



School Men Re-Hired

Contracts for Olton's three school principals, the head coach and band director have been renewed by the board of trustees.

All were given two-year contracts, according to Supt. Joe Harper.

They are Joe Turner, high school principal E. J. McKnight, junior high principal;

Fred Gordon, elementary principal; Walter Bryan, head coach; and Dick Bentz, band director.

The action came last Wednesday night at a regular school board meeting. In other action the board adopted an athletic budget for 1961 and approved monthly reports.

The board also took under advisement a guidance report prepared by the administration for students in local schools.

The athletic budget, totaling almost \$4,800, includes as its larger items; about \$800 for new football equipment, about \$575 for repairs to old equipment, \$580 for payment of game officials, about \$250 for scouting, \$375 for meals and travel, \$400 for awards, \$480 for insurance and about \$175 for medical supplies.

The budget for boys' basketball includes \$107 for equipment, \$81 for meals and travel, \$45 for awards and \$400 for officials. For girls' basketball, the budget shows about \$110 for equipment, \$93 for meals and travel and \$195 for awards.

Poll Tax Deadline Near; Sales Slow

Important Elections Coming Up

Poll tax receipts are selling at a snail's pace here, despite the fact that Olton has some important voting decisions ahead.

As of Wednesday afternoon, only 42 receipts had been issued at the city hall, according to City Secretary Berniece Smith. Some others have paid poll taxes at the time they sent in county-state tax payments.

Deadline for payment of poll tax is Jan. 31.

Although 1961 is an off year for elections a special election already has been set for April 4 to elect a U. S. Senator to fill the seat vacated by Vice President-elect Lyndon B. Johnson.

Also important to Olton voters is the election of city and school officials, scheduled in April. A poll tax receipt would come in handy, too, for any special elections called. Some observers here would not be surprised if a liquor option election is petitioned in 1960.

Olton will elect a mayor and two city councilmen in the annual city election in April. That could be the start of more elections, if history were to repeat. Mayor James is serving the unexpired term of Lefty Hollingsworth, who was serving the unexpired term of Carl Hooper, who was elected to serve the unexpired term of Mayor D. Y. Ray.

Mayor Ray resigned in 1959. Carl Hooper was elected by write-in in January of 1960, but he declined to fill the office. In April, the town elected Mayor Hollingsworth, who resigned after a heart attack. Then, in June, with no one on the ballot, the voters wrote in the name of Mayor James. And only Wednesday, Mayor James said he will not seek re-election.

The two councilmen whose terms expire are Bob Duncan and Fred Thompson. Neither has said whether he will run again. Two members of the school board will be elected in April. Terms of Lloyd Graham and J. C. Muller Jr. expire. Neither has announced his plans.

Phone Change Installation On Schedule

The installation of new telephone central office equipment for Olton is proceeding on schedule, according to R. E. Saunders of Littlefield, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

A five-man construction crew began work on numerous outside plant projects here last week in preparation for the conversion. Another crew of specialists from the Automatic Electric Manufacturing Co. is handling installation of the intricate central office equipment.

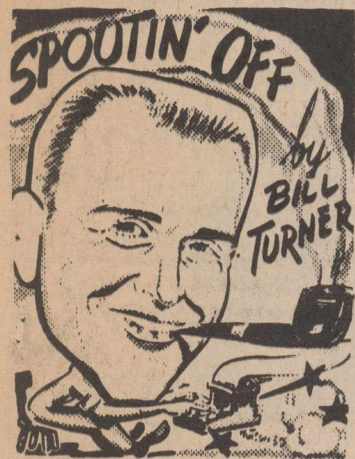
"All work is proceeding in accordance with the master schedule," said Saunders.

Olton's new central office will be equipped with the most modern dial telephone equipment available, the district manager pointed out. Cutover to the new equipment is scheduled for April. Littlefield will continue to serve as the master office for long distance calls to and from Olton.

Saunders indicated that the company will begin a four-way check shortly, and all new numbers will be assigned local subscribers.

IT'S pretty hard for most of us to realize what a threat Communism is to America. When we read about it, it's usually in terms of millions, or some other figure that's beyond our grasp.

Like when Congress starts dealing in billions of dollars, the term "billions" never quite gets across to us.

To say that Communist domination is spreading over the world doesn't mean much unless we can somehow shrink the world down to terms we can understand.

If the present population of the world, approximately 2,750,000,000, were compressed into a single town of 2,000 the size of Olton, the following picture of contrasts would be seen:

120 persons would represent the U. S. A., 1,880 would represent the rest of the world. 120 Americans would receive one-half the income of the town and 1,880 people would share the other half.

72 Americans would be church members.

600 of the town's population would be Christians.

1,400 would have other beliefs.

160 of the town's population would be card carrying Communists.

740 would be under Communist domination.

606 would be white.

1,394 would be non-white.

The 120 Americans would have a life expectancy of 70 years. The expectancy of all others would average under 40. Of the town's total supply, the average American would have 15 times as much as the average other person.

The Americans would produce 16 1/2 per cent of the town's food supply and would consume 15 per cent, storing the 1 1/2 per cent. Most of the 1,880 non-Americans would be hungry most of the time.

The 120 Americans would have: 12 times as much electricity, 22 times as much coal, 21 times as much oil, 50 times as much general equipment as the 1,880 non-Americans.

The lowest income group of Americans would be better off than the average of the other 1,880.

When we get the figures down to "our size," we get a better idea of how Americans fit into the world picture.

NOTICED this headline in the Italy, Texas, News-Herald the other day:

"Wayne Harris Employed to Wreck School Building."

That sort of thing never would be needed in Olton. I'll bet we could get our school kids to do the job for nothing.

Manager Dick Whiteley said the meeting will be at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday at the school cafeteria.

Visitors from Plainview are expected to be on hand to describe the type organization formed in Hale County.

"We hope to have several hundred area farmers out for the meeting," said Whiteley.

He pointed out that many area towns already have organized, "if we hope to get sugar beet production in our area," Whiteley said, "we are going to have to organize and work together toward it."

Holub Coming As Guest

Tech Coach To Speak At Football Banquet

J. T. King, Texas Tech's new head football coach, will be the principal speaker here Monday night at a banquet honoring the bi-district champion Olton Mustangs of 1960.

The affair, sponsored annually by the Quarterback Club, is scheduled at 8 p. m. Monday in the school cafeteria.

Expected to attend the banquet along with King is E. J. Holub, Texas Tech's fabulous All-American center.

A crowd of about 200 persons is expected. Tickets can be purchased at \$2 a plate from Conner Parsons, Bob Gullett and other Quarterback Club members.

Part of the program will be the announcement of captains for the 1961 Mustangs. Lettermen also will be announced. King, a 1938 graduate of the University of Texas, where he lettered at guard in football, compiled an enviable record at Kenedy and Enid, Okla., High

Schools before going into college ranks.

After two years as an aide to Wallace Lawson at Enid, King became head coach, and his first team was recognized as state champion. During his six seasons at the Oklahoma school, the team won its conference five times and was regarded as unofficial state champion three years.

King's college coaching career began in 1946, when Henry Frank summoned him to Tulane to help re-build that school's grid fortunes. King recruited so well in Texas that 14 of Tulane's top 22 players two

years later were from the Lone Star State.

After Tulane compiled a 9-1 mark in 1948 for the best record at the New Orleans school in the last 21 years, King returned to Texas to coach, first a year at Texas A&M, then to his alma mater in Austin. In his 1950-56 period at Texas the Longhorns won three Southwest Conference championships.

King, after serving successively as end coach, line coach, and head defensive coach, under Blair Cherry and Ed Price, was brought back to Texas A&M in 1957 by Paul (Bear) Bryant.

When Bryant moved to the University of Alabama following A&M's Gator Bowl appearance, King answered DeWitt Weaver's call to Texas Tech in 1958. King was named No. 1 assistant at Texas Tech in 1960. He succeeded Weaver as head coach at the close of the 1960 season.

All-America Lists 3 Olton Gridders

Olton's Mustangs placed three men on the 1960 Wigwam Wisemen of America national high school All-America teams, announced last week from Oklahoma City.

They are Bobby Brown, tackle, and Robert Priest and Rande Buchenau, backs.

Of the approximately 115 Texas boys who were named to the teams, only Olton and Borge had more than two representatives listed.

Only one Texas boy, Ernie

Koy Jr. of Bellville, was named to the first team. Bert Gravitt of Denver City made the fifth team and Junior Coffey of Dimmitt made the sixth team.

The three Olton boys and Eddie Parks of Floydada were the only District 2-AA players on the honorable mention list.

The 14th annual All-American team drew 7,280 nominations, an increase of 1,814 over last year. Assisting in the selection were 11,202 gridiron critics, including sports writers from 1,234 daily newspapers and semi-weekly publications, broadcasters from 1,957 radio stations and 734 TV telecasters. Over 5,000 votes were received from high school newspaper

A member of the First Baptist Church, Judge Burrow had lived here 16 years. He moved here from Plainview. He was born in Wise County, Texas.

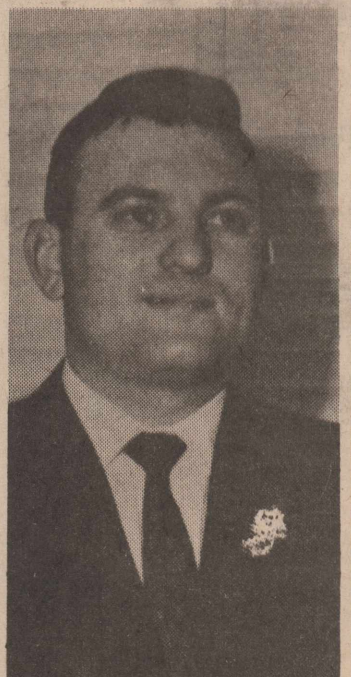

DEVIL'S FOOD CAKE
Two-thirds cup shortening
2 cups sugar

One-fourth cup cocoa
1 cup buttermilk
2 eggs
2 1/4 cups flour
2 teaspoons soda
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons vanilla
1/2 teaspoon red cake coloring
1 cup boiling water
Cream shortening and sugar, add vanilla and food coloring. Add well beaten eggs. Sift flour once and measure. Sift again with salt and soda. Add chocolate and mix. Add the dry ingredients alternately with the buttermilk. Add boiling water last.
Bake in a large cake pan for 50 minutes at 325 degrees.

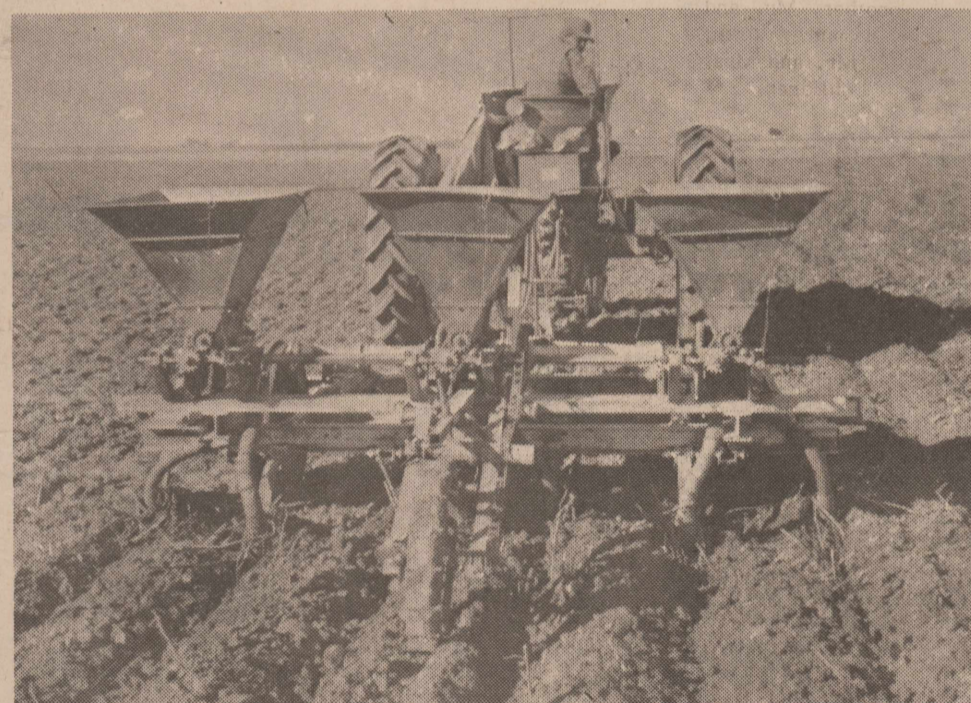

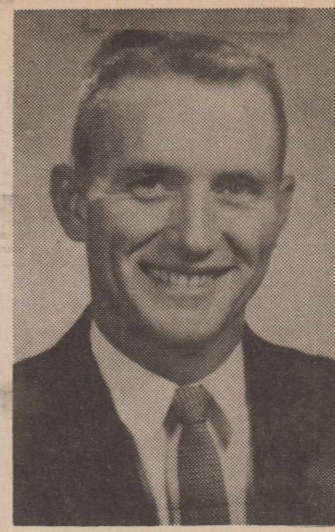
Dennis Kunkel Will Teach In Lutheran School In Kansas

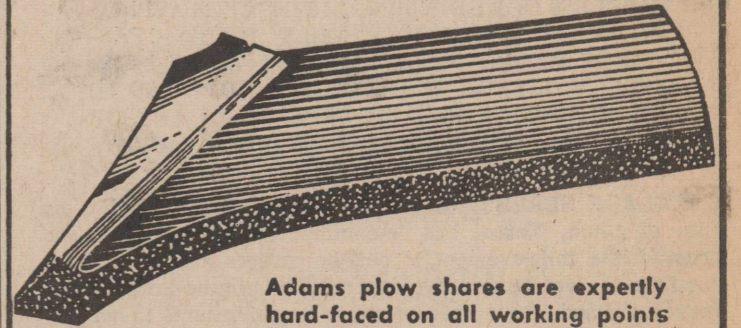

TO ALL OWNERS AND TO ALL PERSONS OWNING OR CLAIMING ANY INTEREST IN OR LIEN UPON ANY PROPERTY ABUTTING THE STREETS OR AVENUES OR PORTIONS THEREOF OF THE CITY OF OLTON, TEXAS, HEREINAFTER NAMED, WITHIN THE LIMITS HEREINAFTER SET FORTH, AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES AND TO THEIR AGENTS AND ATTORNEYS (INCLUDING THE OWNERS AND ALL PERSONS OWNING OR CLAIMING ANY INTEREST IN OR LIEN UPON ANY PROPERTY LYING OUTSIDE OR PARTIALLY OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS OF SAID CITY, WHICH PROPERTY ABUTS ANY OF SUCH STREETS, AVENUES OR PORTIONS THEREOF WITHIN THE LIMITS HEREINAFTER SET FORTH AT A POINT WHERE A PART OF THE BOUNDARY OF THE CITY OF OLTON IS UPON OR ALONG SUCH STREET OR AVENUE, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER SUCH STREET OR AVENUE AT THAT POINT LIES WHOLLY WITHIN, PARTIALLY WITHIN AND PARTIALLY WITHOUT OR WHOLLY OUTSIDE THE CITY OF OLTON, AND TO ALL OTHER PARTIES INTERESTED IN ANY OF SUCH PROPERTIES, INCLUDING THEIR AGENTS AND ATTORNEYS):

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED that the City Council of the City of Olton, Texas, has determined the necessity for and ordered the improvement of certain streets and avenues or portions thereof hereinafter described within the limits hereinafter defined, the nature of which improvements is hereinafter generally set forth; and that said City Council has approved and adopted the estimate, statement and report of the City's Engineer and has taken other proceedings with reference to the making of such improvements, all of which are of record in the Minutes of the City Council of the City of Olton, and has by ordinance ordered that a hearing be held, and notice thereof given, NOW THEREFORE,

PURSUANT TO SAID PROCEEDINGS AND SUCH ORDINANCE, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:-

That a hearing shall be given to the owners and to all

persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property abutting the streets and avenues or portions thereof of the City of Olton, Texas, hereinafter named, within the limits hereinafter set out, and to all other interested parties including their agents and attorneys (including the owners and all persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property lying outside or partially outside the city limits of said City, which property abuts any of such streets or avenues or portions thereof within the limits hereinafter set forth at a point where a part of the boundary of the City of Olton is upon or along such street or avenue, regardless of whether such street or avenue at that point lies wholly within, partially within and partially without or wholly outside the City of Olton and all other parties interested in any of such properties, including their agents and attorneys), before the City Council of the City of Olton, Texas, which hearing shall begin on the 27 day of January, 1961, at 7 o'clock PM, and shall be held in the City Hall of Olton, Texas, at which hearing all of said owners and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys, shall have the right to be heard on any matter as to which hearing is a constitutional prerequisite to the validity of any assessment sought to be imposed and to contest the amounts of the proposed assessments, the lien and the liability thereof, the special benefits to the abutting properties and the owners thereof by means of the improvements for which all of such assessments are to be levied, the accuracy, sufficiency, regularity and validity of the proceedings and contracts in connection with such improvements and proposed assessments, or concerning any matter or thing connected therewith. The said hearing may be continued from time to time and day to day until a fair opportunity for hearing has been afforded to all desiring to contest the said assessments or proceedings, and the City Council shall have the power to and shall correct any errors, inaccuracies, irregularities and invalidities, and shall determine the amount of assessments and all other incidental matters and shall have the power by ordinance to close such hearing, and by the same or by a later ordinance or ordinances to levy such assessments before, during or after the construction of such improvements, but no part of any assessment against abutting properties shall be made to mature prior to acceptance by the City by ordinance of the improvements abutting the property for which the assessment is levied. It shall not be necessary to levy all of the assessments at one time or by a single ordinance, and said hearing may be closed as to each portion of a street or avenue constituting a unit of improvement (as such units are designated below), after a fair opportunity for hearing has been afforded to all desiring to contest the assessments proposed to be levied against the owners and their properties

abutting on the portion of each such street or avenue constituting a unit of improvement; and the City Council shall then have the power to levy such assessments against such abutting properties and against the owners thereof, as provided herein and in the prior proceedings of the City Council herein referred to. No assessment will be made against any abutting property or the owner thereof in excess of the special benefits to such property and its owner in the enhanced value thereof by means of such improvements as determined at such hearing. All of such owners, claimants, and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys, are hereby referred for further information to the proceedings with reference to said improvements on file and/or of record with the City Secretary of the City of Olton, and particularly to the estimate of the City's Engineer, and to the proposed assessment roll wherein the exact amount proposed to be assessed against each abutting property and the owner thereof is set forth; said City's Engineer's estimate and said proposed assessment roll being on file in the office of the City Secretary.

II

The nature of the improvements for which assessments are proposed to be levied and to which this notice relates is the filling, grading, raising, paving, repaving of said streets or avenues or portions thereof within the limits herein stated, except where there is existing paving which can be utilized, and by the construction or reconstruction and the realigning of curbs and gutters where adequate curbs and gutters are not now in place, and by the construction of such other necessary incidentals and appurtenances as the City's Engineer has found to be necessary or advisable, all as shown by the plans and specifications of the City's Engineer, and by widening where necessary so as to attain the paved width from back of curb to back of curb which is set out below, utilizing existing paving where practical; said paving to consist of a triple inverted penetration asphalt surface course on a six (6") inch compact caliche flexible base, the exact nature of such improvements being more particularly shown in the plans and specifications which are on file in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Olton.

III

The streets and avenues or portions thereof to be improved within the limits fixed by the City Council are listed below as they have been divided by the City Council into separate and distinct improvement units. There is stated in connection with the listing of each street or avenue or portion thereof within the limits herein defined constituting each improvement unit

the estimated amount or amounts per front foot to be assessed against the owner or owners of properties abutting such street or avenue or portion thereof and against such properties, the estimated total cost of the improvements as to each improvement unit, and the width of paved surface to be attained from back of curb to back of curb.

Where one side of a street or avenue has existing paving which can be utilized and there is no such existing paving abutting the property on the opposite side of the street or avenue, no portion of the cost of the improvements will be levied against the property abutting the side of the street upon which there is existing paving which can be utilized; similarly, where there is existing curb and gutter which can be utilized abutting certain properties no assessment for curb and gutter will be levied against such properties.

The City Council has determined that the strict application of the front foot plan or rule in apportioning the cost of the improvements will result in injustice or inequality in those particular cases where as shown on the City map all or some of the abutting lots in the unit abut the street or avenue being improved along the side of such lots (i.e., lengthwise), which lots meeting such description are hereinafter referred to as Side Lots, unless the City pays a greater portion of the cost of the improvements abutting such lots than it pays toward the cost of the improvements of lots which abut endwise, such lots being hereinafter referred to as Fronting Lots. It has, therefore, proposed that a different rate per front foot be established for the improvement of that portion of each such street or avenue abutting Side Lots than for the portion of such street or avenue abutting Fronting Lots. For this reason, the proposed amount to be assessed per front foot is shown in two (2) separate columns below, one such column reflecting the amount to be assessed per front foot against Side Lots and the owners thereof, and the other such column reflecting the amount to be assessed per front foot against Fronting Lots and the owners thereof. Included in the front foot assessment rate in each unit as shown below is the sum of \$1.65 per front foot for curb and gutter. Where there is existing curb and gutter which can be utilized the front foot rate will be reduced by the sum of \$1.65 per front foot.

There is included in the estimated amount to be assessed against abutting properties and the owners thereof a proportionate part of all costs incidental to the construction of the improvements.

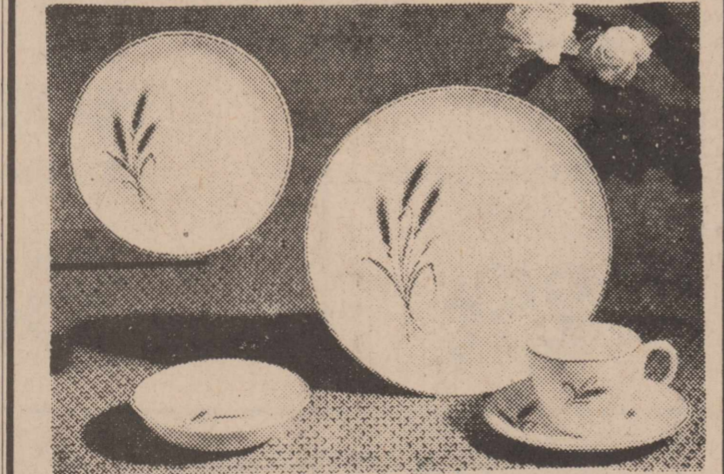
