INCREASE STUDIES AT STATION

HPRF Researching Cotton Irrigation

Research in cotton irrigation and fertilizer levels is underway for the third year at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway. The number of irrigation methods under study have been increased from six to nine for 1960.

These methods include application of water compared to dryland cotton with water applied by the following methods: (1) preplant only; (2) preplant plus first bloom and mid-bloom; (3) preplant plus first square and peak bloom; (4) preplant plus first bloom and peak bloom; (5) preplant plus first bloom, mid-bloom and August 20; (6) preplant, first square, first bloom, and peak bloom; (7) preplant plus whenever soil moisture content drops to 50 per cent as determined by moisture blocks; and (8) preplant plus first square, first bloom, peak bloom, and August 20. All irrigation methods are

being metered, and moisture blocks will determine soil moisture during the growing season.

The September watering test has been discontinued, since this late irrigation has been found to reduce both quality and yield of cotton.

Fertilizer applications have been and will be made in the following proportions: 40-80-0, 80-80-0, and 120-80-0. These will be compared with results from no fertilizer applied.

Gregg, Lankart 75, and Blightmaster cotton varieties will be used in this test.

The most profitable irrigation application in 1958 was preplant, mid-bloom, and August 20; and in 1959, the preplant and peak bloom application.

Conducting this test are Shelby Newman of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Substation No. 8, Lubbock, and James Valliant, assistant water engineer, of the Foundation.

The meeting is scheduled at 7:30 p.m. Saturday in the company warehouse.

Two new directors will be elected to replace O. E. Patterson, current president of the board, and M. E. Lambright, present board secretary.

A nominating committee has submitted four names which will appear on the ballot. Up for election to three-year terms on the board are Houston Carson, Raymond Cooper, R. G. DeBerry and P. A. Nafziger.

The floor will be open for additional nominations, Graham said. Re-organization of the board also is scheduled Saturday night.

He was taken to Canyon Hospital where he is undergoing treatment. His condition was reported as fair Tuesday morning.

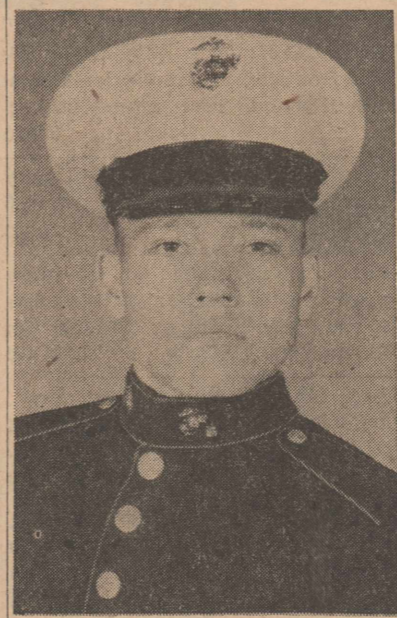
Miss Becky Hall Named FHA Head

OLTON BRONC BUSTER GETS NEW HONORS

Workman Best All-Around Waddy

Edd Workman was named "best all around collegiate cowboy in the nation" Saturday in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association's rodeo finals.

He became interested in the rodeo business while in high school. Edd was graduated from Olton High School in 1952, and then spent two years in the Army before enrolling in LCC where he is a student.

This year Edd has won the title of "best all around cowboy" at six out of seven NIRA rodeos.

To qualify for the championship rodeo, Mr. Workman won the "best all around cowboy" title in the southwestern district. He also received four trophies for having top

time in the district rodeo in the saddle bronc riding, bare back riding, bare back riding, bull riding, and tie-down calf roping contests.

Mr. Workman was awarded a saddle for being "best all around collegiate cowboy in the nation", and one for winning the national championship saddle bronc riding contest. He placed third in the nation in the bull dogging event.

Eleven colleges participated in the national championship rodeo at Clayton, NM.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Workman of Olton received the honor of being top collegiate cowboy in the nation by scoring the highest total number of points in the NIRA championship rodeo.

Former Olton Man Is Dead

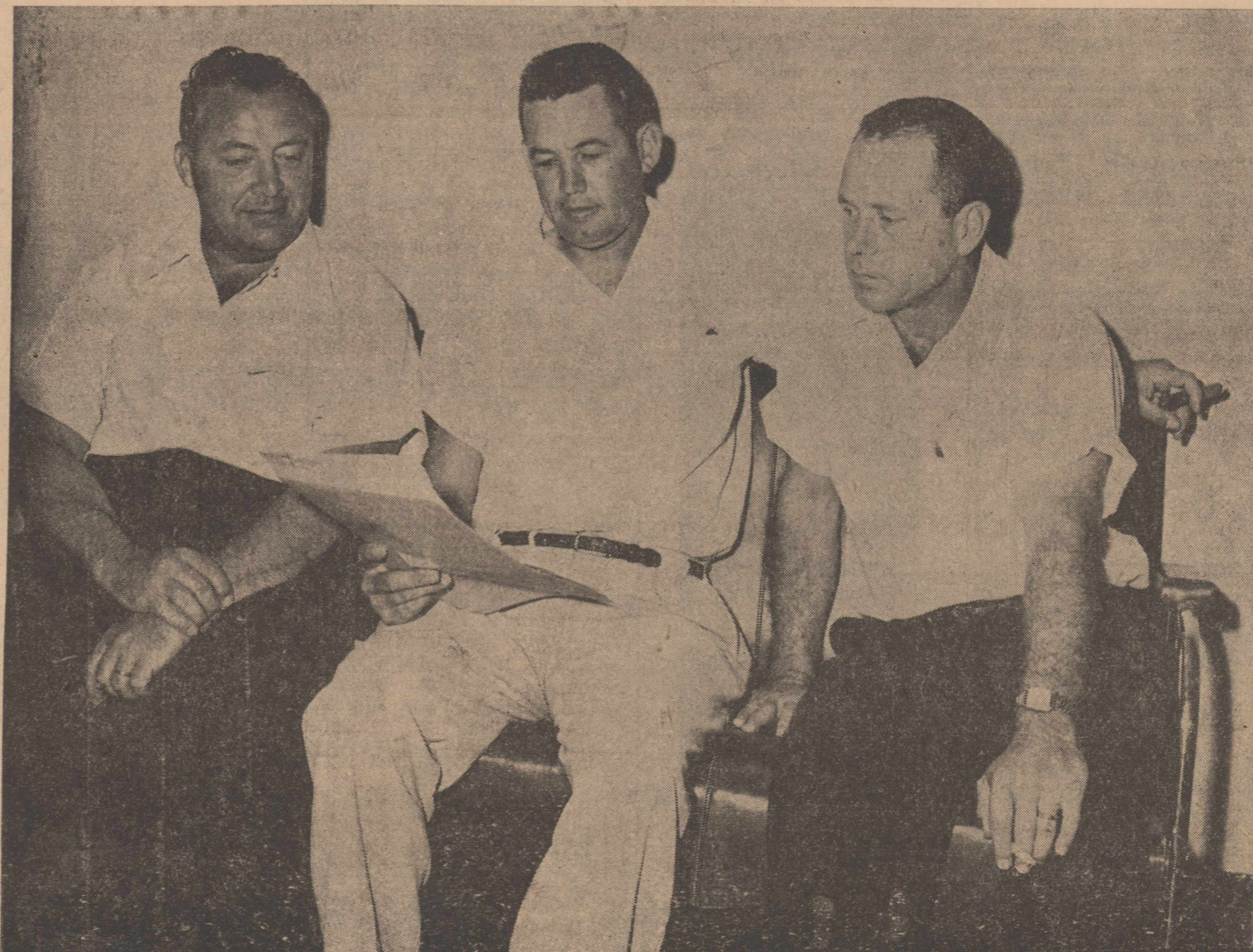
Funeral services for a former Olton man, Harry Paul Jones, were held June 14 at Pennington Funeral Home in San Marcos.
