



Crash Kills Olton Boy, Hurts Five

First Man To Arrive Tells Of Wreck Scene

A Plainview man, who asked not to be identified, and two companions were the first to arrive after the wreck in which an Olton boy was killed and five other persons were hurt Monday night.

He described the scene this way: "We were coming from the west and saw the wreckage. We stopped and I saw Mr. Ogle crawling on hands and knees across the highway. I told the two fellows with me to take care of him. They got him to lay down at the side of the road."

"I went over to the body of the Copeland boy, which was on the edge of the highway. I saw nothing could be done for him. . . ."

"Then I went on to the other car, the one the Springlake men were in. Two of the men were out of the car by the time I got there."

"One of them said: 'We got a buddy pinned inside the car. Help us get him out.' We were able to bend the steering wheel a little and get him out and lay him down on the ground."

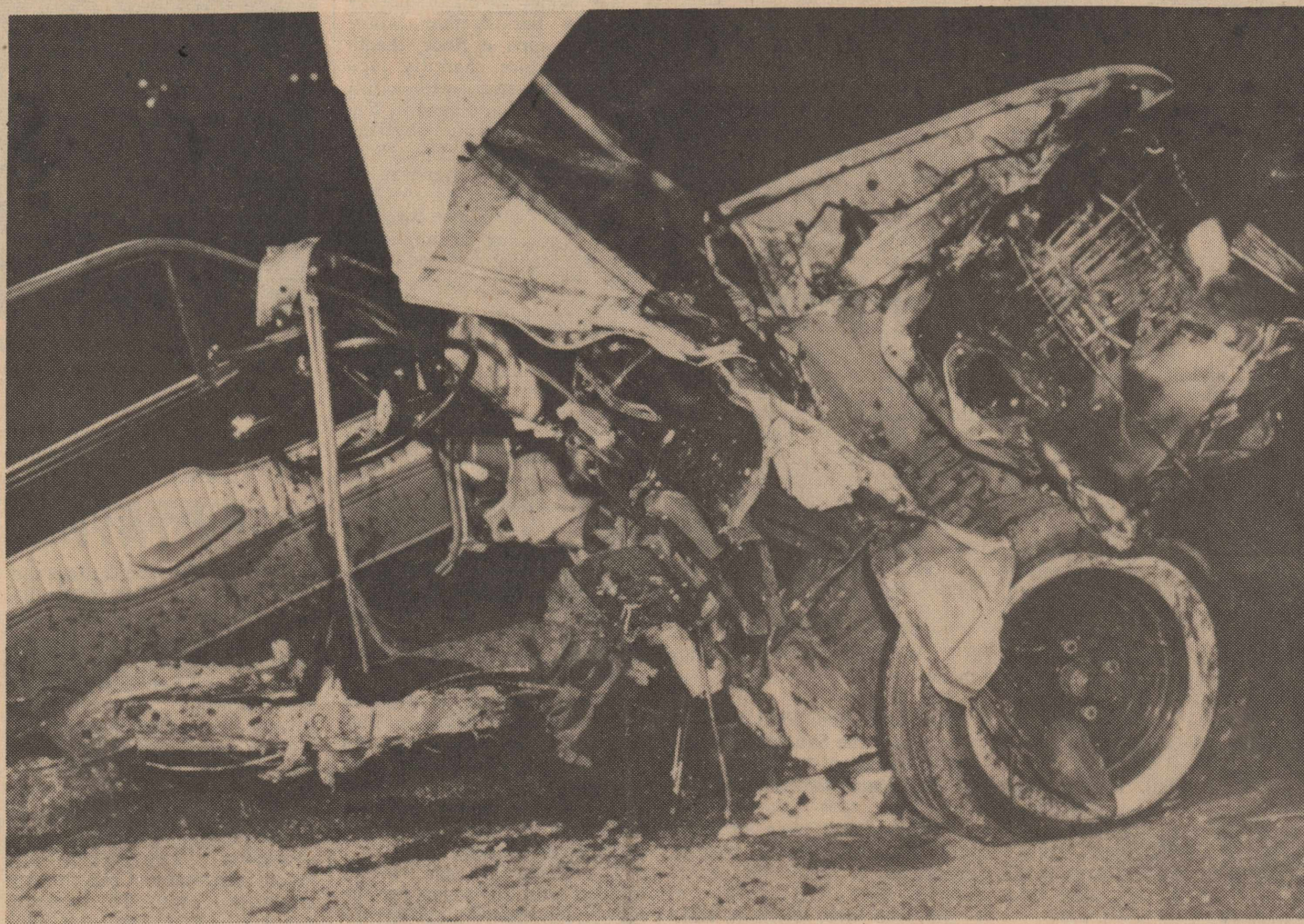
"Sometime during this time, a man drove up from the other direction. I asked him to go call an ambulance."

"After awhile, the ambulance hadn't come so I got to worrying about whether that fellow called or not. I think he was a Mexican, so I wasn't sure he understood me."

"I decided I'd better call, so I started back to my pickup. After I passed about the middle of the wreck area, I heard a sound coming from the ditch. It was a gurgling sound."

"I went toward it and found the Hooper boy lying face down in the dirt. He was cut up real bad. I got his face off the ground so he could breathe and then I went to my pickup."

"I went to an elevator at Halfway and called Plainview and Olton for ambulances. They told me they were on the way. . . ."

Cars, Tractor In Big Pile-Up

Investigation of an accident which snuffed out the life of a 17-year-old Olton boy and injured five other persons, one critically, continued Wednesday afternoon.

The grinding crash killed Gary Dee Copeland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Derwood Copeland of Olton, and critically injured Kenneth Hooper, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Hooper of Olton.

The mishap occurred Monday just before 9 p.m. on Highway 70 1 1/2 miles west of Halfway. Officers Wednesday said they had nailed down these facts about the accident:

1. The tractor, driven by Homer D. Ogle, about 50, of Halfway, and a Ford Falcon, in which Hooper and Copeland were traveling, were headed west. A car in which three Springlake men were riding was traveling east.

2. Witnesses who said they had seen the tractor shortly before the accident told officers both the front and rear lights of the vehicle were burning.

3. The right front area of the Falcon collided with the left rear wheel of the tractor, according to Highway Patrolman Thurman Keffer of Plainview. The impact apparently swung the Falcon sideways, into the path of the Springlake men's auto.

4. The Springlake car smashed head-on into the Falcon, the force of the crash cutting the Falcon in the middle, just behind the left front door of the compact.

The body of Copeland, who was killed instantly, was thrown to the edge of the highway, about 40 feet from the apparent point of impact.

Hooper was thrown across the highway, past a ditch to a spot near the edge of a field. The 200-pound youngster landed about 100 feet from the main area of the wreckage.

Hooper remained in critical condition Wednesday afternoon at Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, where he is being treated for head injuries, cuts and bruises. Attendants said he was semi-conscious Wednesday afternoon.

Dividend checks totaling \$159,000 were handed out Saturday night by Olton Co-Op management at the annual stockholders meeting.

The board of directors will meet July 10 to reorganize and elect new officers.

Special guests at the meeting were Otto Keys of Lubbock, assistant manager of Plains Co-Op Oil Mill, and Dan Davis, manager of Plains Co-Op Marketing Association, Lubbock.

The Olton Co-Op Gin is building a new gin, which will give them a total of three gins.

Patrolman Keffer said Wednesday he had not completed investigation of the accident. No charges had been filed.

Asked to clarify the law regarding tractors traveling on highways, especially at night, Keffer said: "It is not against the law, so long as both

Funeral services for Gary Dee Copeland, 17, victim of a two-car and tractor wreck Monday night 1 1/2 miles east of Halfway on Highway 70, were conducted Wednesday afternoon at the Olton High School auditorium.

Last rites were read at 3 p.m. by the Rev. Robert White, pastor of Valley View Baptist Church. Gary Dee was a member of the church. The Rev. White was assisted by the Rev. Doyane Merriman and the Rev. Martin Landers.

Burial was in Plainview Memorial Park under direction of Parsons Funeral Home, Olton.

Gary Dee, who would have been a senior at Olton High School next fall, is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Derwood Copeland, Olton; a sister, Mrs. DeVern Mandrell, Olton; the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J.R. Chandler, Morton; and paternal grandmother, Mrs. Cassie Copeland.

The youth was active in FFA work in high school and took part in many stock shows. He also participated in an FFA skill judging team that placed fourth in the district in 1959.

Calvin Horn, who taught Gary in vocational agriculture, said, "He had a great character and disposition and got along with everybody. He would just kinda back off and grin."

Pavers Plan Finishing Touches Here

Finishing touches on Olton's paving project will begin this weekend, according to Bill McMorries, engineer of the project.

McMorries said all streets being completely paved were finished Wednesday, and the remainder of this week will be used "to clean up and patch old streets." He said about 82,000 square yards of paving have been done.

Workmen will wind up the whole project next week by patching and resealing about 60 blocks of old pavement. McMorries said the city council hopes after final expenses are tallied, enough money will be left to reseal all old streets.

The engineer said he expects total costs for the paving to run about \$200,000. He said the final figures will be submitted to the city council after the project is completed.

"I think the new paving work should give Olton the best paving facilities it has ever had," McMorries stated.

"I would like to ask all citizens to drive particularly careful next week after we finish, so they won't damage streets. It will take about a week for the asphalt to cure."

The paving project here included curbing and gutter work, the laying of six inches of caliche base, prime coating and three layers of asphalt and gravel, according to Clyde Boyd, foreman of the penetration work.

Hodges and Tierney Co., Lubbock, is paving contractor. McMorries and Associates of Amarillo is the engineering company, and First of Texas Corp. of San Antonio is handling finances.

Potato Harvest Begins To Roll

Potato harvest in the Olton area got underway Wednesday at the L.A. Johnson farm, three miles east of town.

J.B. Williams, who is harvesting the 40 acre crop, said he expects the potatoes to produce about 200 sacks per acre, which Williams described as an "average yield."

Williams said about 500 acres of potatoes are in the Olton community and "almost ready to harvest." Marion Green, J.T. Toller, Clifford Carlisle and Vernon Carlisle Jr. are a few local farmers raising the crop this year.

Market price for potatoes is \$2.75 a sack F.O.B. according to Williams, who ships potatoes from a shed at his farm, west of Olton.

Scattered Hail Again Whacks Crops In Area

Rumbling clouds played "hit and miss" with area farmers last Saturday as tornadic thunder storms danced through the community leaving heavy hail and rain damage to crops, and smashing telephone poles at one farm.

Threatening clouds have plagued the Olton area repeatedly with rain and hail the last few weeks. Most farmers agreed they have had enough rain, as weeds began to choke their young cotton in wet fields.

Some hail was reported in every direction from town, as rainfall totaled up to 4 inches on several farms.

"What must have been a little tornado took a strip of our cotton and tore down two telephone poles," said Mrs.

Wayne Carson, referring to their farm 15 miles northeast of town.

She said about 10 acres of the cotton was damaged, but her husband plans to leave it. Carson finished wheat harvest last week.

Mrs. Carson said the Vernon Bostick and Tom Witten farms, located near their farm, also received heavy hail damage.

A strong wind, thought to be a tornado, lifted a stock tank into the air and dumped it into a nearby field and tore branches from two trees, at the Emil Sorley farm, 13 miles northeast. About 4 inches of rain fell at the farm.

Two inches of rain was reported at the Mickey McGill

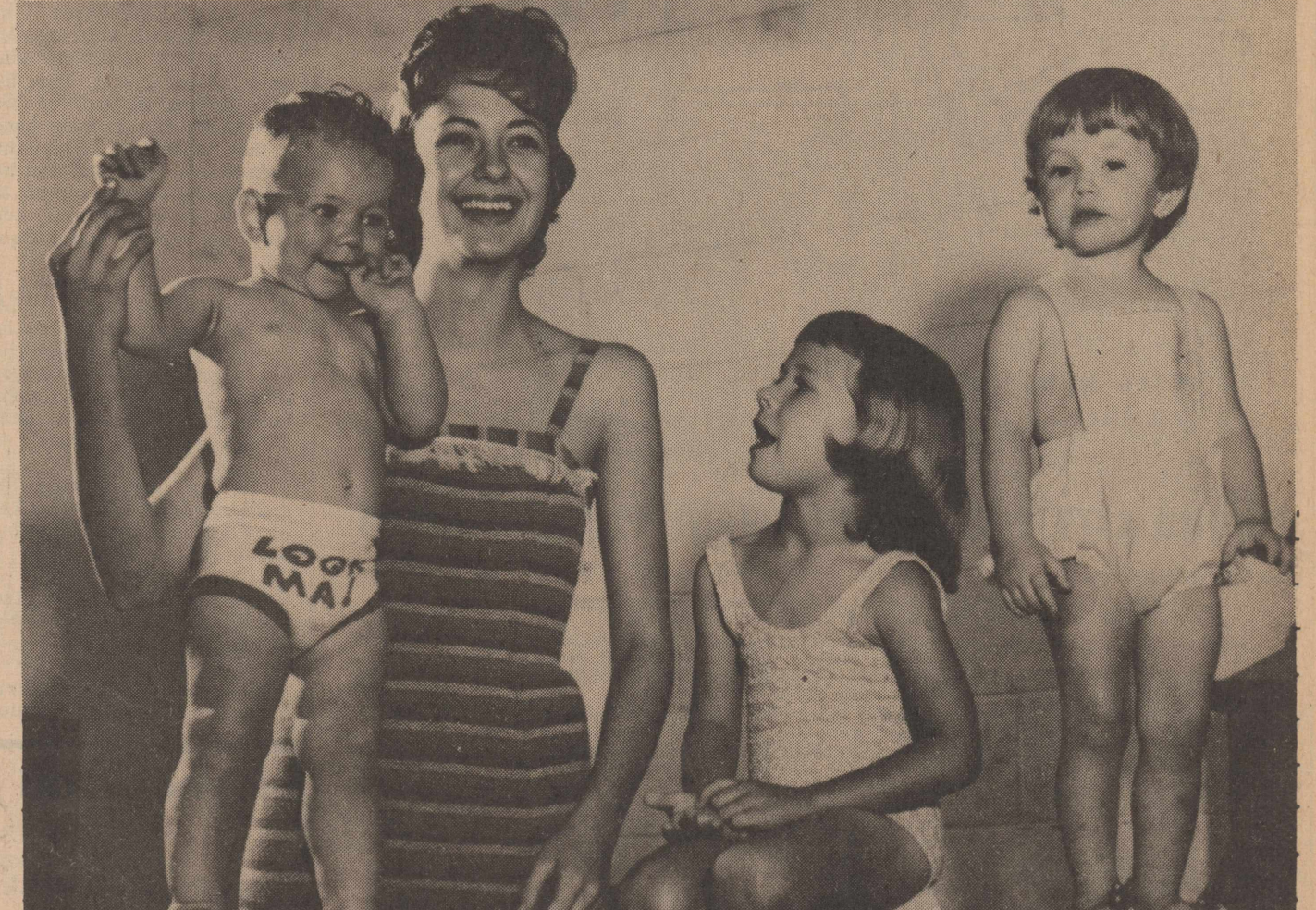
farm, 4 miles south and 2 1/2 west of town. Mrs. McGill said the hail "really beat up their cotton."

"Our cotton is just stubbs. It was early cotton and real pretty until the hail," said Mrs. Leslie Kennedy, 3 miles south and 1/2 mile west. Six inches of rainfall in the last 10 days, with two inches Saturday, have fallen at the Kennedy farm.

Mrs. Kennedy said 100 acres of their corn and 50 acres of feed were "beat up real bad."

Mrs. Roy Thurman, 4 1/2 miles south, said one of their cotton fields had about 80 percent hail damage and the other 50 percent. About 3 1/2 inches of rain fell at the Thur-

A Hart youth has written a song that Star-Crest Recording Co. in California, is considering recording in an album entitled "Music of America."

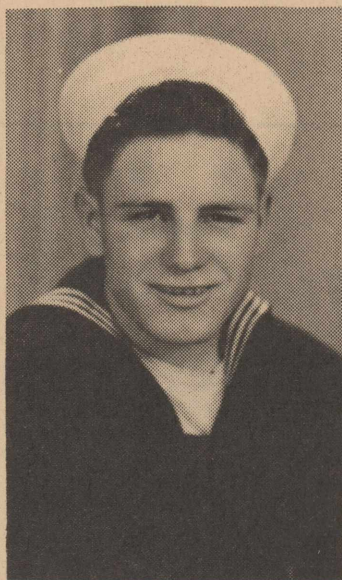
He is Curtis Davis, 20-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Cole of Hart. Green-Henderson of Hart is his grandfather.

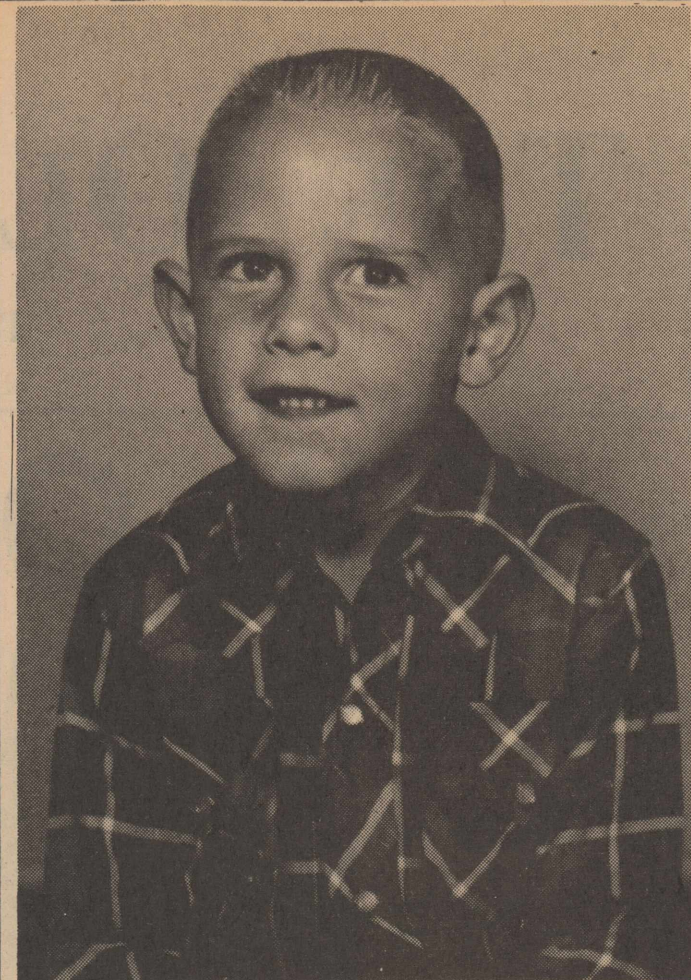
The Rev. Denzil Leonard, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Hart, performed the double ring ceremony.

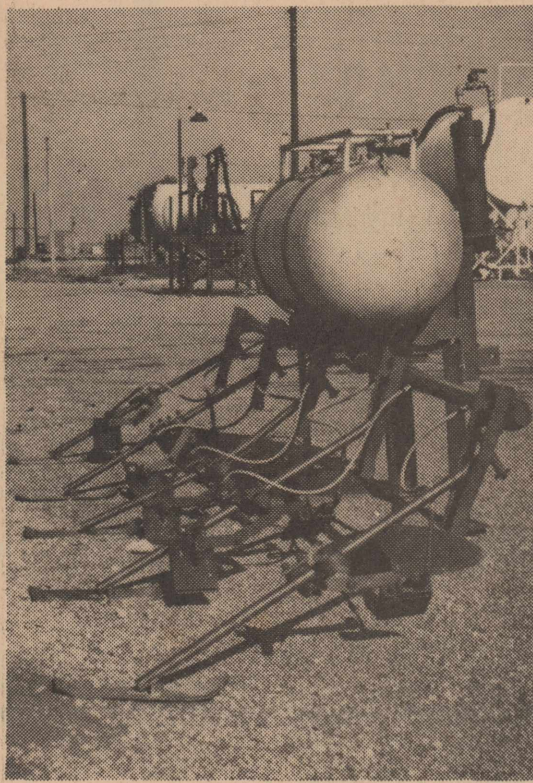

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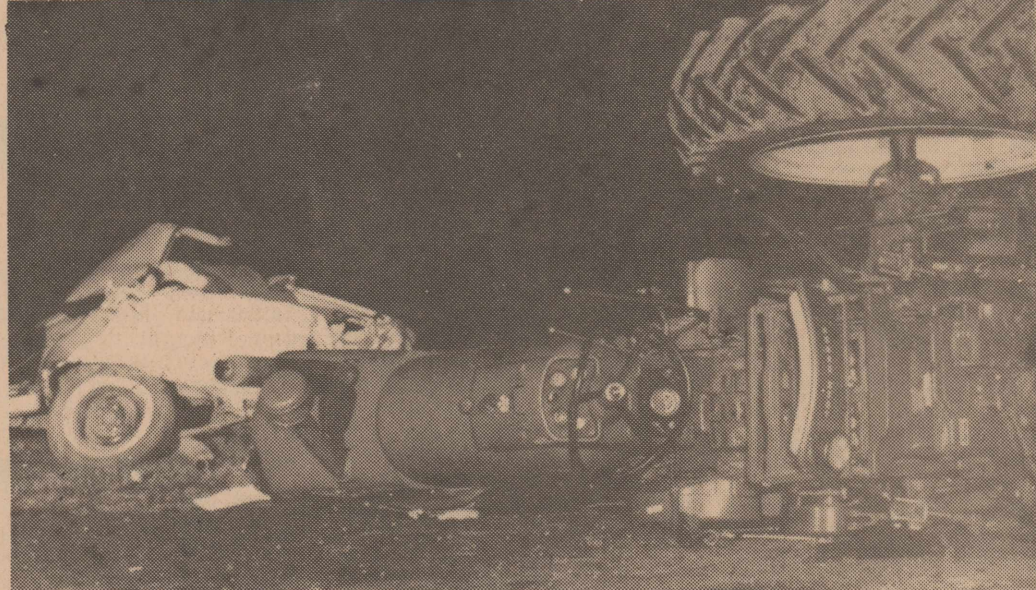

Olton Workers Kick-Off Halfway Station Campaign

Thirty-four Olton farmers and business men turned out Tuesday morning for a breakfast kicking off a fund campaign here for the High Plains Research Foundation, Halfway.

Cleo Smith, Olton, board member of the HPRF presided at the meeting, which was held at the Legion Hut. Among those attending was another Olton board member, I.B. Holt.

Farmers and businessmen present at the session took pledge cards to begin a drive for support of the Foundation during the next five years.

They'll report back Friday night at 8 at a meeting at the high school cafeteria. The public is invited to this meeting.

Refreshments will be served and slides of the station's activities will be shown by Delbert Langford, a staff member. Reports will be made by the campaign's team captains.

Smith is general chairman of the drive. Team captains are Elmer McGill, J.C. Hamby, Bill Walden, Owen Norfleet,

Dan Gregory, Bill Kelley, Louis Hair, Barton Prestridge and Ed Thompson.

The HPRF is seeking a total of \$620,000 for its operations during the next five years. In Hale County, about \$120,000 has been raised so far and the drive is expected to continue six to eight months.

Olton is one of many communities in 21 counties of this area in which funds are being raised.

"We should all take pride in the station," said C.H. Jane-way, HPRF staff member. "It is supported by farmers and businessmen and receives no funds from the government."

"Olton is the closest community to the station," Jane-way said, "and the people here were among those who took the lead in getting it started."

Speaker at the Tuesday meeting was Homer Garrison, Plain-view, who told the group the station has done much to "boost the economy of this area."

Visiting Students Like Olton Welcome

"Just amazing. . ."

These were the words agreed upon to describe American hospitality by five Ambassadors For Friendship who paid Olton a two-and-a-half day visit this week, while on a tour of the U.S.

"We are very impressed with the hospitality of American people. Such hospitality is not found in Europe," commented one of the students.

The young college men arrived in Olton Tuesday morning from Tulia and departed this morning for the Grand Canyon in Arizona.

They were Ravinder Batra, 18, of India; Bert Campbell, 18, of Luxembourg; Gerhard Wessler, 28, of Germany; Dick Johanson, 20, of Cedar Falls, Iowa; and Lyle Dykstra, 21, of Madelia, Minn.

Another youth, David Knight of Scotland, was scheduled to accompany the group to Olton. However, he became ill and remained in Tulia.

"Ever since we arrived in Texas, people have been trying to convince us it is the greatest place in the world. Even in Europe I heard that Texans think their state is the greatest in the world. . . I don't blame them," said Campbell.

"We really have enjoyed our stay in Texas. . . the climate, people and land scape are wonderful. We are slowly being persuaded that Texas is the center of the universe," added Johanson.

"The purpose of our tour is to meet, talk with and exchange ideas and philosophies with American people. . . this is an educational tour, not a vacation at the people's expense," Johanson stated.

The five youths, including the two American and three foreign students, are studying in northern colleges.

The group had some new and interesting experiences while visiting Olton.

A golf ball may be small, but it presented a big problem to the three foreign students who had never played before Wednesday at the ORC golf course. Another comical

experience the boys enjoyed here was playing pool. Two of the youths said they had little previous experience at pool, but they were game to try.

The young men went swimming Tuesday at ORC pool. Wednesday they were guests of the Dimmitt Lions Club.

While in Olton they were guests in the James Spear and Robert Meinecke homes.

Since the youths began their tour two weeks ago from St. Paul, Minn., they have had first hand views of the segregation problem in Little Rock, Ark., and the "freedom riders" in Jackson, Miss.

"We were mistaken for 'freedom riders' in Jackson and weren't too well received unless people knew who we were," said Campbell.

While in Jackson, Ark., the group attempted to enter a Negro church, but were threatened by a sheriff to be arrested for breach of peace if they went into the church. The sheriff said, "We ain't ready to mix whites and Negroes here."

Johanson said the incident occurred "because they didn't understand our purpose. Most of the people were very nice. We received great hospitality there once they understood our purpose, bed bugs and all," he joked.

Perhaps one of the group's first and last experiences was staying in the women's dorm at SMU, while visiting Dallas. "But no girls were there, it was just for guests," one of the youths sighed.

Batra said he saw his first rodeo while on the tour. "I liked it, but I wouldn't want to do it. I'll just watch," he laughed.

Wessler won four tickets to a hot rod race at the rodeo, but the group's traveling schedule did not permit them to use the tickets.

Nothing could be more breath taking than a person's first roller coaster ride. This was the opinion of Campbell, who had his first experience with the midway thriller.

The roller coaster looked a little to thrilling to Batra and Johanson, who said they "just held the coats and cameras."

All of the young men went inside their first cotton gin while at Tulia. When asked how it impressed him, one foreign student replied, "It just looked like alot of machinery. . . I couldn't understand how it works."

One of the students said he hoped the group could tour a gin and elevator while visiting here.

There are 11 groups of friendship ambassadors touring the U.S. this summer. The tours are sponsored annually by Harry Morgan, who originated the idea, and Reader's Digest.

The nation-wide program of educational travel is designed to give foreign students studying the U.S. a chance to see for themselves how American people live.

After leaving Olton the group will tour parts of Arizona, Nevada, California, Oregon, Washington, Wyoming, and South Dakota before returning to St. Paul, Minn., July 30.

A similar group visited Olton last year.

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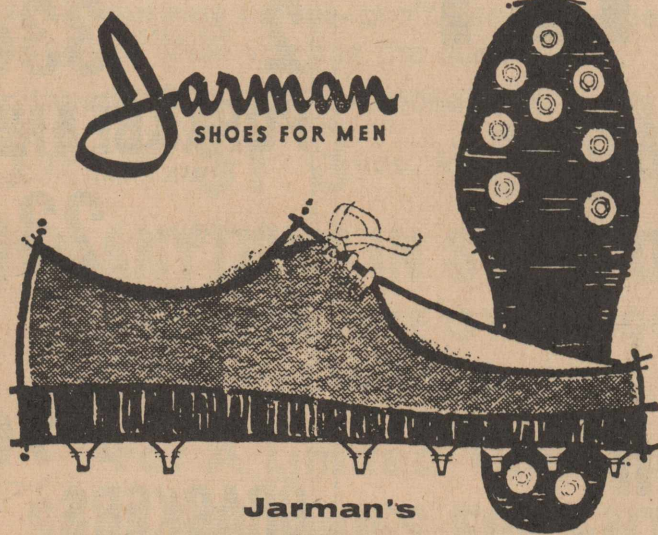

County Birth Rate High During Last Five Years

(Special to the Enterprise) New York-Lamb County women declared extra baby dividends in the 1955-60 period. An analysis of data gathered by the Census Bureau last year reveals that the local birth rate during that span was relatively high.

In the technical and unpoetic language of the bureau, the growth is discussed under the heading "fertility ratio." That figure, it states, represents the number of children under the age of five, in any given locality, for each 1,000 women in the child-bearing ages, 15 to 49.

The significance of the ratio, explains the bureau, is that it indicates the natural growth tendencies in the particular community. That is a matter of great importance to merchants, to home builders and to city planners who must be able to gauge future needs. Lamb County's fertility ratio, based on the local under-five population per 1,000 women, is given as 57.

This compares favorably with

the figure listed for the United States, which shows 488 children in that age group per 1,000 women. In the West South Central States, the ratio is 51.

Where the proportion of small children is high, it means greater-than-average sales of juvenile furniture, such as cribs and baby carriages, more sales of baby foods and toys, bigger drug and medical bills, additional housing needs and all the other special requirements that go into the raising of children.

A study released last year, based on a Department of Commerce report, estimated that the yearly support of a one-year-old child amounted to \$436 and that it rose to \$581 a year when the child became five. By age ten, parents were spending \$679 a year.

Because of the higher birth rate in Lamb County, its households have become larger than those in many other localities across the country.

Locally, the average household now consists of 3.37 persons. It was 3.29 in the United States generally, and 3.36 in the West South Central States.

Government figures point to a rise in family size generally in recent years. They indicate a direct relationship between the degree of stability people feel in their economic and social conditions and the size of families they are able and willing to raise.
