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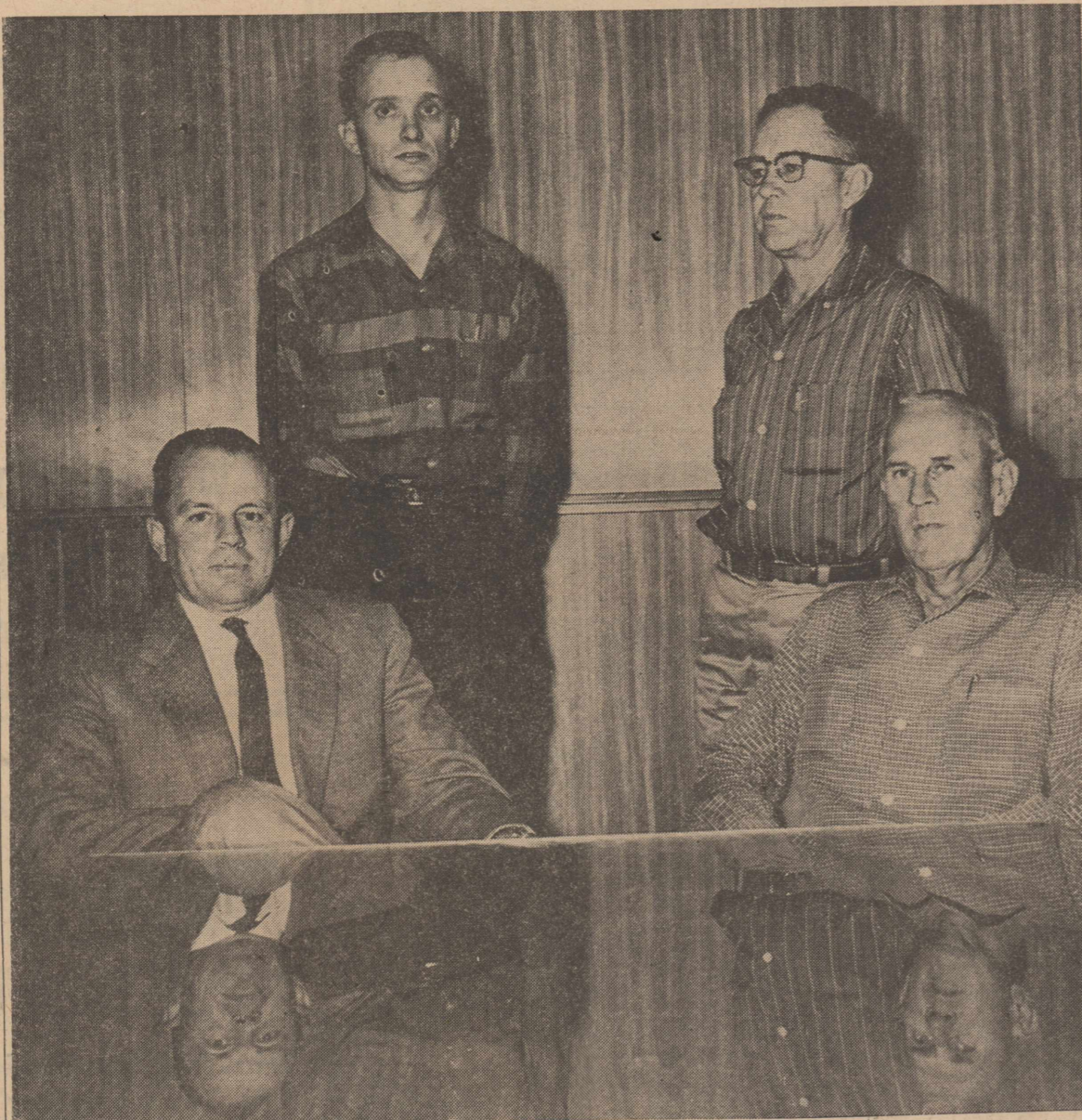
## "Pops" Concert Is Scheduled Here Sunday

## Bill Yates Is New Bank President; Frank Cornelius Now Vice-President

Owen Norfleet took the reins of Olton State Bank this week with retirement of D. M. "Dubbs" Granbery as president of that institution's board of directors. W. N. "Bill" Yates was named president of the board. Changes in management and ownership of the bank were announced at the regular monthly meeting of its board of directors held Tuesday. Mr. Norfleet was made executive vice-president and managing officer of the bank. Frank Cornelius was named vice-president and Gene Trotter remains as cashier to round out the list of the bank's officers. Mr. Granbery has disposed of controlling interest in the institution, this having been acquired by Mr. Norfleet, Mr. Yates and Mr. Cornelius.

# Man Jailed After Olton Child Hurt

Officers jailed a Lockney man here Saturday night as an aftermath of a traffic accident in which an 11-year-old child was mangled.

In Plainview Hospital with skull fracture, fracture of the right leg, severe lacerations and possible internal injuries is Rudy Urrea, 11 years old, who lives with his grandmother, Mrs. Jessie Falas, on the O. E. Patterson place east of Olton.

Charged with driving while intoxicated is Carl John Bontke, 21 years old, Lockney. Bontke entered a plea of not guilty to the charge in county court Monday and now is free on \$1,000 bond.

The child is believed to have been struck by a pick-up truck as he walked westward on Highway 70 about 8:30 o'clock last Saturday night. The accident occurred on the highway between the Dairy Mart and Olton Courts. Mr. Patterson said the little boy had ridden to town with a Latin-American man just before the mishap. The car in which they were riding developed trouble near Olton Trade Lot and the boy was looking for a telephone to call for help when he was struck down.

The child was given emergency treatment here and then rushed to Plainview in a Parsons

Funeral Home ambulance. He was on the critical list until Monday. The little boy's mother is Mrs. Alfred Garza. She also lives on the O. E. Patterson place. City Officer Ernest Holland investigated the accident. He said Bontke was driving a pick-up truck east on Highway 70 and the child was walking west.

Officer Holland said the pick-up skidded about 75 feet. The child was knocked some 15 feet from the point of impact, the officer reported.

Officer Holland said another man was riding in the pick-up with Bontke. He was not arrested. Bontke was lodged in city jail here and later transferred to Lamb County jail in Littlefield. He was booked on a charge of driving while intoxicated. Officers say Bontke has made no formal statement.

Attorney Andrew W. Stroebel was charged with interfering with an officer last Saturday night and held in city jail about three hours. Stroebel says he was jailed by Night Officer Ernest Holland when he went to the station to see a client.

The attorney said he first was refused permission to see the client, Carl John Bontke, and then jailed when he insisted. Bontke is Stroebel's cousin. Stroebel said also that his wife was shoved out of the police station by the officer when she tried to talk to her husband. The attorney was charged with "interfering with an officer." Bontke was in jail on a charge of driving while intoxicated. He

was charged following an accident in which a child was injured on Highway 70 earlier Saturday night.

Officer Holland says Stroebel did not properly identify himself as an attorney and became sarcastic when he was refused permission to see the prisoner. Stroebel says the officer likewise was sarcastic when he asked permission to see Bontke. Statements by witnesses tend to confirm that the tones of both men were sarcastic during their conversation. The conversation which led ultimately to the arrest took place outside the police station. Stroebel says Holland called him "Sonny Boy" and Holland says Stroebel insinuated that he (Holland) considered himself a "tough guy."

Holland is reported to have ordered Stroebel to go home. Stroebel was standing on the sidewalk talking to Charles McClain about five minutes later when Holland took him into custody, according to statements made by both Holland and Stroebel.

Stroebel said his wife tried to come into the police station to talk to him following his arrest. He said Officer Holland shoved her outside and slammed the door in her face. Stroebel was jailed about 9 o'clock Saturday night. He entered a plea of not guilty before Judge W. B. Smith Jr., who returned from his father's bedside at Hale Center for the arraignment.

Judge Smith freed Stroebel after the attorney posted \$25.00 cash bond. Trial date for the case has not been set. PS. Stroebel had a nice visit with his client—a three-hour visit.

Miss Dennis received \$137.50 for her lamb. It was purchased by Olton Bowling Center at \$1.25 a pound. Neal Burrow's lamb was bought at \$1.00 a pound by Olton Butane Co., and brought Neal \$90.00. Gifford Hill Western of Littlefield, represented by Dave Eaton, bought the grand champion barrow at 90 cents a pound and paid \$174.60 for him. Kenneth Blades received \$117.70 for his reserve barrow. Olton Co-Op Gin bought it for 55 cents a pound.

Good Sale Show officials said animals consigned for sale in the show's auction brought a total of \$11,386.21. Bidding was spirited in the sale which followed the show. Lambs brought about 37 cents a pound which was about 21 cents above the market. Steers brought 36 cents, or about a dime above the market. Hogs brought about 28 cents, slightly less than 14 cents above the market.

Randee Buchenau showed the grand champion heifer of the show, a shorthorn. He won the heifer in the Houston Stock Show calf scramble last year.

## FFA Sweetheart Has Top Lamb; Blades Shows Reserve Barrow

Jerry Mathis showed two grand champions and picked up a showmanship award in the spring stock show here last week end as a grand finale to his FFA career. Jerry showed his black Poland-China barrow to a grand championship Friday afternoon and was back in the magic circle with his shorthorn steer less than 24 hours later. Grand champion sheep was exhibited by Sharon Dennis, 4-H Club girl, who in her senior year also is FFA sweetheart at Olton High School. Showing the sheep for Miss Dennis, whose duties elsewhere in the arena kept her from doing so herself, was Roy Neal Jones. The champion is a Southdown.

Reserve champion steer was shown by Jimmy Moss, FFA boy. The reserve champion this year is a Black Angus.

Reserve champion barrow was shown by Don Blades for his brother, Kenneth, who was in Lubbock exhibiting the grand champion bar of the Southwestern Duroc show. The two champions are litter mates.

Reserve champion sheep was shown by Neal Burrow. Neal is a 4-H Club boy. His sheep also is a Southdown.

The grand champion steer was purchased by Olton State Bank at 75 cents a pound and brought Jerry \$694.50. It weighed 926 pounds. Jimmy Moss got \$426.80 for his 776-pound reserve champion. Panhandle Compress & Warehouse Company of Hart bought it at 55 cents a pound.

# Weed District Vote Slated Saturday

Fate of a proposed Lamb County Weed Control District will be decided at the polls Saturday.

Polls will open at 8 o'clock in the morning and close at 7 o'clock in the evening. Balloting here will be in the old school gymnasium. Hart Camp voters will ballot at Hart Camp Baptist Church.

Olton voters are split on the question of establishing the district. On the one hand some feel that it is a definite and needed step in control of noxious weeds.

Others feel that it is inflicting more and needless controls on farmers with little to be gained. Although the question to be decided is of major interest to farmers, city dwellers also may

vote if they qualify in other respects. Any otherwise qualified voter who resides within the district and has any type of property, real or personal, rendered for taxation may vote in the election.

All land but about 150,000 acres of ranchland is included in the proposed district. Towns also are a part of the district. Bindweed and johnson grass would be the chief targets of the district if it is approved.

If the district is approved, a tax of three cents per acre will be assessed on land within its boundaries. This money will go primarily to finance the administration of the district by a five-man board of directors.

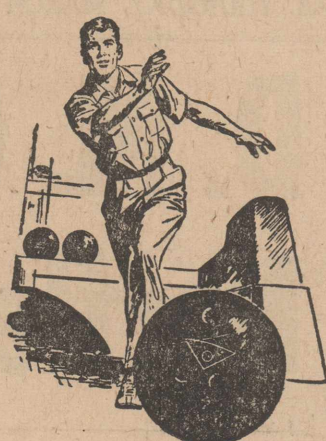

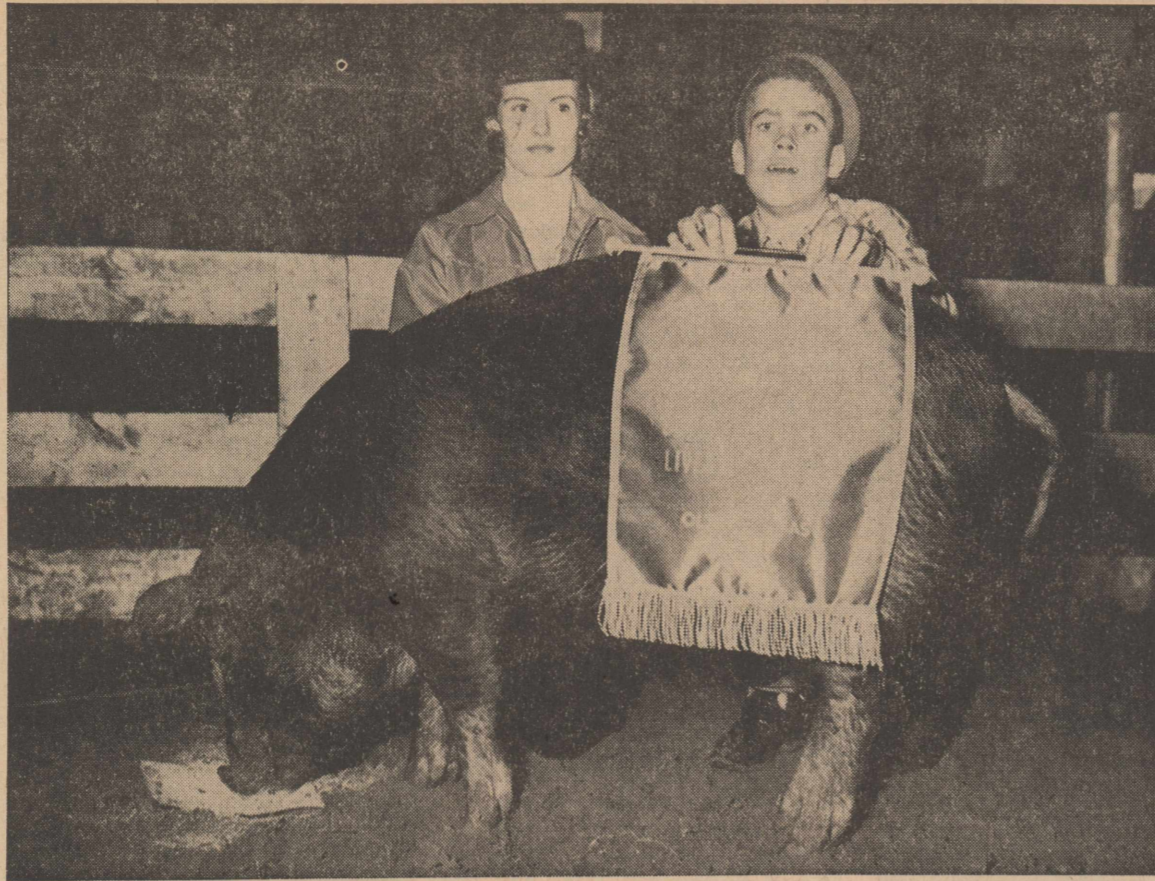

### Baker Dwarf Best Variety Castor Bean

Castor bean tests for 1959 at the High Plains Research Foundation disclose that Baker dwarf varieties 292 and 296 continue to be the best in yield of the released varieties with 1806 pounds and 1859 pounds per acre, respectively. Delbert Langford, Assistant Agronomist, stated in commenting on his report released today.

These yields were approximately 400 pounds per acre above the 1958 record and about 700 pounds above the 1957 yield. The Dawn variety made similar gains.

Five of the eight varieties tested were experimental and not yet released. The average yield of all eight was 1,829 pounds per acre. This exceeded the 1958 averages by 194 pounds and 1957 by 653 pounds. One of the experimental varieties was over 200 pounds above the three year yield leaders. Even higher yields may be anticipated in the future.

The eight varieties of castor beans under test at Halfway made a surprising recovery from the June 22 heavy hail damage. Castor beans suffered less than other crops on the research farm at Halfway.

The eight varieties were planted May 15 at the rate of 10 pounds of seed per acre. They received 50 pounds of nitrogen sidedressed on June 19. All varieties were harvested January 29. Inclement weather delayed the harvest and caused an approximate 10 percent loss from shattering. Damage from the alternaria leaf spot was higher in the sections of the field where water from rain and irrigation remained on the ground longer.

Eight varieties of castor beans tested in previous years have been found unsuitable for this area and have been eliminated from the test programs at Halfway.

The Foundation's research program with castor beans has been conducted at the research farm at Halfway for the past three years. This program will be continued as a part of the Foundation's work in developing new crops to strengthen the agricultural and industrial economy of the High Plains. Dr. Earl Collier, Chief Agronomist and Assistant Director, stated today.

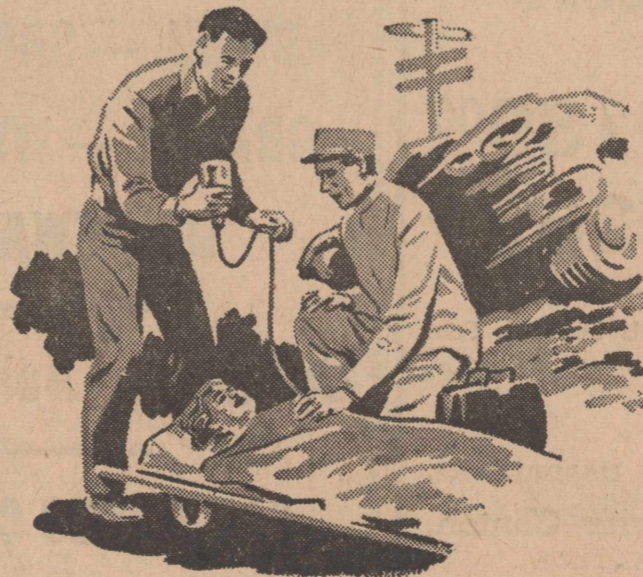

Mrs. Clifford Carlisle is to be hostess for the meeting of the Circle, which will be held at the First Methodist Church at 9:30 A.M.

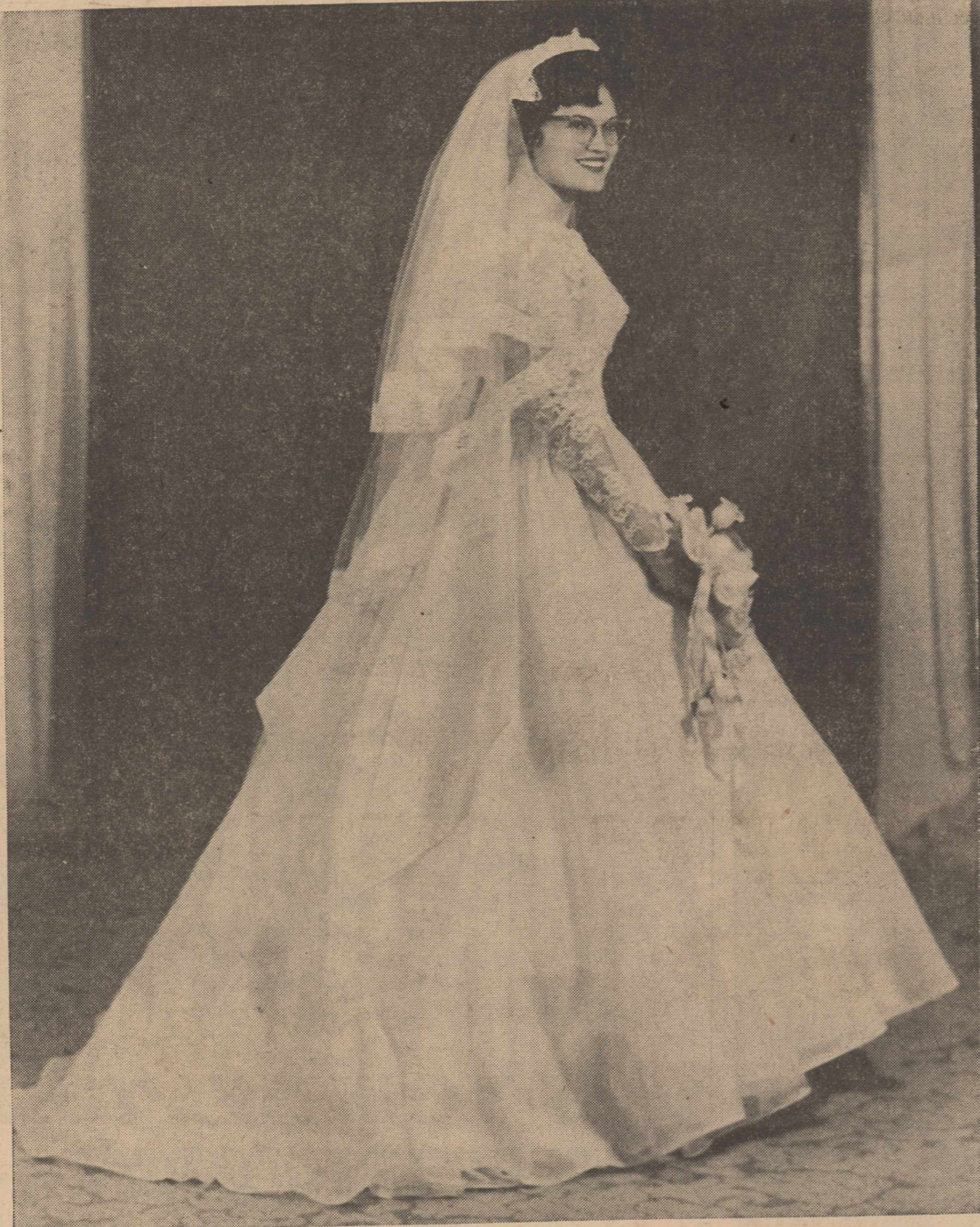

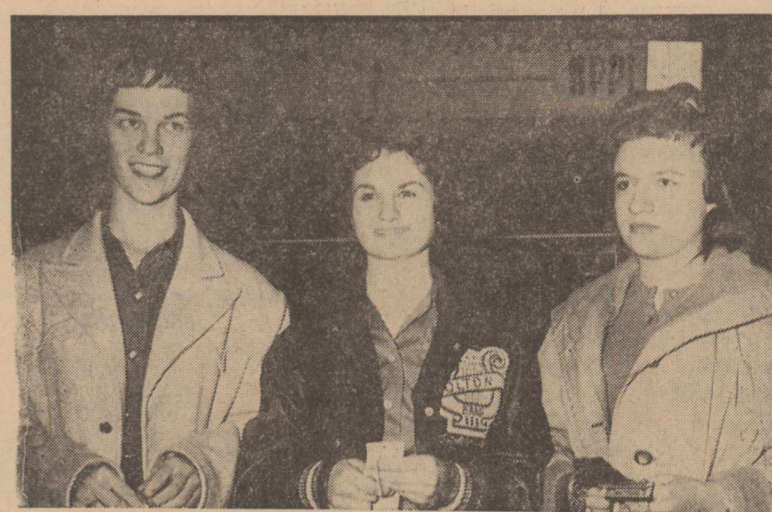

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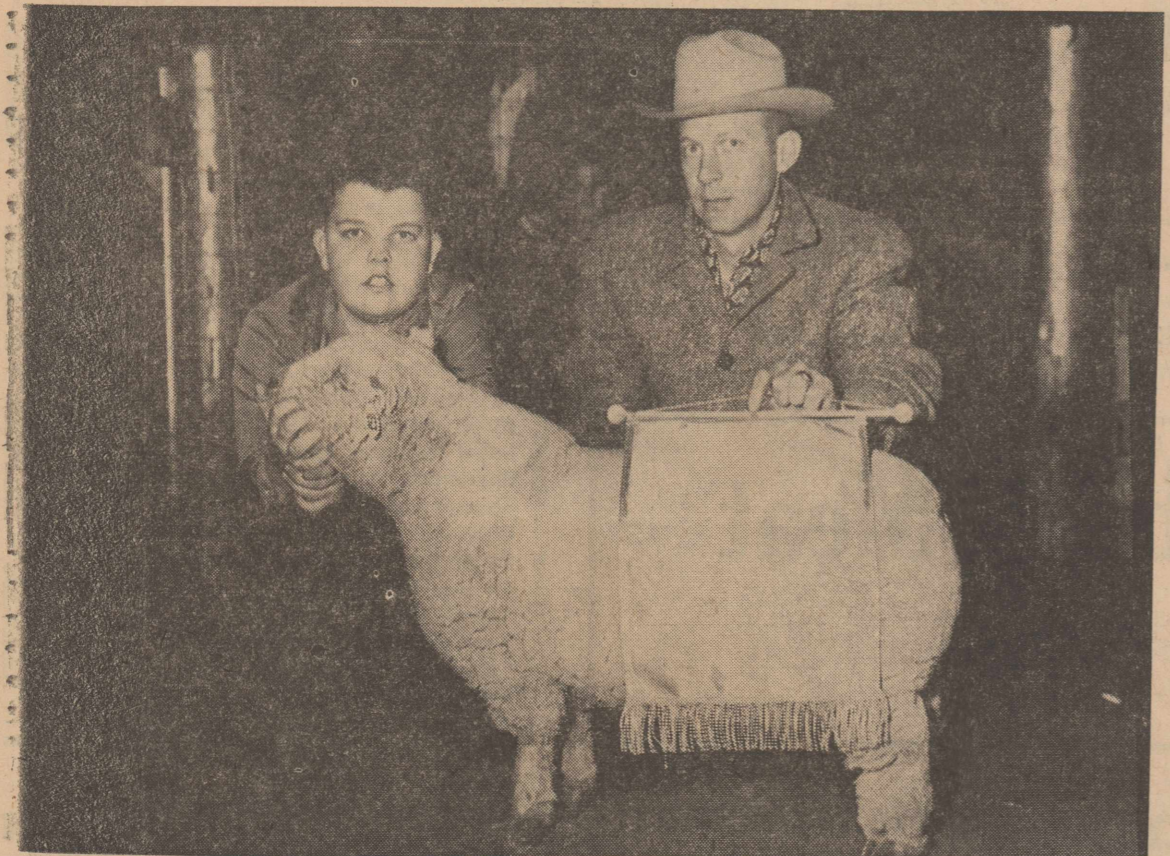

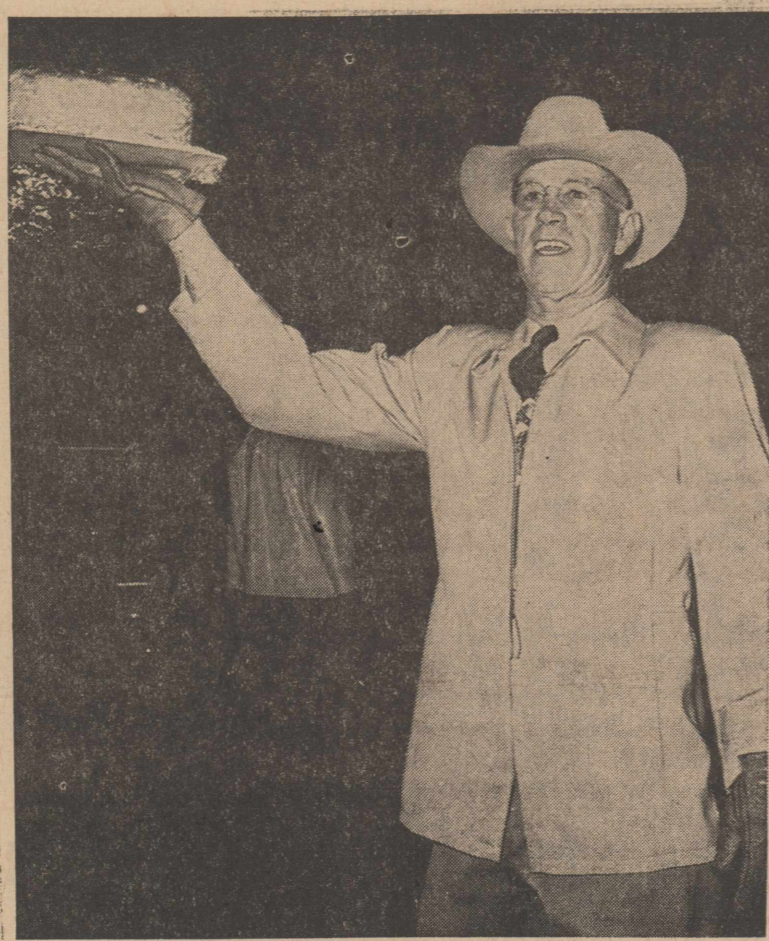

**Here Are A Few Of The Things YOU Will Have To Contend With In A Weed Control District!**

**POWERS OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

- Section 16. The Board of Directors shall have the following powers:
- (A) To determine which noxious weeds shall be subject to control.
  - (B) To determine the method or methods of control, either by spraying, cutting, burning, tillage, or any other appropriate method.
  - (C) To prescribe the specific areas within the district on which the control measures are to be carried out.
  - (D) To prescribe the period within which the control measures are to be carried out.
  - (E) To take such other action as is necessary to effectuate the purpose of this Act.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS**

Section 17. The Board of Directors is specifically authorized to promulgate rules and regulations requiring the cleaning of farm implements and machinery which is brought into the district or which is moved from one (1) location to another within the district, and prescribe the method of disposition of materials taken from such implements and machinery. Before such rules or regulations are put into effect, notice of their adoption shall be given by posting a copy thereof at four (4) public places in each county within the district at least ten (10) days before the effective date, and by filing a copy with the county clerk of each county within the district. A violation of the rules and regulations shall constitute a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not less than Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25) nor more than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250).

**NOTICE TO LAND OCCUPIERS OF CONTROL MEASURERS; INSPECTION OF PROPERTY; FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH ORDER**

Section 18. The chairman of the Board of Directors shall give written notice to each land occupier informing him of the control measures which are in effect on his land and all other necessary information to enable the land occupier to carry out the measures. It shall be the duty of each land occupier to comply with the control measures prescribed by the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of the County Commissioners Court in each county to comply with the control measures on right of ways of all public roads and other public lands within the district.

The Board of Directors or any inspector appointed by the Board shall have the right to enter upon any land within the district to determine whether control measures are necessary and to determine whether control measures prescribed by the Board are being carried out. If it is found that any land occupier is not complying with the Board's directions, the Board shall give him written notice ordering him to comply within a stated time. If he fails to comply with the order, the Board may file a suit for a mandatory injunction in the district court of the county in which the land is situated, to compel him to comply with the order. Any land occupier against whom an injunction is issued shall be liable for all costs of the suit and for a reasonable attorney's fee, to be fixed by the court.

**LEVY OF UNIFORM ASSESSMENTS; ASSESSOR-COLLECTOR; BOND; REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF BOARD**

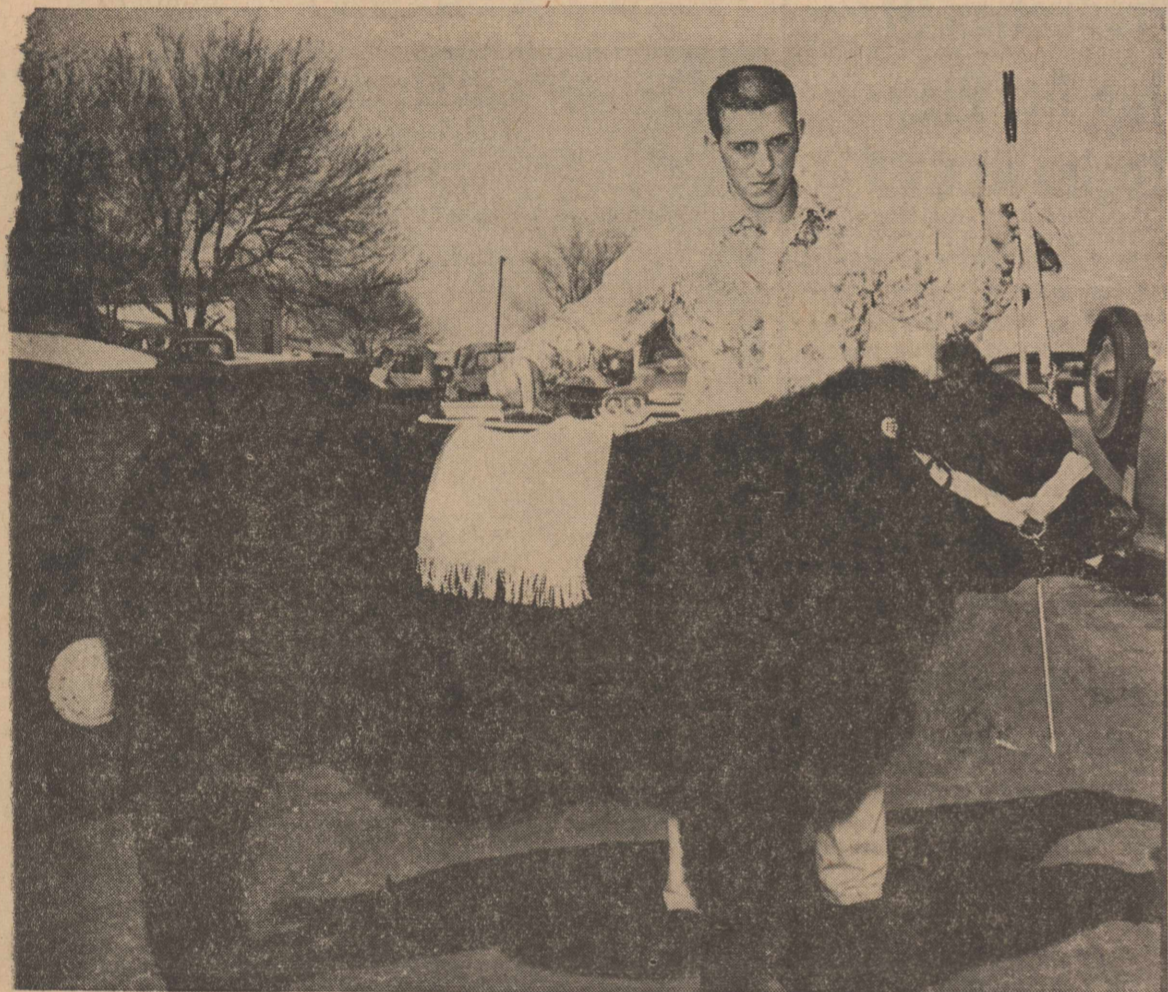
Section 19. The Board of Directors may levy an annual uniform assessment against the land within the district, not to exceed Three Cents per acre, for the purpose of paying the expenses of the district.

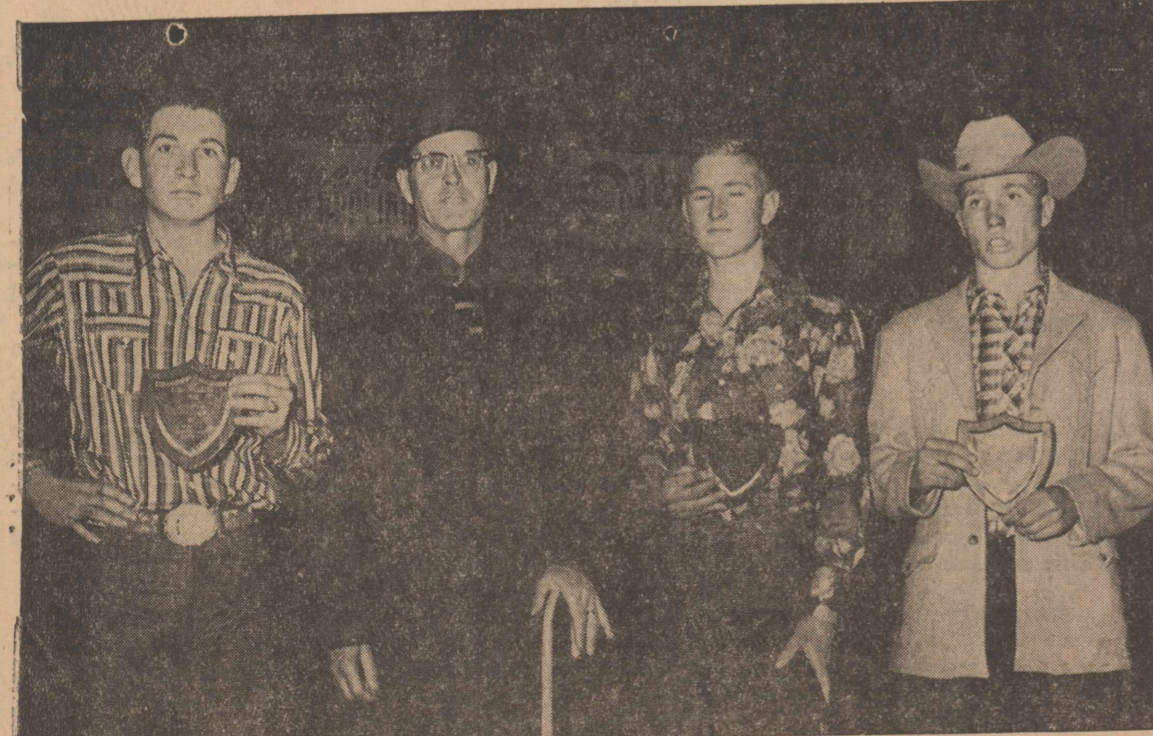
