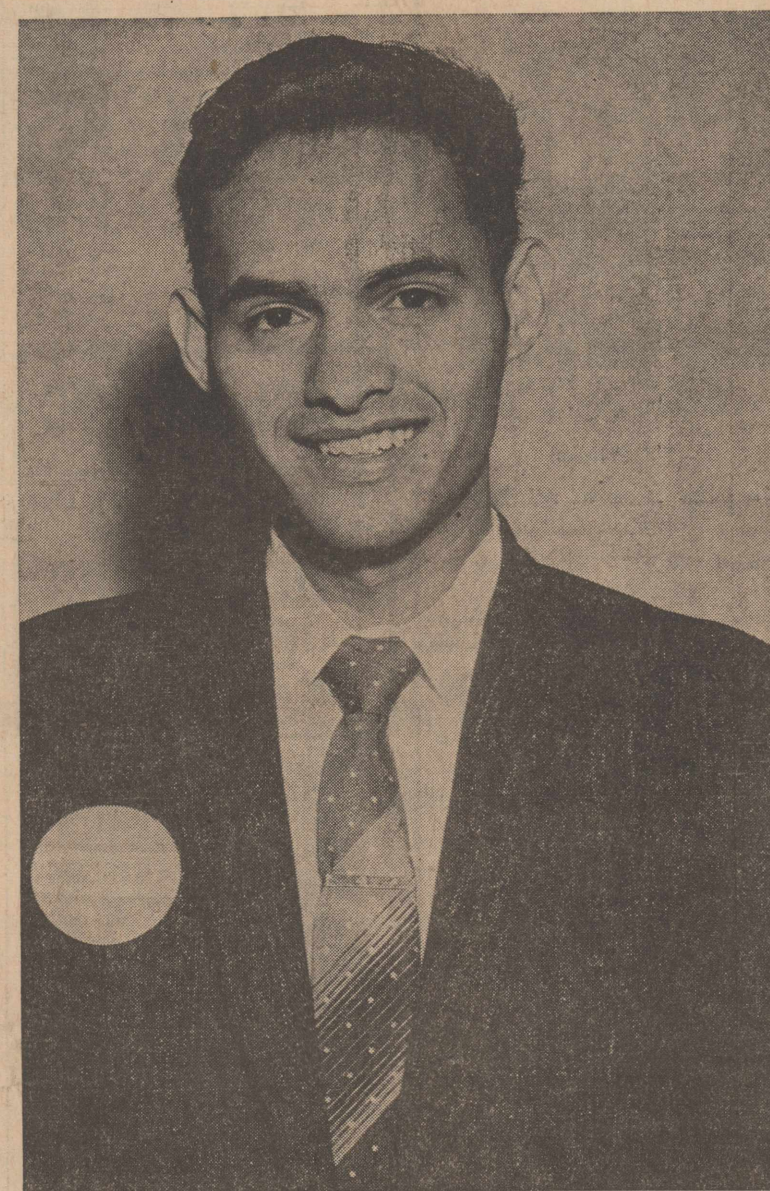
at Olton High School during his years there. He was a member of the number sense team and was president of the National Honor Society his senior year.

**Postmaster Gen. Announces New Improvement**

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield today announced sweeping improvements in mail transportation that will mean better mail service for Olton and 124 other communities in the Amarillo and Lubbock metropolitan areas, covering over 37,000 square miles.  
Discussing the program at a meeting of postmasters in Amarillo, Geo. A. Gray, Regional Operations Director, said that 800,000 people in the 40 Texas counties would benefit by better mail service.  
Barring infrequent delays in media of transportation and occasional distribution errors, first-class letters mailed at designated collection boxes or in the post office before 5:00 PM on a business day will be delivered on the first delivery at any office in the areas on the following business day.

"Tests just concluded," Mr. Gray said, "proved the mail pattern to be highly successful. Approximately 600,000 first-class letters originate on an average business day in post offices within these two metropolitan areas. Approximately 66 per cent of this mail is destined for points within the area. We have tested our newly changed operations with highly gratifying results."  
He pointed out that mail for and from offices outside the area, all over the United States, will be expedited by the new arrangement. Accelerating the flow of mail in the metropolitan areas, it was explained, is part of the vast postal program which has next-day delivery between any two cities in the country as its long range objective. The revised mail pattern is based on the establishment of sectional centers to which mail from outlying offices is brought for consolidation, distribution and onward dispatch for connection with trunk line facilities, principally at Amarillo.

These sectional centers have been established at Amarillo, Childress, Lubbock and Plainview.  
Post Offices near one of these sectional centers will send their mail to that point for processing. Fast non-stop service over the highway then will carry the mail to Amarillo and Lubbock for dispatch to destination. Special connections have been established via fast truck service north of Amarillo at five different locations.  
Mr. Gray explained that the next-day delivery depends on the conscientious attention of postal employees as well as the closely integrated time table which governs the area's postal units and the transportation linking them together.  
He said this improvement in letter mail service is the result of intensive study, and he credits the cooperation of dedicated postal employees in the 125 offices involved.

Mobile sectional centers, which consist of mail distribution cars in trains and buses equipped for en route distribution, are also utilized in the program.  
The plan required an intricate pattern of interlocking schedules, with connections being made within a matter of minutes at many places. For instance, a letter from Roaring Springs to Levelland travels over six different routes, including one train; it is transferred
