"Both Kennedy and Nixon have been called 'cool cats' by political analysts. Each is an accomplished leader, who speaks convincingly and thinks fast on his feet."

Webb, Roberson, Estes Win Golf

Defending Champion Alvin Webb of Littlefield took top honors and Olton's Gilbert Roberson and Jack Estes were other flight winners as the annual Lamb County Golf Tournament closed Sunday at the Olton Recreation Center course.

Webb defeated Rhenard McCary, former Littlefield club champion, 2-1, to take the top prize. The cigar-smoking Webb held off a McCary comeback to win the tournament for the second year in a row.

Roberson took the championship of the first flight with a slim victory over Dr. Basil Johns, also of Olton. Roberson won, 1-up on the 19th hole.

Estes defeated Conner Parson of Olton for the second flight title, 2-up.

Jean Hall of Olton won the women's flight with a gross of 224, edging another Olton golfer, Nadine Weaver, who carded 226. Eileen Stokes of Littlefield was third with 231. Dorothy Brown of Littlefield was medalist in women's play with a net score of 105.

Olton lost its last chance in the championship flight when Webb ousted Carroll Cox in the semifinals, 6-5.

Other top Olton golfers, J. W. Douglass, Ralph Glover, Louis Hair, Andy Andrews and T. J. Roberson, lost out early.

Douglass went on to the championship consolation finals, where he lost to Littlefield's J. R. Chamberlain, 2-up.

George Richards, Springlake, captured the first flight consolation title with a 2-up victory over Olton's Frank Cornelius.

Second flight consolation title went to C. S. Silcott of Olton, who took out another Olton golfer, Neil Wells, 3-2.

Last Rites Read For Ben Dodson, Olton Pioneer

Last rites for Ben A. Dodson, 79, Olton pioneer resident, were conducted here Sunday afternoon.

Services were at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. John E. Lewis, pastor, officiating.

Dodson died in his sleep at 3:15 Saturday morning at his home. He had been bed-ridden 18 months.

Born Nov. 7, 1880, at Charlie in Clay County, Dodson came to the South Plains as a young cowboy-freighter in 1890.

He was married to the former Miss Daisy Brewster in Plainview in 1900. They acquired land holdings southeast of Olton, where they reared a family of six sons and one daughter.

The family resided in the rural area near Olton, in the same dwelling for more than 40 years. Three years ago, the house was destroyed by a tornado and Mr. and Mrs. Dodson moved to Olton.

Dodson was county treasurer four years before serving as secretary of the Olton Independent School board and tax assessor-collector for the school district from 1922 until 1956.

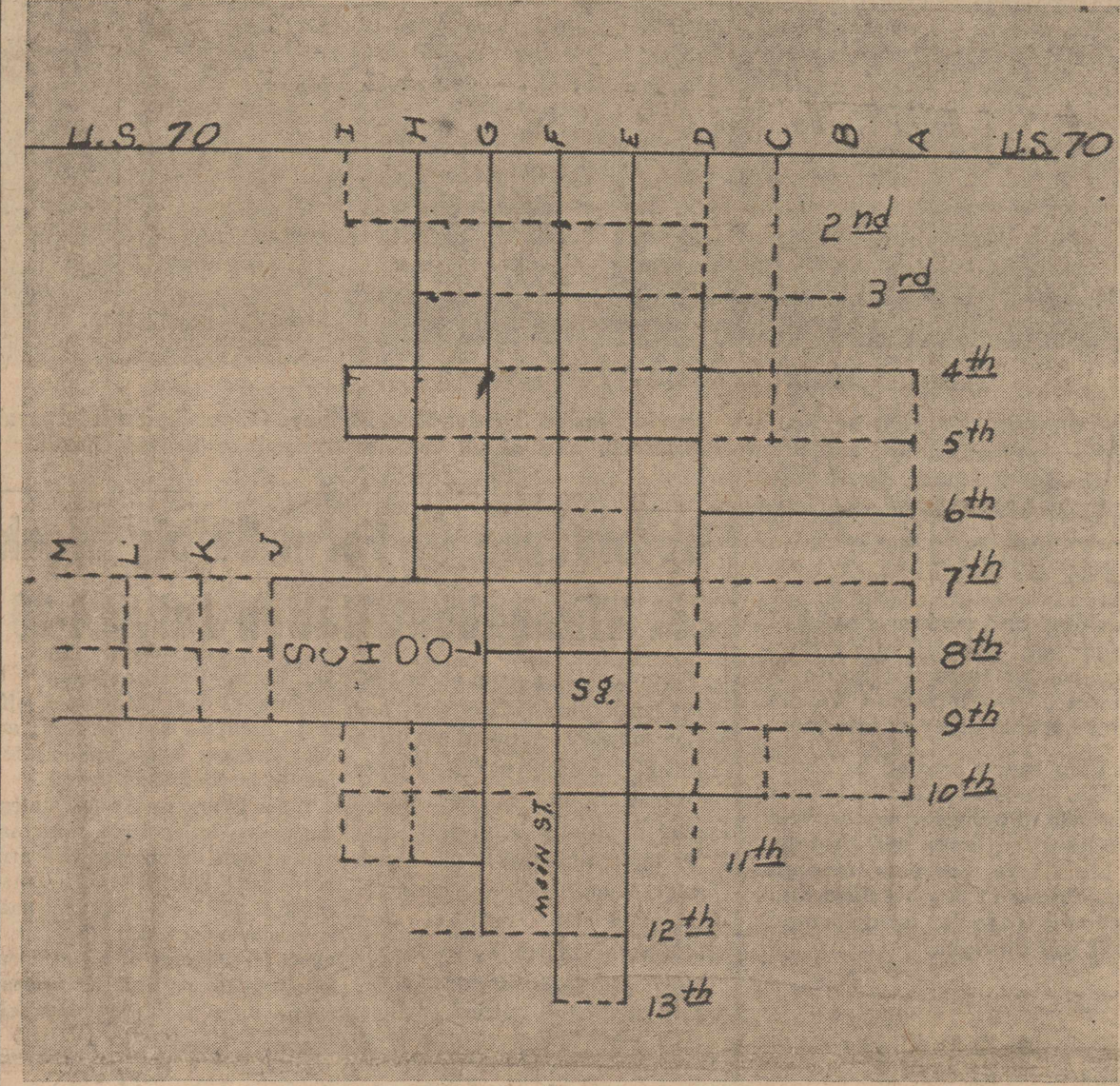
He had been a member of the Baptist Church, 66 years, and a member of the Olton First Baptist Church more than half a century.

Survivors other than his wife are one daughter, Mrs. J. M. Thomson, El Paso; six sons, Tom, Olton; Roy, Bovina; Lee, El Paso; Roy, Hale Center; Dee, Albuquerque, NM; and Max, Lubbock; two sisters, Mrs. Joe Wilson, Floydada, and Mrs. Sally Frye, Dallas, and 13 grandchildren.

Interment was in Olton Cemetery with Parsons Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Paving Proposal Lists 72 Blocks

Property Owner Approximate Cost \$4.25 Per Foot

City officials this week announced a list of blocks proposed for paving here if voters give their approval in a bond election in September.

Seventy-two blocks are in the proposal. They are shown by dotted lines on a map on this page.

Officials pointed out, however, that the proposal doesn't mean that paving will go just as it is shown.

They explained that paving would be done in areas where most interest is shown by property owners. Any area in town where property owners subscribe in sufficient numbers could be paved, and the city is hoping that more blocks can be added to the proposal.

Approximate cost to the property owner will be \$4.25 per front foot.

The city's cost will be approximately 20 per cent of the entire paving program. Overall cost would be near \$400,000.

However, the bond issue tentatively set in September is for \$80,000.

Approval of the bond vote will not necessitate a raise in taxes or an increase in valuations, according to city officials.

The \$80,000, in addition to paying the city's part of the paving, would provide for some small maintenance equipment. The equipment would be used for both maintenance of new paving and to repair existing streets.

Some strip paving now in existence would be re-done completely, as if there were no paving there, as part of the proposed project.

A master engineering plan for the city also would come from the project, so that water from heavy rains could run off.

This also would enable engineers to tie into existing paving in the future without having to tear up existing streets.

Proponents of the paving program are pushing it because they feel housing projects and other progress are being held back without paving and guttering.

The city council hopes that paving can start next spring if the bond vote carries.

County Ranks High In Plains Economy

Lamb County ranks third in a 20-county area of the South Plains in effective buying power, farm income and retail sales, a recent report from Sales Management magazine shows.

In farm income, Lamb County is the 52nd ranking county in the

nation with a total of \$47,897,000, the report indicates.

Only Lubbock and Hale counties outstrip Lamb in the three measurements of economy. Lubbock leads in buying power and retail sales, while Hale leads in farm income.

Effective buying income of the county is listed at \$39,516,000. Retail sales are shown at \$28,836,000.

Breaking down the sales picture, the county is third in food sales with \$6,142,000; fifth in sales at eating places with \$892,000; fourth in general merchandise sales with \$1,561,000; fourth in apparel store sales with \$1,221,000; fifth in furniture and appliance sales with \$755,000; sixth in automotive sales

with \$6,224,000; fifth in gas station sales with \$1,766,000; third in lumber, building and hardware sales with \$6,034,000; and third in drug sales with \$900,000.

Other counties in the 20-county area are Castro, Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Dickens, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hockley, Kent, King, Lynn, Motley, Farmer, Terry and Yoakum.

Prison Terms Set In Machine Shop 'Empty Safe Case'

Theft of a safe paid off the hard way for two men in 154th District Court at Littlefield last week.

Five and 10-year prison terms were handed out to two men who hail from southeast Texas. James A. Columbus, Bryan, was given a five-year term and Jessie James Sephus, Smithville, was handed a 10-year sentence.

District Judge E. A. Bills set the sentences after the men pleaded guilty to breaking into the Robert Edwards Machine Shop here and stealing the safe.

The pair hauled the safe several miles out into the country only to find it was empty.

Lockett Case

TRIAL OF OLTON NEGRO MAN BEGINS IN DISTRICT COURT

Selection of a jury in the murder trial of Leonard Lockett, 44-year-old Olton Negro cafe operator, got under way Thursday morning in 154th District Court, Littlefield.

The trial is a continuation of a criminal term which began Monday with the murder case of Al Griffin, Muleshoe, on a change of venue from Bailey County.

Griffin was found guilty, but received a jury recommendation for a suspended sentence. Foreman of the jury was C. A. Cox, Olton. The Bailey County man was charged in the murder of Grover Tapp, 70-year-old Muleshoe painter and school janitor.

Besides Cox, the Griffin trial jury included eight other Olton men. They were C. L. Low, Allen Johnston, A. J. Spain, Olie Smith, Louis Clark, J. C. Hamby, Melton Hines and Calvin Horn.

Lockett is charged with murder in connection with the gunshot slaying of a cotton gin worker here last fall. James Oliver Mack, 20, was killed after an argument at Lockett's cafe.

Observance Of Farm Safety Week Set Throughout Nation July 24-30

Farm accidents claim about 3,500 lives each year, more than any other industry. Some 11,000 farm residents die each year in all types of accidents, and another million suffer accidental injuries.

To direct attention to this appalling problem, President Eisenhower designated the week of July 24-30 as "National Farm Safety Week." In Texas, Governor Daniel proclaimed the period "Farm Safety Week in Texas." The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, together with the Texas Safety Association, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Farm Bureau, is pushing a farm safety education program during the week.

Theme of the observance is "Enjoy Farm—Practice Safety." Objectives of the educational effort is to curb the soaring farm accident problem which hits one farm family in four each year. Texas is among top ten states in the nation in accident rates associated with drownings, fire arms, burns and electricity. The major cause of accidents across the nation is machinery, which accounts for about 35 per cent of all accidents, followed by drownings, firearms, falls, blows, animals, burns, electricity and lightning.

Caley Completes Field Biology Training Program

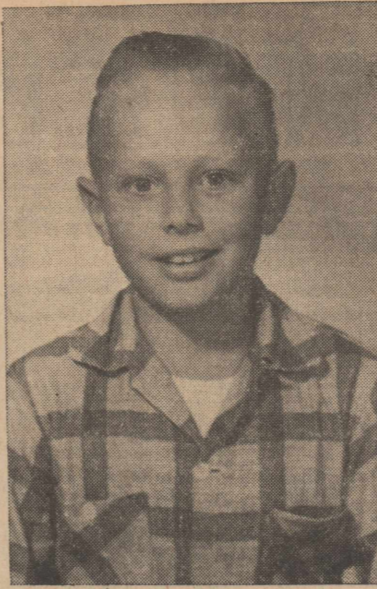
Mother Of Two Olton Men Dies In Oklahoma

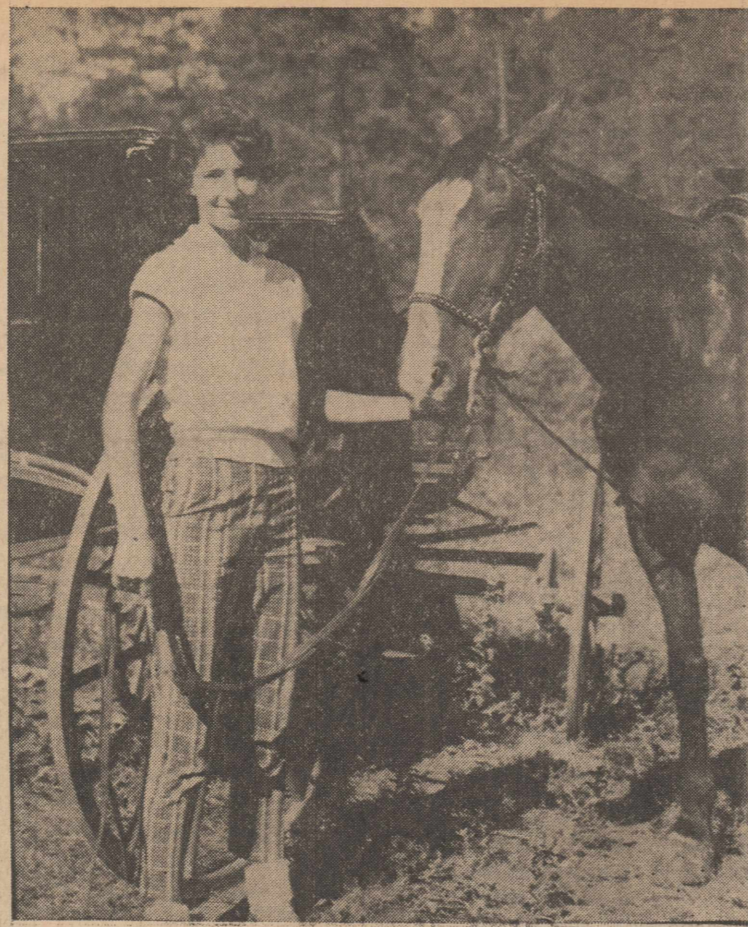
Keith Patterson, Former Resident, Dies In Kermit
