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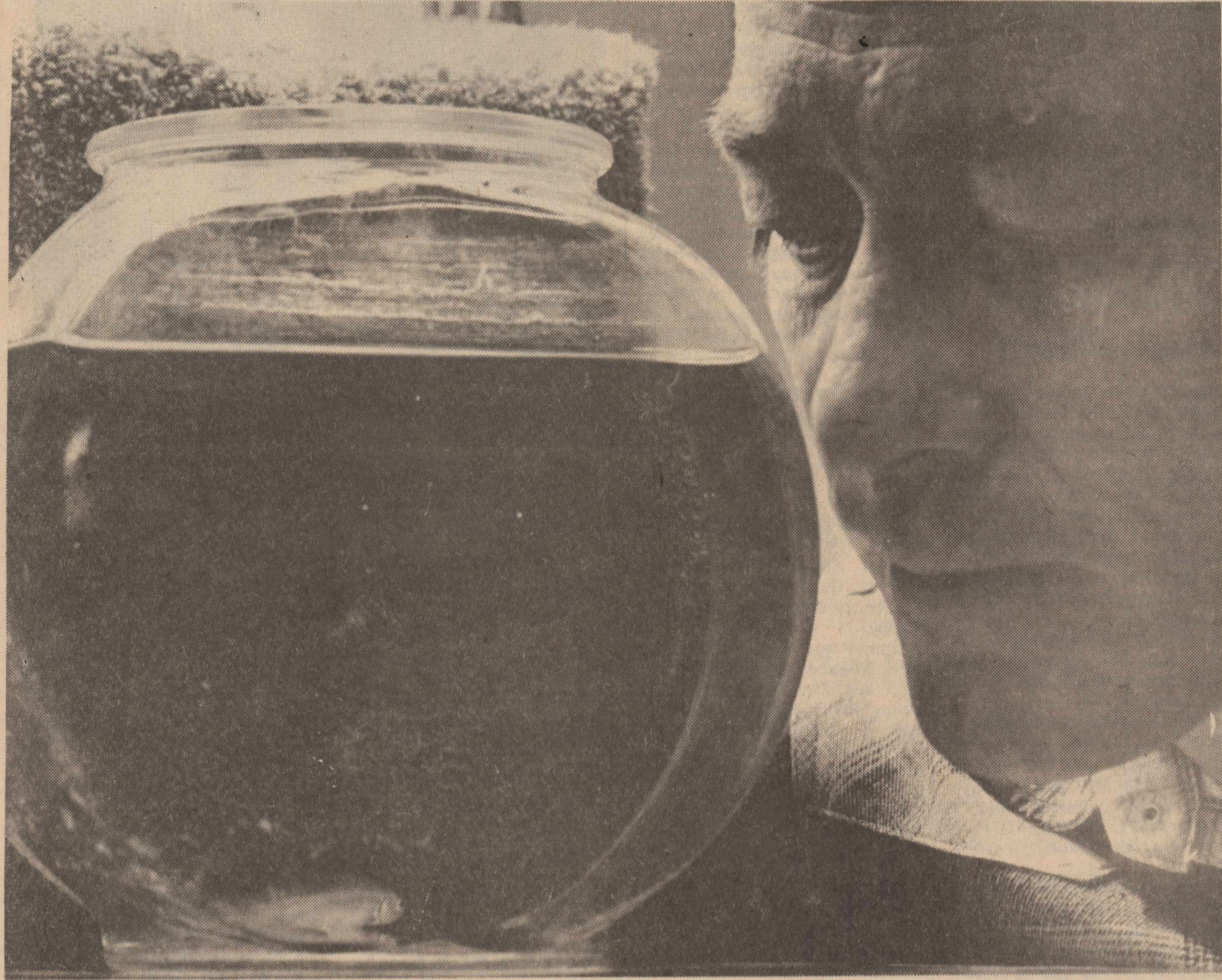

Just A Fish Story? Well, Maybe.....

ALBERT EARL HUDGINS, who farms northeast of Olton, takes a close look at a fish he says came out of an irrigation well at his farm last week. Albert Earl said he found the fish, alive and flipping, near his wellhouse. "I don't know where else he could have come from, except from the well," says Hudgins. The little fish, about two inches long and tan in color, seemed to be doing well on regular goldfish food a couple of days after the "find." Hudgins hoped to keep it alive and see how large it would grow. Assistant County Agent, Herb Helbig expressed an interest in the find, saying,

"maybe the theory that we have underground rivers is really true."

Although Albert Earl's story brings a grin from some observers, others believe that a fish actually might come from underground. Only a few years back, the Clark brothers, who farm near Olton, reported finding fish from an irrigation well. A farmer at Fieldton reported a similar find a couple of years ago. When Albert Earl's fish dies, Agent Helbig plans to send it to a research lab to determine its variety. Meanwhile, the story is making the rounds here, drawing grins from some serious interest from others.

Ownership Change Announced By Bank

Auction Of Square Considered

Olton's square still has people going around in circles. Down at Littlefield, the situation appeared to be in the same old rut as of Wednesday. The 154th District Court is still seeking bids on the one-time hospital and land, but no one has come forth with an offer seen as acceptable by the court.

"I'm going to meet with the lawyers tomorrow and see what can be done," District Judge Andy Bills said Wednesday.

The judge, apparently dissatisfied with the situation, said he may drop the idea of setting a hearing on sale of the property via bids.

"It may be that the property should be sold at public auction," the judge said.

"I'm going to talk to the lawyers about it."

Judge Bills said several bids have been turned in to Receiver Billy Hall, the Littlefield attorney.

But the situation apparently is an uneasy one, at least for people making offers on the property.

One Olton man offered a bid last week, then later withdrew it, the judge said.

Judge Bills had said last week that he planned to set a hearing on the property soon, probably within the following two weeks. He was uncertain yesterday what course he might follow.

The Olton square case, which has been collecting cobwebs the past two years, was brought back into the spotlight two weeks ago when an Olton Chamber of Commerce group pried into the situation.

The group met with Judge Bills to discuss possibilities of business development of the property.

At that time, the judge said sale of the land and building would have to be handled on a bid basis. It has been almost two years since the judge ordered the one-time hospital and land up for bids.

The Chamber, although it does not seek purchase of the square itself, has been hopeful that the party buying the land will use the property toward further development of the community's downtown business area.

At a hearing several months ago, the court turned down a bid of \$13,500.

The square has been in receivership since September, 1958, growing out of a court case filed by Dr. B.J. Souders against Drs. James E. and Lynn Fite.

Norfleet Succeeds Bill Yates

Owen Norfleet Tuesday became president of Olton State Bank, succeeding W.N. (Bill) Yates, who announced he is retiring.

Norfleet, who has been executive vice-president and managing officer of the bank the past 13 months, purchased a majority interest in the institution.

Yates, who said he will devote his time to other interests, has disposed of his stock.

In the transaction, control of the institution was acquired by Norfleet and Frank Cornelius.

Changes in ownership were announced following a meeting of the institution's board of directors Tuesday.

The bank's officers, in addition to Norfleet, now include Cornelius, inactive vice-president, and Gene Trotter, vice-president and cashier.

Directors, other than the officers, are L.D. Smith, Charlie Jones and Robert L. Straw. Norfleet, 41, is a native of Olton. His family name is familiar to students of history in this part of the state.

A 1937 graduate of Olton High School, Owen farmed until he entered the service as an enlisted man in July of 1942. He went to bombardier school and became an Air Force officer, later seeing combat duty as a bombardier-navigator.

After his discharge from the service, Owen farmed until February of 1954, when he became vice-president of Olton State Bank.

Retiring president Yates came to Olton in 1930. He became associated with the bank in 1944 and was made vice-president in 1949.

Bills was in the fuel business here 25 years and was associated with Consumers Butane until 1956. He also was in the grain business a number of years.

Trotter, who will serve as vice president and cashier, joined the bank in 1949 as a teller. He became cashier in March of 1952.

Cornelius, a native of Olton, has been a member of the bank since 1955. He was named vice-president in March of 1960.

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'Red Star' Circular Answered By Huntley

A pamphlet entitled "Red Stars are Back in Hollywood" has been circulating recently in Olton and causing people to ask: Are the approximately 100 famous persons listed on the tract as top ranking Communists really red or not?

Part of the answer may have come this week through a letter from National Broadcasting Company news commentator Chet Huntley.

Huntley, one of those charged with communist affiliations in the tract made a personal reply in a three-page letter to a Friona minister.

The Rev. Hudson B. Phillips, minister of the Union Congregational church of Friona, was upset by the smear literature when one of the pamphlets fell into his hands. The young minister immediately wrote

Huntley asking why the nationally-known newsmen hadn't vindicated himself against the publishers of the tract if information it contained is false.

In the personal letter Huntley wrote to Phillips, Huntley stated he has explored the legal possibilities of filing suit against the Cinema Educational Guild, through which local residents have purchased the tracts.

Huntley said his legal advisor learned that the Cinema Educational Guild has no members but is owned 100 per cent by Myron C. Fagan. The guild and Fagan own absolutely nothing, Huntley said, "he keeps a very small bank account and his other possessions are kept in someone else's name."

The letter continues that an individual such as Huntley who sues Fagan would only get the satisfaction of having won the case and Fagan would not be prevented from continuing to publish the pamphlet.

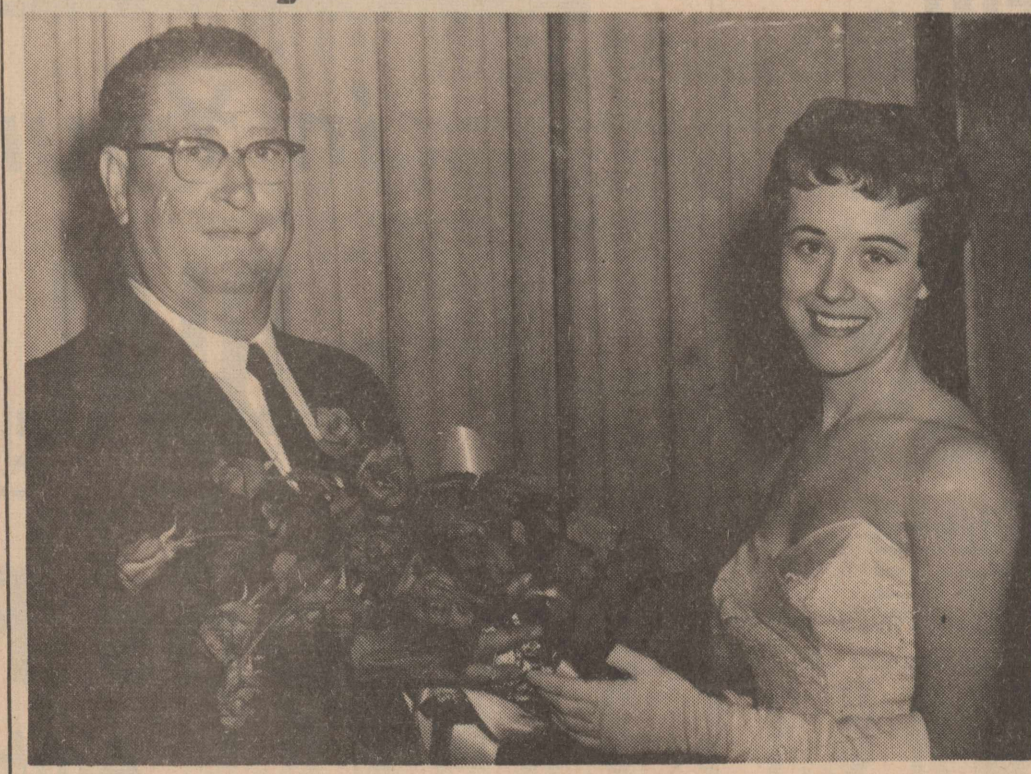
Also, Huntley's letter stated that Fagan would use the lawsuit to his own advantage, calling on his audience, for funds to defend himself.

The letter also points out that the pamphlets are a source of income and profit for Fagan and are not distributed as a public service.

Huntley recalled another attack from a "professional anti-communist," who called him a communist. Huntley won a judgment of \$10,000 against the person and the woman who made

Hepatitis Cases Reported Heavy This Year In State

More Texans have been sickened by infectious hepatitis to date this year than in any similar period since the State Department of Health began keeping records on it back in 1952. Olton has reported a number of cases each year for the past several years. One case was reported here earlier this year and several last year.

Between January 1 and April 1, the exhausting liver ailment had stricken 1,028 persons. Some of them are undoubtedly still feeling its ill effects, since the disease is capable of keeping its victims bedridden for weeks.

For the first 13 weeks of 1960, only 493 cases of the ailment had been reported in Texas. The highest incidence previous to this year was 626 cases reported in 1954.

The reason for the present upsurge in cases is not known. Public health physicians say the disease seems to attack relatively large numbers of

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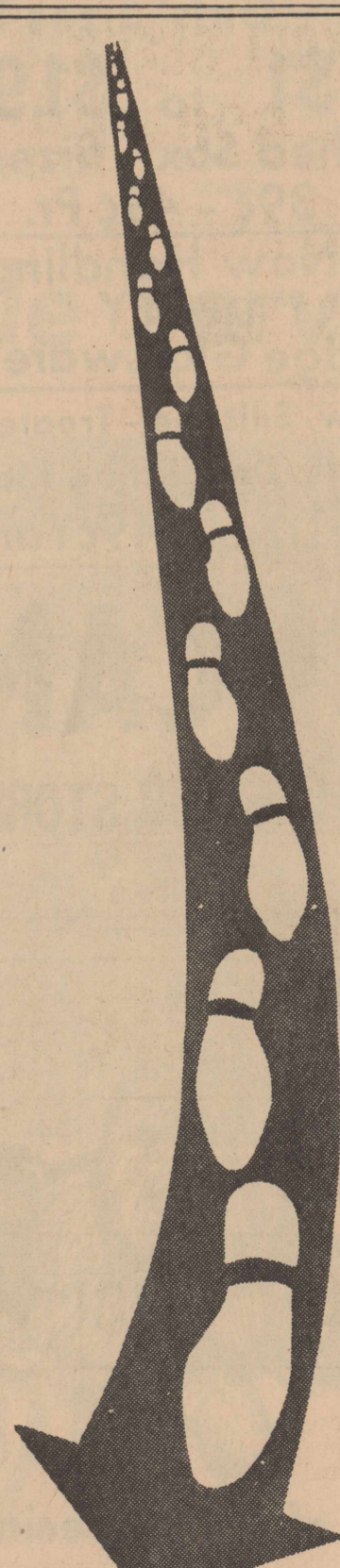
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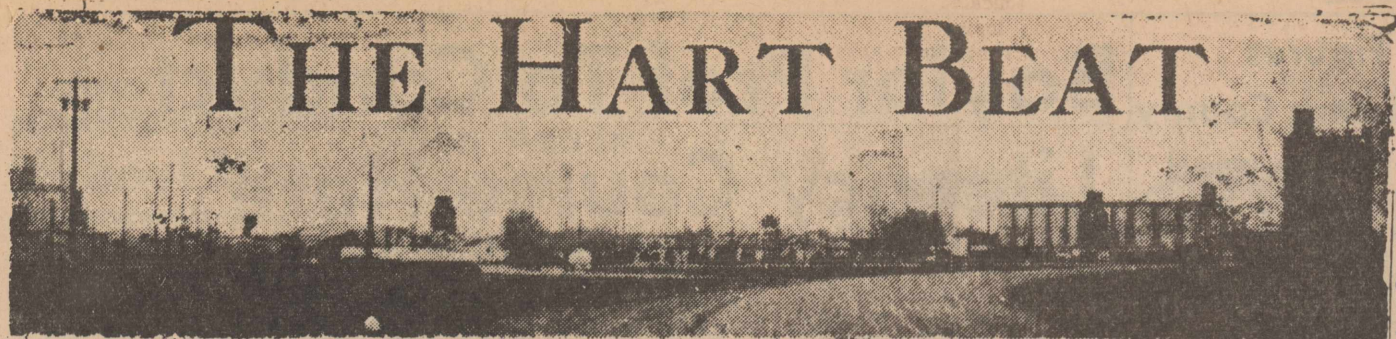
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Pre-School Registration Set For Friday, April 28

GLP Figures For Lamb County Are Announced

NEW YORK - Of more direct interest to residents of Lamb County than the gross national product (GNP), of which much has been said, is their own gross local product (GLP).

That figure is the measure of the county's business activity for the year since it represents the total output of goods and services locally.

Approximately two-thirds of this output is the result of consumer spending, according to the latest Federal figures. The rest is made up of industrial outlays for plant expansion and of the various kinds of government disbursements.

Nationally, in the past fiscal year, the GNP reached a record half trillion dollars, according to data released by the Department of Commerce. It was well over the previous year's total, despite the unemployment that prevailed.

No less than \$325 billion of it was for goods and services bought by consumers. Lamb County accounted for an estimated \$41,005,000 of this amount, which was more than its quota on the basis of population.

With only .0122 percent of the nation's population, it consumed .0125 percent of the nation's output of goods and services. The spending ranged in all directions, from cosmetics to clothing, from furniture to food and from movies to automobile repairs.

Of the \$41,005,000 outlay locally in personal consumer expenditures, \$31,260,000 was for retail store purchases and \$9,745,000 the estimated amount spent for services of all kinds.

Because of his huge spending power, which enables him to absorb 65 percent of the nation's output of goods and services, the consumer holds the reins today. The way he spends his money spells out prosperity for some kinds of business and depression or failure for others.

Grain Sorghum, Corn Bases Interchangeable, Aten Says

A change in interpretation of the Emergency Feed Grain Law making grain sorghum and corn bases interchangeable was announced Wednesday by L.D. Aten Jr., Lamb County ASC office manager at Littlefield.

Aten said he wanted to correct an interpretation at recent meetings with producers over the county.

"At first, the regulations called for any producer with a grain sorghum base to plant only grain sorghum on his base acreage," Aten said.

"The same was true of corn. Any producer with a corn base was supposed to plant corn on his base acreage, if he participated in the program," he went on.

"It's been changed," he continued. "Now a farmer with a grain sorghum base can plant either grain or corn or both, on that base. The same thing's true with corn. If a producer has a corn base, he can plant either crop, or both, on his base."

Aten explained that these rules apply only to producers who participate in the program. Farmers who do not participate may set up their grain and corn acreage any way they want to, however they will not be eligible for price supports.

Producers entering the price supports of \$1.88 per hundred weight.

Aten last week announced that the grain sorghum yield average for Lamb County has been set at 2,430 pounds per acre. On corn, the figure is 62.2 bushels per acre.

The ASC office is preparing notices to be sent to producers, notifying them of yield figures for individual farms. These notices should be in the hands of

farmers by April 27, Aten said. Sign-up for participation in the grain program will be held during the month of May.

Unemployment Pay Benefits Are Extended

LITTLEFIELD - The payment of temporary extended unemployment compensation benefits which is scheduled to begin in Littlefield Wednesday, April 12, will potentially affect some 600 individuals in this area who have already exhausted their unemployment insurance benefits under the regular program.

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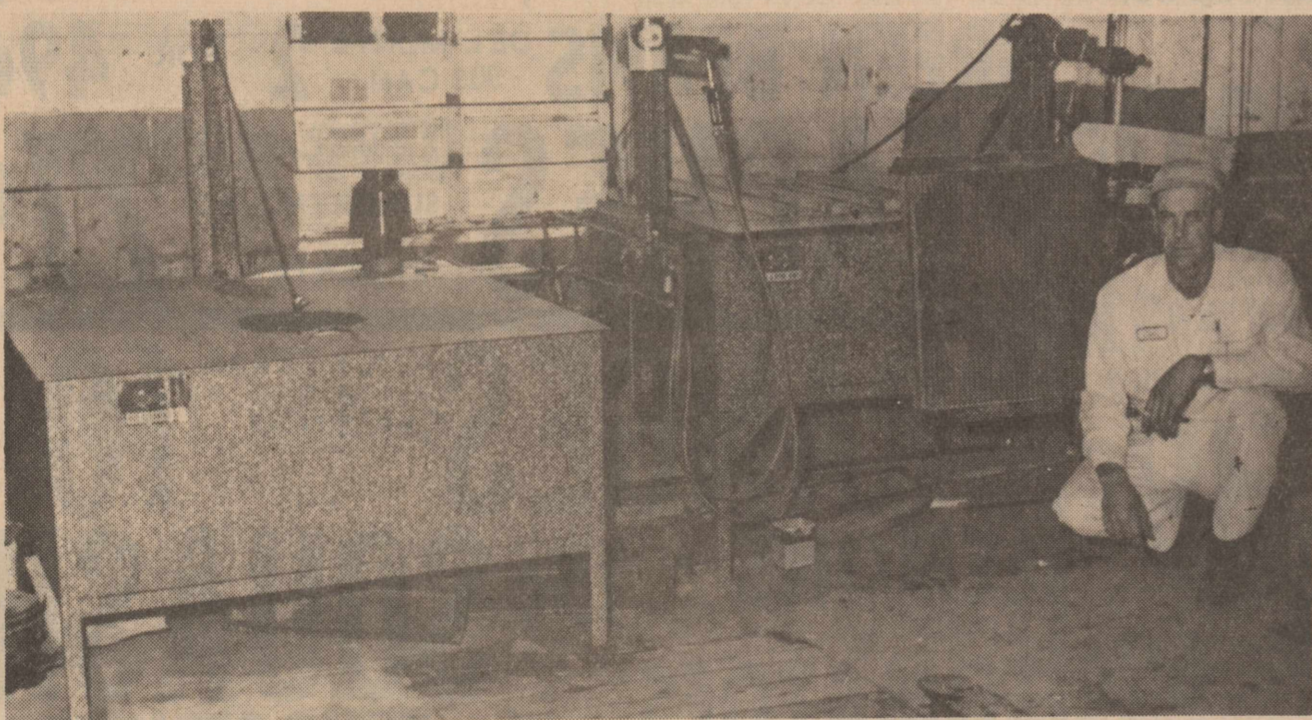
