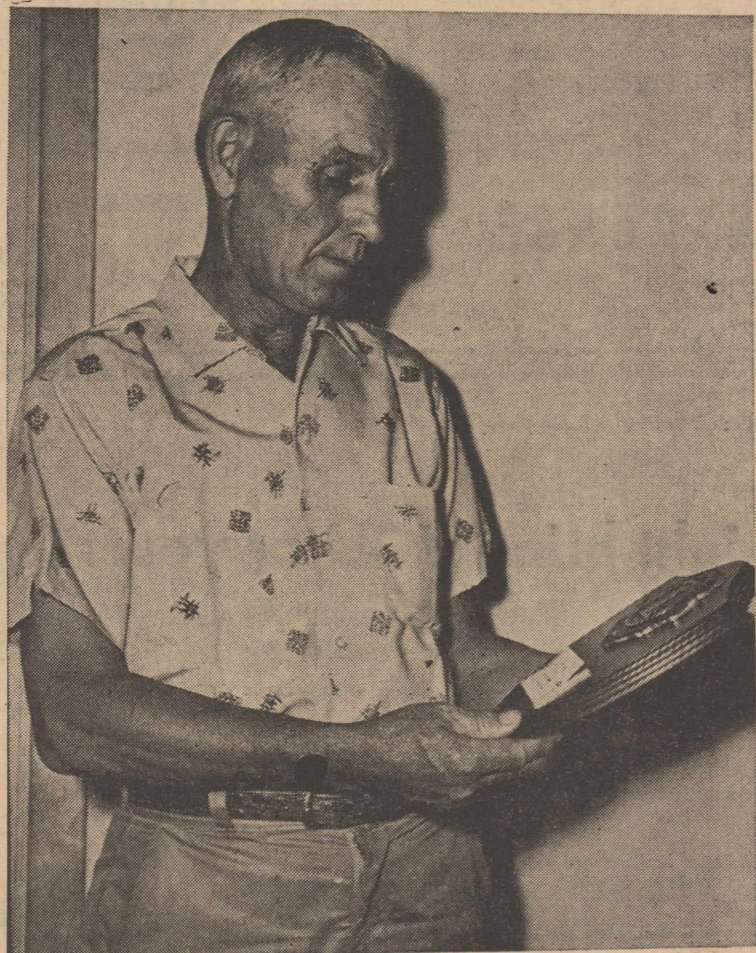
Fire Damages Old School Building Tuesday

Waldrip Resigns School Post To Study For Doctor Degree

COACH JOE TURNER IS ELEVATED TO SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION JOB

Don Waldrip has resigned as Olton High School principal and has been replaced by Coach Joe Turner.

Mr. Waldrip's resignation officially was accepted by the school board at a regular meeting Monday night. The board immediately hired Mr. Turner upon recommendation of Supt. Joe W. Harper.

In other action, the board voted to raise the salary of the superintendent from \$8,372 a year to an even \$10,000 a year.

RESIGNS

Members of the board said this puts the superintendent's salary here at about the same figure as that of other superintendents in schools of similar size in the area. The board also let contract to a Lubbock firm for some remodeling work to be done on the old wing of the high school building.

Moneys Quit

Trustees accepted the resignations of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Money and that of Mrs. Margaret Russell. Mrs. Russell is an elementary teacher. Mr. Money teaches in junior high and his wife is a second grade teacher.

A board of equalization was named and June 27 and 28 was set as its meeting date. To the board were named Blanton Martin, G. H. Bley, Sam Clark and Jim Kemp. Mr. Kemp will serve as an alternate.

Work for Ph D

Mr. Waldrip resigned his position in order to attend Colorado State College at Greeley. There he will work on his doctorate in education. He is attending the college on a fellowship grant and was one of six students to do so.

While there he will teach some college courses while working toward his degree.

Don came here two years ago. Giant strides have been made in curriculum and procedure during his tenure. Mr. Waldrip moved to Olton from Chillicothe where he was high school principal.

He received his BS and MA degrees from Midwestern University. Mrs. Waldrip, "Celle" is a native of Olton and is related to some of the area's oldest families. Don was a member of Olton Lions Club and was active in community affairs, especially in singing.

He was a member of First Methodist Church here.

"I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to students and parents who have made my stay here a happy and rewarding one," Mr. Waldrip declared Wednesday before leaving for Colorado.

Successful Coach

Coach Turner holds a BS degree in physical education and an MS degree in education administration granted at Texas Christian University.

Mr. Turner came here from Tahoka in 1952 and has been an exceptionally successful coach here.

The school board now is seeking applications for the job of head coach.

SURPRISING TURNOUT ELECTS JAMES

Major James was named mayor of Olton—third in six months—in an unprecedented city election Tuesday.

The election had neither campaign nor candidates. James only reluctantly agreed to serve if elected on a write-in. Blank ballots were handed to voters at the polls Tuesday.

Surprisingly, 137 ballots were cast. This, no doubt, was due in part to the fact that several women were on telephones in an effort to get out the vote.

Eight persons received votes and here's how the voting went:

Major James received 114 votes. C. A. Cox was second with 17 votes. Bill Kelley, Bob Chitwood, C. M. Moss, V. Y. Jefferies, George Thomas and Laus Hair each received one vote.

Mr. James will take office at the next regular meeting of the city council which will be held Tuesday night of next week.

He succeeds Lefty Hollingsworth

Olton Ponies Trim Littlefield Team 14 to 12

Olton defeated the Roden Drug Team of Littlefield in a game Tuesday night by score of 14 to 12. Both teams were guilty of errors. There was some lusty hitting and lots of scoring.

George Jones was on the hill for Olton and pitched a creditable game. His support was spotty and errors by his team mates got him in hot water, especially in the last inning when Littlefield rallied for four scores and had the winning runs on base. George fanned 14 Littlefield batters, gave 9 hits and walked 6; he also hit 2 with pitched balls. Kimbrough and Johnson, pitching for Littlefield were touched for 12 hits by Olton batters. They issued six bases on balls and retired 6 Oltonites via strike-outs.

Olton started with a bang, scoring 10 runs in the first inning. They added 2 in the 4th and ended their scoring with a pair of runs in the seventh. Littlefield was not beaten until the game was over. They broke the scoring ice with a single run in the 2nd, made 4 in the bottom of the 4th, three more in the 6th and went into the bottom of the last inning with the score Olton 14, Littlefield 8, when a couple of errors in the Olton infield let down the gates and before Olton could retire the Littlefield boys they had scored 4 more to make the final tally 14 to 12. George Jones struck out the final two batters to end things.

Donnie Malone led Olton hitters with 4 hits out of 4 trips to the plate—George Jones hit a home run in the 7th inning, a smash over the left field fence.

Spain Wins Race For Commissioner

Alva J. Spain defeated C. M. Moss in one of the closest races in years for the post of Lamb County commissioner, Precinct 1. Spain polled 531 votes in the precinct and Moss trailed only 27 votes with 504.

Moss led Spain by a margin of 24 votes in the Olton box. Spain received 407 votes while Moss polled 431. It was the Springlake box that handed Spain his victory. There he won by more than a two to one margin, rolling up the necessary votes to win.

Moss received 48 votes from the Springlake box while Spain amassed 101. Spain received 11 absentee votes while Moss received 10.

Moss received 15 votes from the South Olton box while Spain received 12.

Spain will succeed Don Bryant who did not seek re-election.

Clarence Hamilton carried the Olton box and Lamb County in his bid for state representative, 96th District, but was defeated over the district as a whole.

Here at Olton, Hamilton received 582 votes and Osborn 213. Osborn is the incumbent.

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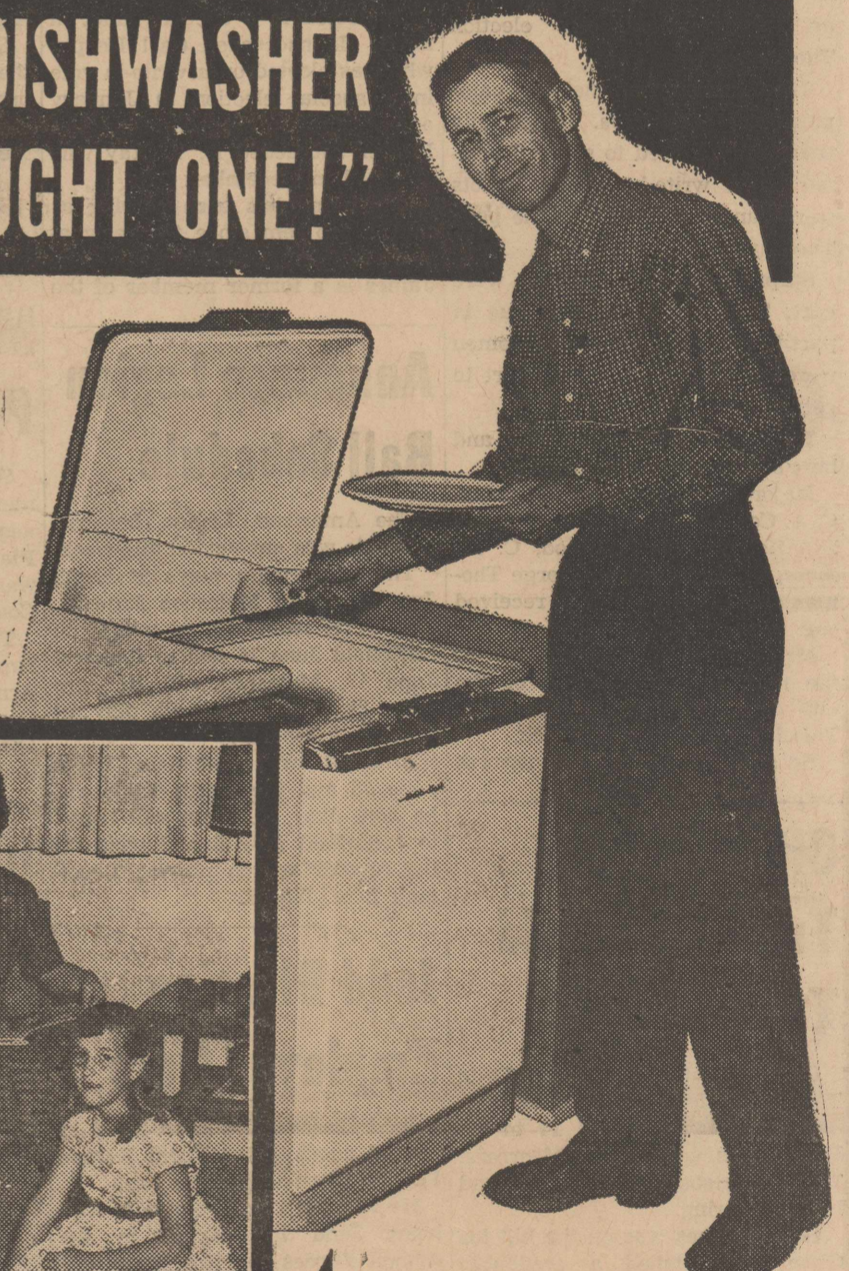

STUDY UP 30 PERCENT OVER PREVIOUS YEARS

Increase Cotton Research At HPRF

Dr. T. C. Longnecker, director of the High Plains Research Foundation announced that the Foundation is increasing its cotton research 34 per cent over previous years. Dr. Longnecker stated that the Foundation has 20 more acres of plot research with cotton this year than in 1959. This accelerated program in cotton research is a result of a cooperative research agreement that has been worked out between the High Plains Research Foundation and the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station No. 8 at Lubbock and College Station.

This cooperative arrangement in research will enable the Foundation to better serve the High Plains area. Personnel from the Agricultural Research Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and the Foundation are cooperating as research teams in conducting the joint research projects.

On commenting about the scope of the increased program of cotton research, Dr. Longnecker stated that the following cooperative projects are being conducted at the Foundation this year:

- (1) Regional cotton variety test;
- (2) date of planting experiment with cotton;
- (3) a climatology study involving different varieties, moisture levels, dates of planting, fertilizer levels, and varieties;
- (4) an in the furrow fungicide experiment;
- (5) a cotton harvesting study involving different varieties and various methods of harvesting;
- (6) planting equipment test using different types of planting equipment; and
- (7) a cotton irrigation experiment consisting of a detailed evaluation of different varieties, fertilizer treatments, and irrigation methods on the yield and quality of cotton.

Dr. Longnecker emphasized that the cooperative research program is just one phase of the Foundation's over-all research program with cotton. In this regard, the Foundation is conducting additional cotton research involving different varieties, fertilizer treatments, irrigation methods, and cultural practices.
