



County Has 1636 Farms

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Lamb County last fall, counted 1,636 farms, according to a preliminary report issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The total number of farms in the county represented a decline of 151 from the 1,787 county farms in 1954, however a change in the Census Bureau's definition of a farm accounted for 15 of the decline.

According to the report, 97.5 per cent of the county's 654,080 acres of land area is

used for farming, or 637,481 acres. This is a decrease of approximately 22,000 acres from 1954.

The average farm size is 389.7 acres, an increase from the 368.9 average size in 1954.

The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$96,521 as compared with \$62,919 in 1954.

The Census Bureau also reports that the average value per farm acre has increased \$100 in the past five years to \$265.36 per acre.

Of the county's farm operators, 496 owned their farms, 419 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 720 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 44.9 years. There were 98 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

The report indicates a definite trend from small farms to larger acreages.

A breakdown by size shows there were 47 farms of 1,000 acres or more in 1959, four more than in 1954; the number of farms 500 to 999 acres increased from 199 to 239; and the number of smaller farms showed a decrease in every size division.

Chamber Launches Membership Drive

Roberts, Johnston Head Push

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture's board of directors Tuesday launched an all-out drive for new members.

Board members Allen Johnston and Roy Roberts were named co-chairman of the drive, with Johnston heading the push to add merchant-members and Roberts heading the farmer-member section.

Percy Parsons, C-CA president, stressed the board is seeking both businessmen and farmers to add to the Chamber's rolls, "because the Chamber benefits both the merchant and the farmer."

The start of the membership drive was scheduled prior to the Chamber's annual banquet. Ordinarily, the membership drive is held the month following the annual meeting.

However, board members heard an audit report for 1959 at a breakfast Tuesday morning and they quickly decided to go ahead with the campaign for members at this time.

The report showed Chamber receipts in 1959 were about \$7,800, while expenditures were about \$8,800.

Dues for farmers are \$3 per month or \$36 per year. In town, businesses pay from \$5 to \$15 per month for membership. Memberships for individuals connected with businesses are \$2 per month.

C-CA President Parsons pointed out that surveys have shown every dollar spent in a town turns over eight times.

"The Chamber constantly strives to better the economy of the community and every merchant in the city benefits by the Chamber's work. It follows that every merchant should be a member of the Chamber," Parsons declared.

He added that the Chamber works equally as hard to better the farmer's position, pushing such programs as cucumber and sugar beet acreage

While the Rosses were living in Copper Center, Alaska, "Red" led their sled over about 4,000 miles of snow trails, never once losing his way.

In Olton, however, "Red" had his troubles.

"He'd just never seen this much open country," says Ross. "There weren't enough trees for him to remember how to get back."

Shortly after the Enterprise carried a story on Red's disappearance, Ross got a call from Gerald Elkins, who lives nine miles northwest of Olton.

Active with his farming interests until about one year ago, Smith also was one of the first trustees of the former Clements rural school district west of Hale Center.

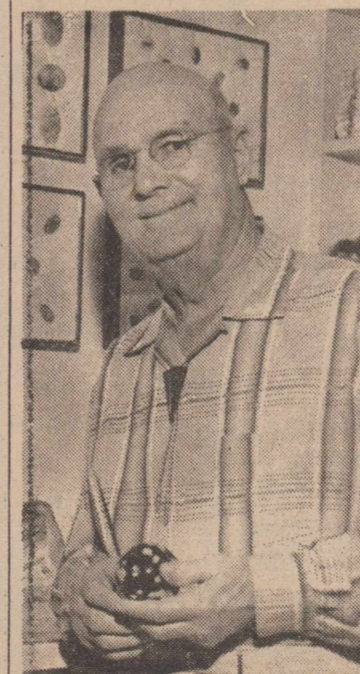

Walter Schreier Claimed By Death

Walter A. Schreier, a long-time Olton area farmer, suffered a fatal heart attack Dec. 31 while a supper guest at the Preston Sampler home. A native of Kansas City, Mo., he would have been 65 Jan. 10.

Last rites were conducted Monday at the Olton First Baptist Church with the Rev. John E. Lewis, pastor of the church, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. J. R. Jennings.

The Schreier family moved to the Olton area in 1906 from Kansas City. He farmed southwest of town until his retirement five years ago.

Schreier served 18 months in France during World War I with a medical detachment. He was assigned to the 142d Infantry with the 36th division. During World War II, he was a member of the Lamb County Draft Board.

He was an active and faithful member of the First Baptist Church, Olton.

A charter member of the Olton American Legion, he also served three terms on the local school board.

Schreier's main interest, other than his home and church activities, was rock hunting. He helped organize rock clubs in both Plainview and Lubbock.

The Lubbock rock club was established in 1958 and Schreier was one of its directors. He was serving a term of club treasurer when he died.



Plains Bucks Population Trend

As the year 1960 comes to its end, population trends in Texas confirmed by the Federal decennial census have now been given some study and evaluation.

What the findings in general add up to are that the thinly-populated, open-country areas of the State are becoming even more thinly populated while more people are flocking to counties which already are thickly populated.

Over-all, in round numbers, the total Texas population increased from 7,700,000 in 1950 to 9,500,000 in 1960, a rate of growth amounting to 23 per cent against the national increase of 17 per cent. Only two states outstripped the 1,800,000 gain in Texas: California, which had an increase of about 5,000,000, and Florida, which grew by slightly more than 2,000,000.

But despite the over-all gain in Texas, 144 out of the State's 254 counties showed losses in population. This was an approximate follow-up of trends established in the decade from

1940 to 1950, with the losses in total population confined largely to counties which have no sizeable towns or cities and which offer little in the way of industry.

However, there were some exceptions to the movement away from rural counties. Some of these counties, mainly in West Texas and in the Panhandle, showed steady gains in population. In general, these were counties which have developed farming by irrigation, are devoted largely to cotton and grain cultivation, and have resources of oil and gas.

Three of the older, comparatively thickly-settled counties showed the heaviest losses in population. These were Lamar County in North-east Texas, which lost 9,000 during the decade, Hill and Fannin counties in the old Blackland Belt, which lost 8,000 and 7,600 respectively. Then there were Rusk, Red River, Navarro, Cherokee, Falls and Limestone counties, all of which had losses of at least 5,000.

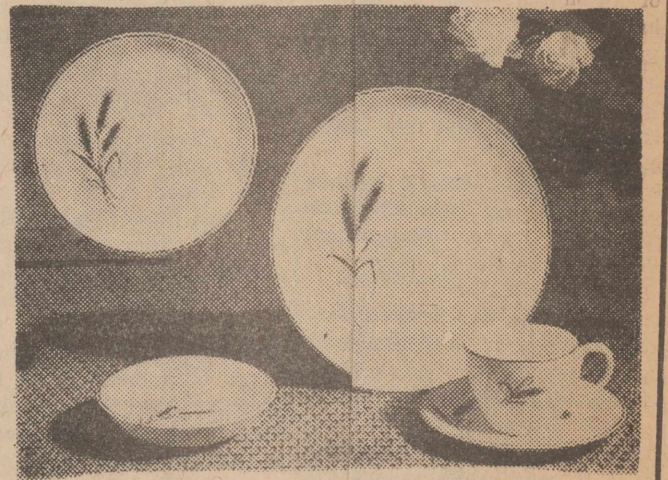

High Plains Water District Election Scheduled Tuesday

Voters in the Olton area will name a county committeeman Tuesday as the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District again conducts its annual election of directors and committeemen.

Polls here will be at the city hall. Candidates for the post are

Willie Gene Green and Bill Langford, both of Olton.

One other precinct in Lamb County, No. 4, will elect a county committeeman. Candidates are Lewis Fields and Henry Gilbert, both of Sudan.

Olton voters will cast ballots only in the race between Green and Langford.

A total of five men serve on the board of directors of the water district. Also, each county within the district has a County Committee that consists of five members.

The terms of office of three members of the board of directors expire this year, and the terms of office of two committeemen in each county also expire. Board members are elected for two years, and committeemen are elected for three years.

All qualified voters who reside within the bounds of the water district may vote in the election. The poll-tax receipt used for voting in the general election is the one that will be used for the water district election.

Voters who reside within District Director's Precincts No. 1 (Lubbock and Lynn Counties), No. 3 (Bailey, Castro and Parmer counties), and No. 4 (Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Potter and Randall counties) will elect one member to the Board of Directors from each precinct.

Voters will also elect two committeemen in each county. In Floyd County, only the voters who reside within county commissioner's precincts No. 2 and No. 4 will be eligible

to vote in the coming election.

In Lamb County, only the voters who reside within county commissioner's precincts, No. 1 and No. 4 will be eligible to vote in the coming election.

Qualified voters who reside within the district in any one of the other eleven counties that make up the High Plains Water District are eligible to cast a ballot.

Though He's 82

C. T. Mason of Olton told friends, in jest, 20 years ago when he quit farming: "I'm not retired... I'm just tired."

Today, at 82, Mason still makes the same statement—but he still doesn't really mean it.

He picked up a hobby about five years ago, and it's kept him young at heart.

Mason writes poetry.

He gets a big kick out of reciting some of his works, and he's done it before several groups here.

It's when Mason is reciting that you really get to know him. He gets a twinkle in his eye when he recites "Springtime," a poem he wrote about fishing.

"When Springtime comes, you can feel it in the air," he declares, "Not a cloud in the sky, and the sun shines fair."

Later on, as he gets to the heart of the poem, he says, with zest, "Hey! here he comes, he feels like a bounder, Oh, I believe he's a three or four-pounder."

He thinks the farmland here is wonderful, too, and he still owns the farm which he purchased in 1924 for \$30 an acre. The farm adjoins the town section on the west.

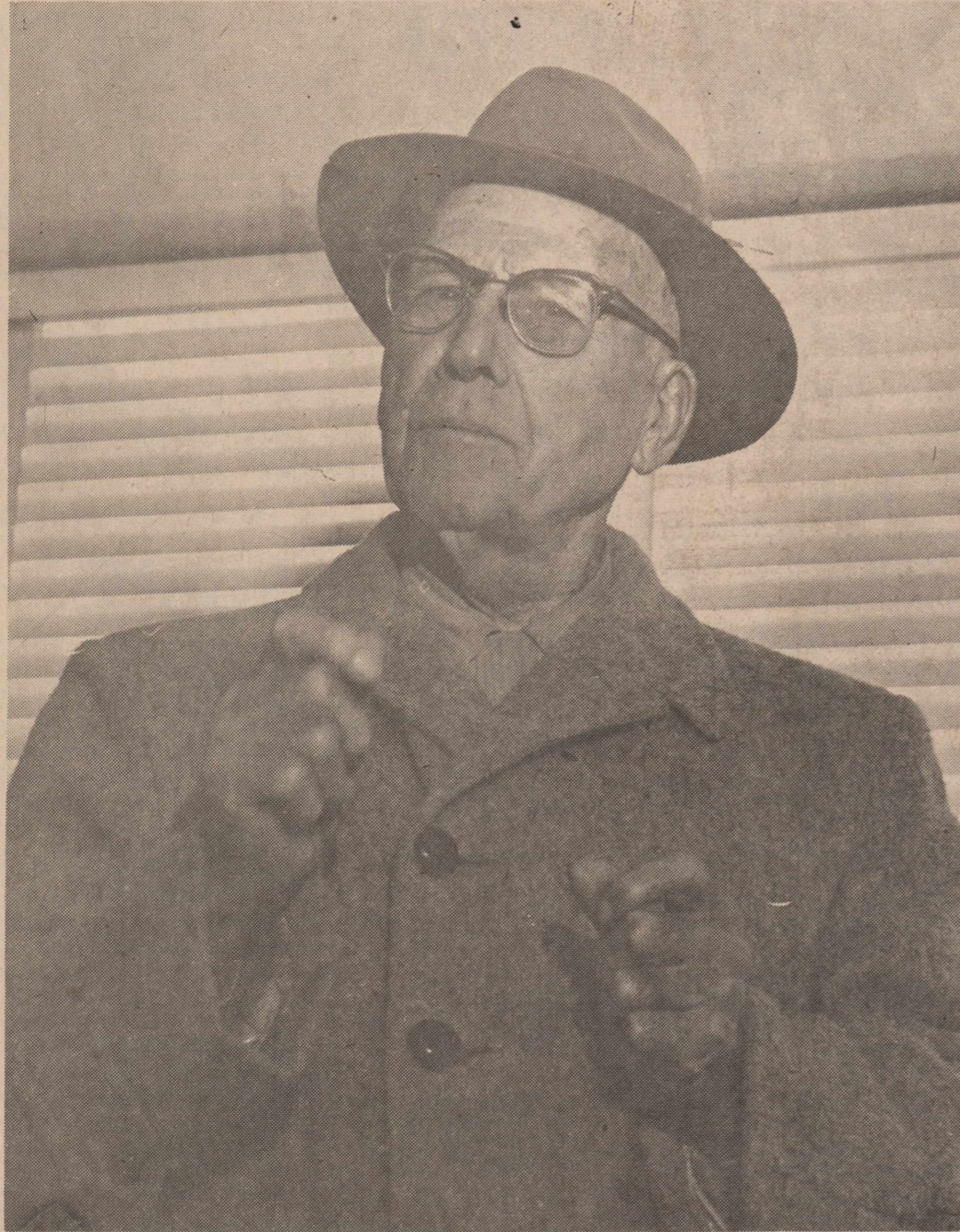

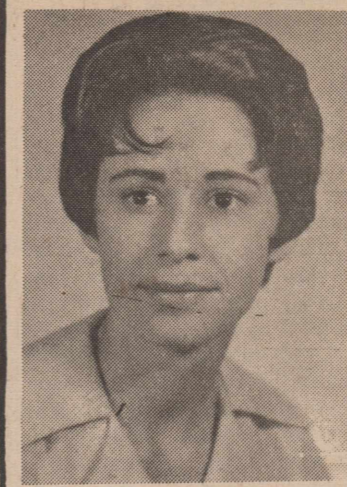

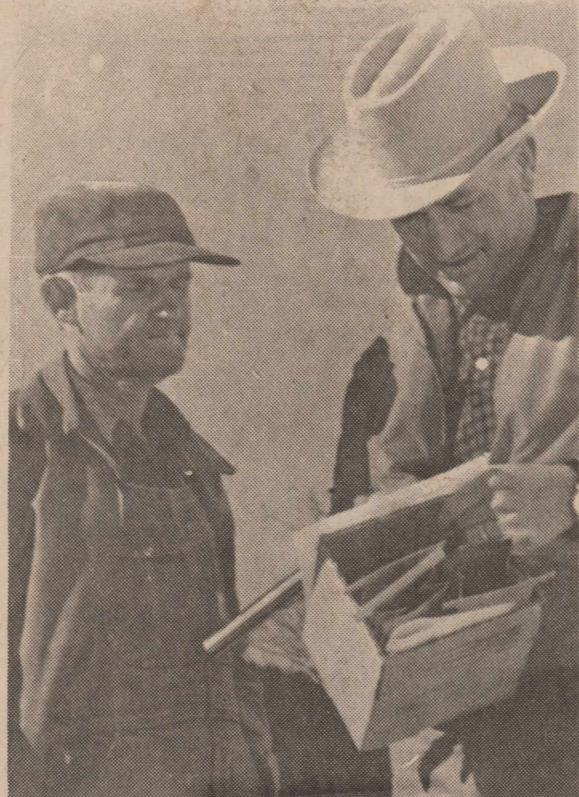

Questions Answered On Use Of Fertilizer

This is the time of year when farmers begin to look for answers to their questions about use of fertilizer.

One thing on which most farm experts agree is the need for every farmer to have a soil sample taken at his farm.

Here are some of the questions asked most frequently about fertilizers, and the answers, supplied by a major fertilizer manufacturer for farmers in this area:

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. If I fertilize this year, will I have to fertilize next year?

A. No. However, you will notice that the plant food in your irrigated soils is decreasing yearly. Without proper fertilization, your yields and profits will decrease similarly.

Q. Does a fertilized crop take twice as much water?

A. No. If plant food is needed, properly fertilized crops will produce more with the same amount of water than an unfertilized crop.

Q. When is the best time to apply fertilizer?

A. Preplant. Test after test has shown that a fast start in plant growth is worth more in yields than growth from fertilizer applied late in the season.

Q. Will cotton burs or grain stubble take the place of ferti-

lizer?

A. No. Cotton burs need to have fertilizer added the first two years they are applied. Grain stubble should have fertilizer added to it every year. Cost of organic matter should be compared with the cost and convenience of chemical fertilizers, plus the yield increases from them.

Q. In this area, how is the best way to apply fertilizer?

A. Chiseled into the soil in bands. Fertilizer applied this way is more available to the plant and is less likely to change into forms difficult for the plant to get.

Q. Why should I take a soil sample?

A. A soil sample analysis is an inventory of the plant food you have stored in your soil. Recommendations made from the sample should be used as a guide in adding plant foods to build up your inventory, but not as an exact prescription.

Q. If my crop does not use all the fertilizer I apply this year, do I lose it?

A. No. Plant food left in the soil at the end of the season stays in your "deep freeze" through the winter. After soil temperature drops below 60 degrees, nitrogen and phosphate leach very little, regardless of rainfall.

Q. Will fertilizer by itself

produce a big crop?

A. No. Fertilizer is only one production tool, along with water management, insect control, and your own personal way of farming. Fertilizer just provides the food for the plant; to make a big crop you must provide its other needs, too.

Q. Is nitrogen the same in all fertilizers?

A. All chemical fertilizers containing nitrogen are made directly or indirectly from anhydrous ammonia. Changing the nitrogen into other forms usually increases the cost. Nitrogen is the growth element in fertilizers.

Q. Is phosphate the same in every fertilizer?

A. No. All fertilizer phosphate begins with phosphate rock. Phosphoric acid and mixed fertilizers contain the most highly water-soluble phosphates manufactured. All phosphates are available to the plant, stimulate early root development and must be present in chlorophyll for food production in the seed for high germination.

Q. What does potash do for my crop?

A. Potash is usually thought of as the health and resistance element in fertilizers. It promotes a stouter stalk and healthier leaves. Most soil samples now show potash to

be high enough in our local soils.

Q. Will fertilizer burn my crop?

A. No. Recommended amounts of properly placed fertilizer will not burn your crops. In an experiment, an excessive rate of 300 lb. of anhydrous ammonia per acre did not burn cotton or grain sorghum.

harral; Frank, Odell Texas; Mrs. W. E. Emmett, Vernon; Mrs. Leon Hines, Mt. Shasta, Calif.; and Mrs. Louis McBee, Plainview. He has 14 other grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

In 1941, Mason retired from farming and everything . . . except fishing.

He wrote his first poem, "Coming back to Tennessee," in 1956 and has been writing poems ever since. A scenic trip to historical places in Washington, D. C., Virginia and Maryland, inspired the writing of his first poem.

Mason has this to say about his trip. "In August, 1956 - I washed my feet in the Pacific Ocean and in Oct. of the same year, I washed my hands and face in the Atlantic."

Music has been written for Mason's "Coming back to Tennessee" and he has a record of the song.

Here are excerpts from one of Mason's poems:

Texas, dear Texas, what a wonderful state,
You are big and beautiful, I know you're great,
I so often think of the historical Alamo,
I know you will ever shine with your name aglow.

There's Travis, Austin, and Bowie, all great heroes,
They loved life too, but they went as history goes.
They fought and died for the Lone Star State.
These with the other great heroes, who made Texas so great.

These great heroes, who have gone on before,
And have left behind great legends of yore.
They fought on and on and suffered their fate,
To make of Texas such a wonderful state.

In answering a friend's invitation to go fishing with him, here is what Mason wrote.

When winter is over, and there's no more snow,
I hope to meet you, on the banks of Buffalo,
And see you pull 'em out, and hear your happy shout,
Which will make others think you've caught a whale.

Here's one of Mason's favorites, "Springtime:"

When Springtime comes, you can feel it in the air,
Not a cloud in the sky, and the sun shines fair,
You smell the fresh earth, as you plant the seed and the field is all clean,
and you can't see a weed.

Then something else comes into your mind,
And you are off to town for some hooks and a line,
You just feel in your bones that it's fishing time,
When the fish make the reel spin, you'll have a good time.

Hey, here he comes, he feels like a bouncer
Oh, I believe he's a three or four pounder.
When you get him out he's not quite that big,
So you try for another with the same old rig.

When the day is done, and you are tired all right
But you just know you'll sleep good tonight,
And you know you'll eat good fish tomorrow,
Recreation like this will drive away your sorrow.

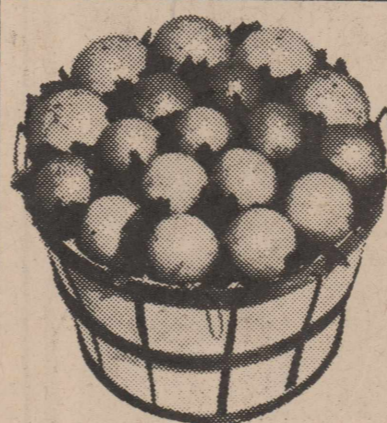

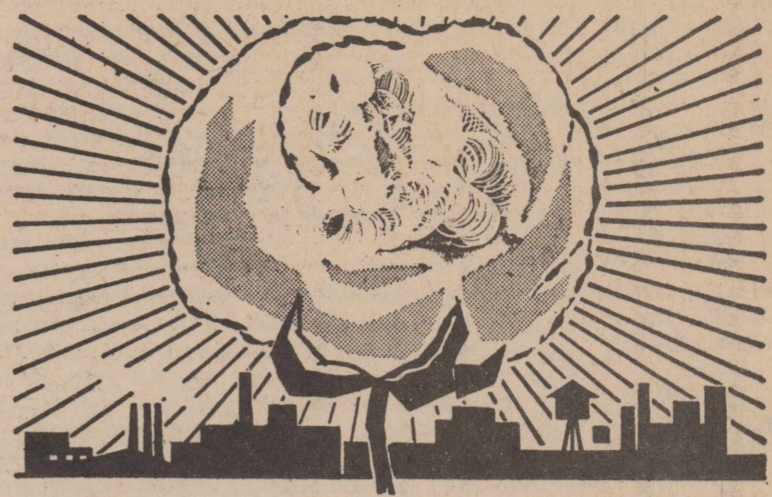

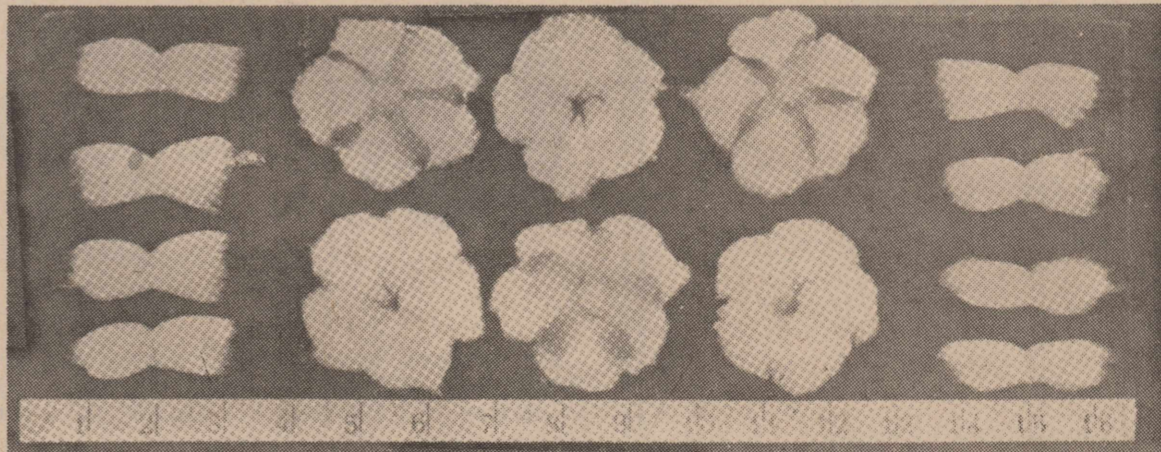

SWPS Slates Expansion Plan

To keep electrically ahead of the continuing growth of its 45,000 square mile service area, Southwestern Public Service Company will invest more than \$22,000,000 in construction and new equipment in 1961, it has been announced by A.R. Watson, executive vice president and general manager of the electric light and power company.

Watson added that the company's five-year construction and improvement budget anticipates a new equipment investment of \$117,000,000 between now and 1965. He also pointed out that the \$117,000,000 expansion figure equals the total amount that the company had invested in plant and equipment less than 10 years ago, and adds up to more than 45 per cent of the present day investment in plant and equipment of nearly \$260,000,000.

Looking at the national picture in the electric light and power industry, Watson pointed out that, contrary to a number of "scare" rumors that were prevalent during 1960, the United States had added more electric generating capability this last year than had Russia. "We frequently heard during 1960, usually from advocates of socialized government power, that Russia was overtaking the United States in the generation of electric power. The fact of the matter is that the United States has more than 2 1/2 times as much generating capability as Russia, and we increased our lead in 1960," he said.

Electric service took another giant stride in 1960 to bulwark its claim as the biggest bargain in the family budget. Southwestern's average rate for a residential kilowatt-hour dropped to 2.9¢ in 1960, as compared to 3.05¢ in 1959. The reduction in the last 10 years in the average cost of a residential kilowatt-hour to a Southwestern customer is 21.49 per cent. Only 1.3¢ of each dollar spent by American families goes for electric service, less than the ladies spend for cosmetics.

"Our customers naturally find their bills for electric service higher than they were 10 years ago, because they are using, on the average, 117 per cent more electric service than they did in 1951. A major factor in this increased use, in addition to the many services electricity performs, has been the fact that the unit cost has lowered in the face of increasing prices for everything else, including the things we must use to make the power," Watson pointed out. Southwestern, along with 10 other investor-owned electric companies in Texas, continues its research activities in atomic energy, through the program of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

"Present day atomic plants don't come close to the economy of the modern fuel-powered generating stations we are using in our area. What's more, we

have the advantage of a plentiful, although not inexhaustible, natural gas fuel supply. This gives us the opportunity for fusion research in atomic power which offers the possibility that ordinary sea water, which is certainly inexhaustible, would provide the fuel for electric generation," Watson said.

The nation's investor-owned electric companies paid nearly 2 1/2-billion dollars in federal, state and local taxes in 1960. In Southwestern's case, more than 24¢ of every dollar taken in is paid out in taxes.

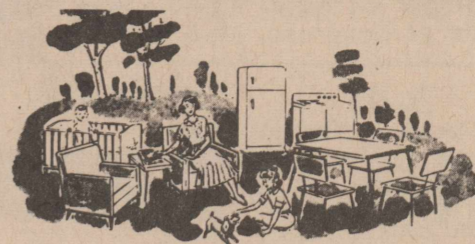
