



Three Starters Back

Ponies Starting Year With Thin, 'Green' Eleven

Coach Walter Bryan used just one word — "poor" — to describe the Olton Mustangs' chances of retaining the District 2-AA crown this season. "I think we probably will be contenders for the third position in district this year," he said.

Bryan said his young team's greatest weakness will be "lack of experience."

Three returning starters from last year's 2-AA Bi-District championship team, will be suiting up for the Blue and White again this year. They are Johnny Schenck, senior quarterback, Robert Duncan, senior center, and Jimmy Lawson, senior end.

Two of the boys nailed down berths on the All-District 2-AA team last year. Schenck made the team as a defensive back and Duncan as defensive line-backer and the second team as center. Lawson also was named to the second team as end.

The Mustangs lost their eight other starters this season. A big quartet who spurred the Ponies to many victories last year were Kenneth Hooper, Bobby Brown, Robert Priest and Feathergill, who all ranked in the 1960 district squad.

Randee Buchenau, speedy halfback, Fred Riney, end, and Larry Timmins, guard, and Frankie Miller, halfback, who all played outstanding football for Olton last season as starters, were graduated in 1961.

However, six other Mustangs who saw limited action for the championship squad last season, are expected to turn into good gridiron material this year. They are Charlie Burrus, junior fullback, George Jones, sophomore halfback, James Loveless, junior halfback, John Conder, senior guard, Roy Moss, senior end.

Coach Bryan said he expects to run mostly a ground offensive attack this year, switching to the airways only when

rushing fails. He said all the new boys are "looking pretty good."

Olton looks weak and inexperienced in the punting department. Priest, Brown and Buchenau booted most of the Mustangs' punts last season.

Schenck led the returning backs in rushing last season. He gained 219 yards on 80 carries, for a 2.7-yard aver-

age. He was followed by Burrus with 131 yards on 36 carries for a 3.6-yard average. Jones picked up 88 yards on 23 carries for a 3.8-yard average. On 11 tries, Loveless dug out 76 yards for 6.9-yard average.

Taking to the sky, Schenck completed 13 passes last season on 42 attempts. They were good for 244 yards and seven touchdowns.

Government OK's \$2,400 For Project

A telegram from Senator Ralph Yarborough to the Olton Enterprise revealed Tuesday that 12 new low-rent housing units will be built in Olton in the near future.

The United States Government has authorized \$2,400 as planning funds for the project. They will be used in locating building sites and preliminary work, according to Dick Whiteley, Olton Chamber of Commerce manager.

Whiteley went on to say that the rest of the money for the building project, or the full loan, will be paid by the government, after construction starts.

Whiteley also received a telegram from Representative George Mahon, confirming the project.

A low-rent housing authority committee here applied for the project in August of 1960.

Members of the committee which was appointed by the City Council, are Basil Sherman, Edd Hestand, Charlie Polk, Charles Sullivan and Dr. Basil Johns.

The committee will be in charge of the housing operation here, according to Whiteley.

Faculty Shows 14 Newcomers

The number "14" proved to be Superintendent Johnny Clark's lucky digit this week, as he completed the Olton schools' faculty with 14 new teachers.

Only last week, Clark was still shy seven teachers, but he filled the vacancies early this week, bringing the total number of new teachers to 14.

Clark also will be making his debut this year as head of the Olton schools. Classes will begin Aug. 28.

After Dick Bentz resigned last week as band director, Clark began a hurried search for a replacement. But he did not have to look far before he found one of Olton's own 1955 high school graduates, Jimmy Priest, to take over the music position.

Priest, who was graduated from ENMU at Portales, N.M., was director for the junior high band last year at Carlsbad, N.M.

Besides Priest, five of the new teachers will teach in high school, one in junior high, three in Bohner school, and four in elementary school.

The other new high school teachers are Sandra Meadows, girls' basketball coach, from Ft. Worth; Bobby Fred, English teacher from Plainview; Miss Gayle Scott, home economics instructor from Amarillo; Robert Nickerson, assistant football coach from Spur; and Charles Choate Jr., mathematics teacher from Graham.

Thomas Rawlins will be the new junior high science teacher. Mrs. Elmer Moore, Mrs. Clavin Graham, both of Olton, and Mr. and Mrs. Grady Cope from Rosenberg are the recently hired elementary school teachers.

Bohner school's new teachers are Miss Peggy Ruth Swalzey from San Antonio and Mr. and Mrs. E.L. Taylor.

Jar From Courthouse Cornerstone Recovered

The atmosphere in the Olton community must not have been very romantic back in the pioneer days.

The first marriage license that was issued in Lamb County Jan. 16, 1909, was for two Olton people, and they returned the license two days later—unused.

But love won out and the couple, the late E.J. Cowart and Miss M.E. Brown, married several days later.

This all came to light last Thursday, when Lindsay Dennis removed a jar, containing the marriage license and several other historical articles, from the wall of the hospital building, which is being razed here.

"The wall from which Dennis took the jar, was the cornerstone of the old courthouse, before it was remodeled into the hospital.

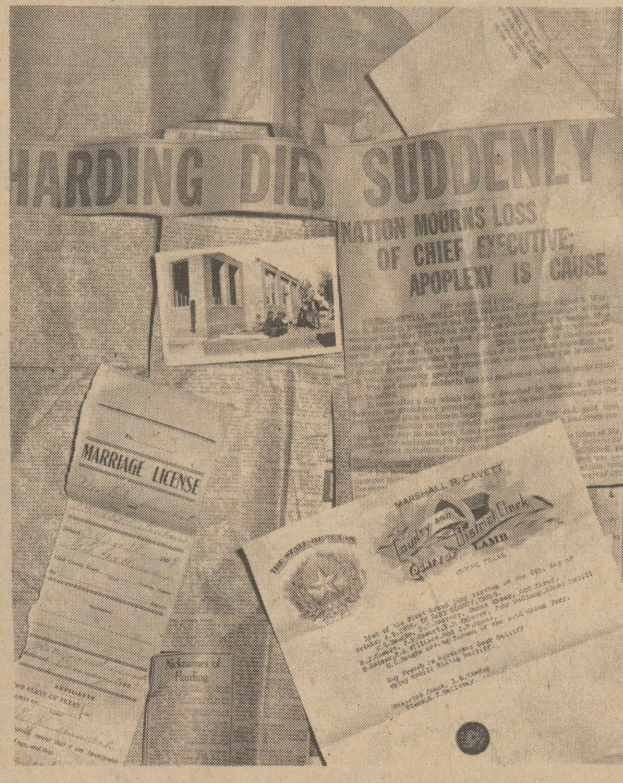
Dennis, who was a member of the crew that built the old courthouse, watched 38 years ago as County Judge R.C. Hopping placed the glass jar, filled with the license and other historical data, into the cornerstone.

Along with the license, an Aug. 3, 1923, Amarillo Daily News newspaper, a 1890 nickel, a picture of the courthouse's building crew; a list of Lamb County's first Grand Jury; and an envelope with the return address of Marshall Cavet, former County and District Clerk in Lamb County.

All the material was in good condition, but the fruit jar was broken, as Dennis tried to remove it from the granite marble cornerstone.

Milton Hines and James Harkness, manager of the demolition project here, helped Dennis remove the jar.

"I had remembered the cornerstone was there, and waited until I thought I could get to it before I tried to find it," Dennis said.



Assembly Opens Year At School

Does the date Monday, Aug. 28, ring any bells?

It may not mean anything special to you, but it does to about 1,200 local kiddos. They will hear plenty of bells ringing, as Olton schools resume classes for the 1961-62 school year Monday, Aug. 28.

To open the day's activities, a general assembly of high school students will be held at 8:30 a.m. in the high school auditorium. After the assembly, students will be off and running for nine months of study and fun.

Prior to the opening day, registration is being held today and Friday. A general faculty meeting is scheduled Saturday at 9 a.m. in the lunchroom.

There will be 14 new teachers joining the schools' faculty. A total of 51 teachers will compose the Olton faculty. Superintendent Johnny Clark will begin his first school year as the schools' head here.

Joe Turner will serve his second year as high school principal, while E.J. McKnight will be junior high principal, and Fred Gordon, elementary school principal. Elmer Moore is curriculum coordinator.

Principal of Bohner School will be E.C. Woods.

Fifteen people will compose the staff of workers in the school cafeteria. They will be supervised by Mrs. Ray Slatten.

Librarians will be Mrs. Virginia Miller in the high school and Mrs. Vivian George in junior high.

School business manager is Dorman Thomas. Mrs. Kathryn Chitwood is school secretary and Leta Bell, school nurse.

Supt. Clark said the faculty was completed this week.

There will be 14 busses and drivers used by the school system here this year. Five custodians will be in charge of maintenance. They are L.L. Hardy, Mack Keating, J.D. Lively, Bill Billingsly and John Ivins.

Supt. Clark said he expects a "small increase" over last year's enrollment, which was 1,246.

Several student organizations elected 1961-62 officers the last school year, while others will wait until the fall to organize.

Jimmy Lawson will serve as president of the FFA, while Alice Ross Bryant will head both the FHA and FTA. Editor of the yearbook will be Lana Hair, while Joanna Lewis will be president of the pep

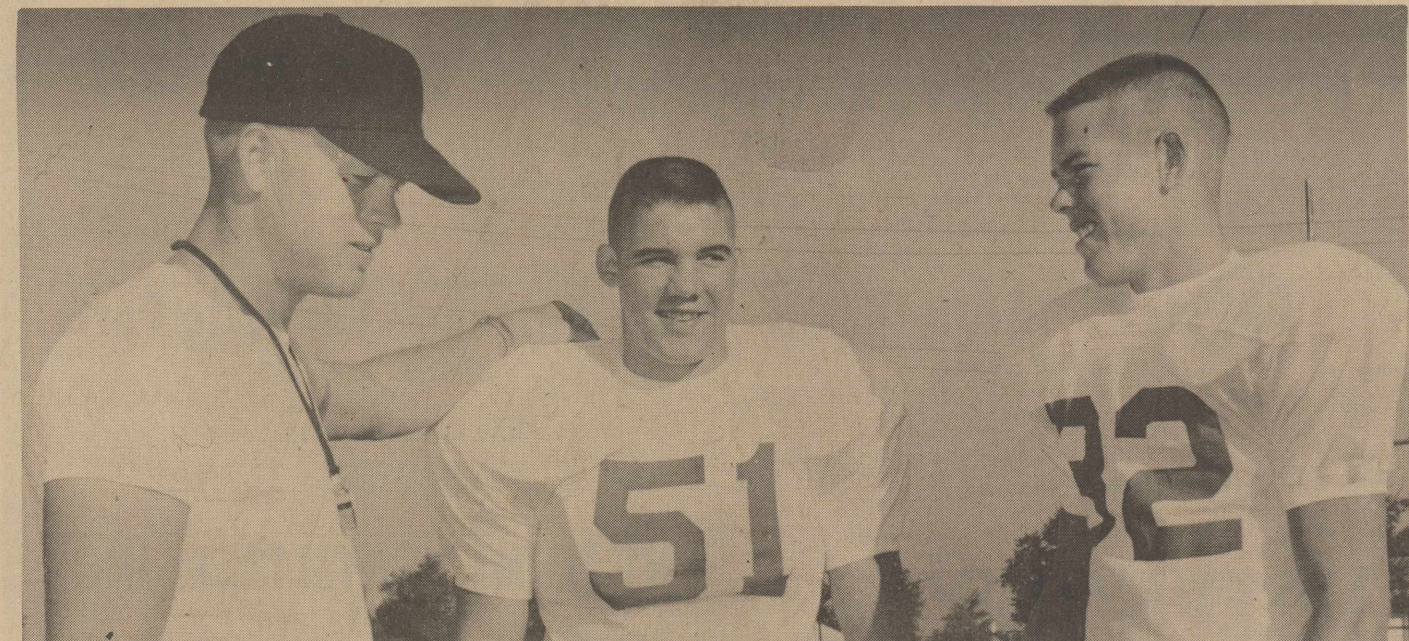

G.C. Graves of Plainview has been employed as new grade school principal at Hart. Superintendent of Hart Schools is Paul Kennedy.

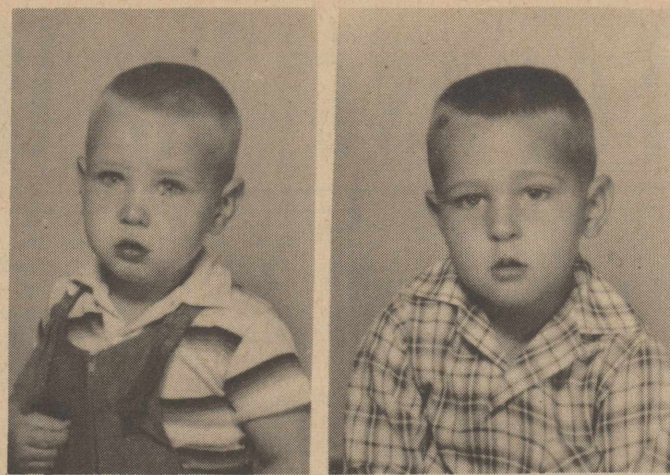
New teachers at Hart this year will be Mrs. Laura Green,

Bond Election Is Set For Sept. 8 Here

A bond election for two major city issues in Hart has been set for Friday, Sept. 8, according to Mayor Ed Harris.

The issues to be voted on are the sewer bond tax and the water improvement, or revenue for future improvement.

A \$95,000 tax bond issue is proposed, to provide funds for constructing a new sewer system in Hart. The tax which is now \$1.35, would be raised to \$1.50.

A map on the proposed sewer placements will be left in the Farmer's State Bank at Hart for the public to see.

Total cost of the sewer system and new disposal plant would be \$110,000.

Cost of providing transmission and outfall sewer, pump station and disposal facilities for the city is estimated at \$52,000. Of this amount, \$15,600 appears eligible as a federal grant.

New Sales Tax Law Spelled Out To Texans

If you see a stream of youngsters passing through a supermarket checkout counter, each with an item costing less than 25 cents, they may all have the same mother, who's trying to beat the new Texas sales tax law.

If you see somebody buying some pretty fancy-looking less-than \$10 clothes and not paying a tax on them, don't criticize the salesman for not collecting the sales tax. Those may be the buyer's "work clothes."

Just how much of this kind of taxfoolery a fellow will be able to get away with is not yet clear.

Comptroller of Public Accounts Robert S. Calvert will have to issue regulations on administration of the new tax before retailers and consumers will know the answer to many questions.

Lawmakers Failed To Supply Answers

The state's lawmakers failed to spell out all the answers when, Aug. 8, they passed House Bill 20 to levy what is called a 2 per cent "limited sales, excise and use tax" which is to go into effect Sept. 1.

The comptroller will have to do this, and later the courts conceivably could correct him on a few interpretations.

But what can be said about the new tax just from reading HB 20, which Gov. Price Daniel has said he will let become a law without his signature?

The tax levied by HB 20 is not exactly a general sales tax. It exempts many items.

It is also not always a 2 per cent tax.

On an item costing up to 24 cents, there will be no tax.

On a 25-cent item bought alone, the tax will be 1 cent, which means the rate will be 4 per cent.

It has not been made clear if several items bought in a supermarket will be taxed according to the total purchase, or on each item separately.

The bill says, "There is hereby imposed upon each separate sale at retail of tangible personal property made within this state a limited sales tax at the rate of 2 per cent of the sale price of each item or article of tangible personal property when sold at retail in this state."

It goes on to say that the tax shall be collected by using the following bracket-system formula on each retail sale: On a purchase costing 1 to 24 cents, no tax; on 25 to 74 cents, 1 cent tax; on 75 cents to \$1.24, 2 cents tax; on \$1.25 to \$1.74, 3 cents tax; on \$1.75 to \$2.24, 4 cents tax; on each additional 50 cents or fraction thereof, an additional 1 cent tax.

Although this may not be clear from the language of the bill, James W. McGrew, research League, says it means that if several taxable items are purchased at the same time, the bracket rates are to be applied to the total price of the purchases.

Companion Use Tax Also To Be Levied

The companion use tax, to be levied at the flat rate of 2 per cent, is designed to catch

taxable sales that will not be caught by the sales tax. That is, mostly large items bought out of state that would escape the sales tax here.

On this bill says: "An excise tax is hereby imposed on the storage, use or other consumption in this state of tangible personal property purchased, leased or rented from any retailer on or after Sept. 1, 1961, for storage, use or other consumption in this state at the rate of 2 per cent of the sales price of the property or, in the case of leases or rentals, of said lease or rental price."

The sales tax must be collected by the retailer from the consumer.

It will be unlawful for the retailer to advertise or claim that he will assume or absorb the sales tax or that it will not be added to the selling price or that it will be refunded.

Articles Exempt From Tax

The first group of articles exempt from the tax are articles already taxed by other statutes.

These include natural gas, oil, sulphur, motor vehicles, trailers, and semi-trailers, cigarettes, cigars and other tobacco products, motor fuels, special fuels, cement, and under certain conditions, alcoholic beverages, including distilled spirits, beer, ale and wine.

If you are just drinking, you will pay no more taxes for these spirits than you are now paying. But if you consume them "with food as a part of a meal served on or off the premises of the vendor for consumption at tables, chairs or counters or from trays, glasses, dishes or other tableware provided by the vendor," you must pay the 2 per cent tax on the beer as well as the meal.

The tax will not be levied on water or on telephone or telegraph service.

Another group of sales exemptions includes those which the constitutions or laws of the United States and Texas prohibit taxing.

Then comes a big exemption: Food products for human consumption. But the bill says "food products" does not include medicines, tonics, vitamins and medicinal preparations; bottled mineral water, carbonated water; carbonated and noncarbonated packaged soft drinks and diluted juices where sold in liquid, frozen or dry mix forms, ice or candy.

"Food products" does not include food sold in restaurants, though, and the tax will be due on served meals, unless they are served to patients or inmates or institutions licensed by the state or care of human beings, or served by public or private schools, school districts, student organizations, or Parent-Teachers Associations to students or teachers of elementary or secondary schools during the regular school day.

Bibles and perhaps a few other religious books will not be taxable, for the bill exempts "books consisting of wholly writings sacred to any religious faith."

The tax does not apply to sales of gas and electricity used for pumping irrigation

water and for several other purposes.

Sales for resale, leasing or renting are exempt, and so are occasional sales, which are defined as one or two sales of tangible property in a year by one not habitually engaging in retailing.

It does not apply to the sale of a house, but it does to the sale of radios and televisions.

There is an exemption for animal feeds, seeds, fertilizer, annual plants, fungicides and insecticides, and farm machinery or equipment employed in food production on farms.

There is an exemption of "any single article of outer wearing apparel" whose retail price is less than \$10, and this applies to any "components of outer wearing apparel," ordinarily sold as a pair, suit or ensemble, which are to be considered as a single article.

But "article of outer wearing apparel" does not include such items as cuff links, tie holders, belts, billfolds, handbags, etc.

When any single article of outer wearing apparel costs \$10 or more, the 2 per cent tax is to be computed on the entire price, with no 24-cent deduction.

Lawmakers have caused considerable confusion among merchants, by labeling the sec-

tion providing these exemptions "work clothes."

There are numerous other exemptions, but they will not greatly effect this immediate area.

The Texas Research League estimates the sales tax will cost the average family \$25 to \$30 a year. The average was based on a family income of \$2,500-3,000 annually.

Deduction On Income Tax

The taxpayer may deduct sales tax from his adjusted gross income in figuring his federal income tax.

The retailer must get from the state comptroller a "limited sales tax permit" for each place of business, showing in an application whatever information the comptroller requires. This will cost him nothing. It must be displayed in his store. It will be revocable if he does not comply with the sales tax law.

The amount of tax the retailer pays the state will also not be what he collected because, for all his trouble of collecting the tax and keeping records on it, the state will allow him to keep part of the tax.

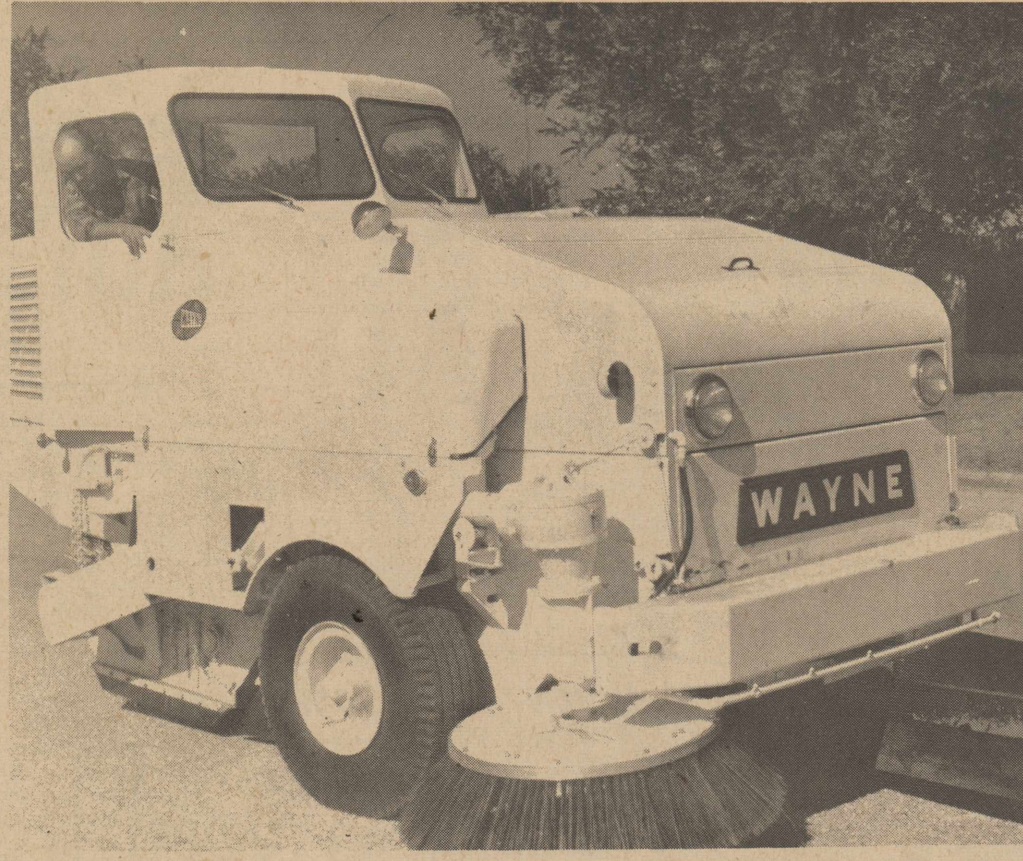

Crops Continue To Shine As Rains Hit Olton Area

What one farmer termed as the best cotton crop in this area in 30 years, was spurred along by rains last weekend and early this week.

Paul Nafzger, who farms a mile south of Olton, said, "I have farmed here 30 years, and this is the best cotton crop I've ever seen in this community."

Moisture-laden clouds dropped about 1.5 inches of rain in this area last weekend and sent showers sprinkling across fields Tuesday morning.

Most area farmers had just started watering their cotton last weekend when the timely rains hit. The community has had numerous rains this year, but little hail has damaged crops, except in the areas south and southwest of town.

Cotton stalks in the area are loaded to the core with young bolls and bright colored blooms, row middles are crowded and shady, as cotton branches stretch to meet from row to row.

Cucumbers also are still in the spotlight here, as a bumper harvest continues. Some cukes vines have about "run out of pickles," while others are still going strong. Harvest is expected to last about 10 more days.

Cuke yields not only have been good, but so have the cukes' quality and prices.

It looks like a real top-crop year for area farmers. Besides cotton and cukes, other crops also are developing into what should produce bumper yields. Grain sorghums, corn, beans, sesame, and fall potatoes all are reported "looking good" by local farmers.

Johnny Hodges, who farms 4 1/2 miles north of Olton, said his "cotton is loaded good and my sesame looks good." About 1.2 inches of rain fell at the farm last weekend and a sprinkle Tuesday.

Four miles northeast of town at the Doug Giles farm, Charlie Giles, who farms with his father, said their cotton is "loaded real good and we got a good feed crop." Rainfall amounting to 1.5 inches fell at the farm last weekend and a shower Tuesday.

On the Fred Hicks farm, two miles southeast of town, 1.5 inches of rain fell last weekend. He said his cotton and feed both "look good and the cotton is loaded."

Nafzger said he has had a good cuke crop and thinks his vines will produce about 10 more days. About 1.5 inches of moisture fell at the Nafzger farm last weekend.

Leslie Kennedy, who farms 3 1/2 miles southwest of Olton, said he received 1.2 inches of rain last weekend and a shower Tuesday. He said his cotton is going to be late because he had to replant after being hailed out in June. Kennedy said his feed is "beginning to turn red." He plans to harvest his corn about Sept. 13.

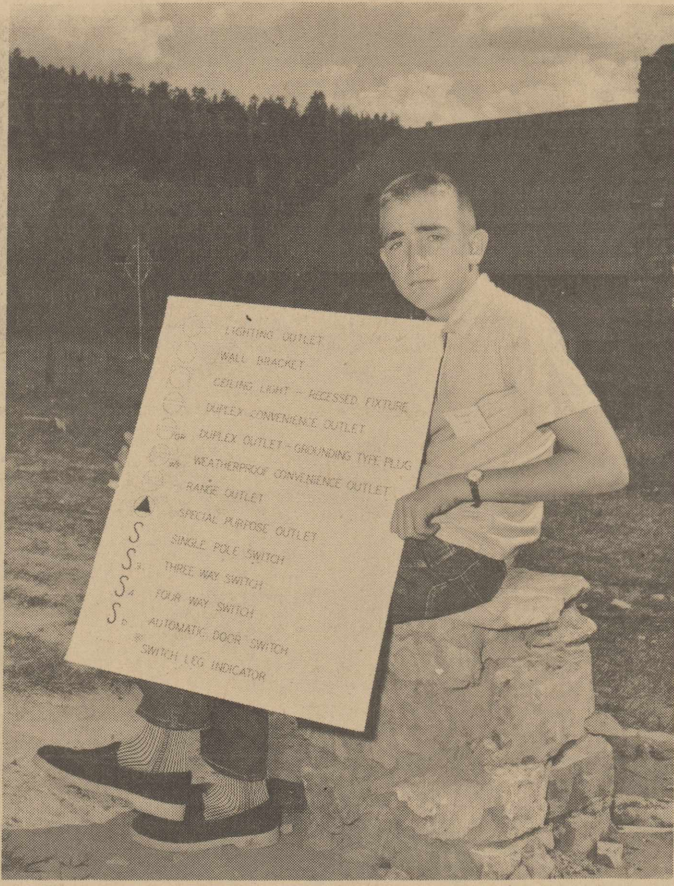
