



**THIS "Strange Day..."**  
I heard Dr. Hill, speaker at the Chamber banquet, repeat that several times the other night. It set me to thinking. We have a "western craze." It's so bad, said Dr. Hill, that one little boy took a gun to school because the teacher said the class was going to learn "to draw."  
Then he talked about the crazy songs of today. I never heard it, but Dr. Hill says there's one called "Take that watch out of your mouth, Grandma, you're gummin' up the works."  
It is, indeed, a "strange day."

A COUPLE of high school boys brought this point home to me pretty hard the other day. I offered them a chance to work a couple of hours last Thursday, inserting the second section of the paper into the first section.

Neither was interested. Of course, neither would have earned a fortune at it. They could have made a couple of bucks, though.

What happened to the good old days when a fellow walked into a place and asked for a job? They used to say, "It doesn't matter what it is, I'll do the work."

Now you have to hunt employees. And then, most of them want to know just what's involved before they'll take a job.

CONTRARY TO WHAT a lot of people say, times must not be so hard these days. People seem to be able to take their choice of work.

In the case of high schoolers, most of them don't have to, and don't want to, work.

I've heard some people worry over the fact that high school grads leave their small home towns because there's nothing for them to do. A little town just doesn't offer them the opportunity they want, so they say.

That may be true to some extent.

But I think the real fact of the matter is that most high school grads wouldn't touch a home-town job with a 10 foot pole.

THERE ARE plenty of exceptions, of course, but we are in an era when most people, young and not-so-young, are bent on taking things the "easy way."

We don't want to get our hands dirty, we don't want any heavy work, we don't want long work days, but we do want big, fat pay checks.

Like I said, there are plenty of exceptions. Take Lana Hair, our after-school reporter, for instance.

After the boys turned me down on the inserting job, Lana went to work sweeping out the office and began inserting papers, without me asking.

One of the finest young men I've ever known is Joe Alcorn, a youngster who did everything asked of him. . . and more, when he was working here. Now he's in college and working part-time.

Then there was Gayle Machen, a part-time worker until she went off to college. She always looked for something extra to do.

These are some of the exceptions, though, among our younger people.

And I'm beginning to learn fast that "you can't hardly get that kind no more."

## People Wanting Paving Asked To Sign Up

Sign-up on Olton's paving program is off to a good start, Tom Anderlitch, First of Texas Corporation representative, said Wednesday.

"If those who are for paving in their particular blocks will come in and sign up," said Anderlitch, "it will help expedite the program."

Anderlitch said the project "slows down" when city representatives have to get out and call on property owners to ask their cooperation on paving.

"We hope to have most of those who are in favor of paving come to the office for the sign-up," he said.

First of Texas, which is handling the financial end of the paving project for the city, is conducting the sign-up from offices in the city hall.

Most of the sign-up last week was for blocks in the east half of the city, from main street east, Work in the west section is expected this week.

## Hepatitis Case Reported; No Spread Seen

A single case of viral hepatitis has been reported in Olton, but Dr. Basil Johns, city health officer, said Wednesday he sees at present no danger of the highly communicable disease spreading here.

A Latin American child from Olton was diagnosed as having the liver ailment about two weeks ago at a Plainview Hospital.

The child, who attends grade school here, was confined to the hospital for a time but now is at home.

Dr. Johns said the rest of the child's family has been immunized against the disease. Other children in the family have been advised to remain at home for the next week.

"At present, we are not recommending inoculations against the disease," said Dr. Johns, adding that he felt more cases would have shown up by now if the ailment were going to spread.

## Dr. Hill Tells 200 At Banquet:

# Be A Success..Work For Olton

The way to be a success is "to do more for your community than it does for you."

And the way to reach that goal is to try those things which seem impossible, Dr. Leon Hill of Amarillo told a crowd of 200 attending Olton's fourth annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet here Friday night.

"We're living in a strange day," the Baptist minister said. "Why the monkeys in the zoo go crazy watching people on the outside."

The Amarillo humorist and philosopher pointed out that Americans must remain a "race of dreamers" and fight a war against mediocrity.

"The best song has not been sung yet, the best remedy to the common cold has not been

discovered yet. . . these and other things are waiting for you. "This is your day, you have the last appeal. If this be true, what are you waiting for? History is changed by people who decide to change it."

Dr. Hill continued: "You don't know what you can do until you try it. Twenty years ago, only a complete idiot would have tried to shoot the moon. Twenty years ago, we said 'What goes up must come down.' Now we say, 'unless it goes in orbit.'"

The future is "out yonder," Dr. Hill said. "You can do anything you want to."

Before reaching this serious note, Dr. Hill had the crowd roaring as he poked fun at people and things in this "strange day."

He took light jabs at farmers,

bankers, doctors and the American people in general.

"I came from a small town, where people help you out if you're in trouble and if you don't have any, they'll dig some up for you," said Dr. Hill.

"Back when I was young, we weren't very literary. The people in my town though a bulldozer was a tranquillizer. One boy studied all night because he had a blood test the next morning."

Now, said Dr. Hill, "We talk of going to the moon, but we won't even go to church."

"The banker is the man who will lend you money when you don't need it. . . The farmer used to believe in faith, hope and charity, now it's faith, hope

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# Truitt Sides Named Olton 'Man Of Year'

## Farmer-Businessman Gets Top C-C Honor

Olton's Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture---which from its beginning has placed equal emphasis on business and agriculture---Friday night named Truitt Sides, Olton farmer-businessman, as the town's "Citizen of the Year."

Presentation of a plaque to Sides for his service to the community came as a high point of the fourth annual C-CA banquet in the school cafeteria.

A crowd of about 200 looked on as Allen Johnston, secretary-treasurer of the Chamber, made the presentation.

"Several highly deserving people were nominated for this award," said Johnston, "but I believe you will agree we have found the most deserving."

Sides, in accepting the plaque, said: "I'm sure you have presented this to more deserving people, but never to one more surprised, I humbly thank you for this honor."

Sides, who came to Olton in 1938, is active in the Lions Club and the First Methodist Church and serves as president of the Lamb County Red Cross Chapter. He also heads the Olton Recreation Center Board.

After working as a vocational agriculture instructor here five years, Sides turned to farming in 1943. He operated the John Deere house from 1944-50. At present he has an interest in Hall-Sides Motor Co.

He served eight years as a school board member, five of that as president, and was on the city council three years. He is a past master of the Olton Masonic Lodge and is

now serving as Olton's Cub Scoutmaster. Sides and his wife Euna have three children, two married daughters, Mrs. Norma Jean Walden and Mrs. Danny Smith, and a son at home Danny Lee 10.

In addition to recognition of the "Citizen of the Year," the Chamber presented a plaque to Emmett Harper, last year's C-CA president, for his service.

Master of ceremonies was Joe Harper. Invocation was by Rev. Wilbur Gaede, pastor of the First Methodist Church.

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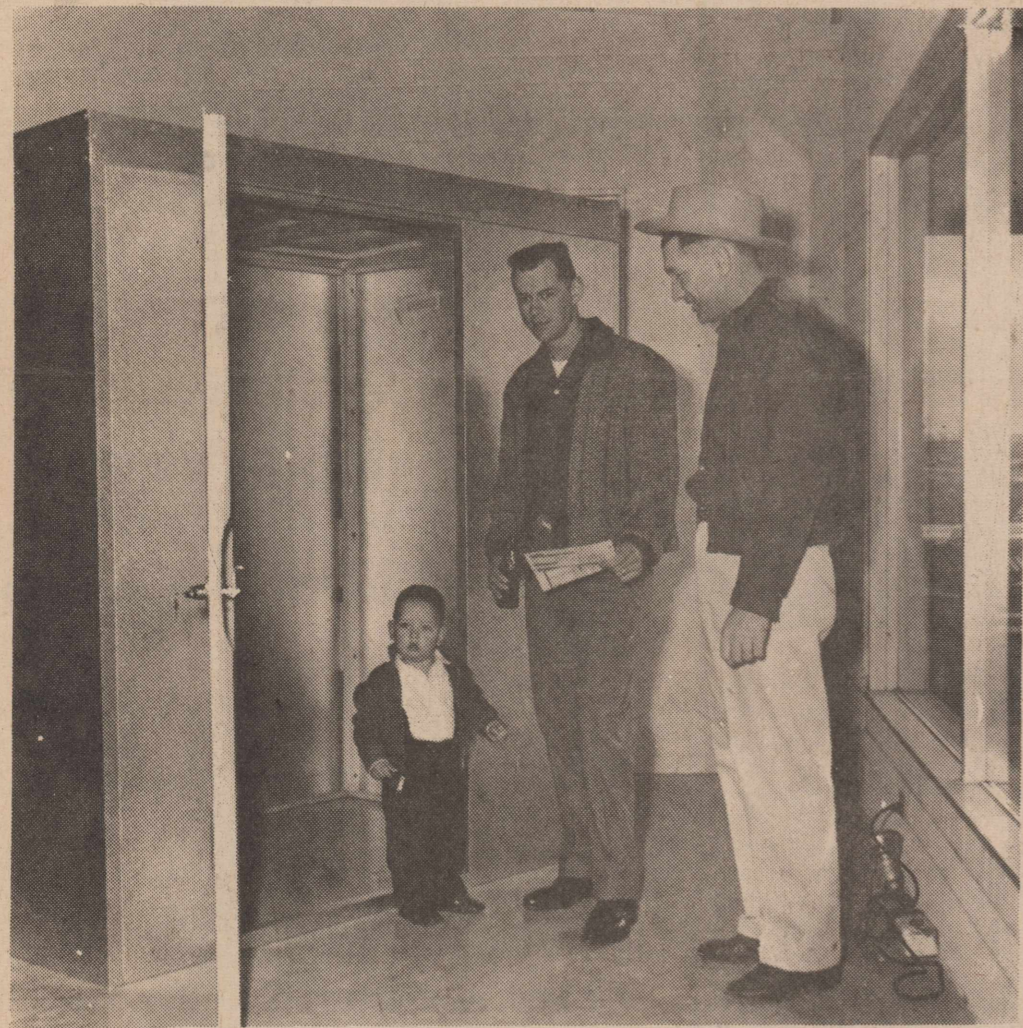

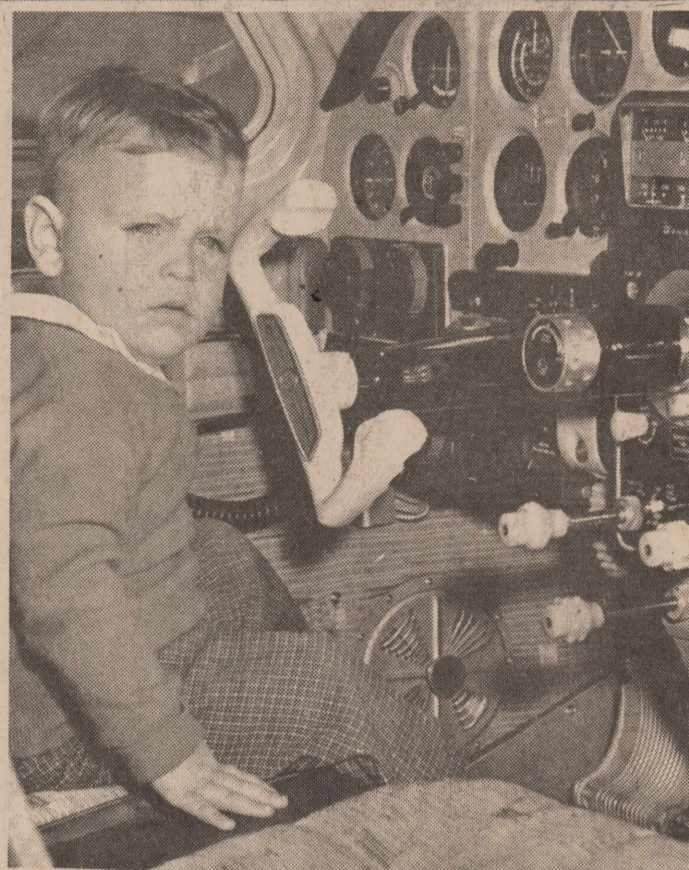
Hart basketballers split a doubleheader with Lazbuddie and dropped two games to Bovina in action last week.

### A New Industry For Olton

## The Plainsmen Farm & Ranch Now Offers A Pelleting Mill

THE PLAINSMEN Farm and Ranch on Highway 70 in Olton is now offering for this area the only pellet mill between Lubbock and Amarillo for cattle, sheep and hog producers.

"We are making three-quarter-inch, half-inch and three-eighths-inch feed pellets and range cubes," says George Caddel, operator of The Plainsmen.

Farmers and ranchers can bring in their grain and have it made into pellets and cubes with the necessary supplements added. The Plainsmen also will make up to a 50 per cent protein fattener cube.

According to W. T. Berry Jr. of the Texas Extension animal husbandry staff, "No feeding innovation since the introduction of sulbestrol has quickened the pulse of the beef producer like pelleting has done."

Berry pointed out that pelleting saves on storage and transportation space by compressing fibrous, bulky feed into firm pellets. He said, "An all-concentrate ration occupies about the same space in either meal, grain or pelleted form, hence, no particular advantage. On the other hand, in an all-roughage ration the savings in storage space may be as much as 900 percent."

Pellets are well suited for automatic feeding equipment. Berry said research shows that even in less specialized feeding setups, pellets usually can be handled more economically than feed in loose form. Pelleting also tends to reduce nutrient losses, eliminates bagging expense and dustiness.

"The most consistent improvement in performance from feeding pelleted mixed feed has come from limiting concentrates to about 30 to 40 per cent of the mixture, adjusting the types of roughages in the mixture to attain a crude fiber content of about 20 to 22 percent," Berry said.

Note these advantages cited by Berry: Fine grinding and pelleting practically eliminates cud chewing, hastens the movement of feed-stuffs along the digestive tract, usually brings about a lower total energy loss than is associated with coarsely ground un-pelleted feeds, and increases propionate production within the rumen. Propionate is a fatty acid associated with more efficient gains.

Let's look at some research results in feeding pelleted roughage. Berry said 60 short yearling Hereford steers were fed in 6 groups for 168 days at Lubbock to compare the feeding value of pelleted and ground cottonseed hulls and loose hulls. Grinding cottonseed hulls did not cause an increase in average daily gain over that of steers fed loose hulls, but a group of

10 steers fed pelleted hulls averaged 0.24 pound more daily gain than the non-pelleted group. In another feeding trial, steers fed pelleted cottonseed hulls as the principal roughage had an advantage in gains (7.1 percent), feed efficiency (6.0 percent), carcass grade and financial return over those fed loose cotton seed hulls.

Steers fed an all-pelleted ration or pelleted roughage with loose concentrates at Ysleta made equal gains and both groups made higher gains than steers fed a loose mixed ration. The steers required 2.5 to 14.5 percent more loose feed than pellets to produce equal gains.

Thirty bulls and 22 heifers from the Texas A&M College registered beef cattle herds were divided into experimental groups on Nov. 1, 1959 and confined and fed in dry-lots for 163 days to study the value of pelleting Coastal Bermudagrass hay.

They were hand-fed a daily concentrate allowance, equal for all groups, of 3.6 lbs. ground sorghum grain and 0.9 lb. cottonseed meal. In addition to the daily concentrate allowance, 15 of the bulls and 11 of the heifers were self-fed Coastal Bermudagrass hay. The other half were self-fed Coastal Bermuda grass hay pellets.

All of the hay, in either form, was produced from one field in 3 cuttings. Half of the bales in each cutting were sent to the pellet mill, pelleted, sacked and delivered to College Station, and the other half was delivered to College Station to be fed loose.

Pellets were self-fed in wooden troughs and hay was fed in metal hay racks. The wasted hay was weighted back to determine the losses.

An average of the performance of the bulls and heifers showed that roughage intake was increased 35 percent with pellets. Differences in gains were even more dramatic. Cattle on pellets gained 67 percent more than those on the loose hay. A little over 43 percent more feed was required on the loose hay to achieve the same gain. If pelleting costs had been \$11 per ton, each \$1 invested for pelleting would have returned \$2.

Pelleting cost at The Plainsmen Farm and Ranch will be \$7.50 per ton.

Studies at Iowa State show a 12 per cent efficiency gain in cattle through use of pellets, 16 per cent efficiency gain in sheep and 19 per cent in hogs.

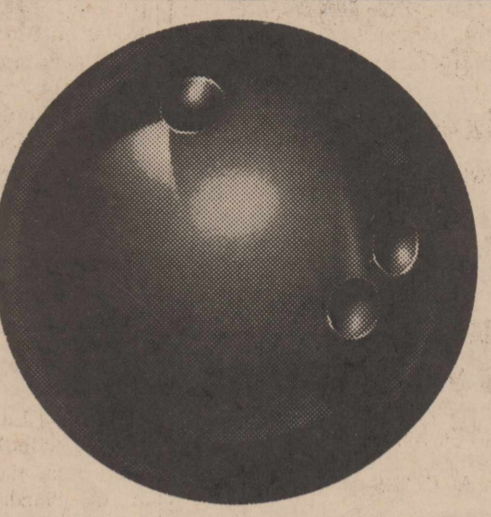
