

ORC Seeking New Pro As Miller Quits

The resignation of Glen Miller, Olton Recreation Center's golf pro, was announced Friday by ORC officials.

Miller said, "I just can't keep the golf course in condition, stay at the swimming pool, take care of the Pro Shop, locker rooms and lounge, all by myself, so I resigned."

Eldon Franks, ORC board of directors president, said he personally feels Miller "has done a wonderful job and we appreciate everything he's done for the club."

However, Franks said, Miller "wanted a three-year contract,

and since the board of directors operates on a year-to-year basis, we didn't feel like we had the authority to give it to him."

Franks said he had no other comment to make on the resignation.

Miller's decision to leave the post, it was learned, resulted from a disagreement between Miller and the board over what the duties of the golf pro should include.

Franks said a committee composed of Bob Duncan and Bill Kelley has hired W. B. Smith Jr. as temporary manager of the swimming pool. Smith took over the pool Sunday and also will register golfers until a permanent golf pro is employed, according to Franks.

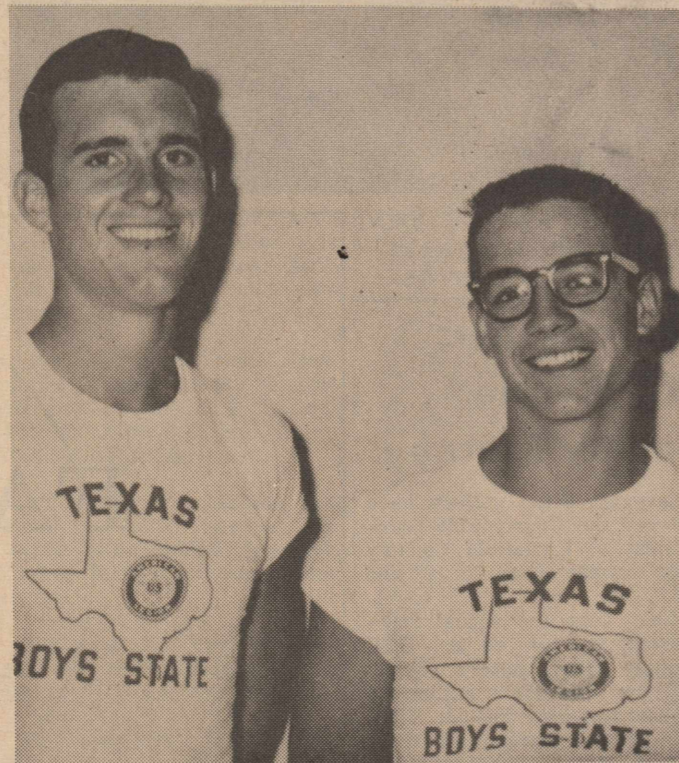
Committeemen Truitt Sides, Dr. Basil Johns, Frank Cornelius, T.J. Roberson and Franks are seeking a new pro to replace Miller.

Miller and his family moved to Olton from Lawton, Okla., in 1957, when he was employed to construct the ORC golf course. Miller has been at the club course as golf pro since.

No definite future plans have been announced by Miller. He said, "I'm going to take a rest from golf for a while to just hunt and fish and ranch a little. I want to go back to golf later."

Miller said he and his family will move to Norman or Lawton, Okla., this weekend. He owns a 520-acre cattle ranch near Norman.

The Millers have three children, Glenda, 18, Rosalee, 14, and Jerry, 12.

City Cracks Down On 'Fire Chasers'

City After Fire Truck Followers

The city council Monday night ordered a crack down on drivers who have no business chasing the fire truck when an alarm is sounded.

The action came at a regular meeting of the council, after council members had heard reports of numerous fire chasers at a blaze at the C.W. Phillips farm Monday afternoon.

"We need to do something about the people who chase the fire truck," Councilman Lynn Fite, a volunteer fireman, said. "They make it hard for the firemen to even get to a fire sometimes."

The only way to stop the practice, the council agreed, is to "get tough" with the fire truck chasers.

"It won't do any good to warn them," Fite said. "Let's just have the chief issue tickets---that's the only way to stop it."

Police Chief Emmett Burrows said Wednesday he would be watching for fire chasers in particular when the next alarm is sounded.

"We're going to put a stop to it," he said.

The crackdown of fire chasers was one of a number of decisions made by the council Tuesday night. Others were:

1. Approved taking of bids on a street sweeper at a meeting set for 5 p.m. June 30. Cost on the sweeper is expected to run between \$8,000 and \$9,000.
2. The council plans purchase of the sweeper in connection with the paving project now under construction here, in an effort to assure better maintenance of city streets.
3. Approved a plan to put city employees under the Social Security Act. Cost to the city is expected to run about \$850 per year.
4. Approved vacations for Bernice Smith, July 13-27; Police Chief Burrow, last week in June and first week in July; and Billie Hall, two weeks in August.
5. Appointed a board of equalization including G.T. Sides, Eldon Franks and Gene Trotter as regular members along with several alternates.
6. Approved installation of a street light at 3rd Street and Avenue E, an intersection between the First Methodist Church and Main Street Church of Christ.

Two Fuel Tanks Threaten As Firemen Battle Blaze

Firemen battled a raging fire almost an hour Monday at the C.W. Phillips farm, while blazing flames leaped at two nearby fuel tanks.

A watchful eye was kept on a butane tank and gas tank, which were only feet from the dancing fire. One end of the butane tank was covered with

a black smoke ring.

A large granary, truck shed, 1956 Chevrolet truck and farming equipment was destroyed by the fire. Loss in property was estimated at about \$5,000 by Phillips.

The fire was started by burning weeds, according to Charles Gibson, a farm laborer at the Phillips farm.

Gibson said he was burning weeds on the south side of the granary at about 11 a.m. and went to the east side to burn some more. He turned around and saw "the whole thing was on fire."

Mr. and Mrs. Phillips were not a home, so Gibson ran into the house and called the fire department.

Gibson said he then attempted to get the truck out of the shed, "but it wouldn't start."

Neighbors saw the smoke and came to help Gibson move as much of the farming equipment as possible.

Both fire trucks dispatched to the fire and had to be refilled to stop the blaze.

Mrs. Phillips said her husband kept corn, tires, oil, cotton seed and various farming equipment in the granary. She said the cotton seed were still burning Monday night at 9.

Phillips said the truck was the only thing destroyed that was insured.

The Phillips farm is three miles north and three west of Olton.

Police Chief Tells Of Mishap He Forgot

Details of a minor two-car accident, at Main and Highway 70 which failed to make news in The Enterprise last week were reported to the newspaper

Wednesday by Police Chief Emmett Burrow.

The accident, which occurred Saturday, June 3, involved cars driven by Gary Johnson, 17, and Police Chief Burrow.

The Enterprise learned of the accident late last week, when an unidentified caller phoned and asked why the newspaper failed to report the mishap.

Investigating the story later, Publisher Bill Turner asked the police chief why the newspaper was not informed of the accident.

"I just didn't think of it," the police chief said.

Burrow said damages to the auto he was driving, a city-owned police car, amounted to only \$14. Damages to the Johnson car came to about \$125.

Told that the newspaper had an obligation to its readers to print the story, the same as it would any other accident story, Burrow replied: "I know that and I don't care. . . go ahead and put it on the front page."

Burrow said he was driving west on Highway 70 and Johnson was headed east. The autos were in collision as Burrow attempted a left turn onto Main.

Impact involved the front of the Johnson car and the right rear of the police vehicle.

No tickets were issued.

Petition List Is Growing

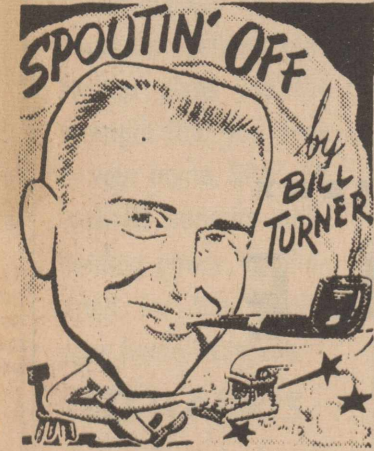
Forty names have been signed to a petition here asking District Judge E.A. Bills to act in the Olton Square case---and the list is growing daily.

But, the fact that Emmett forgot to tell us about it sort of put him on the spot. We had to ask him why and tell him that we'd have to print the story.

That just happens to be part of a newspaper's job, and we intend to do our job, even though people criticize us sometimes for doing it.

Sometimes we deserve criticism, because we make mistakes like anyone else. But we strive every week to fulfill our obligation and responsibilities to Olton---on a fair and impartial basis.

HERE'S A TALE that's making the rounds, one which I spotted in the Perryton paper. I think it's worth repeating:

President Kennedy came away from the summit meeting in Vienna with Khrushchev with the statement that the two men agreed in principle on most things and that the meeting was most harmonious.

This is bad news, indeed. For when a meeting with the Russian Bear is "harmonious" it means that things are going his way.

The story of the hunter and the bear illustrates the point.

"Well," said the bear, "What do you want to shoot me for?"

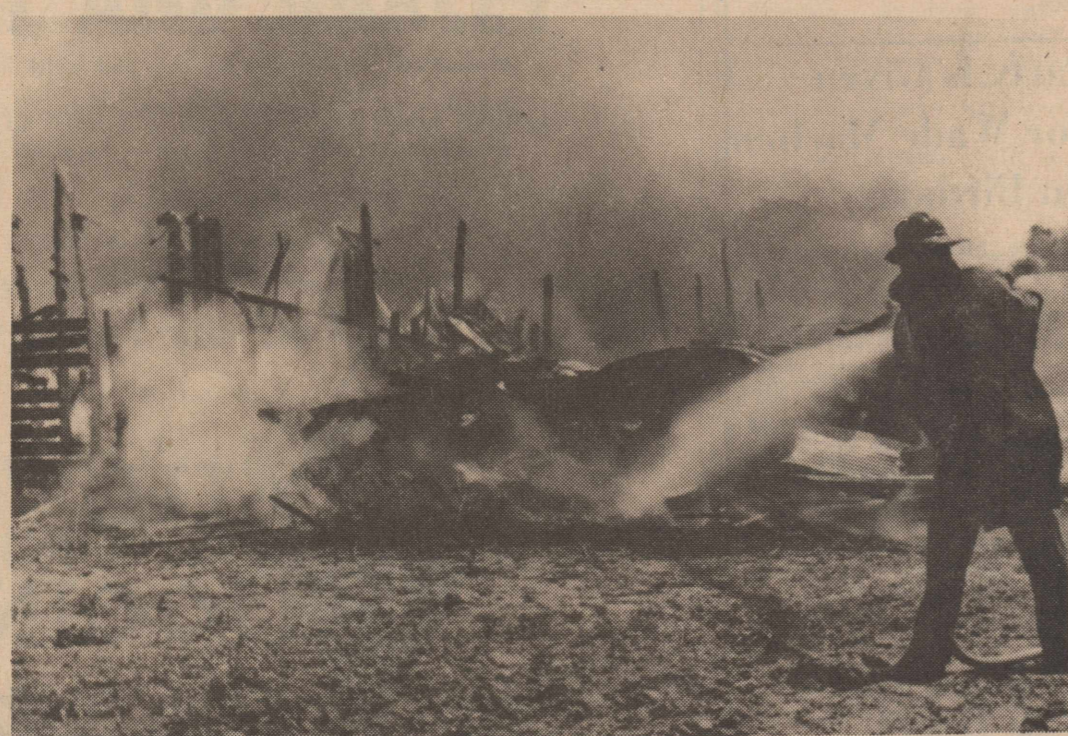
"Simple," grunted the hunter. "I want a fur coat."

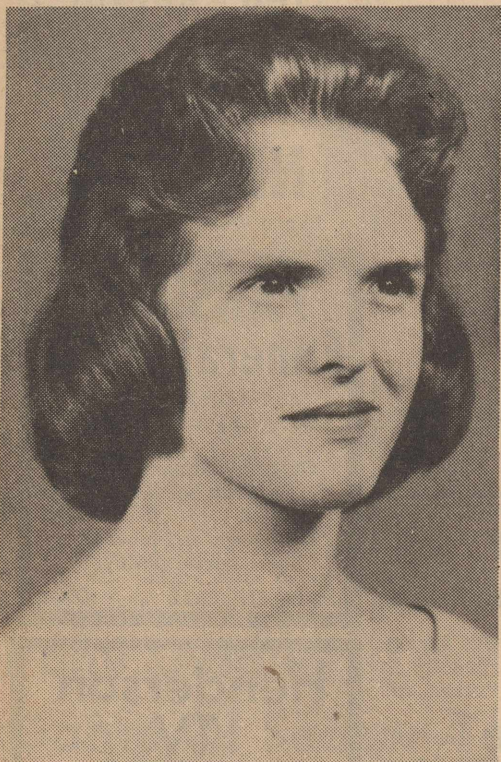

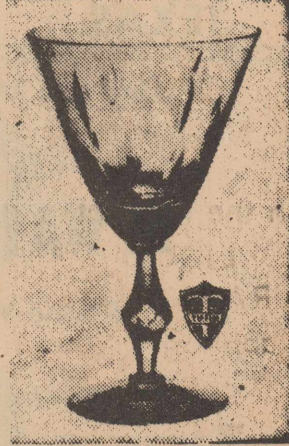

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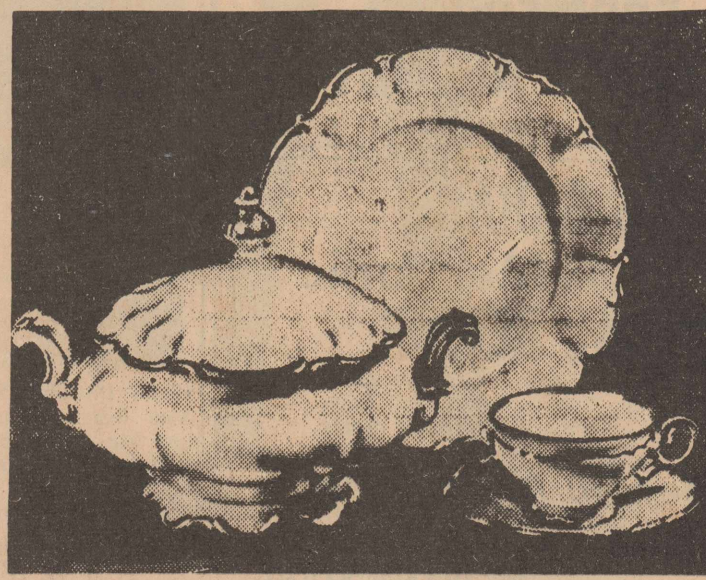

Sun Speeds Barley, Wheat Harvest Here

A mass of hot air sent scorching temperatures across the Olton area this week, as young crops thrived on blistering sun. Rising temperatures speeded maturing barley and wheat crops, sending farmers into fields with combines. Approximately 948,000 pounds of barley and 430,000 pounds of wheat had poured into Olton elevators Tuesday, since this year's harvest began.

Local elevator managers said some wheat was still too wet, but barley is only testing about 14 per cent moisture. Dan Gregory, United Elevators manager, said "yields are above average on barley and I expect them to be on wheat." Good barley yields also were reported by Glen Singlettery, manager of Olton Grain Co.,

who said the barley harvest "appears to be about half over." "Wheat we've received has had a very good yield, anywhere from 50 to 70 bushels per acre," said Allen Johnston, manager of Sanders-Paris Elevator.

Cotton, maize and vegetable crops also were speeded along by the giant dose of sunshine. W.E. Miller, who farms seven miles north and five west of Olton, said he has harvested 275 acres of wheat at his Dimmitt farm, and will start harvesting here next week. He averaged about 25 bushels per acre on the dryland wheat at Dimmitt.

"My cotton looks good and doesn't look like any insects are in it. My crop looks a little farther along than it did this time last year," Miller added.

Barley harvest was completed last week at the Doug Giles farm, three miles north and one east of Olton. Charlie Giles, who farms with his father, said the 25 acres of barley "averaged about 50 bushels per acre, which was an average yield." Giles expects to begin wheat harvest next week. He said he does not plan to spray his cotton.

Mrs. Bill Langford said her husband was cutting wheat for several local farmers, but does not expect to begin harvesting his wheat until Friday.

At the Glen Peterson farm, a mile north and one east of Olton, barley harvest was finished last week. Mrs. Peterson said her husband has not sprayed his cotton, "but wishes he had."

Wheat harvest began Tuesday at the Earl McClain farm, southeast of Olton, and barley harvest ended last week. Mrs. McClain said the wheat yield is good. McClain planted pinto beans Monday, and his wife said, "he's thinking about spraying his cotton."

Mrs. Gene Mitchell, whose husband farms a half mile north of Olton, said, "All our crops are up now and look pretty."

Mrs. Walter Malone said her husband completed planting last week, when he planted pinto beans.

"All my crop is up and it is farther along now, than it has been at this time the last few years," commented Paul Nafzger, who farms a mile south of Olton.

"We didn't spray for insects, but they did a little damage to our cotton, however, they are letting up now," Nafzger added.

Nafzger expected to begin wheat and barley harvest this week, and said he "expects a good yield from both crops."

"All our cotton is up and our potatoes vines have little potatoes on them. We finished planting 60 acres of cucumbers last week," said Mrs. Kenneth Harper, whose husband farms a mile east of town.

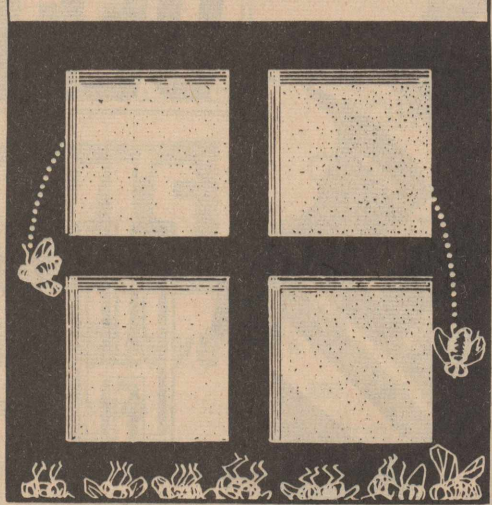
"Our cotton and feed both look real good," said Mrs. E.M. Venable, who lives two miles east and two south of Olton.

"Our crops look real fine, and everything is up," stated Mrs. Billy Guy Thomas, whose husband farms two miles west and 3 1/2 north of Olton.

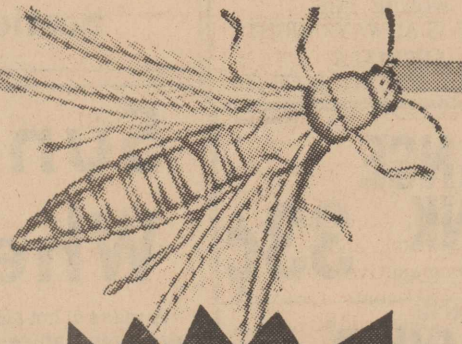

When the mock session of the legislature convened, Schenck said the youthful legislators "tried to pass a bill that would raise the speed limit to 70 miles per hour at night and 75 in the day, so people would hurry and get where they were going and fewer car wrecks would result."

While at the capitol Kenneth toured the state library and state treasury department, where he saw a \$10 million bond. Johnny said he toured the Department of Public Safety and learned how to fingerprint people, take "mug shots," look for clues when crimes occur, and operate a two-way radio.

Johnny had his first military experience, when two Army officers took him and a group of boys for a ride through Austin in an Army truck. He said people began shouting at him, and asking him what he was doing, so he answered by saying that he was "going to Cuba to fight."

"We met boys from everywhere—you name it and they were there. We all just became friends right off the bat," said Schenck.

Both boys agreed that they "had a great time and would go again if they had a chance." Johnny and Kenneth were selected in March to represent Olton at the convention. Roy Neal Jones and Phil Neinst went from the Olton community in 1959.
